Bethlehem: where the story began...

When you travel to Bethlehem today many things may strike you.



The first, and perhaps most obvious, is the wall, and the armed checkpoint you have to pass through. There is a sense of a town under siege and a tangible feeling of tension. This is now part of the West Bank – the Palestinian territories – 'in' Israel

territories – 'in' Israel but not part of Israel; this is Palestine as the sign next to the graffiti and the images on the wall tells you. At the heart of the town is one of the oldest churches in Christendom – The Church of the Nativity, built territories – 'in' Israel to the song of the angels rings a note of, as yet, unfulfilled hope, of 'peace on earth', where in so many ways there is little peace. This was the world into which Jesus was born on that first Christmas Day and the world into which he comes today to offer that hope of which the angels sang.

At the heart of the town is one of the oldest churches in Christendom - The Church of the Nativity. built over the cave where Jesus was thought to have been born, and venerated for century upon century. On the We are all called to enact the call of the angels to supposed place where the manger stood is a silver enable that peace, which has to begin in each and star on the ground where millions of pilgrims have every heart, where we seek to live lives and make seen or touched the rock in the middle, and here choices that are not merely selfish and directed for understood that God is no longer to be thought of as our own gain, but seek as well, the good and welldistant or inaccessible but near (and as vulnerable) as being of others. a child in swaddling clothes.

Many scholars believe that Mary and Joseph were natives of Bethlehem and only moved to Nazareth because of the atmosphere of insecurity generated by the Herodian dynasty (Matt 2) – and in this respect present day Bethlehem has many similarities with the times of Jesus' birth.

Even though there are significant numbers of Christians in Bethlehem, many are being forced out with the pressures of militant Islam on one hand and the presence of Israeli militia nearby, on the other. And in this sense Bethlehem is a microcosm of what is happening in so many places in our world, which among other things, following elections in the United States and a referendum in our own country, is becoming a



more divided and polarised world where hate and fear rather than friendship and cooperation are in the ascendency.

May you have a happy and blessed Christmas and a genuinely peaceful New Year.

- Ensure that the national, local and customary law prohibits all forms of violence against women and girls.
- Ensure that all victims of gender-based violence have access to justice and to support systems and services.
- Ensure that perpetrators are prosecuted and punished and rehabilitated.

In this country alone 1 in 3 women will suffer violence at some time in their lives. Changing culture to end gender-based violence takes us all working together.

Now on a happier note we wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a Peaceful New Year.

The football club has advised that there is a growing problem with owners exercising their dogs on the football pitches at Longmead. Dog excrement has been found on the pitches during matches in recent weeks. Dogs may be exercised around the trim trail but under no circumstances should they be allowed on to the pitches. More signs will be purchased to remind dog owners and the situation will be reviewed regularly. Failure by dog owners to abide by this rule may result in further action.

Youth Shelter – Recreation Field (Purple Peril)

The shelter has had a lick of paint, thanks to Bob Hawkes and Roy Calcraft. There are two plain panels in the shelter that require painting. The parish council is running a competition for parishioners to design and paint these panels. One panel will be for Under-16s, one for Over-16s. The panels are approximately 4ft x 3ft. Dear Residents

We are leading up to the next year's budget, it will be difficult. This current year we are finding it hard and it will get harder. Based on the first six months of this financial year, County predict an over spend of £7.5 million by the end of March 2017, if step are not taken between now and then to address the matter. Steps, such as jobs freeze on all but frontline posts, like social workers and care workers, and embargos on spending, could be introduced if necessary to reduce any over spend. Projections of over spend earlier in the year have already been reduced through cost saving measures. The projected over spend is mainly due to an over run of £5.2 million on adult social care.

The administration has balanced it's books over the last seven, despite facing multi-million austerity cuts every year, we have absolutely no intention of not balancing the books this year. Austerity cuts have prompted the County to reduce spending by £244 million since 2009.

The Government are beginning to realise the disparity between urban an rural, which we are, and granted Devon an extra £8.4m. Devon receive £130 per person less Government funding than urban areas On average Devon Schools got £287 less per child than the national average. If we had the average, it would mean Devon Schools would receive an extra £25m. In public health County get £38 per person, in London it is £200 whilst the national average is £69 per person. This is just some of the areas we are well under funded. Therefore the Government have a long way to go to address these short falls. But be assured, we are continually lobbying the Government to be more fairer.

But for 2016/17, County would still be spending £443.5m on services. After allowing for inflation and other spending pressures, that represents savings of £34.3m on the current year. In spite of this, there would be an increase of £11.3m in the budget for children and £5m in the budget for adult care. With reluctance, for sure we may have to increase Council Tax by 1.99% next year.

Is there is any good news? Well recycling is going up, we are the 5th highest recycler in the Country, this means we put less to landfill and thereby avoiding the landfill charges which are always going up and we get income from recyclables, although this goes up and down.

We have reassessed our Highway Asset Management Plan and have that to work to. Our problem is we just haven't got enough money to put our roads into good repair, like we would like them to be. Therefore we are developing a Needs Based Budgeting approach, which means that our A & B and some C class roads we will need to keep in good condition. 80% of the traffic travel on 20% of the roads. If we adopt this approach, the Government will give us an extra £7m, which then will go towards the minor roads.

I hope I haven't been too depressing, but it is hard times, only to get harder. But heck, Christmas is coming. On that point I do wish everyone on my patch and very happy Christmas and a healthy new year, no matter what your creed or colour is.

I am always here to help anyone, just contact me one way or another. A Happy Christmas.

Around Hemyock

"Hemyock is to be congratulated in having succeeded, in not only forming a football team, but in winning its first two matches. We understand that there are several more fixtures and hope that the result in each case may be equally satisfactory."

Did that catch your eye and make you wonder whatever is going on? The comment was found in the Cullompton Deanery magazine for January 1910, along with the result of a jumble sale held at the Church Room which raised a profit of £12 and 5 shillings, with £5 going to the Waifs and Strays' Society, somewhat different to that raised at the recent Scout Group jumble sale. Relevant to the time of course, but only successful due to the generosity of local folk on both occasions - the October sale raised over £2,000.

Congratulations go to well known resident 97 year old Sam Mather. Some may have read in a local paper that Sam has been awarded a medal as a Chevalier of the Order of Legion d'Honneur for his services to the liberation of France in 1944.

After serving in the North Africa campaign and with peace keeping Forces in Palestine Sam was involved in the D-Day invasion landing at Arromanches with the 74 Company of Engineers which prepared the way for armoured vehicles to cross the many obstacles and bridges en route East.

On Christmas day 1944 Sam was shot in the chest with the bullet passing straight through him. He was taken to hospital in Brussels before being returned to England. He married Ruby in 1945 and they have spent their 71 years of married life here in Hemyock.

Thanks to Sam and the millions who have or are serving in our Armed Forces we enjoy the freedom we have today and it seems appropriate that his award was received so near Armistice Day.

The service to commemorate Remembrance Sunday saw 192 gather at the parish church. The parade from the Parish Hall led by the church choir also saw many young uniformed members followed by a large number of villagers. Wreaths were laid at the War Memorial on behalf of the Parish Council, 1st Hemyock Scout Group, 1st Hemyock Brownies and the primary school. The collection of £444 (down by £36 on 2015) will be donated to the work of the Royal British Legion. Around 25 people also met on Friday 11th for a short service of remembrance

History Group Report

Mr Richard Fox gave an interesting talk on the Jurassic Coast at our October meeting. The stretch of our coast from Swanage down to Exmouth represents a continuous history of rock formation through many thousands of years after the English channel was formed due to a tsunami. This walk through time provides a near complete record of the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous periods and is the ideal location to explore the geological history of our country. Richard is an enthusiast and was able to take our group on an interesting walk through time.

Working his way westward he explained how we could notice the various rock formations and how at one stage the Rhine was a tributary of the Thames. The southern coast is also subsiding into the channel while the north of the country is still rising, a process starting with the melting of the ice allowing the land weighed down by the ice, springing back.

Richard's sketches and beautiful copperplate writing represent the detail and effort that he has given to his subject and would provide a wonderful journal of the timeline through our geological history.

Christmas Time for Pets

Christmas time, full of joy and cheer with the presents under the tree and Christmas dinner smelling better than ever! We as vets want to make sure that you and your pets have a fantastic Christmas without a trip to the practice.

Cats are often more fascinated by Christmas trees than us and like to climb and explore. Make sure your tree is very secure and any glass tree decorations or those with sharp edges are well out of the way of your intrigued feline. Cats also can enjoy a nibble on tinsel. They tend to eat lengths of stringy material which can then cause a concertina effect on the intestines. This can be very harmful and requires surgery to treat, so keeping tinsel and string out of harm's way is much safer!

What Christmas is complete without chocolate? Unfortunately many dogs, and sometimes cats, also believe this to be true! Chocolate can cause vomiting and diarrhoea and in larger doses, liver failure and can be fatal. The higher the cocoa content the more the risk, so keep those expensive dark chocolate truffles out of the way of any investigative hounds in the house! Be wary of chocolates on the tree and wrapped in presents within reach. Remember a small number of extra treats can lead to rapid weight gain which can take a long time to lose.

Dried fruit is also a risk to dogs and can cause renal failure so keep Christmas pudding, mince pies and Christmas cake away from low tables or other places your crafty hound may be able to get to.

For some of us, it can all get a bit much at these festive times. We may like our house being filled with family, friends and music but not all our pets do. For some, the bustle and noise can be very stressful. If you have a timid pet who enjoys the quiet, make sure there is somewhere peaceful that they can go to not be disturbed. They may prefer to have their food and litter tray in a hidden corner.

Most importantly, have a wonderful Christmas with your furry friends and if you have any worries or suspect your pet has eaten something they shouldn't, don't hesitate to call your vet for advice. Merry Christmas!

News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

As we begin our news we have just heard that Donald Trump is to be the new U.S. President. Our sure hope is in our risen Lord Jesus Christ who is preparing to return to usher in His eternal Kingdom.

As we look back we have much to be thankful for. Once again we appreciated fellowship with our friends at St. Andrews as we joined with them for their St. Luke's Day service in October. The Sunday Strollers had a good walk around the woods at Wellington Monument and plan next to go up to Culmstock Beacon.
