Letter from the Rector

Dear friends,

That a strange few weeks it has been! And now we need to gear ourselves up for the long haul, facing significant restrictions on our engagement with each other for an unspecified number of months. My thoughts and prayers are with you all, especially if you are already feeling a bit isolated and apprehensive about what the coming weeks will hold.

Instead of the normal listing of church services in this magazine, here is an update for you of the 'new normal' with regard to services and meeting together.

Churches are no longer allowed to hold services, either on Sundays or mid week, and all the normal mid week groups, Lent groups, coffee and lunch groups have had to be cancelled. Funerals are currently still being allowed, as are weddings, but no more than nine people are permitted to be present for such a service, and then keeping the recommended 2 metres apart. In the case of funerals, we will be able to arrange for memorial services to take place after the coronavirus emergency is over. With weddings and funerals there will be ways in which the service can be shared with those unable to be present, either by videoing, or live streaming, or sending out orders of service to those who would have attended if they could.

However, the church has not shut up shop! Anglican churches belong to the local community and are here to serve that community. So the church buildings remain open for everyone, so that you can come in to sit quietly, to pray, to reflect. You will find a range of helps to prayer in the churches - prayer stations, prayer leaflets to take away with you, and a prayer board on which to pin prayer requests. Every Sunday prayers will be said in each of the churches, and we are putting in place a system for prayers to be said in each of the churches mid week. At these times, the requests left on the prayer boards will be offered up to God.

Please look on the benefice website for local church information, for details about live streaming of worship, and for daily prayers and reflections from the archbishop and from the diocese of Exeter, as well as updates on safety measures.

The churches are also sharing in the initiative of the Blackdown Support Group to ensure that every home in our area is covered with offers of help should need arise.

I hope that it will be possible to hold open-air Easter gatherings to celebrate the highlight of the Christian year, but I guess we will need to wait on government advice. The message that Easter gives us of God's love persisting through the darkest times and bringing us into new life is lifechanging in the hope it brings. The risen Jesus is alive to walk with us day by day, to renew, refresh, and ultimately resurrect us and restore our entire planet.

My prayer is that you may know the risen Jesus walking with you in these testing times, bringing peace and a sense of hope for the future. If you are someone who prays, or wouldn't mind giving it a go, please pray especially for all who have businesses on the line, those facing potential or actual job losses, those working overtime and in difficult situations in the health service, those who are suffering from the virus or caring for those who are, and for all families to find new ways to enjoy being together creatively, and of exploring this beautiful springtime world.

he Church Room, Hemyock sees the parish church Charity and Coffee shop meet three times a month and is well supported by both local folk, ramblers and visitors.



Flushed with Success?

S t Mary's church members are very pleased with their new toilet block, which now graces the 900 year old building. Maybe it's something to do with the fact that it also houses the new, more efficient, boiler which gives a warmer church.

Anyway the Church Council recently decided that they wanted to share the joys of the facilities and have applied to have the toilet twinned with one in Africa.

This is part of a scheme run by Tearfund who are trying to bring clean water and safe sanitation to communities who lack them. We probably take toilets and clean water for granted but if your nearest water is an hour's walk away, and is not very hygienic, and your toilet is the bush, then a village tap and functioning toilet can make differences in areas we would not think of. For example children may suffer less illnesses and go to school more consistently and so are better equipped for work and adult life in general. Women are less likely to be attacked and raped whilst attending to their personal toilet needs.

So given our links with Kisoro in South West Uganda the Council has asked if possible to be twinned with a village in that area. So watch this space-or should that be watch the walls in the loo!

If you wish to know more have a look at Tearfund's "Toilet twinning" website.

Volunteering with Care4Calais February 2020

hatting to refugees at a distribution to an unauthorised camp in Calais was in some ways like talking to any other *bunch of young men. There was a lot of banter back and* forth - about how many sugars they had in their coffee, about where I was from in the UK and how many children I had. Several of them called me 'mummy' as I offered them biscuits, but most were younger than my own son. A game of football started with much hilarity but ended prematurely when someone kicked the ball into the nearby lake.

"They had endured persecution or were fleeing from war or conscription. They had travelled hundreds of miles with no money or shelter. They were living a precarious existence in makeshift camps with little hope of ever returning home to their communities."

We were distributing jumpers that day as well as handing out hot drinks. There was a charging board powered by a small generator for charging mobile phones. Nearby

we had four camping chairs set up with clippers and razors for mobile haircuts and beard trims. I spent some time mending a couple of coats with large rips in them.

But in other ways it was completely different - because we were not equal. They had endured persecution or were fleeing from war or conscription. They had travelled hundreds of miles with no money or shelter. They were living a precarious existence in makeshift camps with little hope of ever returning home to their communities. We had made a choice to visit, travelling safely with our passports and credit cards in our pockets. We could sleep warmly in our beds. We could go home.

Care4Calais shows how people coming together with a common cause - to support refugees - can make a huge difference to the lives of some of the most vulnerable displaced people in our world. Volunteering is one of the most useful things I have done - working with others to connect in really practical ways with refugees. Mornings were spent in the warehouse, taking delivery of donations and sorting them into relevant piles. Afternoons were spent doing distributions at different sites - Calais, Dunkirk, Brussels - with plenty of time for chat.

Thank you to everyone who gave me money or donations for Care4Calais - be assured that you have supported one of the best causes. It seems to me that, if a member of our family were in the same plight as the refugees, we would want someone in the world to help them.

Men in Sheds Committee Peter Williams

Men in Sheds What is a Men's Shed?



he Men in Sheds movement started in Australia in the 1980s and now in the U.K. there are 575 sheds currently operating with another 142 sheds in development

Men's Sheds (or Sheds) are similar to garden sheds – a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter.


Some Sheds are purpose built workshops, but they rarely start out that way. Many don't have premises at all in the beginning and instead form a group that meets regularly for the social connection, company and camaraderie until they can find somewhere to kit out with tools. Many Sheds get involved in community projects too – making bird boxes, planters etc, restoring village features, helping maintain parks and green spaces, and building things for schools, libraries and individuals in need. There would also be the opportunity to use tools and equipment that you don't normally have a chance to try, like wood turning on a lathe.

Activities in Sheds vary greatly, but you can usually find woodworking, repairing and restoring and model building in a typical Shed. Sheds typically attract older men, but many have younger members and women too. Whatever the activity, the essence of a Shed is not a building, but the connections and relationships between its members. The kettle will be as important as a hammer or any other tool!

We think Hemyock, and the Blackdown area in general would benefit greatly from having a Men's Shed and we are currently in discussion with Hemyock Parish Council regarding a piece of land in Longmead, near the Pavilion Changing rooms, and the possibility of the Council helping to fund a purpose-built shed. We also have the possibility of starting our project in one of the Garages near the Blackdown Healthy Living & Activity

We would love to know how people feel about this project and how many of you would be interested in making use of the Men's Shed. To that end we would like to hold an open meeting at The Healthy Living & Activity Centre on Wednesday 22nd April 2020 at 2pm to gauge how much interest there is in a Men's Shed and answer any questions you might have! We would love to see you there!

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

History Group Report

ur February talk was from local historian, Robert Garrett, from Culmstock. Until recently Hemyock was growing at a much faster rate than Culmstock so it might be surprising for some Hemyock residents to be told that Culmstock was the much larger community in the Culm Valley.

The Culmstock Rural District Council, before the local government reorganisation back in the 70's had jurisdiction over the entire Culm Valley, including Clayhidon. Churchstanton and Churchinford were, of course, in Somerset. A number of wealthy families lived in Culmstock and also married into other wealthy families, as they are wont to do. The main subject of Robert's talk was the Corner family who created Wellington School and also the Wellington Weekly News. Although never titled, they produced plenty of daughters who were fortunate to marry into families that were, with the wealth to go with the title.

Our WW1 book recording the exploits of Culm Valley people during World War 1 does refer to a Mary Corner who grew up in a house with parents and 3 other sisters. Her father was Charles Corner who owned the Mill at Milmoor but who died when he was 47 leaving a mother and 4 daughters at home. Mary quickly married Henry Knowlman from the Culmstock auctioneering family who were descendants of the Pook Colliers who ran the local hunt and was invited every year to Badminton due to his rich tenor voice. Henry and Mary moved to Ashculme Farm Hemyock but the unfortunate Mary lost her husband due to a farming accident at the age of 34 and Mary moved to another local farm where the Mother had died. Mary, however sent her son, Charles to a London boarding school. Charles eventually emigrated to Canada as so many of the Culm Valley young men did with the intention of making his fortune. However returning with the Canadian Expeditionary Force to Shorncliffe Camp he died at the age of 45.


One of the other wealthy Culmstock families, the Southeys, made their name and fortune in South Africa. The South West sent many young men to the colonies including General Sir Redvers Buller earning a VC in South Africa. Culmstock born Sir Richard Southey sailed on the Kennersley Castle in 1820 as a Lt in the Albany Mounted Sharpshooters and became Colonial Secretary in 1864 to unite the South African States, together with Cecil Rhodes, added significantly to the family estates both in Devon and S Africa. As an indication of the family joining the Establishment, his cousin Robert, became the Poet Laureate. A more established member of

To find out more information about Hemyock Scout Group visit their website hemyock.scoutsites.org.uk the aristocracy, the 15th Lord John Somerville, was born at Fitzhead Court, whose Mother was a Southey, hence his full name was Lord John Southey Somerville.

Elizabeth Southey was born at Jerwoods, Culmstock to John Southey and Elizabeth (Potter) Southey and married William Corner and Mary Southey married Samuel Corner. Samuel Taylor Coleridge was very friendly with Robert Southey and of course William Wordsworth and spent a lot of time touring the west country. R D Blackmore lived in Culmstock when writing Lorna Doone. Octavius Temple was father of Frederick Temple and grandfather of William Temple, who both became Archbishops of Canterbury. Benjamin Frost also joined the Corner Southey clan and produced the Ben Richard Southey Frost. Octavius Temple, father of Frederick Temple and grandfather of William Temple, both of whom became Archbishops of Canterbury, all of whom lived in Culmstock.

This is an ideal time to do historical research towards a talk or a published work. We welcome any such material that could be worked on to be included in next year's schedule of meetings or in fact towards a published work. William Shakespeare, who has no connection with the Culm Valley that we can find, used a period of self isolation during the plague in the early 17th century to write some of his best plays such as The Tempest and King Lear. We seem to have gone back to an earlier time. Make the most of it.

Dear Residents

s you will already know, County have had their budget meeting which will include 1.99% increase plus a 2% *Lincrease because of the pressure on Social Care, this is the* limit set by the Government to avoid triggering a referendum. I have set out below some of the more interesting points that you may be interested in.

The County Council's Cabinet is proposing to invest over £43 million of additional funding into front line public services in Devon in 2020/21. The full Council approved the proposals on February 20, Devon's non-schools budget will rise to £541 million for 2020/2021, an increase of 8.7 per cent on the current year. The Cabinet proposals include additional investment in social care and health, children's services, roads and drainage.

If approved, the proposals will mean an extra £23.7 million for adult care and health, £11.5 million more for children's services and £2.7 million for highways including £1 million to help deal with drainage issues on the County's 8,000-mile road network. In total the County Council's spending will rise by £43.1 million from £498 million in the current 2019/20 financial year.

The budget proposals are a response to increasing demand on front-line services driven by a range of external factors including demographic and climate change impacts.

Context

The Government's reaffirmed commitment to a fair funding review of local government is welcome. The continuing wide disparity in funding between counties and metropolitan areas requires tackling.

Current Government funding per head of population is £258 for Devon compared to an average £421 for metropolitan councils and £556 for inner London boroughs.

There has been a 72% real terms reduction in Government funding for Devon between 2010 and 2019/20. During that period of austerity, the County Council has reduced its spending by nearly £300 million and staff numbers by nearly 3,000.

Through a combination of efficiencies, innovation and collaboration with other councils, Devon has managed to protect many important public services during this time. All of Devon's 50 libraries remain open, some with longer opening hours. The County has maintained a universal youth service and provided targeted support for the most vulnerable youngsters, and working ever more closely with health partners, the County has maintained services for the elderly and vulnerable adults.

However, the demand-led pressures on all Devon's front-line services continue to rise exacerbated by demographic and climate change.

This is just some statistics you might be interested in; Devon County Council is one of 26 County Councils in England. The authority, which has 60 elected County Councillors, represents 795,000 residents and administers an area spanning 2,534 square miles, the third largest in England.

The Council is led by a Cabinet of nine senior councillors, chaired by the Leader of the Council, John Hart.

The County Council works in partnership with eight District Councils, over 300 Town and Parish Councils, the Great South West region's LEPs and neighbouring County and Unitary councils.

Our Services

The County Council has a total budget of £1.1 billion and provides a wide range of public services – some directly and some commissioned from other organisations. The County Council's main service groups are:

Adult care and health including services for older people and adults with physical or learning disabilities.

• care at home for 10,000 people a year

• 13,000 people with dementia

Children's services including education and learning; services for vulnerable children and families; safeguarding; looked after children and care leavers.

- supporting 16,500 children with special needs or disabilities
- over 200 children adopted or fostered a year
- 97,000 pupils
- 365 schools

Communities, Public Health, Environment and Prosperity including planning, transportation and environment; economy, enterprise and skills; trading standards; libraries; community safety and emergency planning.

- 50 libraries and four mobile libraries
- free school transport for 14,500 pupils a day
- funding for 185 bus services, 60 voluntary car schemes and 16 community ring and ride schemes
- nine new primary schools built or due to be completed in 2020

Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste including road and bridge maintenance; waste disposal and recycling; and the County Council's capital programme.

- 8,000 miles of road (England's largest local network)
- 62,000 potholes filled a year
- managing 357,000 tonnes of domestic waste a year
- 19 recycling centres
- £114 million invested every year on major infrastructure projects.



Clayhidon Friends March Meeting

espite the Coronavirus scares and horrible weather a few of us gathered to hear an extremely interesting, and informative Talk from Case Worker, Publicity Manager and Fund Raiser, Pauline Homeshaw, who has worked as a Volunteer for the past 30 years and still exudes passion and enthusiasm for the Cause. She stressed Volunteers don't have to be attached to the Military.

In 1885 Sir Colonel James Gildea, who with his far sighted vision could see the need for extra help for the Armed Forces, Veterans and Families. He approached Princess Alexander, the then Princess

of Wales to be the Patron and with the "A" of her name in the Emblem started the Charity. All SASAFA workers are

unpaid Volunteers and public contributions help run the organisation. At the start there were 50,000 volunteers, today the number has dropped to 6,000. Other organisations, such as The Army Benevolent Fund, have been set up since 1885. SSAFA Groups have representatives in most of the Services locations.

Help is not just for serving personnel but for their families, Veterans and Reservists. It was interesting that the organisations include the Reservists (Territorial Army). Thus recognising they too are included in the need for assistance. SSAFA might continue after an injured serving personnel has left Hospital and Rehabilitation. They can call for any help needed. Often siblings and children are overlooked after a severe injury or bereavement. They too can be included in the umbrella of help offered. A lot of Mentoring is now offered with the recognition of PTSD, which sometimes doesn't manifest till 14 years after a traumatic experience. Upmost confidentiality is used for example if help is the need in visiting a loved one in Prison or having become an alcoholic.

Unlike other organisations, they pride themselves that they will always do a personal house visit and assessment face to face, after a need has been brought to their attention. They will then find ways that their problems can be alleviated. It might just be putting them in contact with other people to curtail loneliness or for a Veteran to be able to stay in a much loved home, with the installation of a Stair Lift. Over the years since its conception problems have changed to also include help with marriage breakdowns, or with financial or legal problems

The main rehabilitation Centre is now in the central of the Country. SSAFA has paid for flats to be built nearby for visiting family to stay in and they would help with travel and costs to enable these visits. Help also for families who have lost the serviceman as they have to vacate an army home after 90 days. They can be offered short term stays in this accommodation whilst finance and support is implemented. On the other hand it might be some respite care for a family in a terrible time watching a loved one going through rehabilitation. Now there are Homes for the elderly that ex-Military Veterans can apply to move into when independent living becomes unsafe.

How enlightening has the above been for you? I hope as much as it was for our gathering. A very important point we all brought away from the Talk is their need for donations from the Public and caring Volunteers, willing to be trained as Case Workers. One of our Group, Carole, had volunteered in the past for 10 years and reflected back that it was one of the most fulfilling things she had done in her life and the wonderful feeling of having helped someone was priceless.

When re-assessing your Charity Giving, please spare some for SSAFA. They really do such a lot of help in assisting all people connected with our very valuable servicemen and women.

HALL COMMITTEE SEEKS COMPANY STATUS

Clayhidon Village Hall Committee is hoping to attract more grants by turning itself into a new type of charitable company known as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO).

The tiny village school was sold by Devon County Council to a committee of trustees for £400 in 1962, and since then successive generations of volunteers have turned it into one of the Blackdown Hills' most successful community centres.

For the past three years the committee has been fundraising to pay for improvements and an extension, including a village archive room. But it was told by a major donor recently that there was no way it would receive further big grants unless it became a CIO. Last year a new roof was fitted, paid for by Viridor Credits.

Everyone over the age of 18 living locally is invited to the annual meeting at 7.30pm on 13 May 2020, when they will be able to vote on the committee's proposal to liquidate itself and apply to the Charity Commission for CIO status.

n pring, in many ways, speaks of new life and new beginnings. Our very own coffee bar has received a new lease of life in the form of recent decorations. > With this in mind I think this we week we may be off panic buying ... not toilet rolls and pasta, but fence posts and cement. What does seem certain, that regardless of class, creed, wealth or lack thereof, every one of us will feel the effects of this in some way. For now, we wish you well.

Our Thatching Life, featuring Ferrari the Thatcher, Daisy his apprentice and animals various...

s I write the response to Corona virus or Covid 19 seems to be changing daily. It's the 15th March, and for now our Children are still at school or college; shops and businesses are open and we have work to do, but with Italy on lock down, France also from this day, Spain and Ireland in the midst of doing so, it seems likely that whether for political good manners or practical good use, we will shortly follow on.

Theory wise, we could carry on thatching for some while, as most of our clients are content to remain on the ground, and in fact we've no need to see them really as all concerns can easily be raised and addressed with photos and emails. But with so much uncertainty in the stock markets, and just in people's daily work, clients may want to sit tight and see what happens...a perfectly reasonable response. That's assuming we are allowed to leave home to work in the first place. And so to contingency planning: If we are prevented from working, what can we do to make money, save money, add value or save time. Daisy has some work that she can do remotely, but that would soon slow to a halt if we follow Italy. Between us we have a little scrap we could weigh in, but the price for that is rapidly falling too. We can always tell when it rises, as from the rooftops you can hear and see when the farmers and scrap merchants start moving trailer loads, all heading for the best price. We can do some preparatory work for the thatching, tying up eaves wads, cutting hazel sticks and trimming cross spars.

Next in line would be saving money, adding value and saving time....well, I'm not sure Jelly (Daisy's lurcher) is much of a hunting dog unless roasted sticks or tennis balls are your thing, so it's lucky for us that one of the pigs has given us some particularly good sausages and joints for the freezer. Then there is always work to be done on the vans, the tractor, but a mechanic friend of mine told me that there are shortages of some car parts as the both manufacturing and supply chain suffer. We could work on the barn; finish building the walls and start fitting out the workshop. We could chop next years logs. Daisy could occupy herself quite happily on her land pointing in the old flint wall, mending fences and fighting her own personal war against docks, ragwort and gorse. There are probably a number of projects at home that could be brought forward....all the jobs we would normally fit in on weekends and evenings could be done now, so that once we do go back to work we can work longer hours if needed.
