Opening Doors

Whenever I travel around I try to notice new things, and I am always amazed, wherever I happen to be, perhaps in a French village, a mediaeval English town or somewhere more far-flung like the Holy Land, what an amazing variety of doors there are – some brightly coloured, some flaking with a patina of time, some open, some closed, some with a view, some not, some opening into a dark and mysterious interior, others into a bright and inviting space.



I have become fascinated with doors, and often try to take some photos to record their amazing variety.

But doors have a great deal to tell us. They are so often more, than functional barriers to enable access, keep people and the world out and de-mark territory, they can have a deeper symbolism as well. We use the term 'door' to any metaphorical gateway into a new understanding or

discipline. We talk about people who have opened doors for us in our lives, and helped us progress into new parts of our life's journey. A door not only represents the way in to a building and also a way into a new understanding and experience.



Doors can also offer a way into mystery. If the door is shut, or opens into a dark space, there is a sense of the unknown – how often do you wonder what lies beyond those 'closed doors'?

So many things in life can be doors for us whether though education or training, perhaps through meeting someone who offers advice and direction,

maybe through mere chance an opportunity will present itself to us – and a door is opened.

We pass through many doors in our lives and we may learn over time which are the doors to open and which are not, but choosing which is which is not always easy. Some people will try to go through all the doors presented to them and may regret passing through some,



others will be more cautious and perhaps not open the ones which would have offered their best opportunities we are all different.

A door can represent hope and opportunity, the potential for change, a chance of the new – but it has to be opened and passed through. I hope that we can all pass through the doors that matter to each of us.

For those of us in the Church we believe that we have passed through the door that leads to God - lesus himself describes himself as the 'door' or the 'way'. And part of our journey is knowing the value of this door available for us to pass though daily.


So we all give thanks for the doors through which we have passed which have enriched our lives and enabled us to move forward. And maybe we can help others in opening doors important for them.



Did you know that something like 98% of us would accept a blood transfusion if we were told it was needed? Did you also know that just 4% of us are blood donors? So if you're not one of the 4% why not make a resolution to make 2017 the year you started to be a donor. You might just be a person with one of the rarer blood groups which are in short supply. The NHS Blood team are due in Hemyock at the end of March* so you don't have to go far. It could be an hour of your life that helps to save someone else's.

And if you want a donor's perspective on whats involved then ask Church warden David Bawler or PCC secretary Brian Samuels – they've clocked up over 200 donations between them.

Be One in Ten Thousand

The Exeter 10000 scheme was set up 7 years ago with the aim of creating a local database for medical research. As part of the Clinical research Facility of Exeter University the unit has done an amazing amount of research with nearly 300 extra research projects. Amongst these are investigating the diagnosis and treatment of types 1 and 2 diabetes, the relationship between excess weight and type 2 diabetes, protecting against getting diabetes and work on storage of fat in the body and its effects. A current work is looking at the relationship between mood and appetite and people's ability not to want to consume sweet things. The results of this research is translated into improving the healthcare of people in the area.

The Clinical research group is now considered as one of the leaders in our understanding of diabetes and has recently been awarded \pounds 5.7m by the National Institute for Health research which will help fund research for another 5 years.

At present there are about 9600 people on the local register and if you would be interested in helping to get the total to 10,000 you can get information by phoning 01392 408181 or emailing crf@exeter.ac.uk. The website is www.exeter.crf.nihr.ac.uk/ node/155.


The Big Knit

We'd like to say a big thank you to everyone who turned out for the Lights Parade back before Christmas, making it a magical occasion for the village.



Avian Flu Outbreak

As you will be aware there have been a number of Avian Influenza outbreaks in the UK and a Prevention Zone was declared in December that covers the whole of the UK.

The prevention zone means that all poultry keepers - whether on a commercial scale or simply a small backyard flock – are now required by law to house them (keep them under cover) or otherwise keep them separate from wild birds. This requirement (the Prevention Zone) has now been extended until 28 February 2017. They have also banned gatherings of poultry across the UK.

It is also important that poultry keepers must continue to keep a close watch on the health of their birds, and take steps to reduce the risk of infection via the environment, for example in wild bird droppings, by practising good biosecurity. You should do this even if your birds are inside. If they are concerned it is important that they contact their Vet.

This has been necessary because the same Avian Flu strain has also been found in wild birds in England, Scotland and Wales. DEFRA have taken this action to reduce the risks and help protect poultry and captive birds from avian flu.

The Food Standards Agency advise that bird flu does not pose a food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

Hemyock Parish Council held meetings in December and January. A brief summary of the business conducted at those meetings is as follows:-

- 16/01868/FULL Erection of an agricultural livestock shed and associated hardstanding (Phase 2). Great Simonsburrow Farm, Hemyock.
- 16/01772/MOUT Culmstock Road, Hemyock. Outline for the erection of up to 40 dwellings (including affordable housing), public open space and associated infrastructure. (Revised Plans).

Finance

Income - included cemetery payments, interest, defibrillator fund monies, precept and TAP fund grant from MDDC.

Expenditure - included room hire, clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, annual play area safety checks, banking fees, Housing Needs Survey and village signs.

Precept

The council has set the precept for 2017/2018 at £77,000 increasing the Band D property figure from £89.30 to £90.69 per annum.

Highways

Devon County Council's telephone number for members of the public to report any lights that are not working, pot holes, blocked drains/gulleys and any other road maintenance issues is 0345 155 1004. Lines are open 8am to 8pm Monday to Friday and 9am to 1pm Saturday.

Police

101 - The non-emergency number for Devon and Cornwall Police Textphone 18001 101 for the deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired. Always call 999 in an emergency.

Community Speedwatch

The village now has a team of volunteers who have been trained and are supported by the neighbourhood policing team. The volunteers will stand at the side of the road monitoring traffic. Speeding vehicles will be recorded and warning letters will be sent to the vehicle owner together with educational information.

Persistent offenders will receive a further warning letter and possibly a visit from their local neighbourhood policing team to deliver some words of advice. Persistent offenders that ignore these warnings will be given a fixed penalty ticket or summonsed to court, should the circumstances allow.

Vehicle-Activated Sign

The council has been successful in its bid for funds from MDDC's Town & Parish (TAP) Fund which will enable it to purchase a Vehicle-Activated Sign. The sign activates if and when an approaching vehicle is detected exceeding a pre-set speed limit. The speed limit and warning message will illuminate on the sign to remind the driver/rider to slow down. The council is in the process of gaining approval from Highways to erect such a sign.

Dogs on pitches

New signs have been purchased to remind dog walkers to keep dogs off the football pitches and these will be erected shortly. Dogs may be exercised around the trim trail but under no circumstances should they be allowed on to the pitches. The situation will be reviewed regularly and failure by dog owners to abide by this rule may result in further action.

Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges in and around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

A Good Samaritan

At 0910 on Saturday 14 January I was struck by a car when walking from Hillmoor into Culmstock. The visibility was excellent, the roads were dry. I was facing the oncoming traffic wearing a yellow high visibility, fluorescent jacket with my dog to my right on a lead. The car that struck me was coming towards me. The accident happened on the tight bend below Fry's Farm.

After the impact I found myself lying on the ground underneath the car between the front and rear wheels. The driver appeared to be in shock, but a young man who I learned was from Hemyock, arrived and took charge. He told me not to move, covered me with a Duvet and called the emergency services. On hearing that it was an 80 year old man who had been struck by a car the operator repeated the instruction not to move. My rescuer kept me talking until the air ambulance, the ambulance and the police arrived. He than left without me having time to thank him or to learn his name. I would like to know who he is and perhaps your readers could help. He was about 5ft 10 ins tall (I was on the ground so I could not compare his height with mine), slim, dark haired and was growing a beard. He told me that he also had been in the Naval service, as an Air Engineer, and was on his way to the fitness centre in Cullompton.

I have been lobbying the Parish Council and the Police for the last 15 years to do something to reduce the danger on the roads within the village and particularly on the road between Hillmoor Narrows (just inside the 30 mph limit) and the village centre where we have recorded the majority of cars exceeding the 30 mph limit. Had the car that hit me been travelling at 30 mph, within the legal limit, I would have been seriously injured. Had it been a 4x4 or travelling in excess of 30 mph I may not have survived. Had I been a child under any circumstances I would have been at best seriously injured and possibly fatally.

May I make a plea to anyone who drives through Culmstock, particularly those travelling to and from work or taking children to school, to stay within the speed limit on entering the village and to give a wide berth to pedestrians and riders using the road.

Dear Residents

I hope you all had a great Christmas and now that the New Year is well under way, it will be a good year for you.

Everything is going well for County, except for a few funding pressures we are facing.

Various Council minutes will show how we have used the options available to us to provide additional funding for Adult care. You will also see that utilising the additional 2% last year failed to meet our costs of the National Living Wages that care providers incurred so the short fall was met within the budget process. There will be options available to provide an increase in social care funding. This is a statutory duty on our behalf and we will balance the budget by the end of the year.

Devon County Council has introduced a recruitment freeze as it takes 'firm action' to prevent a multi-million overspend. A job freeze has been introduced at DCC to help manage the overspend. The Council is projected to overspend by £8.1m by the end of the financial year, unless it takes firm action. The jobs freeze will take effect immediately, but will not apply to posts where the Council would fail to meet it's statuary responsibilities if it did not recruit a replacement worker. We will take the firm action needed.

As you will be aware, as from 1st April 2017 County will have a new contractor, Skanska Construction UK Ltd, in place to deal with Highway, Public Footpaths and Pavements. There is a transitional period from Oct 2016 to 1st April 2017. As Chair of the Environment, I met with our Officers who are overseeing the transition to make sure that there are no unforeseen problems. They have fortnightly meetings and I am pleased to say that SWH have been very cooperative over this transitional period, which is credit to them, losing the contract, they could have made things difficult.

Skanska are a very professional outfit employing about 25000 employees. Heading into the winter, there will be no disruption with the services and SWH will continue until 1st April. As far as the public are concerned, all we will notice is a different name on the 540 SWH employee's clothing, it will be a seamless transfer. SWH Construction will still be in existence and a supplier of services to DCC.

We are at this time of year when we are well on the way to producing a budget, it will be difficult and it gets more difficult every year. We have always produced a balanced budget and we will do the same again. It is very much a time of holding our nerve. We have a good administration running County with a 47% reduction in staff and £244m reduction of income which has been cut from Government Grant. 8 years ago we would get 70% of our income from Government, now it is down to 40% and to go even lower, our choice is not to cut essential services.

At the same time, we have reduced our debt by \pounds 106m, down to \pounds 507m. We are business minded and will make tough choices to produce a balanced budget.

Around Hemyock

Caring for and supporting others has always been a strong point of villagers in the Culm Valley. The Cullompton Deanery magazine for February 1908 tells us that in Hemyock £4.10s had been raised for the Church of England Waifs' and Strays Society; at Culm Davy 70 Sunday School scholars enjoyed a lantern and gramophone show before prizes were presented whilst the Rev and Mrs Forbes entertained a large number of choristers, ringers and congregation from St Mary's treating them to supper and dancing at the Church Room.

Moving on to a recent Wellington Weekly News we read of two items from their files from the past. 50 years ago the then Rector **Rev William Llewellyn-Jones** set up the Culm Valley Feed the Hungry Campaign. He felt that it would be a positive thing to send dried milk from this area to India where people were starving. The 6 month long campaign resulted in 540 containers of dried milk weighing nearly 7 tons leaving the Hemyock Unigate factory which stood at Millhayes.

Going forward we read that the British Empire Medal was presented 30 years ago to the late Cecil 'Ron' Lowman for services to Scouting. **Old Skip** as he is known to many had at that stage been Group Scout Leader for 26 years and had been instrumental in making 1st Hemyock one of the most successful groups in the country having been featured in the Scouting magazine and had seen a number of boys obtain their Queen Scout badge.

Nowadays the local concern and care for others continues with the Blackdown Support Group, clothing for Syrian refugees, Christmas shoeboxes for Eastern Europe, fundraising for cancer research. supporting the local Foodbank, knitting for charities, raising funds for the Royal British Legion, Christian Aid and Olympic hopeful Neil Morralee - the list just goes on and on and I am sure I speak for many in thanking all those involved without who none of this would be possible.

Whilst most of us have enjoyed the Christmas and New Year celebrations others have seen great sadness with the loss of a loved one. We remember Richard Lister (Sally thanks all who attended his funeral), Betty Arnold, Pamela Silvester, Mary Dew and the father of Jill Burton. We send their families and friends love, prayers and sympathy.

So many people appear to have been suffering with the nasty cough and cold circulating but there are also those who have been, or are, in hospital - remembering by name Christine Brown, Malcolm Best (a driver for the BSG) Ray Rattray and Joyce Baker. We also remember the Rector's father. We send good wishes to all.

Once again villagers responded brilliantly to the Christmas Lights competition organised by the Parish Council so that in conjunction with the Lights Brigade decorations the village was awash with colour. Inviting the two popular takeaway vans to the parade evening along with the Catherine Wheel being open made sure that everyone who chose were fed and watered!

With the Christmas celebration now over it was no surprise to see Easter eggs in the supermarkets during the early part of January despite that weekend still being some months away. No doubt before then there will be a variety of things going on in the parish many listed on the Pump's diary pages thanks to Sue Lambert. If you are new to Hemyock please read through as there may well be something you would like to attend and a visit to see if it is 'your kind of thing' will always see you made welcome.

History Group Report

The meeting in December was a talk from Philippe Planel, an archaeologist with East Devon AONB on the excavations at a cottage close to Honiton. Searching through the tithe maps of Devon that are now available in digital format one finds that most buildings listed have been developed. However one, Lees Cottage, was in exactly the same condition as it was left during the farming recession at the middle of the 19th century. Now surrounded by woodland the plot was cleared by local archaeologists to show the remains of the walls and the floor of the kitchen which was found still to be as hard as concrete and was analysed to show that it had been made of ash and lime. Research showed that the owner also worked as a tailor and various brass buttons plus other household items were found on the site. Philippe gave a fascinating talk on the world of archaeology in the area and the types of projects that would warrant further investigation. Members were asked to suggest sites that might justify applying for finance to fund excavation.

The January talk was by Brian Lane-Smith and Robin Gilbert of the SW Airfield Heritage Trust and was very well received by our group due to the detailed information they presented and knowledge evident from their answers to the many questions. Brian covered the activities at Dunkeswell where US Navy Liberators were used to patrol the Atlantic for U boats and Robin described the preparation, planning and executing of the aircraft at Upottery and Merryfield used for the D Day Invasion. The airfields were built in the early years of the war by the construction companies working for the Ministry such as Geo Wimpey, Laings and Mowlem under Royal Engineers control. The local Hemyock company Redwoods Coaches started their business transporting personnel to and from the airfields during the construction and operation starting in February 1942. The runways at Dunkeswell were operational by September 1942 and the Nissan Huts assembled to provide accommodation and operational control by early 1943.

The US Navy set up complete facilities including machine shops, engine sheds, airframe, propeller and spark plug manufacturing plus tailors and cobblers to serve the personnel. The size and scope of the American planning towards D Day were a scale above anything seen before or since. The crews of the Liberators and Catalinas flying from Dunkeswell were highly trained, joining other flights from St Eval in Cornwall and Ireland to criss cross the Atlantic in a well controlled pattern looking for the U Boats so destructive to the Allies shipping. The U boats spent most of their time on the surface due to the faster speed rather than diving and using battery power to move slowly under the surface.

The crews believed that we had spies at the German bases informing them of the routes taken by the U Boats which they found to be accurate rather than the truth only recently published of the success of Bletchley Park in decoding enigma. Robin Gilbert as a young boy watched the continuous aircraft activity at the Upottery facility working out the patterns and formations to be used during D Day of flying in close formation at different heights and trailing gliders. Some 81 planes took off from Upottery on the 5th June, 90 from Merryfield as part of Operation Neptune with a total of 820 aircraft in time controlled waves of aircraft heading for Normandy between 5th and 7th June 1944. The Heritage Centres at Upottery/Smeatharpe and at Dunkeswell are now fully operational with unique photos and artefacts on display. The group are looking to arrange visits to both centres in the summer months.

The next two talks will be from Andrew Watson on phenomonology in his archaeology studies on February 9th and Brain Carpenter from Devon Heritage Centre on March 9th..

Travelling with your pet


Now is the time of year when we look forward to the summer holidays and for lots of us, that can mean taking our furry friend along. Since 2000, the Pet Travel Scheme (PETS) has allowed cats, dogs and ferrets to enter the UK from certain countries without being placed in quarantine. Animals resident to the UK can now travel to most European countries as well as more distant destinations. From 1st January 2012, the PETS travel scheme changed such that dogs and cats can move freely between PETSscheme approved countries provided the following conditions are satisfied:

- **1** The pet must have a permanent microchip implanted, which lots of animals already have.
- **2** The pet must be vaccinated against rabies after microchipping. This can be done any time over 12 weeks of age using a licensed vaccine. Boosters are given according to manufacturers' recommendation.
- **3** The pet must have a PETS passport signed by an official veterinary surgeon, confirming the above conditions have been met.
- **4** Some destinations require an additional export certificate. It is important to check with DEFRA for specific conditions requested by the country you wish to travel to.
- **5** There is a 21 day wait after rabies vaccination before travel abroad and/or entry into the UK is allowed. This is to allow time for the vaccine to take effect.
- **6** There is a requirement for a veterinary certified tapeworm treatment 24-120 hours before return to the UK. Travel companies and ports will often help you locate a veterinary surgeon for this.

If you are travelling to a country not listed on the PETS scheme, additional conditions must be met. This means starting this process at least 4-5 months before you expect to travel. A blood sample must be taken a minimum of 30 days after rabies vaccination. If the test is successful, a 3 month wait must be observed following the date of the blood sample before your pet would be allowed back into the UK. If the blood test does not prove adequate antibody levels, your pet would require a second vaccination and blood test. It is also important to contact DEFRA and check for any additional requirements of travel to specific countries.

We recommend making sure your pet is protected against ticks and sand-flies during their period of stay outside the UK as these can carry a variety of disease which we rarely encounter in this country. It's also important to consider whether your pet enjoys travelling, changes in environment and temperature or whether they may prefer to stay at home. If you have any questions, please contact your vet. Above all, enjoy your holiday!




Project SPLASH!
