Which Way?

I remember being terribly amused when as a teenager on a geography field trip we saw our geography teacher sitting down at the breakfast table – not with the expected newspaper – but with the Ordnance Survey map. What on earth was it, we wondered, about this map that could hold his attention for so long?

It was not many years later that I too found myself doing the same thing and spending endless hours with Ordnance Survey maps reading the landscape in a way, at that time, you could do in no other way. Using the contours and other symbols it was possible to picture pretty well what the terrain was like, and then when, later, I found myself walking across this landscape it was as if I had already been there.

Navigating using a map and a compass was a skill that I developed, and when I found myself leading parties in Scottish wild places it was possible to do a day's walk completely in the mist and see virtually nothing. Some mountain tops I visited on numerous occasions and never saw the view. But with the map you knew where you were and what was around you - there was, maybe, a stream in that direction or a sheer drop in the other and it was possible to steer a safe course to where I wanted to go.

These days with so many additional aids to navigation maps seem to be becoming obsolete. Many people have Sat-Nav apps on their phone or in their cars. Google earth and other computer software can enable us to see anywhere from above and get an accurate picture of the shape of the ground and it is even possible to zoom into anywhere and get a street view and peer over somebody's hedge.

The problem is that today these undoubtedly useful tools can cause us to have a kind of tunnel vision. We simply follow a very narrow road-view to our destination, being told at every turn which way to go – so we never have a wider overall perspective – and some people, even though they can find their way to a destination very precisely don't know where it is in relation to anywhere else – without the Sat-Nav they would literally be lost.

Though most of us can find our way to the places in the world we want or need to get to, navigating our lives is somewhat less simple. There are no Sat-Nav's to tell us what to do and when to do it. There are no maps that can accurately tell us exactly what lies ahead. We have to find our own way using our own experience and intelligence and the help and experience of others.

It can be a help sometimes to know where we are going, though many move through life with little sense of direction or purpose and just go where life takes them, others may try to steer a course to particular life-goals or ambitions with either more or less success.

But for most of us direction and purpose are important – and it is of some value to know where we are going.

But maybe that's question we can put off for the time being... or maybe not...



Hemyock History Group Report

The monthly talk programme started on September 14th with a talk from Tom Harris on the 3,000 years of bells used to call people to prayer. The history of bells starts in South East Asia and involve related art and culture. Tom has a lifetime of experience travelling around the world searching for evidence of bells together with his local experience in Taunton of bell ringing. The techniques of casting bells has remained fairly constant over all this time learning from experience of the correct constituents in arriving at the bronze from a copper and tin alloy plus other additives. Original bells in Asia were cast as large as possible and were of significant weight. The earliest bells were cast in Cambodia and can be seen in the national museum. Bells in China originated at a later date and were known as Bo bells producing different notes depending on where the bell was hit and are to be seen at the British Museum, being one of Neil MacGregor's famous items. Bells could either be hit by a heavy metal or hung with the clapper moved by a rope

to cause the sound. The notes created and harmonics caused would reverberate for great distances being the object of the bell manufacturer. Tom's slides showed the wide diversity of designs and decorations.

The technique of controlling the timing of each bell note in a peal was developed in England and provided around the English speaking world by the Whitechapel foundry which closed down earlier this year. The weight of the bells in English bell towers can cause damage to the structure and there is continual work required to ensure safety. The bells at St Mary's Hemyock were last refurbished and rehung in 1982.

The next two talks at Hemyock will be by Ben Fox talking about the new work at Coldharbour Mill on Thursday 12th October and Amyas Crump on Thursday 9th November. The complete program for the year will be available at our next meeting and everyone is welcome to come along for a relaxing, enjoyable and informative evening.

News from Potter's Village

Potter's Village is a Crisis centre for sick, premature or abandoned babies in Kisoro in rural South West Uganda. Potter's Village was set up by Rev Jenny Green, St Mary's Link mission Partner – who is now living back in the UK. St Mary's continues to support this venture which has grown into a centre of excellence.

One of the children our funds had been supporting is now 3 years old and is now able to live with her relatives, with the continuing monitoring from the centre. There is a community support savings scheme which the family used to buy animals (probably goats) and this has helped them support themselves.

Our sponsorship has now been transferred to a little girl called Muhoza who was born on 22/5/2017. She was admitted to Potter's Village Medical Centre on the same day. She was born Prematurely and was in the incubator for some time. Sadly, her Mother died shortly after giving birth, it is not known why (but this is not uncommon in that part of the world), Muhoza is now part of the Potter's Village Crisis centre and doing well. It is hoped she can be resettled with a family member once she is big enough.

At Potter's Village there is a Hostel for Mothers and a Nutrition Unit with a Demonstration Kitchen for them, now renamed the Education Centre, which is used daily for education talks to the mothers as well as Sunday Church services for the Staff.

The attendance at the Medial Centre continues to Fluctuate with the seasons. However there is a noticeable trend in the children being a lot sicker than they used to be. This is probably due to the local Government Hospital referring their most severe cases to PV. It does mean that the oxygen and other machinery is running almost continuously which has caused a huge rise in the electricity bills! Potter's Village costs around £8,000.00 per month.

Hemyock Parish Council Business Update October 2017

Hemyock Parish Council held meetings in August & September. A brief summary of the business conducted at those meetings is as follows:-

Planning

Applications received for:-

- 17/01095/FULL. Land at NGR 314405 (115405 (Higher Culm) Pyne Farm, Hemyock. Change of use of agricultural land to create a green burial site, including parking provision for up to 20 cars and formation of access.
- 17/01124/HOUSE. Studleys, Hemyock. Conversion of existing outbuilding to form an annexe and additional ancillary accommodation (Revised Scheme).
- 17/01247/FULL. Land at NGR314680 110439 Sevilles Croft, Hemyock. Retention of change of use of agricultural land to mixed use of agriculture and nature/environmental education site with campsite and associated structures, construction of all-weather shelter, composting toilets, installation of zipwire and additional car parking area.

Finance

Income - included cemetery payments and gun club rent. Expenditure - included room hire, clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, purchase of car park and drainage work at Longmead.

A donation of £1,000.000 was made to the Culm Community Crayfish Project.

The refurbishment of the village toilets is almost complete. The parish council has recruited a cleaner who will start once Mid Devon District Council completes the outstanding work and transfers the ownership of this asset to the parish council.

Posters

The parish council politely asks that advertising posters are taken down after the event.

Devon Air Ambulance - Night-Time Landing Site

Devon Air Ambulance has approved a site at Longmead for night-time landing. The clerk will submit a planning application for the erection of a lighting column for this shortly. If anyone would like to see the plans or would like more information, please contact the clerk. The scheme will cost £5,875.14 and Devon Air Ambulance will provide a grant of £2,983.12 towards this, leaving a total of £2,892.02 for the parish to find. The parish council has agreed to underwrite this amount and hopes that the community will get behind this, as it did for the defibrillators, and raise the money. Donations of over £400 have already been received. Anyone wishing to make a donation can send it to the clerk.

Dog Mess

Dog mess continues to be a problem in particular areas of the village. The district officer from MDDC has visited and applied temporary stencils. Please remember to clean up after your dog.



Village Maintenance

The council has employed a contractor to clear out St Margaret's Brook by the church. At Longmead a berm has been created to alleviate flooding by the bridge at the far end of the sports fields. Large stones have been relocated to their original locations. The village maintenance person has been busy weeding and cutting hedges in the village. The clerk has already received compliments from parishioners who have noticed the difference.

When walking past any of the 3 defibrillators in the village please have a glance and make sure the green 'rescue ready' indicator is on. If it is red, please report to the clerk or directly to the number displayed in the cabinet.

"I'm sorry, sir/madam, it's not worth repairing; it would be cheaper to buy a new one." How many times have you heard that phrase, I wonder, as you reluctantly consign it to the bin? The words of American retailing analyst, Victor Lebow, speaking shortly after WW2, might help us understand how this state of affairs has come about. "Our economy... demands that we make consumption our way of life, that we convert the buying and use of goods into rituals... we need things consumed, burned up, replaced and discarded at an ever-accelerating rate."

However, an initiative started by Martine Postma in Holland in 2009, called The Repair Cafe, offers a welcome alternative route and is now sweeping across the globe with over 1300 cafes worldwide. It's very simple. People take their items - be they electronic, furniture, clothing, bicycles, garden tools or household appliances - either to be repaired by qualified experts or to be shown how to repair them themselves. It can be a real community event too, with the passing on of skills from one generation to another and a chance to meet other members in ones area and make new friends.

We recently visited an "outreach" of the Tiverton Repair Cafe held in Bampton and witnessed firsthand how effective such an initiative can be. For instance, two ladies were fully occupied repairing and remodelling clothing that had been brought in by local people, while a pedal bike was being re-tuned and a DAB digital radio was being repaired. All this is undertaken on a voluntary basis, with donations from those whose items are being repaired going towards the cost of hiring the premises. It's a Win-Win for all involved - including, of course, the environment, with less stuff going to landfill.

We are considering setting up a Repair Cafe in the Blackdown Hills and would love to hear from anyone who would be willing to share their skills on, say, one Saturday morning a month. So, if you'd like to be part of the conversation, please get in touch with Trisha Comrie on o1823 602908. To quote The Repair Cafe slogan: "Bin it? No way!"



Air Ambulance Landing Site

Putting the Air Ambulance at the Heart of Hemyock... Night and Day.

As we hope you are aware Devon Air Ambulance Trust (DAAT) has been working hard towards extending flying operations into the hours of darkness.

As of late November 2016, we have increased operations to midnight every day which means around an extra 8 hours of service each day during the darker winter months. Our vision is to eventually provide a 24hr service and this is a huge step in realising that dream. This will bring a much needed operationally effective service - day and night - to your community.

DAAT are working with communities across Devon to create a network of 'community landing sites' - these are pre-surveyed floodlit landing sites which are part-funded and managed by local communities. We currently have 40 community sites ready for night landing with a further approx. 130 sites at various stages of development. We expect to have upwards of 250 sites throughout Devon within the next 3-4 years.

Devon Air Ambulance Trust has been working with Hemyock Parish Council to identify a suitable area for a night landing site and Longmead sports field has been identified as a good location. The large open site provides good access from the air and offers access to the community, an important feature as we want Air Ambulance paramedics to be able to leave the site on foot to go to a patient should they arrive in the community before a land ambulance. There is also vehicle access close to the site meaning a patient can quickly be transferred from a land ambulance to the aircraft.

DAAT Operations staff have visited the site and completed a formal landing site survey which is when we collect important information on the site and any potential hazards, which will be passed onto the pilots and air crew once the site becomes operational. Having this info ensures our pilots can more quickly assess a landing site well before even arriving there, speeding up the time it takes to get paramedics onto the ground (potentially saving around 10-15mins) and to a patient.

The main requirement for DAAT to be able to land at night at Longmead in Hemyock will be the installation of a new 10m lighting column and two LED lights. That column would be located along the eastern side of the playing area (see photo below), set back from the pitch. Power for the lighting (230v) could be taken from the pavilion, underground via a trench to the lighting column.

Tickets are available from Casey Blackmore. On **Sunday 15th October at 6.30** we look forward to Rosemary Lane Chapel joining us for St Lukes Day service. **St Andrew's Day** supper takes place on 30th November. The December and Christmas activities will be announced in the next edition of the Pump.

We send our very best wishes and a warm welcome to new families who are coming to live with us in Clayhidon in perhaps eight residences this year. We hope you soon are settled here in this beautiful and peaceful parish. In the meantime, we send our very good wishes to those who are in ill health at present and pray for their speedy recovery.

News from Clayhidon

Drewfest and Council Give £3,000 to Hall

Offers of financial support from Drewfest and Clayhidon Parish Council have given a huge boost to plans to improve Clayhidon Parish Hall.

Richard Drew is giving a £1,000 from the proceeds of this year's Drewfest music festival in Clayhidon, while the council at its August meeting agreed a £2,000 grant.

The next stage of the improvement project is to renovate the roof. The hall committee is to apply in October to Viridor Credits for funding of between £30,000 and £40,000, but must raise 10% from third parties.

Voting unanimously to give £2,000, the council added a "strong recommendation" that the committee takes advantage of any available grants and fits renewable energy panels to the roof at the same time

Gareth Weekes, hall committee chairman, said: "The council's support for the hall this year has been fantastic, and combined with this incredibly generous gift from the Drew family we are now close to the 10% we need before we can apply to Viridor."

Merry Harriers Plans Spark a Row

Reg Payne, owner of the Merry Harriers, Clayhidon, has stirred controversy with his plans for building a new pub on the same site following



two arson attacks last year. But the plans have been condemned by local people for being out of keeping with the character of the Blackdowns.

While most objectors welcome the principle of replacing the building, there is widespread disappointment with the design, which objectors say looks more like a suburban house than an iconic country inn.

There is also annoyance that because the site is a few feet inside Somerset, the nearest neighbours, who live on the Devon side of the county border, were not consulted. Yet many of the old pub's customers, and many of the people using this dangerous road junction, live in Clayhidon. The application was due to be considered by planners at Taunton Deane Borough Council on 4 September, but a week later the council's website was reporting that no decision had been made

Heading the objectors is Lisa Turner, AONB planning officer, who wrote that the location of the Merry Harriers made it something of a landmark building, yet "The colours, choice and mix of materials indicated on the plans are not typical of the Blackdown Hills, suggesting a more urban appearance."

Other objectors included Kate and David Hewitt, of Clayhidon, who made a plea for incorporating the iconic wooden beams of the old building and for retaining the skittle alley, which is facing demolition.

Both the Hewitts and Mr and Mrs Purvis of the Kingsmead Centre, called for an improvement to the "whiffy" sewerage system and to the dangerous blind road junction. They said other people would have expressed similar views if they had been informed of the application.



Hog Roast Success

A church barbecue and hog roast on 27 August was a success and cleared a profit of £400 for St. Andrew's, Clayhidon.

Organised by Casey Blackmore, Gemma Gilbert and Nicola Bendle, it included a hotly contested Clayhidon Bake Off competition and entertainment from Julian Day with his racing ducks.

Nicola Bendle said it had been a successful event with plenty of families involved, children's races and wonderful weather.

Some 90 hog roasts were served, with Mike Hudson and Corinne Williams doing the puddings. Hardly anything was left over. Val Slabbert ran a Pimms tent.

The Clayhidon Bake Off had nearly 50 entries. Mike Hudson was the judge for the floral entries, Nicola Werner for the artistic classes and Rachel Drawert and Gina Cox judged the cakes.

Organised by Casey Blackmore, the Victoria sponge competition was won again by her mother-in-law, Thelma Blackmore, and second was her husband, Jamie Blackmore. But Casey said there was no favouritism. "There was definitely no fix, I entered in the scones class and came nearly bottom!"

Gemma Gilbert won the scones and Susie Kallaway won the cupcake class.

Thelma won the Victoria sponge class at the first Clayhidon Bake off two years ago, and last year ran the competition with her sister-in-law, Jo Blackmore, so did not enter.

August Meeting WATSAN Project

At the meeting of Clayhidon Friends on 9th August, Mr Stephen Bullett spoke on the WATSAN Project.

The charity's quotation is "Water is Life, Sanitation is Dignity". Since 1984 the charity has brought clean, flowing water to the small villages of Rukungii and Kanigu in the south west of Uganda. To date some 40,000 people have benefited from the project's work. As an on-going scheme, the rural poor and future generations will have tap stand outlets, improved sanitation and health and hygiene education. In addition rainwater catchments conserve water and old sanitation has been replaced by ventilated latrines.

There is an urgent need for skills to be passed on to future generations. Up to 0.5 million people in this region still lack convenient access to clean, safe water and women and children have to walk as far as 6 miles daily to collect water which is often from poor sources. The area has no Government funding, only approval, and constant funds need to be raised. So the charity needs to raise funds for on-going projects and day to day organisational work.

A younger brother had found him there though he had changed his name! One of his descendants came to the exhibition to relate more information about the family.
