# Hemyock Tomorrow Consultation Document

Following open meetings held in order to discuss villager's concerns and hopes for the future, seven working groups consisting of parishioners and parish councillors were set up to prepare reports. Their reports were presented to the Annual Parish Meeting in March of this year.

A discussion document outlining our priorities for the future was distributed throughout the parish in September. Feedback was received from 19 parishioners. Many very positive and helpful comments were received which will be considered within the discussions as a final document is produced next year. A couple of the responses suggest that some parishioners are unaware of the limited role and responsibilities of a parish council. For example, the Parish Council has no powers over affordable housing, roads, water, sewage or broadband and mobile phone signals. Our powers do include footpaths, allotments, cemeteries, commons, bus shelters, community and recreation centres, war memorials. The Parish Council is a consultee on planning issues. In addition, as you can see below, your Parish Council is taking on the car park and public toilets.

And finally.....despite some suggestions to the contrary, I should point out that parish councillors are unpaid volunteers.

Hemyock Parish Council now owns and manages the village's car park, having purchased it from Mid Devon District Council in order to ensure its future use.

The Council is seeking to realign the public footpath from Redwoods Close so that it runs straight along the eastern wall of the car park to the road rather than currently requiring walkers to cross the car park.



## At Your Convenience....



Following an extensive re-modelling programme conducted by Mid Devon District Council the village's public conveniences will soon be handed over to the Parish Council. This will ensure that the toilets remain in use at a time when many public toilets are being closed across the country due to budget cuts. The Parish Council will now be responsible for the cleaning and upkeep of the facility.

## **Dog Signs Attacked !**

In the previous issue of the Parish Council Newsletter we stated that the Council has spent £985 in erecting signs stating that dogs are not allowed on the pitches at Longmead. It is disappointing to have to report that these signs have been attacked and damaged. The long standing signs on the Recreation Ground by the Parish Hall have also been attacked.

We are grateful to the vast majority of dog users who control their animals and clean up and dispose of any mess. Sadly there are a few inconsiderate people who are unaware or unconcerned by the potential impact of their actions.

Let us be clear. Dog mess is not simply unpleasant, it is a health risk. Dog mess can contain an organism which causes Toxocariasis, a condition which **causes blindness**. A trace can remain even when dog mess appears to have been picked up. Our footballers have to spend time before each match removing dog mess from Longmead's pitch. The situation is becoming so bad that the teams may move out of the village! This would be very bad news indeed as the Parish Council would have to repay the **£162,500** grant it received from the Football Association when Longmead was developed......

PLEASE do not allow dogs on the pitches and surrounding grass area.

PLEASE remove dog mess and put in the red bins provided

PLEASE let us know if any dog owners are allowing their animals to run free, registration numbers of vehicles, addresses etc.

We want responsible dog owners and other walkers to be able to enjoy the walk around Longmead, but failure to deal with the irresponsible owners will cost us all. A new dog friendly exercise area is being proposed for part of the community land resulting from the new housing north of Culmstock Road.

Responses to the Hemyock Tomorrow consultation document included:

- Worthy aims but more concrete plans needed.
- Need for floral displays around the village
- Controlling new housing developments, encouraging building within the village rather than beyond the existing boundaries.
- Still no really affordable housing in the village.
- Ensuring that developers' make tangible and effective contributions to the community.

- Help to provide land for self-build opportunities.
- A café, petrol station and bakery are needed in the village.
- HGVs must be discouraged from passing through, except for local access
- Improved bus service with later services to and from Taunton.
- Reinstate the old railway line as a walking and cycling path.
- The village should have its own solar energy field.
- No provision for electric vehicles?

### Update on New Housing Developments in Hemyock

Three new housing projects in Hemyock are at various stages of the planning process:

- 22 new homes on land SW of Conigar Close have received final approval. Site preparation began in early October. The development includes eight affordable homes.
- Outline planning permission has been granted for 38 new homes, including 14 affordable, on land adjacent to Hemyock's cemetery. The developer has committed to including a minimum 3 hectares of community land to be offered to

the Parish Council. **Possible facilities include** allotments, community orchard, dog exercise area, adult gym equipment and a footpath from Longmead through to Culmstock Road and the primary school. If planning approval is gained the Parish Council will be back in touch with various interested groups to formulate plans for the community.

• A planning application for six new homes on the former Hart's builders yard off Fore Street has been submitted to Mid Devon District Council.


## The Blackdown Healthy Living & Activity Centre

The parish council owns the building in which the BHLAC operates. Two councillors have recently been elected as trustees of the BHLAC trust (a registered charity). Its purpose is to support the health and well-being of people in the Blackdown Hills – particularly the elderly and isolated. The Healthy Living Centre opened in the old St Ivel milk factory social club building at Lower Millhayes in 2010. It now provides a home for several services including the Cameo Club and Respite Care as well as a growing number of complementary therapists, exercise classes and workshops:

- Chiropodist
  - mopoulst
  - Massage
- OsteopathHomeopathy
- ChiropractorHypnotherapy
- Keep Fit and exercise including Pilates, Yoga and Zumba
- Crafts, play, activities and conversation for parents, carers and pre-school children.

An application has been submitted seeking planning permission for the erection of a 10m high lighting column with a pair of 150 watt LED floodlights to provide emergency lighting for Devon Air Ambulance. The lights would enable the helicopter to land on Longmead recreation ground into the hours of darkness up until midnight every day. The lighting will be used in emergencies and will be operational for the minimum time required to deliver this emergency service.

We are seeking funding from the community to help pay for this very worthwhile installation. **Please send any donations to the Parish Council Clerk.**
