| 1. | 2. <u>Blackdown Support Group (BSG)</u> David Corden (Chairman) and Barbara Starkiss informed the council of the key aims and objectives of the group. A summary is given below.   |        |
| The object of the Support Group is to relieve sickness and preserve and protect good health among persons permanently or temporarily resident in the area of benefit by providing or assisting in the provision of services not normally provided by the Statutory Authorities.  |        |
| The group offers a great many services but by far the largest is providing transport to clients on trips to the Doctors, Hospitals and other medical appointments. The BSG serves hospitals in Taunton, Exeter, Chard, Axminster and Wellington, to name but a few, as well as the occasional trip to Bristol when specialist treatment is required.   |        |
| The operating costs are approximately £36k per year, which roughly balances with the annual income. Of that income, approximately ½ comes from grant funding and donations such as that received from HPC.   |        |
| Over 22 years, the BSG has been fortunate to benefit from legacies, bequests and donations from grateful clients and their families, and the Trustees have placed these monies in mid to long term investments to hopefully secure its future. It is the long term aim of the Trustees to have sufficient in reserves to enable the BSG to be self-funding, but it should not be forgotten that there is a duty of care on all Statutory Authorities. The current estimate is that the BSG will need around £1m to enable this to happen and the group is proud to say that it is on its way towards achieving that aim, although it is some way off yet.  |        |
| The future of grant funding is unknown at the moment, and if it does suffer cuts the options are limited. The group could lay off staff, pass on the shortfall to the clients - which the Trustees would be reluctant to do, or draw down on the reserves. The view has been expressed that the BSG should stand on its own and not receive funding from Hemyock Parish Council. This view is understandable, but with the present level of reserves the future would be limited. The grant the group receives from Hemyock Parish Council is extremely important in helping the BSG to provide support to those Blackdown residents in need and the group hope that members will continue to look upon the BSG favourably in years to come. |        |
| Councillors thanked the BSG representatives for their informative briefing.  |        |
| 3. Public Questions 3.1 Culmstock Road Development A member of the public raised the issue of traffic calming outside the Culmstock Road development. As part of the Planning Consultee process the council has already suggested to MDDC the need to move the 20mph speed limit and install traffic calming plateaus similar to Station Road/Longmead. | 7. District Councillor Mr Frank Rosamond gave an update. The usual topics of budget and economic development were mentioned. Solar farms are on the increase. Neil Parrish MP on a recent visit commented on the subsidies available, suggesting they are too much. Mr Rosamond will research the efficiency of the solar panels fitted to council owned properties and report back.  8. County Council Report County Councillor Mr Ray Radford gave an update. A member of the public had commented that traffic lights were installed to mend a pothole, and the pothole had since reappeared. ## 11. Shooting on the Commons

The council and others met with Richard Thomas from Natural England on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> March 2013. He viewed the site and gathered information from the Gun Club representatives and the Rough Shoot Syndicate representatives. In summary, the landowner (Hemyock Parish Council) may grant permission to shoot on the Common without having to apply to Natural England for restrictions. However, if no restrictions are in place, members of the public might walk onto the Common whilst a shoot is taking place, causing danger to the public and disruption to the shoot. The landowner may exercise its Discretionary 28 Day restrictions but would need to apply for further restrictions to cover all Gun Club and the Rough Shoot Syndicate dates.

The following motions were put forward to be considered at the earliest opportunity.

11.1 Hemyock Parish Council agrees that written permission for shooting on its Commons may be granted, subject to such controls and agreements that may be required by The Council from time to time, to organisations or groups requesting this permission, by written application to The Council. (Those organisations or groups (e.g. Culm Vale Gun Club and Rough Shooting

- Syndicate N. Moon) having existing permission for shooting whether verbal or written or access for shooting on the Commons over a substantial period of years are deemed to have priority in any application to the Council).
- 11.2 That use of Discretionary Powers under S22, Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 is agreed by Council for 4 days in March and April 2013. This will allow Culm Vale Gun Club to use Hemyock Common (Turbary) for clay shooting on 16<sup>th</sup> & 30<sup>th</sup> March and 13<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> April 2013, prior to any restriction application to Natural England agreed by The Council.
- 11.3 Hemyock Parish Council agrees to apply to Natural England for restrictions under the Act permitting continued use of Hemyock Common (Turbary) for clay shooting by Culm Vale Gun Club and prohibiting public access on grounds of public safety and disruption, when shooting is in progress on given dates. These dates to be published annually in advance x? months before commencement of shooting by Culm Vale Gun Club. (full details to be agreed with both parties subject to grant of restrictions by Natural England and in advance of commencement of shooting)
- 11.4 Hemyock Parish Council agrees to apply to Natural England for restrictions under the Act permitting continued use for shooting on Hemyock Common (Turbary) by the Rough Shooting Syndicate and prohibiting public access on grounds of public safety and disruption. (Dates and times to be published annually in advance, x? months before commencement of shooting by the Rough Shooting Syndicate. (full details to be agreed with both parties subject to grant of restrictions by Natural England and in advance of commencement of shooting)
- 11.5 Hemyock Parish Council agrees to apply to Natural England for restrictions under the Act permitting continued use for shooting on Shuttleton Common by the Rough Shooting Syndicate and prohibiting public access on grounds of public safety and disruption. (Dates and times to be published annually in advance, x? months before commencement of shooting by the Rough Shooting Syndicate). (full details to be agreed with both parties subject to grant of restrictions by Natural England and in advance of commencement of shooting)

**PROPOSED**: Mr McCulloch **SECONDED**: Mr Clist

**DECISION:** Agreed to meet on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> March at 7.30pm\*. Mr Povah strongly disagreed with the speed of the proposal and felt it didn't give the council enough time for public consultation.

\*Please note post meeting it was discovered that meeting on Monday did not give the necessary 3 clear days' notice. Therefore a new meeting was arranged for Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> March, 6.30pm in the Forbes Lounge.

11.6 Mr Major suggested the council form a group working with all interested parties to look at managing all of the commons in the parish.

**PROPOSAL:** The council establish a Parish Council led 'Commons Management Group' with the aim of mitigating as far as possible the effects of all users of the commons.

## 13. Clerk Update

## 13.1 TAP Fund

The joint application for Culmstock, Clayhidon and Hemyock has been submitted. The total amount available to the three parishes amounts to £3136.10: the application bid is for £8569.39 and we await a response.

## 13.2 Code of Conduct

DALC has issued an amendment to the Code of Conduct the council adopted in August. In summary, NALC's view is that the regulations are hard to follow and open to different interpretations. NALC had interpreted that some Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPIs) only applied to the member and others applied to the member and the member's spouse/civil partner. The Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) has interpreted that all DPIs except sponsorship apply to the member and member's spouse/civil partner. Consequently NALC recommends members follow the DCLG interpretation and has therefore amended the Appendix A wording. In terms of the Register of Interests Form that all councillors have completed, these were produced by MDDC and already state that the declaration includes spouse/civil partner and therefore there is no further action necessary

**PROPOSAL**: The council adopts the amended Appendix A as recommend by NALC.

**PROPOSED**: Mr McCulloch **SECONDED**: Mr Major **DECISION**: passed.

## 13.3 Email Addresses

At a recent DALC training event the subject of Freedom of Information and Data Protection was mentioned. It was suggested councillors may want to set up a completely different email address for council business, making it simpler and easier to keep the emails separate from their normal work/home emails. This will be considered as part of the standing orders work see 13.5 below.

## 13.4 Website

The council pages of the village website need reviewing and updating. Councillors to inform the clerk of any comments/ideas about what should and shouldn't be included on the web pages.

## 13.5 Standing Orders

Clerk has researched this subject extensively and has model standing orders to use. A working group needs to take this forward and agree specific orders. Mr McCulloch, Mr Barton, Mr Clist and Mr Povah will work with Clerk.

13.6 Police Update

Below is a report received from PCSO Tracey Peters for the last month:-

Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> Feb – At around 2340hrs, an altercation occurred between two males at the village hall. As a result an 18 year old male received a small cut to his head, although he did not want to make a complaint against the offender. Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> Feb – At 2230hrs, a vehicle collided with a wall on Station Road. The male driver was arrested following a positive roadside breath test. Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> Feb – At 0910hrs, police were called to a domestic assault. Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> Feb – At around 1235hrs, two males entered the Spar shop. One male placed some sweets in his trouser pockets and left the store without paying. Offender has been identified and the case is currently being dealt with by our Crime Investigation Team.

## 18. Garages Youth Project

Council representatives met with John Hart, leader of Devon Council, to ask him to progress the transfer of the original grant from the BHLC to the parish council. The council provided him with the information he requested and wait for a decision after a meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> March. Mr Povah and Mr Brooke have been working on specifications for the project. Mr Brooke will no longer play an active role in the construction side of this project and Mr Povah and Mr Major have agreed to take this forward. The Council thanked Mr Brooke for all his work on the project to date.

## 19. CLT

19.1 The following report was received from Neil Punnett, CLT.

> Following the unanimous decision of Mid Devon District Council's Planning Committee to approve the Culmstock Road affordable homes planning application on 6<sup>th</sup> February, the CLT's main focus has been on working with Hastoe Housing Association and the District Council's planning and housing departments on the Section 106 Agreement including the Lettings Allocation Policy. The deadline for finalising the agreement is 18<sup>th</sup> March.

We have also been involved in the application for grant funding from the Homes & Community Agency to support the affordable homes project. The SW Investment Review Group of the HCA approved our application on 6<sup>th</sup> March. The application now progresses to the National Housing Programme Board of the HCA in mid-April.

## 20. Devon Remembers WW 1 Memorials

Mr Barton attended a meeting with Mike Cooper (Hemyock History Association) at Devon Heritage Centre on 25<sup>th</sup> February. The aim of the initiative is to focus on the county's war memorials in time for the WW 1 Centenary next year to ensure that they are all in good order. It is hoped that various groups in communities will work together to discover the stories behind the names of the people inscribed on the war memorials (including WW 1 survivors) and the social changes that took place in rural communities during the WW 1 period. Grants of up to £10k may be available from the Heritage Lottery Fund for submissions which demonstrate good involvement within communities and leave a lasting legacy with the project. Mike Cooper has agreed to lead on the social aspects of the WW 1 and Mr Barton is happy to ensure that the physical aspects of Hemyock's war memorial are in order. If anyone has any particular war stories they wish to share with Mr Barton please let him know.
