#### **Heritage Sunday**

Thether you were new to the village of Hemyock or a long time resident the display of Hemyock History going back over 100 years had something to offer everyone.

Organised by the Friends of St Mary's at the parish church visitors were welcomed throughout the afternoon of Heritage Sunday learning or reminiscing about this popular village to a background of music.

A slide show of over 140 photos ran on a continuous loop causing great interest with lots of folk recalling the various events and people as they came on screen. The Band of Hope, 1911 Coronation Committee, Guides and Brownies from 1940's, Wedding of the couple who met on TV Blind Date programme, Canadian judge at the first YFC Calf Club which originated at Hemyock and many photos from more recent years including Scouts, choristers, various sports clubs and the milk factory along with numerous rural farming photos of days gone by.

The Baptist Chapel and church both had displays of past events and both here and at other places could be heard, "Oh I remember that" and "Look that's me when I was 12" or whatever age. There was also a display from the Roman Catholic church and Methodist Chapel both no longer in the village.

Past and present members of various clubs and organisations had donated items along with their written memories and newspaper cuttings. A Guide tie and badges from the late 1950's, a WI embroidered tablecloth with members names, photos of the village prior to all the expansion, programmes from shows and concerts, badges from an American Square Dance club, carnival committee minute books, various certificates and more personal family items all drawing great attention.

Numerous people of all ages took the opportunity to climb the steps to the bell tower under the guidance of Brian Samuels whilst Linda Holway (Captain) welcomed visitors, especially children, displaying and discussing a large demonstration bell on a wooden frame.

Events organised by the Friends usually have a good selection of delicious refreshments available and the day was no exception with the group kept busy serving throughout the afternoon. Overall the afternoon raised over £178 for church funds

#### From the Ringing Room

Te are wondering if we might have broken a record recently. We have had 5 bells as long ago as 1552. At the time this was a lot for a small village, and was only exceeded locally by Cullompton who had 7. However whoever purchased/ordered our bells did not pick the smallest model. The lightest bell at the time was likely to have weighed in the region of 5 – 7cwt. And when the peal was made up to 6 the new "small" bell still topped the 5cwt mark.

This may have been fine for hefty farmworkers but not for dainty ladies when they started to get involved in the early 1900s. In fact in Hemyock they were actively discouraged, and women were effectively barred from the Hemyock ringing room. The first female ringers appeared about 1976. There were still old ringers here who thought ringing was bad for women in the early 1980s.

The weight of Hemyock bells has usually meant that young people wanting to learn to ring have been in the 2nd or 3rd year of secondary school. That is until this August when Saskia Hunt found herself ringing for Morning Service at the ripe old age of 11years and 1 month, having spent the last week of her summer holiday having a fairly intensive 4 day training course. In the tower we are not aware of anyone having learnt on Hemyock bells under the age of 13, but some of the old ringers in the village (we know there are quite a few) might know otherwise.

So well done Saskia. And also well done Lucy, Cieran and James our older teenagers who started learning at the end of 2018 and who have been helping with wedding ringing this summer.

Bells are still measured in the old imperial system of hundredweights, (cwts), quarters and pounds. 1 cwt is approximately 50.9 kilograms, so Saskia has been pulling about 260kg plus the weight of clapper, headstock, rope etc. Our heaviest bell weighs 907kg approx., or 17cwt 3qtrs12lb. 

In the book I have of Cullompton Deanery magazines 1908-10 I came across articles for October. The Bishop of Shan-Tung (China) writes in 1910 Is Christianity Advancing in China? It covers his comments on subjects such as education, foot binding and mission school ending with a recipe for... rabbit pie. Not quite what I was expecting! Perhaps it was the editor simply filling the blank space on the page.

There is also an article telling us that the Mayor of Exeter has set going an astronomical clock in the Speke Chantry of Exeter Cathedral parts of which were made in 1317. The clock is claimed to be the oldest astro-horological clock example in England. Perhaps someone could let us know if it is still there.

People around the same ancient age as myself who have lived here for many years will remember summer trips to the coast for members of the church choir and Sunday School. It was an outing we all eagerly looked forward to – one of my memories was stopping at Bridport one year as we travelled to Weymouth (always a pleasure) and for the first time drinking iced coffee which convinced me never to have it again!

We read in the Deanery book that a similar outing took place in August 1908 leaving Hemyock with around 130 travelling by train and then coach. Unfortunately it doesn't mention their destination but everyone was on the beach but 10.30am and apart from a short thunderstorm (conveniently when the party were inside having dinner) the day was 'splendidly fine'.

#### The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial massage.

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. The Trustees are only too happy to consider any applications. Alternatively for more details please contact the secretary, Mrs Judy Barton on 01823 680975 or j.h.barton@hotmail.co.uk.

The Trustees are proud of the speed with which they are able to help patients and in many cases are able to provide financial assistance within two weeks.

Our new members, Lauren, Gary and Sue have settled in well and are an asset to our group. Rehearsals have been enjoyable and we are lucky to have a cast of



#### **Organ Donation Week**

The following is a story that was written by the BHF about Hemyock resident Stuart Webb and his brother Dave.

This week is organ donation week, and we're raising awareness about lives changed thanks to transplantation. Stuart and his brother, Dave, both have hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, a heart disease which may have been inherited from their late father.

The health of both brothers deteriorated to the point that their survival depended on a heart transplant. Stuart was the first to become symptomatic at the age of 24, and he was soon diagnosed with atrial fibrillation. Over the next few years he was in and out of hospital and seeing his consultant on a sixmonth or annual basis. In 2005 Stuart started to suffer with fluid retention-a symptom of heart failure.

At this point he was sent to Bristol and had open-heart surgery. The surgeon gave the devastating blow that he was in constrictive heart failure – and a heart transplant would be his only option. Stuart had his life saving heart transplant in August 2016 at the age of 46.

Stuart's brother, Dave, became ill 10 years after Stuart – he was also suffering from atrial fibrillation. After numerous visits to hospital, doctors quickly determined that his health deterioration was fast becoming a mirror image of his brother. Soon after, Dave was also told he needed a heart transplant. Incredibly, Dave was also aged 46 when he received his new heart.

Speaking about his recovery, Dave said: "As soon as I was conscious I knew my new heart was better. Stuart told me that would happen and it did. You just feel it being better." Also speaking about life with his new heart, Stuart said: "I am absolutely loving life at the moment. It's almost a privilege to go through it. You get to the end of the road, this is it. And then you are given this amazing second chance."

Have you talked about your wishes to your family about this subject?



#### **Dear Residents**

t a DCC Cabinet meeting, have been told that a total projected budget overspend, four months to the 2019/20 financial year, is £4.3m. These figures assumes a funding short fall of £13.8m for special educational needs and disability (SEND) will not be dealt with this year. It also assumes planned contributions to reserves of £8m are not made. The report says, without these adjustments, the projected overspend will be £28.1m. Overspends always seems to be apparent at midterm, by the end of the year, management put in place measures to retrieve the situation, and bring budgets on target.

The Government has announced additional funding for SEND in 2020/21, but nothing as yet for this current year. It is not a solution, but a mechanism that gives more time for a solution to be found. Our Schools are suffering, they are around £300 per child less than the national average. The Cabinet agenda reports say DCC could receive an extra £1.7m next year and £9.5m in 2021/22 for education, following the Government spending review, and an extra £8.6m to help support children with special needs next year. County are continuously campaigning with Headteachers, Governors and parents for fairer funding for Devon's Schools and a promise of a 'level up' under-funded areas.

As you know, DCC are putting a Forum together, which will include professional people, from Exeter University, The NFU, Citizen's panel, etc, to work out how best we can work towards Zero Carbon. I am on the task/working group that will pull all this forward to go forward for implementation to achieve Zero Carbon by County's target by 2040. The Government target is 2050. We can chip away at the edges by being more efficient with transport, energy savings, more recycling, electric vehicles, etc, but it will be a tall order to get to Zero. The forum will include all the Districts.

You may have picked up that Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS), have ended the contract with Gigaclear, CDS says; despite painstaking work by all concerned, it has not been possible to agree a recovery plan that CDS and the Governments Building Digital UK Agency could support in confidence. Gigaclear was awarded five contracts for completion by Dec 2019. The Company underwent new ownership since last summer and failed to meet contract targets set in early 2018. By the end of the first quarter of this year, Gigaclear had provided 496 properties with access to the new network compared to contract targets of 28,689. However, despite new owners investing additional resources and changes in senior management, delays increased. CDS intends to launch a fresh procurement this autumn, this will start an estimated 12 months tender process to identify a new provider, or providers, of these services.

Devon and Somerset Fire & Rescue Authority have completed their public consultation and a decision will be made on the future of how this Authority will operate on the 5th Nov.

he Friends and their Partners enjoyed a very informative Talk and Walk around the Wellington Basins in the early Leslie's husband along with Richard Fox and Terry Milton told us a brief history of the Basins. A lot of us had never been there and were amazed at the ingenuity of the Georgians and Early Victorians.

The Fox Brothers who owned the Wool Factory altered the Water Ways of the Basins to enable them to utilise the waters for the Mill. They constructed the two ponds and water ways to give them a controllable water supply. The engineering required was truly forward thinking for those times.

There is no longer a need for the water supply to the factory but the Basins remain. A valued Group of Volunteers help to maintain the Basins for the general public to enjoy. It is no mean feat and we should be incredibly grateful to this Band of people. I cannot recommend a walk around the ponds and to follow the Leats (open watercourses conducting water to a Mill) along through pleasant pastureland.

After our walk the Friends of the Basins opened up their Storage Container/Café and treated us to a hot drink and delicious cake made by our Group members Leslie and Maureen. In the twilight we chatted to Richard Fox some more, a descendent of the Fox Family who ran the Mill. It all made for a delightful early evening.



All you have to do is bring your apples and containers for the juice. There will be some recycled bottles available if you don't have any of your own. The juice can then be pasteurised or frozen in order to keep it for longer or of course drunk within 3 days.


