Spiritual but not Religious

At the end of July we will be celebrating 750 years of St. Mary's Church, Hemyock – at least as far as documentary evidence is concerned – it is probably somewhat older judging by the Norman arches hidden in the base of the tower. But whether it is 750 years or 850 years, for the whole of that time it has borne witness to the Christian faith which was part of the social as well as religious fabric of the village during past centuries. I have read that one of the many options to describe oneself when computer dating in the 'Religious Affiliation' category is 'SBNR', which you may know (I didn't) means 'Spiritual but not Religious'. And many people will be happy, today, to tick that box. Even I, would be tempted to tick that box. There is so much about formal religion that many people

For hundreds of years citizens of Hemyock or Clayhidon, or anywhere else in England, would not have known much else other than the Christian faith as it was taught in the parish church by the local parson. Religion was part of the way things were, and the existence of God and the life, death, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus would have been taken for granted. Times were often hard and everyone would have prayed – for a good harvest and children and cattle free from disease – and that they would not go to hell.

Apart from the Reformation period when the Roman Catholic practises were superseded by those of the Church of England it would have largely remained unchanged until two or thee hundred years ago – new alternative chapels would have been established – but Christianity would have remained dominant. However, over the last hundred years things have changed – and in more recent times Christianity has become a minority religion – indeed religion itself has diminished in importance so that the parish church, or indeed any church, chapel, temple, mosque or synagogue has little or no significance to the larger part of the population.

Though 'religion' has declined very significantly, 'spirituality' I think, has not.

There is so much about formal religion that many people find difficult, unintelligible or irrelevant. And it is evident that formal religion is in decline - as it clearly is not being found to be important for very many people – it might be the language, the ceremony, the need to believe in the unbelievable, the people who go to church are 'not like me', – or there are better things to do on a Sunday.

But very many people are aware of 'something beyond', something that can touch them deeply, which can't be put into words, but may be expressed in part in music, in poetry, in art, in nature, in silence..... in simply becoming more aware.

The discovery of techniques of mindfulness may link up to this, perhaps also the growing popularity of retreats, or getting more in touch with nature.

Whatever it may be, more people are aware of the reality of a spiritual dimension and its importance to them.

And it is certainly true that there exists a gulf between this and formal religion – between the 'spiritual' and the 'religious'.

Maybe God, if she or he exists, is trying to tell us something....

St. Mary's Church, Hemyock 1267 – 2017

As Seen From the Outside

The first written record of a church in Hemyock was in 1268, but it is obvious that there was a building here many years, even centuries, before that. Frequently a churchyard is older than the actual church. Our forebears, possibly for more than 1000 years have been buried here, and before the church was built the spiritual needs of the parishioners would have been cared for by an itinerant priest, preaching in the open air.

The church is dedicated to St. Mary. This has not always been the case. In the very early days (up to the 1400s) St. Mary was the patron saint, but after the Reformation she was dropped. In the 1740s St. George was the patron saint and by the 1750s it had changed to St. Peter only to revert to St. Mary again in the 1760s.

It would appear that the earliest church was cruciform in shape, with the tower at the centre of the building. By the 1300s the church was changed and what you see now, in spite of several renovations, would have been recognisable 600 years ago.

The wall around the churchyard was built of local chert in 1812 by four families, (Lutley, Clist, Farrant, Wood) whose names crop up again and again in the development of St. Mary's. The wall cost \pounds_{130} and the money was loaned to the parish by Edward Lutley.

The gates were erected in 1813 and were hung from two piers of Blackborough whetstone – a material that was famous for hundreds of years as an ideal abrasive for sharpening scythes and hooks, the Blackdowns being one of a very few sources of this very special stone.

Our war memorial was built on the site of an old Church House. It was the village poor house in the early 1600s and was converted in 1838 to be the village school house. In the late 1880s it was pulled down. Interestingly, had it remained it could have solved our current traffic problems because it infringed on the road and would have made it impossible for lorries to negotiate the corner!

There was a spire on top of the church tower from the late 1300s until the end of the 1600s. It is thought that it was constructed of wood and covered with lead, and this may be the reason why the tower is so low.

The first clock was made in 1697, the present one dates from 1747. The external dial was added in 1833; before then parishioners would only have heard the chiming of the hours.

Hemyock History Group Report

The life and works of Isambard Kingdom Brunel (IKB) drew in the crowds for the April meeting. The illustrated talk was by civil engineer David Greenfield PhD, whose thesis centred on Brunel and who provided great insight into IKB's working and personal life including his love-hate relationship with colleague and arguably, equal, William Gravett, and the success and failure of their widespread portfolio of projects.

IKB, an English mechanical and civil engineer, is considered "one of the most ingenious and prolific figures in engineering history", "one of the 19th century engineering giants" and "one of the greatest figures of the Industrial Revolution, who changed the face of the English landscape with his groundbreaking designs and ingenious constructions". Brunel built dockyards, the Great Western Railway, a series of steamships including the first propeller-driven transatlantic steamship, and numerous important bridges and tunnels. His designs revolutionized public transport and modern engineering.

Brunel's projects were not always successful but they often contained innovative solutions to long-standing engineering problems. What stood out was this Victorian's ability to make decisions and to implement schemes without today's red tape and bureaucracy. Of Brunel's former colleague Gravett it was said that 'he failed because he could not, or would not, conform to the ordinary ways of the men among whom his lot was cast'. Not a bad epitaph for a free-thinking creative genius; whether Brunel and Gravett could have had such a widespread influence in the 21st Century I fear not.

The May meeting concentrated on the interesting archaeological finds across the border at Longforth Farm on the outskirts of Wellington. Funded by Bloor Homes as the site formed part of their proposed development, the excavation of a late medieval manor, possibly of ecclesiastical origins was presented by Phil Andrews of Wessex Archaeology.

The site excavated by some of the Time Team members was visited by the Hemyock History Group just before the site was backfilled and returned to a grass field in 2015; the finds have now been collated and booklets published containing a report on the process of archaeological excavation and evaluation with computergenerated reconstructions based on the foundation remains and experience of other similar built forms.

All that remained were rubble foundations and random floor and roof ridge tile fragments, all of the roof tiles and stone walls having been robbed and reused elsewhere. The building had originally been of high status with images of knights on some of the remaining remnants of what was an extensive range of buildings and enclosures.



News from Clayhidon

Service for World War I Fallen Hero

A memorial service marking the 100th anniversary of the death of one of Clayhidon's First World War heroes, Corporal Hubert Bright, was held in Holcombe Church, near Dawlish.

After surviving two of the greatest battles of the war, Hubert was fighting in the Machine Gun Corps when he was killed on 17 April 1917, one of 100,000 Allied troops to be lost or injured in the Battle of Arras. His body was never recovered.

Although his mother came from Holcombe, he had spent part of his adolescence at Burrows Farm, Clayhidon. His name and that of his brother who was lost at sea a year later, are recorded on the Clayhidon war memorial and on the roll of honour in the parish hall. Clayhidon Resident who Loved Africa

Dee Carter, of Brookdale, Clayhidon, who died in Musgrove Park Hospital on 20 March, was born in Nakuru in Kenya's Rift Valley on 5 November 1945 and remained in love with Africa for all of her 71 years.

Her great grandparents had trekked more than 2,000 miles from South Africa after the Boer War to create a farm near Eldoret.

Her mother moved to Nairobi, where Dee spent most of her childhood, until the allure of the swinging 1960s drew her to London.

There, in quick succession, she married, had two children within a year, Vanessa (1968) and Richard (1969), before divorcing and returning to Kenya.

She was working for an advertising photographer in Nairobi in 1972 when she met Neil Carter, an already much-travelled young Cheshireborn agronomist working for Dow Chemicals. They married, had a son, Malcolm, in 1976 and a year later moved to Greece, from where Neil was asked to run Dow's pharmaceutical business in the Middle East.

The family lived there for four years, before Neil was transferred to Dubai, then a relatively undeveloped waterside city. Neil spent three years working out of the London office during which the family lived in Camberley before they were moved to Houston, Texas for four years, returning to London in 1989.

Dee and Neil wanted English schooling for the children. They chose Taunton School because it was the first public school in the country to go co-educational from 13. It was the Taunton connection that first brought them to Clayhidon. They bought Brookdale, near the Half Moon Inn, in 1981 but did not move in until 1989.

She was famously forthright in her manner and did not suffer fools. But she was, said Neil, "incredibly supportive" of their many house moves and a "first class mum", who didn't believe in mollycoddling children.

Before the long illness that ended her life, she was outgoing and party-loving. She loved music and dancing and was in love with Africa, returning time and again to visit her Mother who still lived in Nairobi and then latterly Nanyuki.

She is survived by Neil and her three children: Vanessa, who lives in New Zealand with her children, Will and George; Richard, who lives in Langford Budville; and Malcolm, an airline captain with Emirates, who lives in Dubai.

Merry Harriers to be Rebuiilt

The Merry Harriers public house is to be rebuilt and a national pub chain is interested in buying the site, says the owner, Reg Payne, according to the Wellington Weekly News.

He said he was planning a new pub on the site and hoped to be able to move it back from the road.

Mr Payne told the newspaper it would be rebuilt. The insurance companies had agreed a settlement, but this had taken a long time because the fires were suspicious.



Parishioners Learn First Aid

Twelve people from Clayhidon took part in an all day first aid course on at the parish hall, paid for by money raised at Drewfest.

Richard Drew was one of three parish councillors, with vice chairman Sue Hay and Alison Weekes, who took part. Others were Maureen Bendle, Val Slabbert, Kate Hopper, Casey and Thelma Blackmore, Adrian Hay, Alex Hill, Piers Pepperell and Chris Brake.

Ace paramedic Neil Fines put the group through an intensive course of emergency first aid in the workplace, including use of the parish's two new AED machines, automated external defibrillators. These are situated by the chapel in Rosemary Lane, and on the church side of the Half Moon pub.

The course covered choking, wounds and bleeding, fractures, broken bones, embedded objects, burns, unconsciousness and shock.

Parish Hall

It is still not known how much Clayhidon Parish Hall committee will need to raise to pay for improvements to the building, but the annual meeting was told that the previous year had shown a marked boost in its finances. This was put down to a successful year for lettings, live events and film nights, plus a £2,000 donation from the Parish Council.

The hall committee and its helpers worked hard to produce another year of live entertainment, film shows and other community events. They have cooked and generously donated food and raffle prizes and, given much time and effort in preparing for and running events. At the same time, we they have been looking to the future, with comprehensive plans to refurbish the hall and build an extension.

The committee was re-elected en bloc, with the addition of Neil Carter, who has been asked to co-ordinate the building project. Officers re-elected were Gareth Weekes, chairman; Lucy Ball, vice chair; Caroline King, secretary and Sandra Aldworth, treasurer.



Bus Shelter Mystery Explained

Who uncovered the bus shelter at Clayhidon Crossway? Several residents have been wondering who has cleared up years of ivy and undergrowth from the shelter recently. The answer is Chris Houghton, Clayhidon's new parish lengthsman, who has been working in the parish since the autumn.

The parish council has been unhappy for years at the lack of work done by Devon County Council on this kind of maintenance of parish drains and roads and finally, last year, agreed to get the work done itself.

Mr Houghton had agreed to be a road warden initially and has had Highways training last November and been given lengthsman equipment.

At the last meeting of the parish council, councillors agreed a payment of just over £1000 to Mr Houghton for village maintenance work from October to April. Chairman Richard Kallaway thanked him for his work and said he hoped parishioners were aware that it was taking place.

A private funeral was held at Taunton Crematorium.

Clayhidon Friends

Clayhidon Ladies welcomed Rhoda Locke from the Conquest Centre, Norton Fitzwarren to their monthly meeting on 13th April, 2017 at the Village Hall, Clayhidon. She gave a brief history of the Centre, which was founded in 1965 and became a Charity in the late 80's.

The Conquest Centre provides horse-based activities for persons with disabilities and additional needs, which in turn benefit their health and well-being. The work of the volunteers and skilled staff focuses on ability, rather than disability and aims to allow each individual to achieve their personal goals. Ages range from toddlers to 80 plus and has a foot-fall of 200 adults and children per week, as well as families, carers, students, volunteers, public riders and local clubs and associations.

The 14 horses (average age of 20 years) and the facilities of indoor and outdoor floodlit arenas, provide a variety of learning tools. The areas can be hired by clubs and associations out of teaching hours. The Ladies group were told of the benefits given to the riders from the warmth and love of the horses. Back-riding, where instructors ride and move in the saddle with the child, brings positive results. Balance, core strength, language and processing developments improve the riders' emotional and social skills.

Within the Centre the Woodland Trail enables all to enjoy the countryside. The Sensory Room relaxes and improves co-ordination and language and an outdoor play and picnic area enables all to relax in a non-judgemental rural environment.

Rhoda enthused on the work and achievements of the Centre. She gave an open invitation to witness the remarkable work carried out by the trained staff, volunteers and students of the Conquest Centre and Beehive Café, enabling those with special needs the opportunity to gain work and life skills. The Centre holds a variety of events throughout the year and promotes the charitable centre by its presence at local functions.

Clayhidon Friends (Continued)

For our meeting on 11th May we welcomed Yvonne Whittamore. Yvonne demonstrated the art of making articles with fabric. First of all she showed us how to make flowers out of cotton. Then for a different approach used synthetic materials, as in her process she uses heat and natural fibres burn easily. Using Organza she cut differing size circles and carefully melted the edges with the use of a tea-light. After layering the circles up, she glued them and decorated them most effectively. Sometimes she sews the whole thing onto felt as a backing. Although Yvonne said it was time consuming, an hour and half on each, it was a passion for her and she delights in seeing what new ideas evolve by using different methods and materials. She has runs a small business which includes courses at her home.

Along with the flowers, she makes items for weddings such as napkin holders, table decorations, wine glass identifiers and bride's maids head decorations. Her repertoire extends to Alice bands, gift boxes, shoe decorations, scarf circles and she produces cards made up from photographs of her wares.

Our Group thoroughly enjoyed her demonstration and marvelled at the truly impressive samples that were passed around amongst us. We had time for a few of us to attempt to replicate the samples and had the opportunity to purchase some of them. She also sells kits to make yourself at home.

After the Demonstration and Talk Linda and Tessa provided delicious tea and cakes, which along with lots of talk amongst ourselves was a very delicious and welcome conclusion to a successful evening. Our Group meets on the second Thursday of every month in Clayhidon Parish Hall. We are an informal gathering and always welcoming to any prospective new member.
