Beginnings and endings make up our lives. The big beginning happens when we are born and the big ending happens when we die; but there are many other, important and not-so-important, beginnings and endings that happen in between.

Starting school, college or one's first job, are beginnings we may remember well. They are important points of transition when we move from one place, one mode of being, to another. Getting married, getting some kind of qualification or honour, getting promotion – are other instances where significant changes will happen in our lives.

When we begin a new thing, it very often means leaving leaving school, leaving college or university, leaving an old job. Such times can me mixed with emotions of sadness - at leaving behind good friends and colleagues - and of excitement, anticipation and some apprehension about the new thing you are about to begin.

Within our lives many of us will go through a number of important transitions - some, often the 'endings', can be high in the 'stress stakes'. Loosing a loved one can be particularly tough for any of us. Moving house or getting divorced, being made redundant or retirement also feature high in the events of highest stress.



In my work I am privileged to share in many of these important life events, both happy and sad. The Church has provided, and can continue to provide, a framework to celebrate or commemorate important times of transition - especially at christenings, weddings and funerals – but at other times too.

It has been such an honour, as a representative of the Church, to have been involved with so many families at these important times of their lives. I hope that I have managed to help in a process over which I believe God oversees, and helps individuals and families move forward with faith and hope.

Sadly, I will soon come to an important time of transition of my own, and be retiring in September. I will miss the day-to-day contact with so many different people in our parishes – not just the Sunday services – but the involvement with so many people at these important times in their lives through which I have got to know so many.

But every ending has another beginning - even our final one – and whatever sadness we may have (and I know it will be considerable when the time comes for me to depart), there will be new beginnings with new challenges, new people to get to know and a new open fields to explore.

St Mary's Charity and Coffee Shop started running in 2012. It aimed to give the village a "recycling" facility, a social centre and a financial stream not only for the church but also other local charitable groups. The Shop normally runs three times a month, from 10am till 12n0on on the 1st Saturday and 2nd and 4th Tuesdays. The venue is the Church Rooms in Castle Hill. They accept a wide range of items, but not furniture or items needing mains electricity.

The "Coffee Shop" is run by the Friends of St Marys and provides cakes and biscuits to go with the coffee, tea and squash, and sometimes other goodies too. It's well worth a visit!

Hemyock Bells

Since 1858 that number has been 6, ranging in weight from 5cwt to just under 18cwt (280 to 907kg). They ring to announce services in the church, weddings, funerals and to mark many special personal, local and national events.

Standing next to a pillar erected by the Normans about 1120, ringing a bell nearly 400years old in the style that was started in the early 1500s, one has a glimpse of the traditions of ringing, just one of the many facets which make this form of service for the church so fascinating.

Hemyock ringers meet for practice most Thursday evenings, and ring for 45 minutes before the morning service on Sundays. They will link up with their fellow ringers from Culmstock and Clayhidon when needed.

Update on the building works at St Mary's Church, Hemyock



Thank you to everyone who has so generously given towards the provision of new toilets and associated works at St Mary's Church. When we sent out the leaflet with the Parish Pump in February there was a shortfall of £18,550; nearly £12,000 has been received in personal donations, leaving £6,700 still to be raised, but we are sure this is achievable. It is good that so many are prepared to support the Church which continues to be central to our community life. Thank you.

In spite of the inclement weather early on in the project, not least snow in March, the work is on schedule and the new extension with lovely stonework can be seen from the Churchyard, but also a particularly good view from the seat by the Castle Moat. It is fitting in well with the rest of the Church and will soon weather and blend in even though it is many centuries newer!



The good news is that services will now be resuming in the Church. For most of the last 3 months, services have been held in the Church Rooms because of no heating in the Church, but now the warmer weather has arrived (we hope) then it will be back to usual. We are grateful to the team of cleaners who have had a good spring clean.

One of the delights of the building work being has been the exposure of the C13th foundations which a number of visitors have been to view. The raised floor and pews in the north aisle had to be removed to give level access and a new floor has now been laid. A door has been knocked through from the Church into the new purpose built extension.

The work is being carried out by local firm BK Construction under the watchful eye of Russ Palmer, Church Architect.

Hemyock History Report

David Rabson gave a talk on the Sanford family of Nynehead who bought the estate in the 16th century. Nynehead was listed in the Domesday book and was given to the Bishop of Winchester who advanced into the Tone Valley with the Saxon King Ina in the 8th century, with other Taunton property owned to this day by the Diocese.

The Sanford family still live in the area, although not at Nynehead. They added to their wealth over the years having made extremely fruitful marriages. William Sanford organised the fund raising in 1815 for building Wellington Monument.

The late **Elsie Board** and **Stan Powell** were possibly members. I'm sure that Valley Arts and Hemyock Singers appreciate the more respectful audiences of today! Someone who was instrumental with the success of drama and music here was a past Headmaster of Hemyock School **Clive Richardson** who had previously taught maths at Uffculme School. His wife Jan was a petite, calm and unassuming lady who you may remember. After retiring the couple moved to family in Australia . We recently watched a 3 part series on BBC2, Secret Agent Select, concerning training some troops went through during WW2. Purely by chance at the same time this was televised I came across a letter Jane (Jan's daughter) had sent the Pump following her mother's death a few years ago. In it she quotes some of the notes Jan used in a talk given to her local church group. In brief it says:

At 18 she left her job in newspapers in Fleet Street and joined the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry and shortly afterwards found herself in a huge country house for 3 weeks training. This in turn led to Jan volunteering for overseas service with Special Operations. Jan worked as a radio operator for the SOE in Naples then at Bari on the Adriatic working with the Albanian Section before being sent to Sienna working with the Italian partisans before eventually being demobbed and returning to her old job. Obviously Jan's work involved dealing with dangerously secretive information with her life often in danger.

Re reading the letter me wonder do we have any SOE members living locally. If so would you be willing to share your experiences through the Pump? Do get in touch if this is something you would like to do.

Calf Club Centenary

In two years time Hemyock will be celebrating its role as the birthplace of the Young Farmers movement in the UK. 2020 will mark the centenary of the formation of Calf Club No 1 in Hemyock at a time when milk was in short supply after the First World War. Milk yields were static at about 500 gallons a year, and farmers were resistant to change.

But Hemyock teenagers, seven girls and 12 boys, took on the challenge of increasing milk yield and within three years the local dairy had doubled its intake. Each young person was given a British Shorthorn calf and charged with caring for it for a year. The idea came from the young Canadian manager of the local Wilts United Dairy, as he had seen successful young peoples clubs in North America. This small experiment led to today's vast modern dairy industry and the formation of 619 Young Farmers Clubs in England and Wales.

Now a small group of people, led by Heather Stallard want to commemorate this centenary with backing by Hemyock Parish Council and the Culm Valley Young Farmers. They are currently planning ways to do this including a recreation of the first parade of calves, a sculpture, an exhibition, rally, a legacy booklet and a social event.

So now they want to contact everyone whose family was involved in some way in farming in the Culm Valley between 1900 and 1930.

We want you to talk to relatives, dig around in your attics, and check out your family history to make sure we can record this centenary in the best way we can. We would love to see Calf Club records, details of milk production, milk recording, photos, diaries, farm accounts and farm sales. We aim to scan them and add them to our research. And maybe you could identify people in photos we already have and will have on display.

Please come along to the Forbes Lounge at Hemyock Parish Hall on Saturday, June 23, and we will scan your precious documents and return them to you. If you can't come along on that day but are happy to have your documents scanned, we can come to your home and do it there.

THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months.

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for.

News from Clayhidon



MIDSUMMER PARTY

A Midsummer Party in a Clayhidon marquee is planned for Saturday 30 June – and everyone is invited

It's being organised by the parish hall committee as a big summer social event to raise funds for building improvements.

There'll be a hog roast, a barn dance with the Stirabout Ceilidh Band, a licensed bar and a raffle with the star prize of a Cornish seaside holiday for five. The marquee will be pitched in Russell and Caroline Bendle's field just below the hall.

"It's going to be a real family and friends get-together and everyone from the area will be welcome, not just from the parish," said hall chairman Gareth Weekes. "Stirabout are great at getting children dancing as well as reluctant grown-ups, so we are hoping it will be an all-ages fun event."

After 125 years serving the Blackdowns, as a school, community centre and entertainment venue, Clayhidon Parish Hall urgently needs improvement.

Work on replacing the roof starts this month. The hall's supply of electricity is to be increased during the summer allow for much needed improvements in the kitchen, including a new cooker and glass washer.

The whole building suffers from condensation and is hard to heat. The toilets are cold and damp. Rain drips in between the slates and heat leaks through the poorly insulated roof.

Tables and chairs have to be stored on the stage and carried down before every event, then lifted back again afterwards. The stage has

woodworm and is poorly lit. Visiting performers change in a garden shed.

The hall committee plans to build an extension behind the stage to house new toilets, a warm room where performers can change, or people can hold meetings, plus an upstairs room to house the parish archives. The old toilets will be converted into a furniture store. All this will cost in the region of £100,000. "It sounds a daunting prospect for a parish where barely 300 people live, but we are already about a third of the way there," said Gareth "We have been promised a £25,800 by Viridor Credits plus great support from the parish council and gifts from generous individuals."

Somerset and Devon highway departments have agreed to work together to solve problems caused by huge lorries getting stuck in the narrow one track lanes of The Blackdown Hills.

Parishes complain of articulated lorries damaging bridges, house guttering and overturning. Residents complain lorries do not follow designated routes and use inaccurate sat navs.

Somerset has put signs on its border saying many roads are unsuitable for lorries, but Devon's stance has been that there are too many signs. Several parishes have resorted to buying their own signs saying lorries are not welcome.

Now two MP's have promised to try and sort out a coordinated scheme for the Hills which straddle the Somerset Devon border. A meeting on Monday in Clayhidon chaired by Neil Parish, MP for Tiverton and Honiton, gathered members of the Blackdown Hills Parish Network steering group with councillors from Clayhidon and Hemyock with Devon County Council chairman Ray Radford, Mid Devon Councillor Frank Rosamond and officers from both Devon and Somerset highways departments. Rebecca Pow, MP for Taunton Deane, was unable to be present.

It was agreed to hold another meeting in six months, on October 15. Mr Parish said: "We are absolutely fed up with all the lorries tearing up banks and generally causing havoc. Some of these lorries don't need to be where they are, some just see it as a cut through. They don't care which side of the border they are on."

And Catherine Bass, coordinator of the BHPN, said the area needed a combined effort to work in a joined up fashion. Richard Kallaway, chairman of Clayhidon PC, said a joint approach would make all the difference.

Mr Parish stressed the need for speed and said he would talk to the Minister for Transport.

May Meeting

We were all very intrigued by the title of Ken Atherton's Talk of "10 Places You Will Never Visit". He explained to us that he had shortened it from 100! We were not disappointed and our appetite for the unusual thoroughly stimulated. Who knew that there are so many places the General Public are not allowed into, existed?

In London the General Post Office (GPO now BT) built warrens of underground tunnels. Primarily to house the communication cabling, but big enough to walk through. These join the Ministry of Defence and the Government buildings. Also includes Buckingham Palace and Downing Street, going all the way up The Mall. Despite being built for World War I, they continue to be used to this day. What with the Underground Railways vast network, one wonders why more sink holes haven't appeared in London as they do in the other parts of the UK. Ken went through the 10 places which included MI5 and MI6. He explained it was not just London that had tunnels. Buildings such as the "The Doughnut" at Cheltenham which carries on the work of Bletchley Park. The Pindar Bunker which is radioactive proof and houses the Crisis Management Base and would house people in time of Nuclear Attack.

Also outside of London are other buildings we will never enter. Menwith Hill – RAF Yorkshire is surrounded by a high hedge. Initially used by the US in the Cold War, it is now back in the UK hands and used solely to concentrate still on Russia. No one knew it was there until the 2014 Cycle Race which had BBC Helicopters tracking the race but gave a full view of the grounds to the outside world.

The Manchester Guardian Telephone Exchange is much, much more than that. It too conceals underground tunnels. Primarily to house and keep active communications. An initial innocuous Victorian House in Wood Norton, Near Evesham was bought by the BBC to provide emergency broadcasts during the war if the BBC premises in London were bombed. Now it is used as a training centre but within the grounds is a ten level underground building, which would survive a Nuclear Attack and be able to take over from London to broadcast. One does have to ask the question who, if the UK had suffered a nuclear attack, would they be broadcasting to in the outside, unprotected public world? After the Talk we were treated to Refreshments by Helen and Margaret, for which we were very ready and grateful for and the chance to discuss amongst ourselves what we had learnt. I am unable to write in detail here the accounts of all ten places, but hope I have given you a taste of things that the General Public just don't know about. It was very, very interesting and if anyone would like to read my full account, please let me know.



Our Thatching Life Featuring Ferrari the Thatcher and Daisy his Apprentice

If my last article was all despair at the rain, this one couldn't be more different...spring sprung at last and we kept pace with her green mantling of the land, adding our own finishing touches to lan and Jenny's roof. Once the ridge is on, we roll out 3 foot of galvanised chicken wire along each side of it, fixing it to the ridge with hazel spars and twisting together any excess wire so that it fits to the shape of the roof exactly. Finally we twist the top wires of each side together, which like drawing up a zip, pulls both sides tight together.

Next is sweeping and dressing. Every stem has a leaf around it; loose, dry and easily pulled away by the birds for nesting; so with stiff brooms we start at the top and sweep the coatwork clean. Finally we use our 'leggetts', the aluminium paddles with a honeycomb surface, to tap back any high points leaving the coat smooth, flat and shining gold in the sun.

Finally we extricate ourselves from our customers gardens with 'The Big Tidy Up'. Daisy's attention to detail comes into it's own as she conducts a fingertip search through the flowerbeds for any evidence of thatching work. Once the scaffolding comes down, we return to dress the eaves, which may have had scaffold poles in the way, and then that really is it... after every kind of weather and the nicest lunches made for us every day ... we draw a breath, take stock, order materials, mend and patch anyone who is leaking... and then it's on to the next one.
