A Staircase for Silence*

There is something about an old empty church.

Many of us like to drop in to the ancient and musty atmosphere of a country church. It smells of history and permanence.


As the sun streams through aging glass catching the dust in the air as shafts of heavenly light, pools of sunshine collect on the honey stone floor, and, without a glance at altar or pulpit, a deep sense of the presence of one greater pervades one's being. God is there.

Recently I remember calling at an ancient Celtic chapel in Cornwall with its holy well and water flowing under the eastern altar in which centuries of Christians had been baptised, and having this deep sense of the endless presence of the One who created me. God was there indeed.

We have a priceless inheritance in many of our church buildings.

Most people do recognise them as special, if not holy, places where we can be still, be quiet, and get in touch, both with ourselves, and God.

As a Christian minister I recognise the pressures on our buildings to be places where the needs of the local Christian congregations can be met with modern facilities, comfortable seating arranged to create a sense of community and oneness. It is excellent that there will be toilets in St. Mary's pretty soon!



However, we need to be sensitive both to the needs of today and the inheritance of the past. No easy task.

It can sometimes surprise many Christians of the truth that many who do not come to church do have a profound belief in God and a real openness to the spiritual dimension.

Perhaps one thing we who are church members can do, is to encourage our church buildings to be more open and available as a 'holy space' which can be used by any who would find this resource useful and helpful.

It is good that in most of our villages the churches are for the most part open during the week to allow anybody to enter and experience that stillness and quiet that is both at the heart of our being and at the heart of God.

Once a year a percentage of takings from St. Mary's Charity and Coffee Shop, Hemyock are donated to charity with the latest amount being over £500. The shop has been running for over 5yrs and has donated approx. £5000 to various charities.

£432 was donated to the Parish Council as a contribution to the night time Landing Lights for the Air Ambulance with £108 being given to 1st Hemyock Brownies. Their money will be used for a gardening project in the Church Room garden and churchyard.

The shop held at the Church Room, Castle Hill three times a month runs from 10a.m. – 12 noon and provides a great place to socialise, enjoy coffee and cake as well as seek for a bargain amongst the enormous amount of good quality items for sale. The volunteers offer a warm welcome and you will meet many friendly faces.

Over 2017 lunches organised by St Mary's Church, Hemyock has raised £2,241. The church Fabric Fund received £1,150; £925 was donated to Rev Jenny Green for her work in a deprived area of Bradford with £166 being sent to the Potters Village in Uganda a previous placement of the Rev Green.

Summer Lunches will be held at the Church Rooms on 19th April and 17th May, serving at 12.30pm. The meals are open to all so if you are new to the area it is a good way to meet folk and make friends with the added addition of a delicious lunch.

Election and Review Time

Each year the Church of England requires various things of the parishes which make up its dioceses. One is to elect Churchwardens. This is an ancient office, which, whilst it has lost some of its tasks, like removing the hats of gentlemen wearing them in church, it still has an awful lot of responsibilities. They are the main support to the priest in "normal" times, but in times of inter-regnum there are the ones leading the parish. In olden days the meeting to elect them was held in the Vestry, and that name has stuck to it over the years. The electorate for this meeting is anybody whose name is on either the Church Electoral Roll or the Parliamentary Electoral Roll.

The second meeting is the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. This reviews what has been happening in church life over the past year, looks at the accounts and elects the Church Council for the ensuing year. These are elected by those on the Church Roll only.

Both these meetings take place on Tuesday April 24th, the Vestry at 7.30pm, the APCM afterwards.

Hemyock History Report

Two good meetings were held these last two months with a good attendance. Both the speakers were from the SW Heritage Trust who are developing their services at all the buildings which house unique documents and artefacts. We will be organising visits to their premises in the summer.

The February talk was from Will Partridge, the new Finds Officer and who intends to increase the public awareness of the finds already recorded and would like to work with interested amateurs in where to search for potential valuable finds.

This is the 20th anniversary of the commencement of the Treasure Act and over this time thousands of archaeological items have been acquired by public museums. The Frome Hoard of 52,000 Roman coins beat the Staffordshire Hoard of Anglo-Saxon gold as the Nation's favourite find in a national poll. The Treasure Act provides recompense equivalent to the value of the find. Locally there are records of 684 artefacts including Roman gold, spoons, coins, brooches, and Saxon enamel buckle plates etc.

The March talk was from Mary Siraut representing the Victoria County History for Somerset housed at the SW Heritage Trust. Most Counties have a representative body set up in the Victorian era for researching, recording and protecting historical material as a continuing record of England's places and people from earliest times.

The Somerset group have crossed the border occasionally on projects since there is currently no Devon group. Somerset have published 20 books on various subjects and have many properties of historical significance including the Fairfield estate where Alfred's jewel was found. One property they had to cross the border for was Compton Castle which has had an interesting history since the 12th century and where legend has it that Sir Walter Raleigh smoked the first pipe of tobacco in Britain. The April talk will be from John Somers on the subject of "How we used to live" and the May talk will be given by David Rabson on the Sanford family of Nynehead.

Dear Residents

I am not aware of any major problems in Hemyock, if there are please let me know, I hope to have a one to one with Dave Ashford, the Highway Neighbourhood Officer later this month. We ended the last year with an underspend of £2.6m. To start this year we have already spread over 12,000 tons of salt, compared to last year when we spread 9,500 for the whole year, not a good start.

You will know that the budget has now been set. You might also like to know the main issues of the finances of DCC, are, the Nett Revenue Budget is £511m, within that the Adult services get an increase of 6.1%, Children Service 5.5%, Communities PH and Environment minus 2.3% and Highways and Waste minus 2.7%. Interesting to know, Police have increased by 6.81%, Fire 2.99%, DCC 4.99%, this includes 2% for Adult Care, MDDC 2.99% and the average increase for Parishes Councils is 7.7%. The Locality budget is retained at £10k, with an additional Investing in Devon Budget (IID) of £10k and the TAP fund is still in place at just over £10k, but these budgets are spread over 9 Parishes. Please let me know if any club/ organisation would like to make an application for funds.

Thought you might like to know about Devon Norse, this is a Company jointly owned by Norse Commercial Services and DCC. This arrangement provides many benefits to the Authority including, access to new markets, building strong local communities, support for local charities, arts civic projects and community initiatives, as well as an income share agreement. In 2016/17 the business delivered a profit to DCC of £226k. Below are a few headline factors:

- Devon Norse directly employ 1080people, around 91% which live in Devon.
- For every £1 of expenditure on suppliers, 67p is spent in the South West region, including 57p with businesses in Devon County Council
- £695k was spent on other businesses in Devon, These businesses supported further 31 jobs.



Social Prescribing Conference - 26th January 2018



At the end of January, the Blackdown Practice and the Blackdown Support Group hosted a "Social Prescribing Conference" at the Blackdown Healthy Living Centre in Hemyock. "Social Prescribing" enables GPs, nurses and other healthcare professionals to refer patients to local non-clinical services. It has been recognised at a national level that health and general well-being can be significantly improved by social or physical activities, learning new skills, having more contact with others or feeling part of a community. The BSG has been operating on this principle for over 25 years now, so along with the Practice, we decided to hold this event, bringing together professionals from the local authorities, health and social care teams, local and national charities and representatives of other community organisations.

The event was introduced by Dr Michael Dixon who has been a GP in Cullompton for over 26 years and is also Chair of Council for the College of Medicine, which emphasises the importance of non-biomedical interventions in health and care, including social prescription, lifestyle interventions and complementary and traditional approaches. The 35 conference attendees discussed the services which are currently available in the Blackdowns, what we could do to improve links with each other and how we can ensure local people have the relevant information they need in order to access appropriate services and support. The event was a great success and we hope to continue working together with other organisations in this way. Hemyock Primary School

At Hemyock Primary school, we are committed to a creative curriculum that is broad and balanced and that includes awe and wonder. However, after a recent school health and safety audit it was deemed that the decking that surrounds the pond was not safe for use (it was showing its age and had been repaired several times). Therefore, our new focus was to remove and replace the damaged timber so that the children could access this vital component to the broad and balanced curriculum. After submitting a proposal for a grant to the 'Blackdown Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) 'to help fund the replacement of the decking, we were granted the money and with voluntary help from Mr and Mrs Bar, we were able to complete the task, thus ensuring that awe and wonder was still enhanced in the curriculum.

How we went about it...

The Children and staff had previously worked with the AONB team to develop the pond area by clearing the pond and making habitats for the local wildlife that frequently visit. After their help we started to create a hide-out from reclaimed timber so that the children could watch and record the inhabitants as they go about their daily routines.

Part of the remit was to ensure that local businesses were part of this and, with thanks to Brookridge Timber, we were able to source the wood we needed to carry out the repairs and replacement. The decking was a major task. At first we thought it was only the deck boards that needed replacing but we soon found out that this was not the case and we also needed to replace the supporting joists.

After the decking had been replaced the next stage was to clear some of the weed that had over grown the pond. This is an annual task that needs to be done, otherwise the children will not be able to see the wild life living below the water line. So, the big operation to clear the pond for the dwellers was under way. We remembered to leave the weeds on the side, like the AONB had showed us, when they came to help us at school last year. We did this so that the pond inhabitants could find their way back home.

The pond was starting to look over grown and the pond dippers were unable to see the life that lurked beneath the water so we cleared the weed.

The final step was to make the wildlife hide water tight and safe for use. We used some of the left-over wood to create windows so that the children can peer through whilst looking for the inhabitants of the pond without disturbing them as they go about their busy lives.

All ready for use

Sun class went on a hunt to find out what lives in the pond area during the winter.

The children noticed the flora and fauna that either surrounded or grew in the pond, particularly pointing out the bulrushes. I carefully pulled one towards the children so that they could look closely at the brown soft head that was about to fall apart, showing the children the seeds that it had stored. "Wow they feel soft, like my furry blanket," a pupil commented when she felt the bulrush head.

The children then looked carefully into the dark, cold water of the pond. "Look"! A shout of excitement came from one of the pupils as he pointed eagerly into the depths of the pond. Right enough, there, floating on top of the water, was a small (very small) pond beetle and alongside were seeds from the trees that surround the area. The seeds had been blown into the water over the winter months. This opened up another adventure - looking for the trees that had shed their seeds into the pond.

"Look at what's happening to the conkers" a pupil asked as he showed me new life emerging from the conker that had been deposited in the pond area. I explained to him this was how the tree starts to grow. "Can we plant it?" he asked. I suggested that we take it back to the classroom, plant it and watch it grow.


The children were very excited to use the hide-out as the weather changed from a lovely sunny morning, to a rain shower that turned into a flurry of snow. We stood inside the hut looking through the window watching the British weather changing before our eyes. It was beyond educational!

Moon class children went searching for the pond dwellers too. They found some signs of life and will be on watch over the next few months as spring raises it head.

Although the decking has been replaced, our work has not finished. The children will continue to work alongside their parents and staff to develop the pond classroom. In addition to this, we will continue to work with Blackdown Hills AONB to develop our understanding of the beautiful area that we live and learn in and how to help sustain a healthy population of wild life. The area will also be a vital hub for the school community to take part in national wildlife surveys as we develop the flora and fauna.

Thank you once again to Blackdown Hills AONB for the grant, Mr and Mrs Bar who kindly offered up their skills to help replace the decking and Brookridge Timbers for suppling us with the materials.

News from Clayhidon

Rubbish Buys New Roof For Hall

Rubbish from thousands of Devon households is paying for a new roof on a popular Blackdown Hills entertainment venue.

Taunton-based Viridor Credits, which is funded by donations from Viridor's 18 landfill sites across the UK, including Broadpath, near Uffculme, is giving £25,856 to Clayhidon Parish Hall.

The committee running the 100-year-old building, originally a Victorian village schoolroom, wants to raise over £100,000 to bring it up to 21st century standards.

"Worn slates, leaking mean we have no choice but

to start with the roof," said committee chairman Gareth Weekes.

Despite its shortcomings, the hall hosts many live music gigs, community events and film shows, and attracts audiences from a wide area. Once a new slate roof has been added, the committee plans to build an extension with new toilets, a meeting room and a parish archive room before thoroughly modernising the hall interior.


Work on the kitchen roof will start in May, but nesting swifts will delay completion of the hall roof until early September. Roofing contractors Courtney Bowden & Son, of Wellington, will be making special nest boxes for them to be fitted once the birds have flown on their annual migration back to Africa, "We are immensely grateful to Viridor Credits for this generous grant, which has given a flying start to our fundraising campaign," said Gareth. Clayhidon Parish Council has also given £2,000 towards the roof and Richard Drew has donated £1,000 from the proceeds of the music festival he runs, Drewfest.

The grant is being made under the Landfill Communities Fund, a Government scheme which allows companies to give part of their Landfill Tax to local community and environmental organisations.

Gigaclear Reassure Councillors

The public turned out in force for Clayhidon Parish Council's meeting on 19 February - and everyone who wanted to speak had their say. Many were there to comment and ask questions about the laying of fibre-optic cable in the parish.

If the officials from Gigaclear, MGM Utilities, Devon County Council and Connecting Devon & Somerset had expected a hard time from the audience, it never happened. All signs of hostility melted away as people praised the work teams. Their most vocal critics had apparently already had their say about the damage to roads and verges and been listened to.

Maurice Bendle said: "We still have concerns about our roads, and it's reassuring to know that you are going to keep an eye on things after you have finished."

Richard Olive, of Gigaclear, quoted Alan Redwood as saying to him: "We have forced you to raise your game". "It's a fair point," added Mr Olive.

War On Potholes

There's a simple way to get Devon County Council to repair Clayhidon's potholed roads - and everyone in the parish can play a part, says parish councillor Graham Langford.

If there is a pothole in your vicinity 40mm deep, with a vertical edge and at least 300mm wide, simply go online and mark the spot on the map. Visit the Devon County Council website and type "Report a problem" into the search box. If it is not repaired, go online and report it again and again, says Graham. Every report is logged and his theory is "in the end they will get so fed up with logging it they will come out and fix it."

There are many isolated deep craters, but parish councillors agreed that the worst stretch was between in the parish hall and Hidewood Farm, which former councillor Alan Redwood described as "almost impassable".

'Outstanding' House is Planned

A highly unusual application to build an "architecturally outstanding" modern house on the hill above Carlingwark, Clayhidon is to be considered by Mid Devon planners. Clayhidon Parish Council voted by a majority of three to one to support plans, by Susan Annett and Richard Brown, for a fourbedroom beech-beamed building with "an agricultural look". Planning laws normally prevent new homes on the green belt, unless they meet specific criteria, not least that they should be architecturally outstanding.

Frozen River

There's a river under there somewhere. The Culm completely froze over in places on 2 March. It's thought to be the first time this has happened in about 20 years. The whole parish was effectively snowed in for the first



two days of spring, when Storm Emma collided with the Beast From The East - a freezing gale that blew from Siberia.

Happy About The Blues

The prospect of two blues bands - the Moosehead Blues Band and 11th Hour - drew a crowd of nearly 50 to Clayhidon Parish Hall for what turned out to be a thoroughly enjoyable evening. It soon emerged that this wasn't just going to be a Blues Night as advertised, as both bands slipped into classic rock and roll covers. The hall committee organised a raffle, supper and a licensed bar and made a profit of more than £400

February Meeting

Despite the Diversions set up in the lanes due to cable laying, nineteen of us managed to gather to hear a Talk on Dementia by Brian Standing who is a "Champion" for the Dementia Friends. This means he is trained to talk to people and educate every one's perceptions of Dementia. He hasn't been trained in the medical side of it. Dementia is a Disease. You cannot catch it! People still need you to be their friend.

Dementia can happen to anyone from the ages of 30 to 90 years of age. Alzheimer's is only one type of a hundred different types. Every person is unique in the type of Dementia they have. It is impossible to generalise about what a person is going through. Brian told us one of his sayings; "If you know one person with Dementia, you know one person with Dementia". The message was to not say that a person is 'suffering' with Dementia, but say that person is 'living' with Dementia. Many people, with adjustments to their lives, manage to carry on their lives for a long while. The disease can progress in stages and also revert backwards and forwards day by day.

It isn't just about losing your memory. You lose Motor skills such as getting lost, not remembering the sequence and routines you once had. They might lose their inhibitions or their personality changes back and forth from aggression to loving. One day remembering how things are done, the next unable to. They might be unable to cope with escalators or automatic doors.

Although their sight might be perfectly alright, their brain doesn't always compute what they are seeing. Seeing things as they aren't, with example maybe seeing a black mat as a hole and standing there in fear of falling into it.

What Dementia people pick up, long after memory has started to fade, is your non-verbal communication. Smile at them, give them a hug if appropriate, and look them in the eye. They can be feeling very lonely. Don't give up on your relative or friend, they need you more than ever to connect at whatever level they can. It is best not to ask direct questions as they won't be able to reason it through. Better to say, "I am making a cup of tea". Don't say "Do you want a cup of tea?". Take them for a walk and point and name things that you observe to include them into the trip.

Brian gave us a very graphic analogy to imagine a bookcase with your most recent memories on the top shelf, each shelf holding a different stage in your life with the bottom shelf being all your childhood memories. As things progress all the top shelves start to tilt and fall off and those memories are gone. The last one to go is the bottom shelf with all the childhood and teenage memories. Knowing that, try to communicate with their childhood memories or skills and connect with them through those. Music stays with people and often ignite wonderful times and memories. We were told to think about how you would make a cup of tea. Perhaps the person with Dementia was born before the electric kettle and the milk was kept in a fridge and tea was loose, not in bags. Be aware how confusing the modern things are for them now.

The whole group was very grateful to have listened to Brian, who brought the whole subject over very well. We now feel enlightened in how to communicate with people 'who are living with Dementia'. Vale Veterinary Group Press Release

Parvovirus update

Following a recent case of Parvovirus, the vets at The Vale Veterinary Group are raising awareness of the importance of pet vaccination for dogs. In an attempt to prevent further cases of the disease, all owners are being asked to check their vaccination records; If they believe that their dogs may not be currently covered they should contact their veterinary practice.

Vet Alan Benson explains "Parvovirus is usually spread by environmental contamination with dog faeces. There does not need to be direct dog to dog contact and it can be brought into the household on shoes. Unprotected dogs, especially the young, develop severe vomiting and bloody diarrhoea, and in most cases, despite the best veterinary care, the dog cannot be saved." Alan continues, "The distress to the dog and their owners is obvious. Unfortunately there are still a large number of dogs which have never been vaccinated or whose vaccinations have lapsed, making them vulnerable to infection. We believe that preventive care including regular vaccinations and health checks are the best way an owner can actively help their pet's long-term health" concludes Alan.

FORCE – Friends of the Oncology and Radiotherapy Centre. Exeter

FORCE Cancer Charity is based in Exeter. It believes that anyone affected by cancer deserves the best possible treatment and professional support close to home and face-to-face. Since 1987 the charity has been funding local research and buying equipment to improve patient care at the Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital.

In 2004 FORCE opened a Cancer Support and Information Centre in the grounds of the RD&E. The Centre is open every weekday 9:30-4:30 (Wednesdays 6:30) for people needing physical, emotional, psychological and practical support at a difficult time in their lives. The Centre receives around 25,000 visits a year with patients, their families, carers and friends all able to access support. It has a well-stocked library and information nurses on hand to help with questions and offer advice.

There are counselling services for individuals and within support groups, including for children and young people, plus complementary therapies, exercise guidance, relaxation and mindfulness sessions, a benefits advice service, help to cope with hair loss and a wig fitting service.

FORCE also offers support and information sessions once a week in Tiverton and Okehampton with plans to offer a service in East Devon. The charity also funds the delivery of chemotherapy in Tiverton and Okehampton.

All of FORCE's services are free of charge. Since the charity was founded it has spent well over £8million on support, equipment and research. FORCE receives no Government funding. The charity needs to raise £1.5million every year to maintain the services it offers.

That money comes entirely from voluntary contributions - legacies, donations, the FORCE charity shop and from fundraising events. Fantastic support from the community it serves enables FORCE to fulfil its mission to support anyone locally affected by cancer.
