Wreaths were laid at the War Memorial on behalf of the Parish Council, 1st Hemyock Scout Group, 1st Hemyock Brownies and the primary school, where Mr Tim Barton gave the Exhortation.

The collection for the RBL raised £423.84. At 12.30 bell ringers took part in the national ringing event to replicate the moment in 1918 when long silenced bells rang out.

Hemyock Chefs of All Ages Cook up Recipe Book for Upkeep of St Mary's Church



History Group Report

The first talk was on the building of Exeter Cathedral given by the archaeologist employed by the Cathedral, John Allan. The construction in the early years of the second millennium AD created a structure which withstood the German bombardment in 1942 leaving sections of the walls collapsed.

This was followed by a talk in October by Todd Gray from Exeter of the varied memorials built in memory of Devon's contribution to the World Wars.

The next 2 illustrated talks on the third Thursday of the month are on Maritime Shortcuts where canals cut through land including the recent work on the Suez and Panama canals explained on 20th December and The Romans in Devon given by County Archaeologist, Bill Horner on January 17th.

- 18/01374/FULL. Erection of replacement dwelling (revised Scheme). Beamley Bungalow, Hemyock.
- 18/01608/HOUSE. Erection of single storey side extension. 5 Parklands, Hemyock.

Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

See that lady over there? No, my dear, do not stare. She used to be so well turned out Although she was a little stout, Now she is all skin and bone And her family are unknown To her, here within this place, And look at you, and your dear face. I never knew your hair was dark I thought you were blonde, such a lark, You kept your hair so neat and smart To see it now would break your heart. He's gone you know, your husband dear You don't need to linger here You're ninety two years old you know It really would be kind to go My dearest Aunt, I say to you There's nothing left on earth for you. You cannot eat, nor speak, nor smile It's been like this for guite a while I take your hand and kiss your face It's time for me to leave this place I will not be back, now I know Across the sea, I have to go. The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS. The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher Palmer who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

- Befriending visiting those who may be unable to leave their own home or have limited social contact with other people, relieving feelings of loneliness and isolation

- Mentoring trained volunteers provide a structured support programme for those who are struggling to re-integrate back into the community, perhaps after bereavement, an accident or long period of ill health
- Advocacy providing support with filling in forms and paperwork to ensure people have access to the services or financial support they need
- We also offer short-term wheelchair loans and a disabled access vehicle.

Dear Residents

Members of the County Council are getting concerned about the quality of work being done by Skanska, who as you know took over from South West Highways. A working group has been set up to look into this and a report will come back to the Corporate, Infrastructure & Regulatory Service Scrutiny Committee in due course.

Phase 2 superfast broadband is delayed on average by 18 months due to Gigaclear issues, CDS has requested that Gigaclear make a remedial action plan. It is hoped that Gigaclear will get back on track after new investors have made capital injections, alongside lessons learnt such as wayleave and planning issues to date.

School funding continues to be a big problem, although extra money has gone into school funding, it has not kept pace with demand and Devon have lost 600 teachers and staff through lack of funding. Children's service and school budgets, with 8 months of the year gone, by the end of the Council year this budget is predicted to overheat by £8.7 million and Children's Social Care is forecast to overspend by £5.1 million. The dedicated school grant is also under pressure. Devon have 697 children in care, this is a huge burden on the budgets. Nationally there is 78,670 children in care. Because of these pressures, County have imposed an embargo on replacement staff, any post that becomes vacant will not be filled, unless really necessary, will not be replaced for the next 2 to 3 months, this is predicted to save £5.1 million. Officers are working hard to reduce these short falls, we have always been able to claw back these overspends, and we will do the same again, it will nevertheless, be challenging.

Food waste – 1800 black bags across Devon were analysed, despite being collecting separately by MDDC in the blue box, 30% of rubbish in the black bags was food waste, overall, 40.8% in the black bags were found to be compostable or recyclable, If this is true across the County, it will cost County £6.7 million in disposable cost, therefore a lot more needs to be done on education/ information of this issue. Anything that goes into landfill/ incinerator, costs us money and anything recyclable we can sell and that helps to keep our council tax in check. After saying all that, County is the 4th top recycling County in the Country.

We had a presentation on trees, there is a sad story on ash trees, Devon have an estimated 20 million trees and 20% of those are ash and the prediction is that between 90 and 99% of those will die through Ash Dieback.

Budget is the next biggest issue we have to tackle. Because of the cut back in Government Funding, we have to take out £25 million from the budget. Our current revenue budget is £508 million. 8 years ago when austerity kicked in, our revenue budget was well over £800 million and we have reduced our employees by 4000. We are running a tight ship. Our reserves are standing at £85 million. We took early unpopular decisions which has paid off. We are better placed now to face the future, nevertheless, the next couple of years will be very challenging until such times as the Government has phased out grant support to Local Authorities.

Anyway we can cheer up because Xmas is on its way. Therefore I would like to wish everyone a happy Xmas and a happy and healthy new year, see you then, but if I can be of any help in the meantime, you know where I am, just give a call.

CLAYHIDON AT THE SPEED OF LIGHT

Many homes in Clayhidon now have a faster broadband service than 95 per cent of the UK. The long promised ultra-fast broadband has at last gone live as the fibre optic cables laid earlier this year week were connected to premises.

The effect has been dramatic, with people able to stream films and download huge files at the click of a computer mouse. General reactions have been highly favourable. For some it has made working at home a workable reality and cut out long car journeys, but they have had a long wait and some are still waiting. It is two years since many signed up to be connected to Gigaclear's fibre network.

PARISH REMEMBERS WAR DEAD, 100 YEARS ON





Nearly 40 people joined a service of remembrance at Clayhidon war memorial Clayhidon on 11 November, the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1. The names of local men who had died in the war were read out. Children had made a paper poppy wreath during an earlier service in the church, and Mollie Upton and Evelyn Tonkin laid this on the memorial. The national anthem was sung. A small exhibition in the church, created by the Local History Group, displayed biographies of five of the fallen heroes of the parish -Hubert and Reginald Bright, Frank Drake, John Honniball, Gilbert Hutchings, William Richards and William Trickey. You can read their stories on www.clayhidon.org.uk In a sermon the Rev John Stone outlined the Christian dilemma on wars such as this, in which both sides claimed to have God on their side. Perhaps the question we should ask, he said, quoting a famous remark, was "Are we on God's side?" The answer lay in Jesus's sermon on the mount, when he said "Blessed are the peacemakers".

WATCH OUT FOR WALLABIES

A wallaby has been sighted hopping through Clayhidon. Gareth Weekes spotted the Australian marsupial as he was driving down Battle Street at night. "I caught it in the headlights on the verge before it disappeared into the bushes beside the pumping station at the top of the lane," he said. "It was hopping in the way that only wallabies and kangaroos do."

He says that when he got home and told his wife – parish councillor Alison Weekes –she looked at him in disbelief, but when he Googled "Wallabies Devon" his story was immediately confirmed. It turns out there have been several reports of wallabies in the Devon countryside. NEW SLEEPING ARRANGMENTS FOR HALL BATS

Work on reroofing Clayhidon Parish Hall has resumed after a delay of nearly four months, caused by the discovery of bats roosting under the slates.

The hall has now obtained a European Protected Species Mitigation Licence from Natural England which has allowed the Wellington roofing firm Courtney Bowden & Son to remove and replace the remaining slates.

But they could not begin again until a large hibernation box had been fixed to a nearby tree. An ecologist from the Dunkeswell consultancy Blackdown Environmental is supervising the stripping of the slates and removing any sleeping bats to the box.

The work is being paid for by a £25,800 grant from Viridor Credits.

A GOOD OLD FASHIONED HOP



Bar None promised to get people dancing and they did. People were on their feet for most of the second set in their Fifties to Noughties gig at Clayhidon Parish Hall on October 6.

Half the audience of teens to septuagenarians were jumping and gyrating in what turned out to be a good old fashioned village hop.

The band were terrific and this proved to be a great family event. As usual the hall committee laid on an excellent supper and ran a bar and a raffle, and added a few hundred pounds to the hall's funds.

October Meeting – Learning about Leprosy

Margaret Brotheridge gave an informal presentation on "Learning about Leprosy" to her fellow members of the Clayhidon Ladies Group at their October meeting. Her theme was "a picture paints a thousand words". She described her experience of working with Lepers in Zambia over 15 years during her school holidays and had numerous photographs of the various little friends.

Leprosy is a disease that damages the skin, the nerves of the limbs and the face, and the lining of the nose. It is caused by a tiny germ. It is found in nearly every country in the world, especially in Africa, Asia and South America. The body's defence system is hit and the germs cause sores to turn septic, painful and eventually numb. Toes and fingers become damaged and deformed. It is estimated that there are 15 million suffers in the world, of which 12 million are not being treated. There is a cure for leprosy if it is caught early and antibiotics are prescribed. "Operation Sunshine", a Christian Charity founded by Kathy Hardy of Beer originally sent useful items in containers to Mozambique, where they were distributed and then converted into accommodation. The colony of "New Jerusalem" in Zambia, which Margaret became involved with in 1995, has given hope to those children left as orphans due to leprosy and Aids. The deceased were given descent burials. Shelters and schools were set up, bore holes drilled supplying fresh water and enabling crops of maize to thrive. Sewing programs gave children uniforms and dignity.

Among many duties Margaret did was to drive the children to the nearest prosthetic hospital and also to the dentist. Seeing her photos and hearing her experiences made the Members of the group appreciate how fortunate we, in the West are, and how grateful those children were for the things in life we take for granted.

November Meeting – Trolley Dollies

This month, Nicola Bendle came to talk to us about her eight years as an Air Hostess for BOAC (now British Airways). She joined aged 23, fellow Stewards and Stewardesses at Heathrow Airport for her twelve weeks training, before being issued with the Uniform. Things such as Deportment, Grooming, and Makeup by Elizabeth Arden very thickly applied. First Aid was minimal as it was found a lot of Nurses left the National Health to be a Hostess. The scariest part of the training was jumping out through the Shute.

After training she was issued with the Uniform of Navy pencil skirt, (four inches below the knee), Jacket and white blouse with Tricornered hats was issued, the badge was half a wing, like a sycamore. Later on in the 1960's the uniform changed to a dress, much shorter, with the Jacket.

There were far more Airlines running in those days. Unusually the Air Hostesses were paid the same as the Cabin Stewards. They all had to join the Union. If there was a Strike and you were mid trip, you had to stay where ever you were in the World till the Strike finished.

Working out of Victoria Station Terminal she had a flat close by, travelling free, in her Uniform from her nearby flat.

Her first flight was memorable. There was a contingent of Frummet (Orthodox) Jews. All the female and males had to be in separate sections of the plane. All food had to be Kosher. A very friendly woman invited Nicola to her home leading to a friendship of thirty years with her and her Surgeon husband.

For long haul flights you were given the currency for each country to buy your meals at the hotels. Of course the thing to do was save the money and go and find a local cheap restaurant. It wasn't unusual to save as much as £300 on a World Tour, which was a lot for the 1960s.

Nicola was lucky to be on the Inaugural flight to Russia. They were briefed by the Embassy on many do's and don'ts and to take your own bath plugs and soap. They were not to discuss politics or go out on their own and on this occasion had chitties to eat in set places. It was chilling to view from the bus journey to the Hotel the ravages of the war still prevalent and the obvious poverty. The tradition to have a party in one of the rooms ensued, supplied with left-over food and drink from the plane. One young Steward was convinced his room was bugged and had pulled back the carpet to discover a metal plate. He had tried to unscrew it, but luckily failed, as the Chief Steward told him it was holding the Chandelier up from the room below.

Another first ever flight was to Alaska. They were on duty throughout the whole long flight, with only a perch in the Galley.

They flew over Canada and the North Pole and the Pilot called them in to listen to him taking a telephone call from the men in the North Pole Radio Station. She read out a letter she had sent to her Father about how beautiful it was, and describing her fellow crew members with amusement.

Round the World tours expanded Nicola's experience of the World. Karachi was always unsafe and they were bussed to a Closed Compound. She managed to see a lot of the Middle East before the modern wars destroyed the beauty. The Gold markets were amazing in Beirut. However she was shocked to see in Bombay and Delhi the amount of maimed children, having been purposely damaged by their parents, to be a more 'appealing' beggar.

Singapore was one of her favourite places. They stayed in Raffles, felt confident to eat the piping hot street food and also take advantage of having clothes made up personally at very cheap prices. In Change Alley there were amazing fake designer clothes to be taken advantage of. When she commented on seeing how many beautiful young women there were in one Club, she was enlightened by a more experienced Steward, that they were indeed 'HeShees' – young boys dressed up.

You had to be tough and carry on. In Auckland she broke her toe. Unusually there was not the extra crew member on the journey and she was told by the Captain to get a grip and carry on. She hobbled in a sock as she couldn't get her shoe on. Luckily the Physiotherapist of the England Football Team gave her some secret, magnificent cream. Going over the International Date Line over Fiji, people couldn't understand if going East, you lost a day, and wanted to know when they got it back.

In those days whilst on the American trips she found the people impolite. She preferred San Francisco to Los Angeles. They always had to have Visas and, up to date passports. She managed to tour seeing the Grand Canyon and the original Disneyland and movie studios. In New York the thing to do was to get an empty bag from Tiffany's.

She found one royal flight very interesting with the First Class Cabin made into a Suite for Princess Margaret and Lord Snowdon. They had taken on her favourite tipples of Gin and Martini, a special box of Elizabeth Arden make up and cut glasses and Carafes.

It was very frightening that on one flight to Nairobi, when the under carriage wouldn't drop. Emergency landing procedure was put in place and everyone in the Brace Position. When they landed safely there was a united expression of relief.

Nicola had to indeed obey the rules when after eight interesting years she told her Supervisor she was getting married she was told, sadly, that was the end of her Career. She feels very fortunate and privileged to have been An Air Hostess in the 1960s and all the places and sights she visited.

Calling all contributors to the making of the Culm Valley Millennium Screen, now housed in Coldharbour Mill in Uffculme.



Our Thatching Life

Our Thatching Life, featuring Ferrari the Thatcher and Daisy his apprentice with a yearning for a new hound.

We are off to a late start with our wheat reed re-thatch as we had a few ridges and repairs to finish before winter really sets in, but we are settling into it now. I'm content as I like working with combed wheat reed the most. Your hands are constantly working it, teasing each stem to sit well by it's neighbour, then binding each handful on the roof with a few stems of the last, pulling them across and fixing with twisted hazel spars.

To begin with though, we must tie in the eaves wads. As with slate or tile, the eaves must be made to withstand all the weather from all the roof, making sure there is no water ingress to the timbers beneath and shielding the upper parts of the walls. Each bundle of wheat reed is divided into 5 or so 'handfuls', roughly 5" in diameter when held tightly between both hands. Each handful is worked to separate the stems, making them lie evenly throughout and to knock the stems all down to the end, then tied with a few spare stems just beneath the ears of wheat. Each individual handful is then tied tightly onto the timbers of the roof, one beside the other, ensuring that the eave stays in place for the life of the thatch. By tying on each one, we also ensure that if a rodent does chew through a string it will only mean that one small piece of the eave is dislodged, rather than a larger section.

These days we tie on with baler twine, currently available in bright pink. Before the 1950's a hemp string fortified with tar was used, and we still often find pieces of it amongst the old base layers of thatch that we thatch over. Earlier ties would have been made out of whatever was to hand, often soaked willow withies, that would tighten as they dried. As I look over the scaffold I see that Daisy has made a new alliance with 'Sticky', the client's dog. Looking like a smaller blacker version of Stitch, and lying very comfortably in the back of my van, (on my coat!), I sense that the Year of the Dog is not quite done, and spring may yet bring the chaos of a new puppy. In the meantime, let me wish you peaceful season's greetings.

Oh, and one more thing, non-believers of Churchinford Village Shop.....I **can** make my own puff pastry, topping off a very fine pie... it's all in the folding!
