#### **Remembrance Day Service**

Armistice Day saw around 25 people gather at Hemyock's War Memorial for a short service taken by Rev John Stone as the village fell silent as it observed the national 2 minutes silence.

The following day a large congregation gathered at St Mary's parish church, Hemyock for the annual Remembrance service which was again led by Rev Stone. The church choir followed by uniformed youth groups led members of the public from the parish hall to the church where a pulpit fall of poppies was on display. The church gate and War Memorial wall had been adorned with handcrafted poppies made by members of the local Women's Institute.

The service ended with wreaths being laid by representatives of the Parish Council, Scout Group, Brownies and Primary School. Mr Tim Barton gave the Exhortation and the 2 minutes silence was observed. The collection in aid of the Royal British Legion amounted to over  $\pounds_{512}$  an increase of around  $\pounds_{70}$  on last year.

#### Hemyock History Report

The meeting on Thursday 9th November started with a brief questionnaire on proposals to change the date of the meeting to the 1st, 3rd or 4th Thursday of the month. Also the plan to organise a group to go with the Dorchester Army Museum excursion to the memorial to the 2nd Devons in the first world war at Bois des Buttes on the river Aisne, 2 hours NE of Paris. The excursion will coincide with the Centenary of the battle on the 27th May 2018 when there will be a guided tour of the battlefield and ceremony. Several men from the Hemyock area were involved in this battle and attended the ceremony to mark the award of the Croix de Guerre to the 2nd Devons.

The November talk was given by Amyas Crump who grew up in the area and has been involved in giving talks on the Culm Valley Railway for many years. His talk has now been extended to include fascinating information he has researched on what happened to the railway during the war years. Spitfires were trained locally on how to follow trains and destroy them so that they could then be deployed to the continent and achieve success in short time.

Trains were very busy during the war years with several crashes caused by enemy action and also damage to the rails. A crash between Norton Fitzwarren and Tiverton resulted in 25 deaths and the diversion of traffic via Dulverton and Bampton.

Amyas also provided new information on a special agent who lived locally before being sent to France as an SOE agent. The methods used to drop agents into occupied France were extensive and fraught with problems. One method that we have heard about before at our meetings was to use the Westland Lysander with a metal ladder fixed to the outside of the aircraft to allow agents to scuttle up and down quickly when the plane was landed with only the moon light in a field somewhere in France. One of these brave pilots, now in his 95th year, lives in the valley.

The SOE agent who spent 3 years in occupied France with the resistance but then captured by the gestapo, sent to concentration camps but worked her way back to the area after the war was, of course, Odette.

The next 2 talks are from Reg Howe on Thursday 14th December on Livery Companies and David Pugsley on Thursday 11th January on the Jane Austin family.

Everyone is welcome to come along for an enjoyable relaxing informative evening at 7.30pm in the Church Rooms, Cornhill, Hemyock.

#### **Dear Residents**

The main issues at Devon County is the preparation of the next year's budget, that is ongoing, because of the austerity times we are in the next year's budget preparation which is always ongoing. This last 8 years have seen £267m cuts in grant from Government and we have to make another £30m cut for next year. It is generally excepted the Government grant will disappear completely by 2020, when we will be on our own. We will have to be a very lean and mean Authority. We have pressures on funding, with ageing population. The Adult Social Care is 47% of the Council Budget. Our 'Promoting Independence Policy' is being embraced by staff and we are making progress in how we are supporting older people in a way that promotes their independence.

Any property which is surplus to requirement, we are selling, to date we have sold property worth £4m and there is another £7.5m to be sold by the year end, all sales will go back for capital investments. Only six months into this current year, and we are predicting a £1.99m underspend by the end of year, but there is a long way to go and we have the winter in front of us.

Meg Booth has been promoted to Head of Highways, Infrastructure and Waste, taking over from David Whitton, who has retired. Work continues on the roll out of the LED lighting across the County. Work on the "A" road network is nearing completion, with the remainder of the funding being used by the end of March 2018 to replace our highest energy usage lanterns. In total with the £10m investment we will have replaced about 25,000 lanterns and 5,000 columns, there will be significant savings in energy costs.

The average recycling rates of all Districts, including Exeter, have achieved a 55.7%, up .6% on the previous year. Mid Devon has achieved a recycling rate of 53.4%, below average but up 2.6% on the previous year, going in the right direction, at the same time reducing their running costs, this has been attributed to the fact that Mid Devon moved all their operations to Hitchcoks Business Park. Devon's average waste per head of population is 461kg, up 3kg, Mid Devon has reduced theirs by 21kg from 376kg to 355kg per head. Devon County is the 4th best performing Waste Disposal Authority in the Country, Oxford being the best.

We get presented with customer feedback statistics on a quarterly basis, the second quarter of the year has seen a rise from 882 to 969., generally all customer complaints are down, what scudded the figures was letters from the 9 Devon MPs, up from 80 to 208, mostly about Social Care and Adult services. 107 was from Exeter. It was also noted it was in this year`s election year.

I would also like to remind you that I have the locality budget and if local clubs, charities and organisations could do with some small funding, just to contact me. It is not a big budget but does allow communities to access a few hundred pounds.

Oh dear, another year nearly gone. I would like to wish all Residents a Happy Xmas and a Happy and Healthy new year.

#### Devon Air Ambulance – Night-Time Landing Site

MDDC has granted permission for Devon Air Ambulance to erect a lighting column at Longmead for night-time landing. It is hoped that the installation works will be completed in early December and the site will 'go live' shortly afterwards. Should the lighting on the column switch on at any time during the evening, this will mean that the Devon Air Ambulance helicopter is due to land.

The scheme will cost £5,875.14 and Devon Air Ambulance will provide a grant of £2,983.12 towards this, leaving a total of £2,892.02 for the parish to find. The parish council has agreed to underwrite this amount and hopes that the community will get behind this, as it did for the defibrillators, and raise the money. #### Can Beavers Help Save Britain From Flooding?


The notion of 'Re-Wilding' can raise strong opinions on both sides of the debate. Locally this currently focuses on the Beaver. There is however national interest (the information below is from the Guardian newspaper) in their potential to reduce 'downstream' flooding.

The experimental site in Devon is vivid proof of how beavers create a wildlife paradise, re-engineering small valleys with amphibianand insect-friendly ponds. Scientific studies show that their dams remove pollutants from water – they are particularly effective at filtering out harmful phosphates – and reduce floodwater peaks. Enthusiasts proclaim these large herbivores could become 21stcentury water engineers, protecting towns from flooding. But some farmers hate beavers because their dams can also flood productive land.

But it's the beavers' water works that have really struck those studying the Devon site. During heavy rain, the volume of water flow increases rapidly above the site, creating a dramatic spike in the graph. But when the floodwater is measured again below the site, there is a gentle curve. In other words, the beavers dramatically reduce the peak flow of floodwater on this stream.

So, it appears that Beavers are good for wildlife & they could reduce the flooding in river valleys after heavy rainfall. However, they can also flood farm land so would need to be managed. As home owners we don't want to be flooded, but neither do we want to lose significant farm land. I wonder what next year will bring for this famous West Country resident?



From new studies carried out by Aga Burzynska, Assistant Professor, Department of Human Development and Family Studies, Colorado State University, it is clear to see that dance exercise helps to preserve cognitive function in participants aged 60 - 80 years.

#### **Traffic Diversions**

Gigaclear is to start digging up Clayhidon's lanes in February 2018 and laying underground fibre optic cables and connection pots. Part of the price of having among the fastest broadband speeds in the world will be three weeks of traffic disruption, with many roads having to be closed.

Clayhidon people worried that Gigaclear might be bypassing the parish are taking comfort from publication of a map showing the proposed roadworks. #### **Revised Merry Harriers Plans Approved**

The Merry Harriers is to rise again from the ashes. Planning permission has been given for a new pub on the site of the historic building wrecked by fire last year. But Taunton Deane District Council planners have taken on board criticisms that the original design was too suburban and out of keeping with the Blackdown Hills. They have insisted on a revised design more typical of the area, including a stone boundary wall,

The front of the pub is to be rendered all over instead of the original plan for red brick on the lower half of the building. The planners have also imposed road safety conditions covering drivers' visibility and the surface of the car park and have insisted on the builders providing habitats for bats and swallows.



#### Another Juggernaut Gets Stuck

A 6oft lorry somehow got down Rosemary Lane before becoming stuck at Gladhayes Bridge, Clayhidon on 26 October. It was on the way to Jules Farm, Hemyock and the driver said he was following his commercial sat nav, which had guided him here from the A303.

John Bendle, who helped him reverse out of trouble and turn, said he would be raising the incident with the parish council, to try to get effective signs banning lorries from Rosemary Lane. It is the second time in 18 months that a lorry has become stuck at the bridge. The last one did some damage to banks and buildings in Rosemary Lane, and this one apparently knocked off someone's guttering and left tyre marks all the way back up the hill. Clayhidon Parish Council held meetings in October & November. A brief summary of the business conducted at those meetings is as follows:-

#### Planning

Applications received for:-

- 17/01453/FULL. Kingsmead Centre, Clayhidon. Erection of a dwelling (100sqm) including camp site reception facilities (58sqm).
- 17/01570/FULL. Wiltown Farm, Clayhidon. Change of use of land and conversion of former agricultural building to form 1 dwelling.
- 17/01642/HOUSE. Rosegarland Barn, Clayhidon. Erection of two storey rear extension (Revised scheme).

#### Finance

Expenditure - clerk's wages and village maintenance.

The parish council has agreed to donate £2,000 to the Parish Hall (towards the 10% required under the Viridor Grant Scheme) to help renovate the roof of the hall. The Parish Council has strongly recommended that the hall committee uses the opportunity provided by renovation of the roof to seek any available grants and to fit renewable energy panels.

If it is red, please report to the clerk or directly to the number displayed in the cabinet. Annual defibrillator training (with Culmstock & Hemyock) is provided by South Western Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust as part of the lease agreement. It is hoped that the next training will be in January. More information to follow – see village website.

#### **Fireworks**

Following this year's bonfire night and concerns about animal welfare, the parish council politely asks that in future advance notice is given to neighbours of any planned fireworks party. It is an offence under the Animal Welfare Act 2006 to cause any unnecessary suffering to any captive or domestic animal. Fireworks must not be set off near livestock or horses in fields or close to buildings that house livestock.

#### Local Tradespeople

From time to time the parish council employs people to carry out tasks on its behalf. These tasks range from repairing a wall, improving and repairing footpaths, gates and bridges, clearing ditches, and other general maintenance works. The parish council is keen to use local tradespeople and to that end if you would be interested in quoting for any such works then please contact the clerk giving your contact details and the types of work you are interested in and your details will be held on file.

#### **Clayhidon Friends**

#### **November Meeting**

Peter Hayward from Honiton worked as a distribution manager for Express Dairies for the 4 SW counties for 30 years - based in Exeter.

He brought a crateful of milk bottles from different eras to illustrate his history of the milk bottle. He has about a thousand bottles - all different, old and newer - from SW dairies.

The first milk to be sold in bottles was in the USA in the 1890's and their glass was light brown. Milk came in bottles in the 1930's in the UK but not really until after the 2nd WW in the rural areas of the SW.

Early UK bottles weighed 20 ounces. Bottles would last on average 20 uses before either breaking or needing replacement - much more than the dumpy bottle (weight 8 ounces) which came later. "Silver top" milk was (4%) full cream, and "gold top" was (5%) channel island milk. Skimmed milk was a waste product and fed to the pigs or even thrown away. When concerns were raised about the levels of fat in our diet, full, semi-skimmed and skimmed milk became available.

Pasteurization was developed just before WWII, and was commonplace by the fifties. ASDA tried a biodegradable carton made of thin cardboard lined with very thin plastic, but it didn't take off.

The milk marketing board came into being in 1933 and then milk quality was checked and standardised. The size of bottle (one pint) was standardised, although a third of a pint bottle was used for school milk. This was started in 1926 and continued until the 60's and was a good source of calories and protein for children. A quart pint and a half pint had also been used until then. Homogenising the milk dispersed the fat throughout the milk, so no more pinching the cream for your cereal!

Sterilised milk was popular post-war in the midlands and areas in the north because a fridge wasn't necessary to store it, and usually, lower income families didn't have one. With the arrival of supermarket milk in plastic cartons etc, there was a huge reduction in doorstep milk deliveries, but there are moves to reintroduce this in some areas.



out of the way of your intrigued feline. Cats also can enjoy a nibble on tinsel. They tend to eat lengths of stringy material which can then cause a concertina effect on the intestines. This can be very harmful and requires surgery to treat, so keeping tinsel and string out of harm's way is much safer!

What Christmas is complete without chocolate? Unfortunately many dogs, and sometimes cats, also believe this to be true! Chocolate can cause vomiting and diarrhoea and in larger doses, liver failure and can be fatal. The higher the cocoa content the more the risk, so keep those expensive dark chocolate truffles out of the way of any investigative hounds in the house! Be wary of chocolates on the tree and wrapped in presents within reach. Remember a small number of extra treats can lead to rapid weight gain which can take a long time to lose.

Dried fruit is also a risk to dogs and can cause renal failure so keep Christmas pudding, mince pies and Christmas cake away from low tables or other places your crafty hound may be able to get to.

For some of us, it can all get a bit much at these festive times. We may like our house being filled with family, friends and music but not all our pets do. For some, the bustle and noise can be very stressful. If you have a timid pet who enjoys the quiet, make sure there is somewhere peaceful that they can go to not be disturbed. 

Our Thatching Life

Featuring Ferrari the Thatcher and Daisy his Apprentice

Even if I weren't shaking sheets of ice off the tarps at the beginning of the day, I can tell it's getting colder as with every few degrees less, Daisy adds a few layers more... she is up to 5 now plus her jacket. That said, we are on the sunny side of the roof, so it's not long before we warm up. We are re-thatching Mr and Mrs H's house in water reed, with a simple straight block ridge. We are only doing two sides as the two rear extensions still have a few years in them. It is often the case that each elevation wears at a different rate to the other, with things like the prevailing weather, shading from trees, the pitch of the roof or how many details like dormer 'eyebrows' or valleys there are, all influencing how the roof bears up over time. Perhaps sadly the more straight, steep and featureless your roof, the longer it will last between coats.

With a ridge lasting up to eight years and the main coatwork lasting up to twenty, it can be a bit of a juggle timing a re-thatch to coincide with a re-ridge, but we try to keep you dry with small patches where necessary, and timetable your work so that you are getting the most out of your roof. The only time we might advise you to the contrary is if you are selling your house, as a glowing new thatch that will last for years is a good selling point.

Daisy's youngest is counting down the days to Christmas... I expect Mr and Mrs H are counting the days till the scaffolding goes as not many people like scaffolding poles as a view out of the window on Christmas day! So while we keep our fingers crossed for 3 weeks of dry weather, it only remains for us to wish you a Merry Christmas and a peaceful, prosperous New Year.
