An Unknown God?

There is a famous story in the Bible about St. Paul waiting in Athens waiting for two of his friends to arrive. Just like tourists today, finding he had time on his hands, he began to look around their temples. In one of them he found an altar dedicated "To an unknown God." So he began to proclaim to everyone that this was the God he had come to tell them about. This was the God who had made the world and everything in it. The God who had given life and breath to human beings, but did not live in temples and was not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being." This was a quotation from one of the Greek poets. Paul was having to use poetic language to try to describe God. There is no human language which is adequate for that task, because God is not a physical God he is a spiritual God. St. John, in his gospel says, "God is spirit and must be worshipped in spirit and truth."

On June 9th we shall be celebrating Pentecost, or Whit Sunday. It is one of the most important celebrations of the Christian year. It is the day when we celebrate the sending of the Holy Spirit to the disciples. The Bible says it happened with a sound like a violent wind and that tongues of flame appeared and rested on each disciple. They were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages so that Jews from other countries who were gathered in Jerusalem for Pentecost could hear them talking about God in their own languages. We cannot use human language to provide an accurate description of the Holy Spirit any more that we can to provide an accurate description of what God is like, but Christians believe that the Holy Spirit is the power which God uses to work in the world today.

Just like God, the Holy Spirit is not far from each one of us. When Jesus was baptised the Bible tells us that the Holy Spirit descended upon him in the form of a dove. When Babies are baptised in church today we pray for God to, "Send your Holy Spirit upon them to bring them to new birth in the household of faith...". So in the form of the Holy Spirit, God lives in every baptised Christian.

As the opening words of the marriage service have it, "Those who live in love live in God, and God lives in them."

Christians may not be able to describe the totality of what God is, but he is not an unknown God. As St. Paul put it, "Now we see as in a mirror dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." We know him now on earth, but eventually we shall know him much better, in heaven.

Annual Church and Vestry Meeting

he annual church and Vestry meeting of St Mary's with Culm Davy Chapel, Hemyock has taken place under the chairmanship of David Bawler as the benefice is in a vacancy.

Re elected as Churchwardens were Jenny Doble and David Bawler for St Marys and Mark Fitzgerald for the chapel. Reports on the workings of the Parochial Church Council and from the various groups showed an active life within the two congregations. Numbers on the electoral roll had increased and the financial reports showed a healthy balance.

Regular lunches and donations from coffee served after services raised money for mission support in Uganda and Bradford along with maintenance and running of the parish church. Other financial support has been given to Children's Society and Mission to Seafarers. The highly successful charity and coffee shop continues to annually present a percentage of its takings to local charities whilst the Friends of St Mary's have held a number of successful events with funds supporting the upkeep of and special church projects.

The church acts as a collecting point for clothes for Syrian refugees and supports the work of Devon charity Christian Response to Eastern Europe with humanitarian aid and Christmas shoeboxes for all ages going to Moldova. Locally it supports the Taunton/ Wellington food bank, Musgrove Neo Natal unit whilst books are bought for prisons and goods provided for the homeless further afield. At the primary school local churches provide Open The Book with Seekers providing activities for young people. No major work has been needed at the chapel but the church has seen the completion of toilets, boiler house and reorganisation of the church north aisle to provide a community area. At the Church Room a shed has been installed and the garden is to be tidied to allow a patio area.

The bell ringers, choir and special services team along with various other groups have all added to a year of change. Special thanks we're expressed to the retired Clergy and Wardens who along with the lay team had ensured all services in Hemyock as well as Clayhidon and Culmstock - the Upper Culm Mission Community - have been covered following the retirement of Rev David Burton as they await a new appointment.

Sea Shanty Evening

Imost 100 people attended St Mary's church, Hemyock to enjoy a delightful free evening of sea shanty songs The Barnacle Buoys, a group of five singers from North Somerset, kept the audience entertained for an hour of almost continuous singing before a short break when light refreshments were available after which they performed for a further 30 minutes.



Their opening number Drop of Nelsons Blood followed by Fire Down Below quickly gave the audience a taste of what was to follow drawing warm applause. Sea shanty songs were mainly about drink and women it was explained. There were no rude words!

Lifeboat Girl, Clevedon Bay and The Bristol Ship, The Matthew were three songs amongst those enjoyed in the first half of the concert and later in the evening New York Girl, Cruising Down The Coast of Barbary and Mermaid were included in the Buoys programme. A number of songs had West Country references and with an occasional word change even Hemyock received a mention!

Audience participation took place during some numbers including the final song What Shall We Do With A Drunken Sailor? which brought a hugely enjoyable evening to a close.

Since the groups formation they have supported charities Children Hospice South West and the RNLI raising over £10,000 in total. The evening was arranged by the Friends of St Mary's and after expenses had been paid £240 was made towards to upkeep and maintenance of the church and special projects.

Palm Sunday

The congregation of St Mary's church Hemyock were joined by those from St Andrews Clayhidon, All Saints Culmstock, Culm Davy Chapel and members of Hemyock Baptist for the Palm Sunday service. Assembling at the Parsh Hall the group walked through the village led by the church choir and a pony ridden by Wilfred appropriately dressed and a grandson of a Clayhidon member.

The service attended by almost 90 began simultaneously at the hall and the church with a reading and blessing of palm crosses by Rev John Stone and Rev Chris Hudson. Singing along the route was led by Ron White on accordion.

During the service of Holy Communion a dramatised reading from St Luke's Gospel of Christs Passion involving members from the different churches was given.

The National 12 Bell Striking Competition

ajor competitions in a large number of physical activities tend to take place in a fairly limited number of locations. London, Birmingham, Manchester and Glasgow are all used to being the stage for a whole variety of national and international finals. One activity where this is slightly different is in Bellringing.

The National 12 Bell Striking competition can be in any of the country's towers with 12, or more, bells, and this year it comes to Exeter. Although world wide there are now nearly 6000 towers with bells rung in the "full circle" English style, there are just 132 where 12 bell ringing is the norm. It

is not just the Cathedrals that claim this honour. Fairly locally we have Withycombe Rayleigh, Crediton and South Petherton parish churches all in that "12 club", along with Buckfast Abbey and St Mary Magdelene, Taunton.

So 12 bell ringing is a specialist skill within ringing. The ringers will be aiming to ring a test piece with accuracy and musicality. Given that there are over 4,000 million ways of ordering numbers 1 to 12, and the bells will all be striking within about 4 to 5 seconds for each change, it is a test of concentration and memory. Add in the fact that

S t Mary's recently received a certificate from the Trussel Trust, who run Food Banks around the country. This was to acknowledge the fact that our donations to the local food bank in Wellington had topped the 1000kg mark. So a sincere "thankyou" to everyone who has supported this initiative.

The Trust recently reported that over the past 5 years the number of food parcels given out has risen by a staggering 73%. Last year they gave out 1.6 million parcels. Nearly 600,000 went to children.

They state that one of the main problems for many people is that a change onto Universal Credit benefits results in at least a 5 week wait for a full payment. A campaign for a change, "5weekstoolong" is currently underway."





the Cathedral's tenor bell (which is called Grandison after the Bishop of that name) weighs in at 72 cwt and is the second heaviest bell rung "full circle" and you can see that the task is also a real test of physical skill for the ringers of the heavier bells.

> For comparison the Hemyock tenor weighs just under 18cwt. Bells are still weighed in the way they have been since about 1400 and if you are not used to these old Imperial measures, well, call it about 907kilo. So for Grandison, as they say in the car ads, you can do the maths.

The competition takes place on Saturday June 22. On the day there will also be lots of additional activities going on on the Cathedral Green. So a "once in a generation" chance to hear the country's best ringers in a local setting. Don't miss it!

All the churches in the Mission Community have rings of bells, Culmstock 8 bells, Clayhidon and Hemyock 6. If you want to know more about this ancient art which calls people to worship then contact the appropriate Tower Captains.



Spring Concert




Mozart's Requiem was the work selected and performed by the 29 strong member choir, conducted by Musical Director Matthew Bale and accompanied flawlessly on organ by Nigel Atkinson. The strong opening chorus Requiem produced a lovely sound which the Singers sustained throughout the concert. The bass line was strong but not overpowering, the soprano solo by Jenny Doble was superb and the ending a triumph.

The diction of all four being extremely clear and voices well balanced. The Backdown Hills Wednesday Club

Te had our AGM on April 10th which was very well supported by our members. We had a recap of our meetings over the past year and very varied, fun and *interesting they were. The Treasurer told us that our finances* were in good shape, not least because of a grant from the Somerset *Community Fund to help with the Christmas Lunch and because* we had a lot of speakers who charged us nothing or very little. (It won't always be like that - some speakers are charging quite a lot these days). "Taunton Foodbank opened in

Churchstanton Church is holding a Flower Festival in June and we put it to the members to see if we as a Club wanted to participate. The members said they did and also voted

to pay for the flowers. The helpers who give up their time to run the meetings and make such delicious food for tea were thanked by the Chairman. Then we got onto the fun part of the afternoon and played Bingo. Our thanks to Neil Arnold for calling and Kathy for helping and to Dorothy for buying all the prizes.

On April 24th we welcomed Clare Lucker from the Wellington Foodbank who gave us a comprehensive talk about the 2000 food banks in the UK co-ordinated by the Trussell Trust, a nationwide charity based in Salisbury, run on Christian principles, with the objective of reducing poverty and hunger. Clare gave us various reasons why people need the Foodbank: Universal Credit is not getting to people fast enough, they have to wait up to 6 weeks for any money. Benefit delay also happens because sanctions are applied if people miss their benefit appointments; some people are on benefits or on a low income and are just not managing and some people have too much debt. Homelessness or sickness or domestic abuse contributed to short-term money problems. The government has put £1.7million into improving the system and Clare said that perhaps some issues are being resolved.

Some Foodbanks are large enough to provide holistic support: budget management advice, basic cookery instruction, job skills,

how to apply for grants. There are 1.3 million people living below the poverty line in this country and Foodbanks can be said to prevent crime, housing loss, family breakdown and health problems.

It works by having donations of non-perishable goods from various outlets such as churches, offices and supermarkets which can be stored at the Foodbank and some perishable goods, in Taunton from M&S and in Wellington from Waitrose, which come on the days

> the Foodbank is open. Professionals such as nurses, social workers, the Job Centre, schools, and churches hold and give out food vouchers and recipients must have a food voucher in order to receive a food parcel at the Foodbank. Volunteers are told what

size of box to give depending on whether it is for a single person or a family and what non-perishables to take off shelves to make up the box and then clients are offered fruit and vegetables of their choice. Clients are allowed 6 vouchers in 6 months but Clare said that no-one is ever turned away. Taunton opened in 2012 and has helped over 3000 people including 1300 children since then. An amazing talk giving us a real insight into the work of the Foodbanks and some frustration and dismay that they should be necessary in this affluent country. Thank you, Clare.

Hemyock History Group Report

e can report another successful season of history talks in Hemyock which have attracted a regular group of interested locals. From Devon based archaeologists such as John Allan from Exeter Cathedral, Bill Horner, our Devon CC archaeologist and Derek Gore from Exeter University we have had a full range of subjects to interest our members. The initial intention was to have more of a literary and debating Society with members participating on subjects that interest them. However the format of booking learned figures to talk about the subjects that they have studied has been more acceptable to our members.

We also have our database of historical images and documents available to search through and discuss. Perhaps we should have an evening where members can access the material, print out copies for them to study, research the background and then return to share the information with the group. You never know this may highlight new material that has become available in the public domain which would be of interest to a wider audience.

Universities are always on the lookout for mature students to research various subjects and provide dissertations and reports in the course of obtaining MA's or even PhD's.

With distance learning you do not have to travel far from Hemyock to participate on these courses although they do prefer the successful students to appear at the award ceremonies in various gowns during the summer celebrations.

Hemyock has also become a suitable place for groups from Devon and Somerset to come on guided tours including the Castle, the Pump, St Marys, the Baptist Church and the High Street Congregational. Even with the expansion of new houses the old part hasn't changed that much over the last 750 years. Aren't we all lucky to have this on our doorstep.

Melita Sally Ann Woodman (known to everyone as "Sally") was born in Ealing, London on the 21st August 1932 to Miriam & Leonard Cook. She had an older sister "Jean".

During the war Sally & Jean were evacuated to Wellington to live with their Auntie Mabel. She attended Primary School in Wellington and in 1945 attended Courtfield School for Girls, Wellington. On leaving school she went to work for Eggerton Burnetts, South Street, Wellington as a Tailoress.

In the early 1950's there was a huge fire at the premises and they relocated at Fox Brothers Ltd. Around this time Sally met Anthony who worked for Fox Brothers Ltd together with other members of the Woodman family. They both enjoyed dancing and travelled all around the area on Anthony's motorbike. In 1957 they got married and moved into Shan-gri-la, Westown which Anthony helped to build, they lived there for the majority of their married life. Sally had a great love for cats and had various cats over the years. She also shared Anthony's passion for gardening and they spent hours tending their garden, which always looked immaculate. Sally's artistic flare made the garden look spectacular with a display of flowers and plants in vibrant colours all year round.

In 2002 they moved to Sunny Nook Hemyock. Sadly in 2011 Anthony passed away and Sally was lost as they always did everything together. The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president

of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

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They went everywhere together, i.e. bus trips, outings, coffee mornings shopping etc. On one occasion they went to a Rod Stewart concert in Taunton, she thoroughly enjoyed this. She led a very busy life and enjoyed herself. She also enjoyed spending time with the family especially her great-great-nephews. She will be sadly missed by all her family and friends.

Good wishes are sent to the many people who are unwell at present. We remember in particular **Brian Clist** and **Juliet Andrews** who are both extremely poorly as I write.







LEAP News

he next time that you stroll around Longmead, take a look up into the trees alongside the stream and on the mature trees around the edges of the area. You will be sure to spot the addition of some 'Des Res' for the local bird and bat populations.

Longmead Environmental Action Project enthusiasts were in action during April when volunteers met to site the bird and bat boxes; making sure that the bird boxes (for blue tits, great tits and robin-sized birds) were facing where possible between north and east and the bat boxes faced south to west. Given that the desired height for



the bat boxes was at least 3 metres from the ground, this required a head for heights and not too wobbly knees.

We know that wildlife can be extremely fussy about where they want to nest or roost, but we are hopeful that at least some will eventually be occupied in the not too distant future. Apparently, it is good practise to site more than one bat box on a tree, as different bat species prefer slightly different aspects. Pipistrelles, Noctules and Daubenton's bats have been seen in the area, so hopefully we may have some residents in time. Coming up will be the Scarecrow competition, to take place in early September, so hang on to your hats and any other old clothes to make your scarecrow look dapper. Prizes to be won-think Penny for the Guy, but with a more rural attitude. Look out for more information on the village notice boards and in the next issue of The Pump.



Clayhidon Friends, May 2019

e were very pleased to welcome Tony Cooper as our Speaker. He entertained us regaling his life in the Metropolitan Police from the 1960's when he joined as a Cadet. He comes from Somerset and had originally applied and been rejected from that County's Force for being a half inch under the required height.

Tony started his 13 week training course at Hendon with accommodation in the Section House. From there he was thrown in the deep end to the Station at Commercial Street, in the East End of London. This was the time of the Krays and their successful 'Insurance Company'. Along with the Krays contemporaries there were petty thieves, drunks and vagrants. At one shout he was called to a murder at the Blind Beggar public house, but all 72 of the people drinking in the Pub insisted they were in the toilet.

Whilst he was attending Court to be a Witness in the trial of Ginger Marks, for GBH with a Machete, he was interested to see that The Profumo Case was being held in a court adjacent. This MP was brought down for sleeping with Christine Keeler, who was also sleeping with a Russian Spy. At the height of the Cold War, this was treated very seriously.

In those days the Police acted as Stewards for the Boxing. He was honored to have been on duty during the fight between Cassius Clay and Henry Cooper – and having a ring-side view!

Not long after his marriage he was transferred from Forest Gate to Staines in Twickenham where he became what was nicknamed a "Noddy Driver". They didn't have car radios in those days and when an incident occurred they had to find the Blue Box to phone it in. One incident he had to attend a Break-in. The window was smashed, so they entered and searched the place and found the perpetrator hiding in a

cupboard. The man, Gary Arthur Cook and his accomplice Raymond Paul the driver were well known to Tony and they 'met'

over several years. So much so that Raymond Paul complained of Tony harassing him. Nevertheless at the time of his Mother's funeral Raymond contacted Tony and asked for him to be the Police presence at the Funeral Procession. Tony stood saluting, as seventy two untaxed cars processed by him.

At Christmas it was guaranteed that there would be call outs for Matrimonial Disagreements. They would arrive at the house to find a drunk husband and a beaten up wife. The next day the wife would always drop the charges. Tony would attend the same family the next Christmas for the same GBH. Delivering bad news was also a side of the job that was very hard. You never knew how people would take hearing of the death of a loved one. One incident though beggared belief when Tony had to go round and deliver news to a well-known petty criminal. The door was answered aggressively by the man in white singlet. He swore and asked what he was there for. When told that his son had died the answer from the man was "What do you expect me do about it then". By then he had been joined by his equally aggressive wife and answered the question of would you come down and identify the body, she said that they always did their shopping on a Friday and couldn't come till the next day. Which they did.

In 1973 he was the Policeman called to the Ashford Hospital after the Pilot of a Trident Jet had had a heart attack. Luckily the Co-Pilot was able to take over the controls. The Press were besieging the hospital and Tony had to fend them off. From then on a Policeman is always on duty at a Hospital.

Tony had become a reluctant Social Secretary by then but enjoyed arranging visits out. One such visit was to the Courage Brewery in Reading. The Reverend Sam Kemble the Vicar of Staines was invited and announced "And he came upon an Inn and took Courage". Sam became a well-known character and was often bumping into Tony at Events such as the Rugby. He was renowned for keeping one cigarette in a packet, the rest in his pockets, so he couldn't share.

In 1977 Tony became Community Policeman for Stanwell, encompassing Heathrow Airport. This was something Tony believed in and he thoroughly enjoyed giving Talks at schools and making friends with people whilst on the Beat. In those days every reported crime got a visit from the Police and was followed up. One day he got a call from a Headmaster to say a boy was stealing money from his Mum's purse. He was the son of a well know thief. He gave the boys a talking to and said he would remember him. Every time he was out on the Beat and saw this boy he would make a point of talking to him. He hoped by keeping up a rapport and the boy knowing how Tony knew him it would deter the boy from following his Dad into a life of crime. He also was Chairman of the local Youth Club for 19 years and loved helping to mould youngsters into holding good values.

As part of his further training in his career he had become a Marksman. One time he had to help protect the Queen Mother at Kempton Races. She was there to enjoy the races but also to present the Winning Cup to the Owners. Her horse won. She presented it to the Trainer instead. On returning through the Tunnel one young spark pointed to her Horse and went "Ere Missus – I bet on that one and won!" not knowing to whom he was addressing. She just sweetly smiled.

He was also in attendance at the Iranian Embassy Siege. There was a lot of hanging around waiting for things to happen and across the radio came a Yawn and an "I'm Bored!". The Superintendent shouted "Who's BORED!" 'Bored' obviously kept quiet.

Tony loved his job and in 1992 was proud to be awarded the BEM and Community Police Officer of the Year Award. He stayed on doing this job for a further six years and the thanks he got for working past retirement was £6,000 taken off his Golden Handshake.

He now runs the "International Dog House Club". This raises money for the Sunshine House for the Blind Charity to help the Underdogs. The one in the Chair is Top Dog, the second in the chair is Deputy Dog. Their wives are called The Leash Holders. On one visit to the Home a young boy came up and offered to show Tony round. Taking him round the Home he told him what room was for what. Then they came up to a Piano and the boy pointed it out and asked if Tony would like to hear him play. He then played Twinkle Twinkle Little Star, all the time with his blind eyes shut. Tony's eyes filled up in the telling of this story and you could see what a sincere, caring and Man of This World, retaining a brilliant sense of humour. We are so grateful for people like him who choose to serve the people in The Police Force of the British Isles.

Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - Focus on Domestic Plastics

y previous article about rubbish and recycling dealt broadly with what personal measures we could be taking to improve recycling, both on the "doorstep" and also using municipal facilities. This month I am focussing on what we can do to identify and isolate non recyclable plastic wastes at home.

The Blackdown Hills Transition Group have been considering how the "Ecobrick" initiative could be used to collect plastic waste that either cannot, or is currently unable to be processed by Somerset Waste Partnership.

At our April meeting we were fortunate to have Ben Bryant from Devon Recycling Network in Totnes, who came to talk about Ecobricks and their use. Please check on the internet to see how these are being used in the world, especially where poorer countries and their environments are blighted by plastic waste materials. The following link is a good place to start: www.ecobricks.org

Their experiences in dealing with the threats caused by this type of pollution are uplifting, especially as the approach requires little input apart from physical effort to isolate those materials into plastic drinks bottles. Whilst Ecobricks could not be used in mainstream building projects in the UK, it is possible that they could be incorporated into ancillary structures such as building composter bins or sea defences. Ben will be looking into where these can be used and reporting back to the group soon. My own quest to isolate any non-recyclable plastics and produce Ecobricks has resulted in stopping over 5.5 kg (12.1 lbs) of material going into landfill, since the beginning of the year.

What could you all do? Why not come and join us at our next meeting on June 5th at 7.30pm at The Holman Clavel pub? You will be most welcome to join in the conversation.

For the last 5 years the members of the Culm Valley Model Railway Club having been working on a model of Tiverton Junction Station as it was in the late 1950s to early 1960s, when there were still some steam locomotives running as well as early diesels.

Many of you will be aware that the station was at Willand and closed in 1986 when Tiverton Parkway opened. We are modelling it when it was a junction for two lines, one to Tiverton and the other to Hemyock. Features of the station area included an Esso oil depot, milk trains to the Hemyock dairy and Lloyd Maunder's siding all of which will be modelled.

After a lot of research, studying photographs, checking plans, reading umpteen books and chatting to local villagers who used the station we started work on the model. All the track has been laid, some of the buildings have been constructed, and we have started on the scenery. Over the next few years we will continue to work on the buildings, general scenery and detailing.

The layout measures approximately 9' x 27'. We are about to have a full testing session and have booked Sampford Peverell Village Hall on Sunday the 16th June between 11:00am and 4pm for this purpose. You are welcome to join us (No Admission Charge) to see a large OO gauge layout under development and have a chat. Additionally we will have "SOLDOR", our Thomas the Tank Engine based layout, for accompanied children to operate and tea, coffee and cakes will be available. 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
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
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
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
