#### It's Time To Vote!

Whilst our politicians at Westminster differ about what they want to vote for and why, here in the Hemyock Parochial Church Council office we are more concerned with when we are going to vote for next year's Council.

One of the "joys" of the early Christian church taking over other peoples' festivals is that Easter Sunday can be on about 32 different dates. This year it is relatively late, on April 21st. Why does this matter for us? Well we are required to have our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) by April 30th each year. Traditionally we have held it on the Tuesday after "Low Sunday" (That's the Sunday after Easter) So April 30th then? Well that doesn't give any time for adjournments, problems etc.

So the Church Council has decided to have the meeting on Tuesday March 19th, when we will have the APCM (getting reports and electing Council etc) and the Annual Vestry meeting (That elects the Church wardens). Anybody over 16 living in the Political parish or on the Church electoral roll can vote in the Vestry meeting. To vote in the APCM you have to be on the Church Electoral roll. (slight problem number 2).

The Church of England scraps its Electoral Roll every 6 years and produces a new one. This is done in the 2 months before the APCM And 2019 is one of those "Scrap it" years, so we need a new roll. All people on the current list will be notified and sent a new application form. There will be details displayed on the notice boards at both Culm Davy and Hemyock churches. Anyone wanting details or an application form can contact our Electoral Roll officer, Diana Cooper.

#### 1633 and All That

In the fourth decade of the 17th century Western Europe was being swept by an attack of bubonic plague. Thousands were dying. All sorts of things were being done to try and halt its spread, usually unsuccessfully.

#### Local Shooter Takes Aim at World Championship

Hemyock resident Matthew Charlton is currently in New Zealand with the Great Britain Rifle Team, aiming to win the World Long Range Rifle Championships. The team is currently taking part in the New Zealand Championships; the World Championships start on 4th February with individual matches and culminate on 9th-10th February with the Palma Match for national teams.



Matt started shooting at school aged 13 and is now on his 11th overseas tour with the GB team, with whom he won the World Championships in Canada in 2007 and Australia in 2011. He met his wife Ellie (who shoots for England) at Bisley, and they were married at St. Mary's Church, Hemyock, in 2016, leading to the birth of daughter Ursula just over a year ago.



Competitions on tour take place at distances ranging from 300 to 1000 yards, with the World Championship matches (including the Palma Match, which first took place in 1876) all occurring at 800, 900 and 1000 yards. The Trentham range, near Wellington in New Zealand, is well known as one of the trickiest in the world because of its very variable winds. They will be a huge test for Matt, whose team role is principally to read the wind so that team-mates' shots hit the bullseye rather than being blown off-target!

Hemyock Parish Council held its usual monthly meeting in December and a planning meeting in January. A brief summary of the business conducted at those meetings is as follows:-

#### Planning

Applications received for:-

• 18/01955/CLU. Certificate of lawfulness for the existing use of land for the siting of a residential caravan with adjoining garden and parking space for a period in excess of 10 years. Crumpy Down, Hemvock.

• 18/01951/HOUSE. Erection of a single storey rear extension and front porch. 12 Hollingarth Way, Hemyock.

• 18/01729/FULL. Erection of a garden office and change of use of land for the erection of a 2-bay domestic carport. Moorhayes, Hemyock.

#### Finance

Income - included cemetery payments, interest and grant from MDDC towards noticeboard. Expenditure - included room hire, clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, improvements to Blackdown Healthy Living & Activities Centre, cemetery water bill, competition winners, toilet cleaning, and bank charges.

The council has set the precept for 2019/2020 at £80,700, increasing the cost for a Band D property from £94.95 to 97.31 per annum.

They gave a commendation to Mr D Allen, Eastcote, and thanked all participants for their efforts in making the village look so festive. Sadly for many, recent weeks have seen the loss of a loved one. We send condolences and love to the family and friends of **Betty Hill**, **John Heath** (past Headteacher of Uffculme Primary School and a member of our Bowling Club) **Tony Soley** as well as **Gordon and Betty Brown** who lived at Hollingarth Way and were also members of Hemyock Bowling Club. We also remember Claire Sibley and family on the death of her mother.

The following has been received from Martin son of Betty Hill:

Betty Margaret Redstone was born on 17th September 1924 and lived at 21 Churchfields in Wellington. She attended High Street Infants School and afterwards Coram's Lane School.

Mum had two brothers – Eric who was three years older, and Crofton 3 years younger. Crofton and Mum went to South St Baptist Sunday school – they were given a penny for the collection but only put in a halfpenny and spent the other half on chewing gum.

As a child, she used to walk with friends up to the Wellington Monument for a picnic and play all day, then walk back home quite safely. As a young girl, Mum was a member of Doc Balls gymnastic team in Tonedale and was always very keen on keeping fit from then onwards – when in her 80s she would go to 'keep fit' and also go swimming with Mary Lowman once a week, when 30 lengths of the swimming pool was average for Mum. She worked at International Stores in Wellington where she went out on her bicycle taking orders around Ashbrittle, Hockworthy, Hemyock and beyond, and then later on driving the van delivering the groceries. She met my Dad, Richard [Dick] Batchelor, on one of these occasions – he 'wolf whistled' at her and she told him "I'm no dog"!

He won in the end and they got married on 3rd September 1949, and bought a little farm at Higher Willand, Churchstanton on mortgage. I was born the following year in October 1950. She worked hard on the farm and was a good mother to me – always cheerful, and nothing was ever too much trouble.

Dad died in 1980 and Mum then met Bert Hill on a coach trip with Redwoods. The week after, there were runner beans delivered and they became firm friends. They eventually married and had a great life together taking holidays, bowling and enjoying the company of her grandchildren and later her great grandchildren. One of her greatest joys was visiting her grandson Richard's farm just out of Torrington in North Devon. There only a few months ago when Alec, who is just three years old, wanted to be cuddled by her and when she picked up her sandwich to take a bite he would pull her arm back around himself.

Money cannot buy that wonderful end to a great life. Mum died peacefully with a pure faith.

This time of year always brings its share of illness and nasty viruses so to all who are unwell we send good wishes for a speedy recovery. We also continue to remember all who have a long term illness and past villagers now in care homes sending all our good wishes.

#### The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS. The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher Palmer who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

#### Running in the Park

After the celebrations of the Christmas and the New Year period many of us are not quite in the best of condition. The ideas to rectify this are many and various, and often costly. One suggestion to help us get into a slightly fitter condition, and which has received much publicity in the media of late, including on "Woman's Hour", is that of taking part in a "Parkrun".

So what is this and what is its history? It is a opportunity to cover 5km either by running, jogging or walking often in a public park or open space. It starts, usually, at 9am on a Saturday. You can be timed by use of a barcode, or just cover the ground in the way you choose. Some people run with a dog, others with a small pushchair. There are now over 500 places where you can "parkrun" in Britain and a growing number of places in an increasing number of countries overseas. This phenomena started in 2003 in Bushy, Hertfordshire when a group of friends started having weekly runs. The emphasis was on getting some form of exercise in the fresh air. As numbers increased volunteers started helping organise the weekly events. These days volunteers all over the country ensure the safety of participants, keep records and generally ensure an enjoyable social event. They are backed by a number of firms who have an interest in health matters. You might have 30 people taking part, several hundred, even a thousand. It has even spawned a growing "Parkrun Tourism" industry.

Locally the nearest event is at Longrun Meadow, behind Castle School in Taunton. There are others at Exmouth, Killerton and Montacute. At most venues there are Junior Parkruns taking place over 2km at a slightly different time. At Longrun you might find some of the younger runners completing the course in 17 or so minutes or a lady in her 80s walking around in 75 minutes. Time does not matter, God's fresh air is there to be enjoyed. And one other fact – participation is free.

#### From Captain Krankypants to Major Tom!

On Wednesday 12 December, The Catherine Wheel in Hemyock hosted the first date of the national tour of Trace Dann, aka Captain Krankypants, an Australian ex-military serviceman talking about how he is dealing with PTSD and Depressive disorder.

The presentation began with a brief introduction to his life, 19 years of military service with tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan going on to 10 years in the entertainment industry performing with a David Bowie tribute band and touring and promoting top Australian performers.

Suffering with PTSD over the last 10 years, he gained the moniker Captain Krankypants from his children and the eventual deterioration of his condition led to an event that prompted him to seek expert medical help.

He went on to explain how a trip to the UK to rediscover his love of live music shows led to the Eureka moment of how to use this love of live entertainment to share his story with fellow sufferers and their families, to give a better understanding of the conditions, assist with recovery and, hopefully, reduce the number of depression-related suicides.

In an entertaining and humorous way, he told the tale of his journey from a life of inner turmoil, stress, unhappiness, anger and distrust to a new life of self-awareness, acceptance, trust and, hopefully, happiness.

After a very positive show for a very serious condition, the evening came to an end with a Q&A session which prompted a multitude of questions from audience members related to their own situations.

#### **Dear Residents**

Another year gone, another to look forward to with challenging times ahead. Our main concern now is preparing next year's Authority Budget, starting this April. We have already had budget briefings so I can outline the main points as of today. You will note that we are experiencing huge fluctuations in various budget headings. This always appears to be normal, part way through a year, but we have always produced a balanced budget by the end of the year, we will do the same again this year. For next year, we have already produced a draft balance budget.

If you take all the plusses and minuses in to account, the position at month 6 was £4.8m overspend, at month 8 it has reduced to £3.3m Still much to do, this still assumes the carry forward of £2.4m in relation to the dedicated schools grant. The improved position is thanks to savings being made across the council and some additional funding to support the pressures on the high needs budget. Adult care and health services are looking to be £385k underspent, and the operations are forecasting an increased underspend of £752k. Adult commissioning is currently on an overspend of £367k as a result of increases in mental health who have 45 people more than the number in the budget. DCC will be receiving an extra £3.6m both this year and next year specifically to alleviate winter pressures. Children's services are now forecasting an overspend of £11.1m it is a little disappointing to report that this an increase but there was one unexpected exceptionally high cost case. The Atkinson has seen a turnaround in that the overspend has reduced by 10% and is set to drop further. In other budgets there is better news, Highways is now looking at an underspend of £2.4m and the mangers are saying that all the planned maintenance will be delivered during the year and safety defects are manageable. We also have plenty of salt in store.

Waste management is looking at an underspend of £400k despite seeing higher domestic, food and green waste tonnages than budgeted, but these are offset by reduced tonnages with in-vessel composting, lower volumes are going to the energy plant in Plymouth reflecting improved recycling in some areas. Communities, PH, Environment and Prosperity have increased their underspend to £762k.

Our non-service items are now forecasting an underspend against budget of £2.8m this has been found from achieving higher interest rates and capitalising some revenue schemes. We have joined the many other local authorities grappling with high demand levels for children's services. Residential placements continue to be difficult to contain and remains a real cause for concern. We have reflected the pressures in the next budget proposals but more work will be needed to contain costs. Over the last few years, we have increased our reserve to £85m, while our neighbours, Somerset County Council have none. We sit about half way up the table of reserves of County Councils in England. 2011 we employed 6.608 full time employees, today we employ just 3,844. This indicates what we have had to do to maintain frontline services because of Central Government cuts in funding settlements. Anyway, we are still here, please don`t hesitate to contact me if you think I can help. It is difficult to do all we want at once, but I will keep doing my best.

#### News from Clayhidon



#### Hall Roof Finished After Bats Stopped Play

After months of delay caused by the discovery of nesting bats Clayhidon Parish Hall's new roof has been completed.

It's the first part of the hall committee's ambitious plans to upgrade the 125 year old former

schoolroom, and they celebrated by inviting donors and helpers to a 'thank you' reception.

Generous support to the tune of  $\pounds$ 25,800 came from Viridor Credits, who covered the basic cost of replacing most of the original Welsh slates with new Spanish ones.

There was also financial backing from Richard Drew, using funds raised through Drewfest, and from Alex Hill, who paid for most of the extra costs incurred by the discovery of bats.

The contractors, Courtney Bowden & Son of Wellington, had to stop work for four months when they found bats roosting in the roof. The committee had to hire wildlife consultants Blackdown Environmental to monitor the bats, obtain a licence and supervise the work when it resumed.

Work on the next stage – building an extension behind the stage to house new toilets, an archive room for the Local History Group and an artists' changing room or small meetings room – is due to start in July. Meanwhile fundraising to pay for the work is about to resume in earnest.



#### Edinburgh Fringe Stars Are 'Fantastic'

Bowjangles, the all-singing, all-dancing comedy string quartet, who won the 2018 Edinburgh 'Spirit of the Fringe' award, perform in Clayhidon Parish Hall on Sunday February 17, courtesy of the Villages in Action rural touring scheme.

Their show is called Excalibow and is described as a ludicrous journey through myths, folklore, and legends to find a magical violin bow. Nothing remotely like it has ever been put on in the hall.

Edinburgh reviewer Frodo Allen said it was "a completely original format for a show that never drags... The cast have an abundance of charisma and chemistry with each other that makes an hour in their company a delight. Each gets a chance to shine and to be funny. As collaborative writers, they clearly understand the importance of character, pacing, and a witty aside... Bollhayes cider maker Alex Hill is winning hyperbolic reviews from food critics for his revival of cider fermented in bottles, champagnestyle.

Oz Clarke, speaking on the BBC's Food Programme, called it "a very fine cider".

Martin Hesp wrote in the Western Morning News that it was like sipping a Grande Marque champagne worth £400 a bottle. When Alex offered him a glass in one hand and a slice of Iberico ham in the other, he said "it was the kind of fabulous combination that I could imagine a multi-millionaire paying ludicrous amounts of money for in a top Michelin restaurant".

Alex stopped making bottle fermented cider some years ago because of pressure of other work, but he has been building up stocks again and launched a smart new website, where it's on sale at £12 a bottle. A marketing campaign by Selena Mitford on Facebook and other platforms, is helping to develop Bollhayes as an excellent, interesting, lower alcohol alternative to sparkling wines. So interesting, it seems, that this nectar is almost animal: "In a cellar deep in the Blackdown Hills something lies, almost breathing", says the sales line.

Walter and scorer Anne Langford, they were clearly the best of nine teams, beating their nearest rivals, The Deadbeats, by 145 points to 128. The event raised around £300 for hall funds.

#### **Eco House Plan Turned Down**

Mid Devon councillors have turned down plans for an innovative and exceptional eco house in Clayhidon, by just one vote. No local objections were made to Susan Annett's and Richard Brown's new house at Carlingwark and it was backed by the parish council, the community and the AONB.

Despite that, and after support speeches from the parish council chairman, Richard Kallaway, and local district councillor, Frank Rosamund, the local county councillor, Ray Radford, voted against the scheme.

He said that if approved the new four bedroom house could lead to many more in the Blackdown Hills.

The plans were submitted to Mid Devon under a special exception category for "Grand Design" type homes. It is the first such application made in the district. Specially designed to fit into the landscape, it would have been the first house in the country built with a beech structure. The scheme includes a new orchard and lake. One parish councillor, Graham Langford, had voted against the plan, pointing out that the Design Review Panel had rejected it and they were the architectural experts independently testifying to the Local Planning Authority.

Planning officer Alison Fish recommended refusal because she thought the plans were not innovative enough.

Former parish councillor Alex Hill, of Bollhayes, protested in a letter to Councillor Radford: "The whole point of 'paragraph 55' provision is to encourage innovative and bold designs in open countryside. To object on the grounds that approval of the application might risk a profusion of similar developments is completely missing the point. On those grounds there would never be any house built in Mid Devon under the conditions of this provision." Councillor Radford replied that his main concern was bare walls and that if these could be designed out he would support the project.

#### Harmony And Humour Delight Christmas Crowd

Nobody could remember the last time a male voice choir sang in Clayhidon Parish Hall, which might mean it never happened, but noone is ever going to forget the wonderful Wyndham Singers' concert on December 14.

Their jolly director, Charles West, introduced them as a bunch of old farts, which seemed to delight them as much as it did the Christmas concert audience. We can be sure we will never hear old farts more glorious than these 16 harmonious gentlemen from Kentisbeare.

The audience loved the blend of voices, from beautiful sonorous basses right through the range to an astonishingly high tenor section. They loved the acoustic of the old hall, which perplexes some visiting bands, but which we now realise is perfect for choirs and brass bands. They loved that these were amateurs performing to professional standards.

No-one who knows about the school's music department would have been surprised by the high standard of their playing, and the hall committee is grateful to Andrew Trewhella, the school's head of music, who lives in Clayhidon, for making this happen at the busiest time of the school's musical year.

The hall team served hot mince pies and mulled wine, and the event raised cash for hall improvements and the Exeter Leukaemia Fund.

#### **Reducing Fire Risk in Thatched Buildings**



With the New Year comes some detailed new research into the causes, risks and prevention of fires in thatched buildings. The research was conducted by Dr James LD Glockling of the Fire Protection Association and commissioned by Historic England (Building Conservation and Research Team) and NFU Mutual Insurance and was completed in 2018.

Wood burning and multi fuel stoves were found to present a greater risk of fire than open fires or other forms of heating, but research showed a number of factors contributed to this finding. As with most things...it's never simple, but the summary leaflet gives a clear guidance for homeowners to help them reduce the risk of fire. The summary leaflet and also the full documents have been widely circulated to thatchers and building conservation experts, and can also be found on our website ferrarithethatcher.co.uk.

## THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months.

#### What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation work, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive.

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for.
