What is a Church?

I used to often take school assemblies - once or twice a week and sometimes I would ask the children to draw a church for me. As you might expect they usually drew me a biggish old-looking building with a tower and a path leading up to it. Usually there were no people in the picture at all although when I lived in North Devon there were often quite a few sheep about! These days children will still draw a building if asked to describe a church.

What goes for children will often go for adults too. We all tend to think of a church as a place, a building. But that isn't really the whole picture.

For these past months since March we have had to get used to functioning as a church without using a building at all – no services, no weddings, no bells and no funerals in the church building. Thanks to modern technology some of us have been

able to meet together on Sunday mornings and at other times and see and hear one another without any risk of passing on or catching Covid-19 but instead using 'Zoom' to help us worship together. Is it a perfect substitute to being together in reality, no, of course not, but we have been able regularly to pray together, to confess our sins, to hear God's word and to sing his praises. It has been something to be very thankful for.

What we have learnt again is that a church is much, much more than a building. A church is primarily a group of people who believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour and seek to follow him in their lives. My hope and prayer is that when we gather again for worship in the buildings which we call our churches then we will treasure our relationships with God and with one another and use our wonderful buildings with respect, creativity and great joy.

he four churches in the united benefice are adopting a revised pattern of worship from September this year. Both All Saints and St Mary's believe it will be helpful to have the same time for worship every Sunday, and will hold a service every week.

This will do away with the guesswork you might have been involved with previously, trying to remember which Sunday of the month it was and therefore whether there would be a service happening or not! From September, if you turn up at All Saints at 10.00 am on a Sunday, or at St Mary's Hemyock at 11.00 am on a Sunday, *something* will be happening.

What's more, the form of worship will vary throughout the month in order to include a range of approaches. Some people connect best with God through a formal liturgy; others need a much more creative approach; still others need patches of silence, and others benefit from being able to participate through conversation, craft, music, or in other ways. God is vaster than any tradition or denomination can grasp, so this variety gives us opportunity to learn from each other and gain new insights into God.

The ecumenical service scheduled for the 2nd Sunday of the month at All Saints is a new one. There will be a particular welcome here for local people who may go out of Culmstock to worship at other churches, but who would value worshipping occasionally with others in their own community.

The Church of England is here for the local community so we offer these times of gathering for prayer, worship and conversation, hoping that there will be something here you will be able to connect with and find helpful. We look forward to seeing you!

Sea Sunday

W ith the Flying Angel flag billowing from the tower of St Mary's Church Hemyock around 50 worshippers from the village with Culm Davy, Clayhidon and Culmstock celebrated Sea Sunday with a Zoom service led by the Rector, Rev Becky Totterdell.

The flag is that of the Mission to Seafarers (MtS) a worldwide charity providing support - both emotional and practical to the crews of commercial shipping and their families who are often separated for many months at a time. The Upper Culm Valley Mission Community was delighted to welcome Ronnie King and his wife Gillian from Taunton to join them in worship.

Ronnie spoke of the work carried out by the charity and movingly told of an incident when he and Gillian worked full time for MtS. Ronnie was called to Dunkirk by a Chaplin as crews were failing to leave the ships to buy essentials, enjoy a hot meal and such like as it was too cold. Ronnie organised a Wooly Pulley Appeal in the southern area of England. A truck was soon filled with sweaters and taken to France. Whilst being unloaded faces of crew members filled with utter joy as they realised the gifts were for them.

More on Sea Sunday...

What's that Blue thing?

ou may have noticed a blue flag on the church tower in the middle of July and thought "that's not one of their usual ones!" Indeed it was not and as far as we know it was the first time we have had a "Flying Angel" on the tower. It was flying because the second Sunday of July is celebrated as "Sea Sunday" when all those working in the various areas of mercantile shipping are remembered.

"The Flying Angel" is the symbol of The Mission to Seafarers, a charity supported by the Church of England, aimed at supporting the Maritime community around the world. It supports sailors of all faiths and none, and also where possible their families too. Originally started in the Bristol Channel to support Seamen, its work now covers the world and the change of title reflects the increasing number of ladies working on the waters. There are approximately 1.5million sailors in the world, from local fishermen to cruise ship crews via coasters up to those working on 100,000plus tons container ships. Taken together they account for the provision of 90% of the goods we use daily.

Sea life is not easy. Taking a container ship as an example your sailor might be the only one from his/her homeland on board, they may have no contact with their friends and family for months, (not every ship has the internet as standard) work can involve hard physical effort with shifts covering all 24hours in any sort of weather. Time in port may be too short to allow free time on land. Mechanisation has reduced crew numbers so there may well be some feeling lonely, "home" may only be visited once or twice a year.

Add to this the possibility of attack by pirates, owners not maintaining vessels or even abandoning them, pay coming late, port authorities holding vessels against unpaid mooring dues, contracts being changed at short notice – the life becomes a little less rosy.

Against this the MtS offers over 200 centres worldwide where sailors can get help including legal aid, relax and have a willing ear to talk to and get help to contact their families. Chaplains will visit ships in port or at anchor, do shopping, provide SIM cards, take seafarers to the centres, offer counselling and if asked take services or pray with individual sailors. All of which takes money, so donations are always welcome.

One sailor known to us said that knowing that the port they were going to had an MtS centre took away all the fears of arriving in somewhere strange. "It was like having some of your family there to welcome you"

Details about the Mission are found on their website. If you want a readable account of life on a container ship then "Down to the sea in Ships" by Horatio Clare, published by Vintage Books, gives a good insight on life afloat.

From Bishop Robert – 10th June 2020

Thank you for all you are doing in these extraordinary times as together we plot our course across a fast changing landscape. Like many people, I have been moved by the broadcasts of the Queen to the nation. In her last broadcast, she referred to her father, the late King George VI and the evocative lines of Minnie Harkins' poem that he immortalised:

I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year, 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way!' So I went forth and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And he led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

As the nation begins to recover from this pandemic and we discover the shape of a new 'normality', there will still be many who are self-isolating. As our cathedral and church buildings re-open, we should not forget them. For all of us there is anxiety as we journey into the unknown. Devon Charity Supporting Village Halls To Reopen Following Changing Guidelines

r ndependent charity Devon Communities Together has been supporting village halls and other community buildings L throughout Devon during the past few months and is now working with these vital rural hubs to help them safely navigate their way out of lockdown as Government guidance begins to make reopening possible.

Village Halls have been closed since the lockdown was imposed and were due to be considered for re-opening when the Government's plan reaches stage three. However, on Monday 15 June the government changed the rules to permit holding indoor markets in community buildings, and it is expected that wider reopening of these important assets will be allowed from 6 July. Therefore, Devon Communities Together is circulating guidance on how to prepare for re-opening, based on the national guidance provided by Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE), the national charity which champions and supports community-led projects and assets in the countryside.

The extensive guide, prepared by ACRE in conjunction with the network of county village hall advisors, helps halls through the regulations and guidance provided by government, local authorities, public health and professional bodies. Halls are encouraged to contact their user groups to work out how they could return whilst complying with social distancing requirements, good hygiene practices and knowing what to do if a user becomes ill. The guide provides checklists and model documents to help committees get their halls open safely.

Nora Corkery, acting CEO of Devon Communities Together (pictured), said: "DCT has provided extensive help to village halls ever since Covid-19 started to have an impact on communities. We have provided advice and guidance on a wide range of subjects and guided halls to apply for the Government's Covid relief funding, through our helpline and our village halls advisor. We have extended our service beyond our membership and have tried to reach all of Devon's village halls and similar community buildings.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

Finance

Expenditure - included room hire, clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, toilet cleaning and consumables, subscriptions, electricity, and audit fee.

Village

The parish council has purchased two dog bag dispensers, one at the flood bridge and one at Longmead.

The 'Hemyock' sign coming into the village at Culm Bridges has also been replaced.

The pc has purchased 8 new grit bins which will be located around the village during the winter months.

Public Space Protection Orders

Mid Devon District Council has consulted on making a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) relating to dog control for the next three years. PSPOs are available to Local Authorities to deal with specific nuisance problems, in particular areas that are having, or are likely to have, a detrimental effect on the quality of life for those who live, work or play within







the locality. The consultation was to consider widening enforcement powers in order to deliver a cleaner and more sustainable environment across the District within the Mid Devon District Council Boundary and to replace current dog control powers which are due to expire in October 2020. The draft order is set out to achieve four main objectives-

1. Dog fouling

- 2. Dogs on leads in:
- a) Cemeteries,
- b) Parks.
- c) When requested by an authorised officer or police constable

3. Exclusion of dogs from play areas

4. Limiting the number of dogs walked at a time by one person

The parish council has asked that the consultation period is extended beyond 17th July so that it has time to consult more widely. This would give the pc the opportunity to put forward

areas in the village where dogs should be kept on leads or banned altogether. If the consultation is extended anyone who wishes to express an opinion should complete the survey. To view all the consultation documents please visit www. middevon.gov.uk/consultations

Longmead

The bridge over the brook at the northern end of the football fields is in need of refurbishment. Brookridge Timber Ltd has kindly agreed to remove it and refurbish it. Whilst the bridge is undergoing repair contractors will be on site making improvements to help preserve the newly refurbished bridge and the path will need to be diverted along the side of the football pitches. There will be no access across the brook. Please bear with us whilst this essential work is undertaken.

The play area has been dismantled in preparation for the installation of new play equipment including a zip wire, climbing frame, swing and new surface. This will be installed during September.

Hemyock Turbary

The pc has received planning permission to create a hardstanding area for appropriately 6 cars at the entrance to the turbary. Work on this will commence shortly.

Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges in and around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

Scouting HQ is keeping us informed with progress back to near normal scouting where in Hemyock that means getting very wet and very muddy. Alas it is still away off. HQ is organising various virtual activities over the net including summer camps. Not quite the same.

So Old Rikki has little to report this time, so will revert to history. Thinking of what I could tell you I found some old records including a photo from early 1961. It was of the formation of the scout section. Although the cubs started in 1960, with Funeral Director Martin Pring being one of the first cubs, scouts was a few months later. There were two patrols and the photo showed us being invested by District Commissioner Bunny Leighton, aided

by scoutmaster Les Purcell and assistant scoutmaster Ron Cork. Those first twelve scouts were, in no particular order (just as we were stood in the photo); Roger Lowman, Roy Perrott, Keith Gammon, John Northam(aka Rikki), Peter Doble, David Moore, Brian Milton, Trevor Coles, Thomas Fouracre, Alan Berriman, David Llewellyn Jones and George Radford. Alas not all still with us. Those who are, best

wishes to you, hope you are well and if you get to read this, may it stir some memories for you.

I was on history last time with Hemyock on the front page of the Scouting magazine. I mentioned a scout mum with five fine young sons who made excellent scouts. I said I would tell you who this time. That mum was the late Betty Shires.

I have mentioned from time to time our link with the scouts of Tonder in Denmark. We are getting ever closer to our fiftieth anniversary camp and reunion in 2022, so here is a potted history of our twenty camps and home hospitality together.

It started in 1972 at the Devon International Jamboree in Torbay. Hemyock was due to host twelve scouts from Morocco, they did not turn up! So instead we hosted forty Danes from Tonder. The camp was from 29th July to 5th August and we all enjoyed the camp together. The Danes were way ahead of us and had girls in their troop. The first time we had camped with boys and girls together. That made headlines in a newspaper called The News of the World! Next up in 1974, forty eight from Hemyock went to Denmark, sailing from Hook of Holland to Esbjerg and on to Tonder. We camped with our friends at an International camp of 18,000 at Hvelpsund. Next, in 1977 63 Vikings came to Hemyock and we camped up in Wales, the Cambrian Mountains. 1980 and 48 scouts and guides made the journey across the North Sea to Dk and another International camp of 7,000 at Stevninghus. this was the year of much rain, a very wet camp. If you see Leader Colin Grabham, he will tell you, he was there. Everyone dried out with a week of wonderful home hospitality in Tonder. 1983, 59 Danes to Hemyock. This year we camped locally at Fishponds up at Dunkeswell. The weather was fine, apart from a thunderstorm during a night hike to Sidmouth. Being scouts everyone was prepared with the waterproof gear. Royal Marines parachuted into the camp site to visit us. Like they do! It was all great fun.

Lets have a new paragraph. Onward to 1986. The numbers increased. 81 scouts and guides travelled to Tonder to camp on the Island of Funnen, the home of Hans Christian Andersen, I am sure you have heard of him and his many writings. We had sun all the time and got tanned. This time we had a trip to Copenhagen, visiting the Little Mermaid (she really is small) and The Tivoli Gardens. I have to admit that it did pour with rain in the coach journey back to camp, but it was dark and the next day back to sunshine. Then the scouts and guides went back to Tonder to spend a week living in the homes of their new friends. Lots and lots of activities as usual. 1988. 60 Danes visited and we camped again at Fishponds It was a wet but happy camp. A number of us went down to Plymouth where we met Prince Edward who was visiting many youth organisations including scouts and guides. 1990. Our turn to visit Dk, we camped at a site at Bredeaadal, on the coast just above Tonder. Yet more fun. 1992 45 Danish visitors and we camped at Gutter Tor on Dartmoor. Twenty years of our friendship. Little did we realise then that Rikki would be writing this nearly 50 years later.

> 1994, 41 of us sailed across the North Sea to an International camp of 23,000 from all over the world. It was called Bla Sommer--Blue Summer, and it was temperatures in the nineties all week. This was leader Andy's first camp abroad. I have told this little tale many times, but perhaps one or two of you have not heard it! During the camp Colin and Rikki could not find Andy

in our sub camp so went to look for him. We saw a group of French scouts and asked if they had seen an English leader with a bushy black beard. Answer came, oh you mean Andy, he went down there to see an American group. The joys of scouting. I think Andy met nearly all 23,000. 1996 50 Danes and we camped at Huish Woods scout site just outside Taunton. Another fine time was had by all. 1998 and 30 plus went over to Dk and we camped again at Bredeaadal with lots of scouting activities. 2000. The friendship continues with 71 Danes camping with us at Clearbrook in Dorset . This included a visit to Brownsea Island where Baden Powell held the first scout camp. 2002 and we camped at the Bla Sommer site at Abenraa. Much quieter this time but still great fun.

2005 with 46 Danes and we camped at Woodhouse Park in Avon, overlooking the river Severn. 2007. 28 to Dk with a very wet camp at Troldhoj. There was much mud wrestling, including the leaders! 2010 and we camped at Caddihoe down near Exeter with 36 Danes. 2013 This time back to Bredeaaldal with our Danes. It is a lovely site. 2016 Camped at Cloud Farm, near Lynton with The danes. We had a steam train ride to Dunster to see the Castle. 2019 and nearly there. Hemyock scouts travelled in two minibuses across Europe to camp at Kulso. This included a trip to Legoland at Billund. Our twentieth camp together in 47 years . History would have been different if those 12 scouts from Morocco had arrived at camp in Torbay in 1972!

So, onward to 2022, our 21st camp together in our 50th year. Quite an achievement for a small rural group set in the heart of Devon. I will keep you informed of the preparations as we progress in the next two years. I hope that I have not bored you all, but you can probably guess that although now 70 plus, I am still a scout and always will be as will every one of the thousands who have been members of 1st Hemyock. I think that can be my "finally". Be prepared and stay safe and we can all get back to normal soon. Old Rikki

Dear Residents

lease see my report for Aug/Sept, not sure if there are any burning issues in and around this area, please let me know if there are any that I can help you with. Things move on quickly and by the time you read this, it may be out of date or updated. Most Parish Councils have had contact with Phil Morgan (DCC Highway's Officer) on doing what matters, by the 17th July, he has to collate all the Parish Council's request and put it into priority for funding.

Restrictions at our recycling centres have eased, so personal vans are now allowed to bring household waste as long as it's only the same amount that would fit in a normal sized family car or trailer.

Following on, this is an update of some of the issues relating to the Coronavirus which is still with us, we still need to be careful and keep to social distancing.

The DCC spend on directly procured stock was £1.748m. Reimbursement of adult social care providers PPE costs stands at £1.803m

Indications are that there may be further Pandemic funding for Local Government but it seems unlikely it will cover the full cost. Current approved and pipeline response plans already exceed the main grant of £36.7 millions by £8.5 millions, and this is without taking account of the significant loss in Council Tax our Districts are projecting. It is imperative that as we transition from Response to Recovery, that we do so in a measured and affordable way.

Council Tax and Business Rates

Assessing the impact the Pandemic is having on Council Tax collection and the tax base is very difficult this early in the year. Estimates provided on the Government's returns indicate losses of up to 13%. It is however, unclear if these losses will be permanent or just a matter of cashflow with payments being made later in the year or even next year. There is an added complication relating to increased Universal Credit claimants and the impact this may have on the Tax Base for next year along with the impact of the furlough scheme ending later in the year and the ongoing economic situation.

Due to the level of Business Rates Relief the Government has introduced, the risk to lost Business Rates is much lower and estimates from the Districts are around £1 million.

The vast majority of Devon people have behaved with great sense and responsibility throughout the pandemic and that's meant we've had the lowest number of outbreaks by some way throughout the crisis.

We obviously want to keep it that way and reduce it still further. We can now build on this effort and extend the work we have done together as Team Devon to protect our residents and support the most vulnerable. Team Devon is a public and private sector partnership drawing in expertise from business, education, skills and public sector organisations, has developed the plan with the backing of business representatives. We will now be at the forefront of responding and managing the outbreak at a local level. And if there's a hotspot in a town or village we'll be able to get onto it swiftly before it spreads too far. We've ensured that our plan

includes a strong focus on prevention and early intervention to ensure key settings such as care homes and schools and high-risk locations and communities identify and prioritise preventative measures. The good sense of the people of Devon has helped protect us all so far and they continue to have a vital role in reducing the spread of the virus and preventing further outbreaks. I would urge all of us to continue to follow national guidance and advice and keep up social distancing, wash our hands regularly and, if we think we might have the virus, get a test and self-isolate if that's necessary, we need to do all we can to avoid a second spike." Needless to say, this will have knock on effects to our budgets, to which the Government has said they will reimburse us, let's see. I would like to let any organisation, or Club know, that I have a Locality Budget and can help out any good cause, it will not be huge amounts, but every little helps, just go no DCC website and look for 'Locality Budget' fill the application in and return to me, or, any problems, give me a call.

News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

ver since lockdown commenced, we have been going out for walks with the kids. We have been out almost every day and almost always to the same woods, not far from where we live. More often than not, these adventures out of the house have been documented with photos.

Last week I began looking through this record of the last few months and seeing how much things had changed: Whilst many of the trees were bare at the beginning of lockdown, now all are covered in a rich layer of green leaves. The light that broke freely through the canopy of the woods now only dapples the woodland floor. And the floor itself has changed colour... where bluebells once covered every available space, now foxgloves stand proud in the places where the sunlight still reaches. And those children of ours, who have made this their playground for the last few months, they too have changed. Our youngest was just about starting to stand as lockdown commenced, now she is running around in a desperate attempt to keep up with her brothers.

It has been a similar story in the church. As we look back over the last few months, we can see how much things

have changed. Church, the gathered people of God, became a group of people distanced from one another and yet finding new points of meeting online. Zoom, YouTube and other forms of social media have become the tools of the church to communicate the good news of the gospel, to enjoy fellowship and to encourage each other in difficult days. The phone has become an increasingly invaluable tool highlighting how right Bob Hoskins was when he said, 'It's good to talk.'

I realise that it may sound as though there is an air of nostalgia in my writing, particularly as I quote an advert from the 90s let this not conceal the acknowledgement that these days have been immensely difficult for many. We have listened to people weep over the phone because of the isolation and loneliness that these days have brought. I have heard people, indeed have myself felt, the deep frustration at not seeing friends and family. We have all felt pained at the stories of suffering witnessed on the news and within our own communities. But, we have also seen the goodness and faithfulness of the Lord at work in these trying times of a pandemic. Just like the light finds a way through the dense woodland to dapple the floor, so the light of God can burst through and touch our lives.

> You light a lamp for me. The Lord, my God, lights up my darkness –

PSALM 18:28

As a church we have seen prayers answered, relationships deepen, and lives touched. We have had opportunity to connect with people in different ways... and not just here, but from Barnstaple to Bahrain and Hampshire to Hungary. We have heard reports of how missionary friends, in already difficult circumstances, have been able to serve others during the pandemic. As we look back, even amidst the pain and frustrations, we find ourselves strengthened in the knowledge that God is ever faithful, His love is strong and sure, and that His grace is sufficient for us each and every day.

And looking back with gratitude for God's love and faithfulness, gives us courage to look ahead with hope. As a fellowship we are in the process of working out how best to reopen the church building and facilitate our gathering together at Rosemary Lane. In the coming days we hope this will become a reality, we hope in the days ahead to resume worship, to collectively rejoice in the Lord's goodness. We **hope** that in the days to come we will not only have the capacity to make a phone to call to convey comfort, but once more embrace each other with warmth and affection. We hope that in the next issue of the Parish Pump we will have a great deal more to tell you about what has happened, what plans are ahead, and how great our God is!

Because God is faithful, we have hope.

But we do not live in the past or inhabit the future, we live today, and perhaps this is the greatest treasure of all: The knowledge that God cares for us here and now, where we are. He meets us in our need, He lifts us in our despair, He strengthens us in our joy, He calms us in our storm, and He offers us peace in our pain. We've had some wonderful weather these last few months, and, on several occasions, I have had opportunity to go outside at night and look up at the stars – go and do it next time you have a chance. There are an estimated one hundred billion stars in our galaxy alone and yet God's word tells us *He knows each* and every one by name "He determines the number of the stars; he gives to all of them their names" (Psalm 147:4). But why would he name stars? It is not for the sake of the stars, but for ours - so that we would be assured, that just as he knows each star by name, he knows you also! He sees you where you are and would draw near to you, to make known His love! Indeed, this is our Hope and comfort today, that God, seeing our need, chose to draw near and makes known the wonders of His love through His Son, Jesus Christ, just as He always promised:

The Lord your God is in your midst, a mighty one who will save;

he will rejoice over you with gladness; he will quiet you by his love; he will exult over you with loud singing.
