THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation: they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Lookbarg cattle in the suppose menths.

What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation work, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive.

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for.







Then There Were Three!

t Mary's has been supporting the local Trussell Trust Foodbank for some years now. We are well on the way to getting to a total of 2 tons of donations.

We started with a collecting box at the back of the church as our donation point. (which is still there). After about 6 months we added a second box in the Church Room. This was useful for people going to the Charity Shop and other events there.

Well now there is a third outlet for Hemyock folk to share their wish to help those in need of support. The Spar shop in Station Road has set up a collecting box in the shop giving an easy opportunity to donate. So special thanks to Kerstey and all in the Spar Shop for this move.

And thank you too to all of you who have been filling the boxes. In the current situation the Food Banks have been experiencing vastly increased demands. They feel the main causes of this are the numbers out of work or furloughed and the slow distribution of Universal Credit.

Don't forget that should you be in a position where the Foodbank might be of temporary use there you can get the initial help from the Hemyock Surgery.

The Wellington Foodbank at the moment is open on Thursday afternoons from 1.30pm to 2.30pm.

And the Next Job is...

ne of the "joys" of using a building of great age is the way what has been left can tell us all sorts of things about what has gone on over the years. Take a building like St Mary's and you have 900 years to contemplate. How do we know it is 900-because the building tells us so. Come into the ringing room...

The current ringing room was at one time the centre of the church and you can still see 3 typical Norman arches on the east, north and south sides of the tower. The Normans did a lot of building and the more they did the better they got. One area was the size of blocks that they could "cut" from the rock. Experts can tell by the size of block approximately when it was used. Our blocks at the base of the arches are of a size that suggests after 1110. But by 1130 the Normans were decorating their arches, often with zig-zag designs or semi round decoration. Our arches are plain, so the experts tell us they probably date from about 1120.

Go up our "folding" staircase (built in 1906) and come into the clock room. The clock has been there since 1747 (lesson in clock building and two ways of powering them). But the large pieces of timber have only been around since 1907. They show a bellhanger's solution to a problem of stopping the stresses of swinging bells. The walls at this level are a little narrower than at ground level but the weight of the bells is directed down onto the Norman walls.

Climb up the next stair and you are in the bell chamber. Hemyock's bells have quite an interesting history, and that's only the bits we know, There were 5 bells there in 1553 and we know that because the powers that were wanted an inventory of all church property. Where they came from we are not sure, a lot of the early records were lost during World War II.

What you see now is the layout as it was left in 1907 by one Harry Stokes a noted bell-hanger from Woodbury, and modified, with modern (I.e.1983) fittings by the workers of John Taylors Bell Foundry and Bellhangers of Loughborough.

You will note that the smallest bell is upon a frame on its own. This has its origins in the fact that the Church wardens in the mid 1850s decided that Hemyock should have 6 bells. The tale of its acquisition is another story but it arrived in 1858. Where to put it? They put in a separate frame above the others.

When Harry Stokes came along he did the same, but where as the earlier frame was of wood Harry was using steel. Now the top of the tower shows evidence of improved building skills dating from the 1300s, but also has been known for its ability to maintain damp conditions in its core. A mix of water, steel and time is not good and what we have at present is indicative of there being rusting of the steel inside the walls. The way out of this is to support the frame, expose the end of the beam check for rust and treat appropriately. All whilst making sure that the five and a half cwt (280Kg) of bell doesn't fall down and create more problems.

This will be a piece of work requiring some specialist help and the Church Council have decided to take the opportunity to refresh the whole of the tower which has not had major work done since the Bells were rehung in 1983. So there will be a top to bottom list of jobs to do.

This will not be cheap or quick, but then bell-ringing is a "slow" sort of occupation. The ringers think it would good if we could do all the items could be done in time for the next "Birthday" in the tower, in 2024. Then the 3rd bell will ring in its 400th anniversary. Watch this space.

St Mary's Charity Shop

A t the time of writing (mid January) the shop is closed along with all other Charity outlets. We cannot at present be sure when the Government will say that we can reopen but when we can we will be ready to serve you with all our bargains.

Pre-Christmas we were opening every Tuesday which seemed to please many of you. So we may well repeat this when the time comes to reopen the doors. We'll set up posters with the details, unless by chance the next "Pump" just happens to come along at the opportune moment.

Regular Charity Shop customers will know that usually on the first Saturday of February we give money away. Not to our customers but to local charitable groups, or groups like the Air Ambulance that aid the village. Despite all the problems of last year we WILL be doing this as usual - but not on the first Saturday of February. Obviously with restricted opening in 2020 we will not have so much to pass on, but once we are open again we will look at what we can do to help.

The Bowerman's of Hemyock and some Spanish Adventures

The arms shown below are from the Royal College of Arms and are those of the merchant class awarded to the Bowerman family of Oxfordshire, Hampshire, Wiltshire and Devon.

In 1515 a Nicholas Bowerman born in 1489 married Elizabeth Russell who had been born in 1478 in Kingston Russell, Dorset and was the daughter of James Russell and thus the brother of John Russell, the First Earl of Bedford and lived at Brook Manor on the Isle of Wight, a property that Nicholas had inherited from his Mother. Elizabeth may have previously married a John Bowerman who we believe died in 1508 and he may have lived at Whitehall Manor with Elizabeth until his death. Elizabeth's brother John was enobled by Henry VIII in in 1539 and became the principal aristocrat in the Western Counties as President of the King's Council of the West benefiting by the grant of the

buildings and land of the previous Dunkeswell Abbey, among other properties in the area. This may be the reason that his sister Elizabeth moved west to Whitehall Manor. Brooke Manor stayed in the Bowerman family for some 400years. Nicholas's brother Richard Bowerman inherited Austerborne Manor, we now know that this became the summer home of Queen Victoria and named Osborne house.

Nicholas and Elizabeth had at least four children; Margaret who was born on the Isle of Wight around 1516; William Bowerman and John Bowerman. William inherited Brooke Manor and John married a merchant's daughter Johanna Bickman from the Devon area and they lived at Whitehall Manor Hemyock. We John and Johanna had at least four children; John, James, Dionis and William. John died on 3rd July 1540 and William became canon of Wells.

The Bowerman's took ownership of Hemyock from the Corbett family. An entry in Magna Britannia Volume 6, Devonshire, published by T. Cadell and W Davies London 1822 simply states:


"The manor of Columb David, or Culme Davy, belonged, at a early period, to the family of Widworthy; and afterwards, successively, to Wogan, Corbett, and Bowerman. The last-mentioned family possessed it for 400 years, and then sold it about the beginning of the last century (c.1700?).

Their grandson James married Isabell Carvanell and set about building up their name as merchants in Devon and producing many children at Whitehall three in particular are worthy of further mention.

The three principal characters were Justice William who married Elizabeth at Wells Cathedral in 1596. William died in 1590 and Elizabeth in 1610, Hugh, who became Earl of Leigh and became an adventurer sailing with Francis Drake to Spain and the New World as did Simon.

The Bristol based Merchant Adventurers, as in other English ports, financed expeditions with the object of producing a good

return for the benefit of their families and the country. Of course modern scruples are questioning their approach. Since these were very dangerous activities with few authorities concerned and their lives at stake, risks were taken.



In 1564 Hugh Bowerman and a number of merchants wrote to the "Kynges Magestie and his Cownsell" to alert him to the fact one of their ships had been taken en route to Seville and the "maryners" clapped in irons but had broken no law. The ship contained cloth bound for Seville from Bristol. (Documents illustrating THE OVERSEAS TRADE OF BRISTOL in the sixteenth Century, vol XXXI, Bristol Record Society)

In the same publication we find a letter from Roger Howe to Alderman George Bond dated Seville 15th June 1585 which gives concern about two ships, the Manuwell and Gillian of London may be embargoed and their goods of oil bound for Simon Bourman (Hugh's brother). It was noted that ships were having their sails taken for what reason "It is reported that the King will make ready a hundred sail of ships, "but what to do the Lord knows."

Interestingly these embargoes were happening only 3 years before the Armada sailed for England. Are we seeing King Phillipe starting to equip his fleet by taking material from the English merchant ships? Simon however is not one to hide away,

OCTOBER 1601. A Spanish coast-guard galley from Cartagena (Colombia) sights an English pinnace with two prizes near Riohacha, capturing Capt. Simon Bourman and 38 of his crew members. (Born of a Spanish mother, this officer is eventually released upon the official cessation of hostilities three years later.). This Simon we speculate was the son of Lawrence Bowerman (son of James) and Katherine Cardwell a Spanish woman.

His brother, Hugh as Captain Hugh Bowerman, counsellor of England in Cadiz, Spain and local Governor served in Cadiz supporting his fellow adventurers. He died in Cadiz and has a very impressive tomb in Andalucia. There is an inscription stating that Manuel de Benavides, 4* Lord of Rozas, married Lady Cecilia Bowerman, comptesse of Leigh from Devonshire, England in Cadiz. Daughter of Captn. Hugh Bowerman, Earl of Leigh, counsellor of England in Cadiz, Spain. Governor of Cadiz & of the Fortress of St. Catherine in Cadiz. We are attempting to determine the dates of his service bearing in mind that Sir Francis Drake attacked Cadiz in 1587 which no doubt prompted King Philip to launch the Armada in 1588. Captain Hugh's service in Spain must have predated this fallout between England and Spain. Another breakdown in relationships between England and Spain after the joining of the crowns when Phillip married our Queen Mary.

Hemyock History Report

The report this month includes an article produced by Michael Bowerman and Michael Cooper on the Bowerman family who have a fascinating history involving the Culm David community.

The information is still being assembled so if anyone has any information that could be of assistance in completing an accurate report on this family we would very much appreciate their contribution.

Brian Samuels of the Charity Shop and the St Mary's ringers has suggested we also accumulate information on St Mary's hells

Hemyock had 5 bells at the time of the 1553 audit of churches where did they come from and when?

Do you have any information about German Prisoners of War?

This request has been received via the Devon Heritage Centre:

I am a third-year undergraduate History student at the University of Plymouth and am undertaking oral history research as part of the requirements for my final-year dissertation. My project explores the memory and experience of German Prisoners of War who were held in Devon during and after the Second World War. I am particularly interested in British attitudes towards the Prisoners of War, their employment whilst held in camps and after the end of the war as well as their socialisation with the Prisoners of War. I am hoping to carry out some informal interviews/discussions with people who would be willing, able, and happy to share their experiences. This could be German prisoners themselves, their wives and family members, those who employed them during and after the war and/or their family members also, or anyone with an experience they would like to share.

Prisoner captivity was a large part of the Second World War and various experiences of British soldiers have been shared over the years. However, the experiences of the German Prisoners of War within Devon are lesser known but are a significant part of our history. Many prisoners were employed on local farms with some even staying after the war to continue their work. I believe it is important to illuminate these unique experiences to ensure we do not forget them as the years pass on.

I would look to use these interviews within my dissertation and will ensure that participants fully understand the project, what is required of them, what they can expect of me, and how their interviews will be used, to ensure the consent they give is fully informed. In return, I would give acknowledgment to those who are happy to participate or redact/change names and details for those who wish.

Practical tips on staying positive and taking care of yourself during lockdown

It's normal to feel stressed, anxious or lonely when faced with staying indoors for long periods and interacting less with people, especially when that is added to the underlying stress of worrying whether you or your loved ones may be at risk. These feelings can affect anyone, of any age regardless of how much support you have around you. It is important to try and manage these feelings so they don't become overwhelming. Here are some practical ideas which may help:

Keep to a schedule

Even if you are staying at home, try to keep to a regular schedule as much as possible. While loneliness can feel like it will never end, trying to make these days feel as "normal" as possible will help you to get through. Start each day with a plan of a few things that you will do, keep a daily diary about how you are feeling and what you are doing, and keep a symptom log if you are managing illness. All of these tracking systems will help you to feel like you are being proactive about the situation.

Stay informed but don't overdo it!

Keeping up to date with health information and advice on precautionary measures is important but watching too much news, reading too many articles, and consuming too much online content can be overwhelming. You might decide to check the news twice a day. Or you might decide to limit your time on social media if everyone is talking about the virus. Make sure you seek websites or other sources that give factual and accurate information about what is happening and what you can do to stay safe and healthy, for example the NHS or local government.

Keep moving

We sometimes forget that our physical and mental health are delicately intertwined. If you spend weeks of isolation not getting any exercise at all, this will have a detrimental effect on your ability to cope mentally. Go for walks outside if you can, but even small tasks around the home or gentle stretching can help keep you moving and improve your mood. Breathing deeply for a few minutes can help you to feel calmer, less anxious and more energetic.

Do something meaningful or creative

Doing something meaningful or creative each day, even if only for a short period, will give you a sense of purpose and identity. Reach out to someone else and offer words of kindness and encouragement. You cannot "fix" someone else's feelings but kindness goes a long way and helping others can help you to feel less lonely or anxious yourself. Expressing yourself through creative means can also be therapeutic. Only you know what you will enjoy or find fulfilling, but below are some ideas to get you started:

- Create a family tree or photo album that you can share with others later
- Sign up to be a volunteer or reach out to someone you know who may be finding things difficult
- Sign up for an online/distance learning course and do

- some work each day
- Complete a painting, colouring, sewing or knitting project
- Choose a space in your home and reorganize or redecorate it by moving things around
- Try writing poetry or short stories
- Plant seeds or bulbs to grow indoors
- Try cooking or baking something new

Connect with others

While you may not be able to visit with family and friends in person, that does not mean that you cannot connect. If you are comfortable using technology, there are numerous ways you can stay in touch but try to make connections meaningful. If you prefer more traditional ways of communicating, you can send a handwritten letter or postcard to someone or call them on the telephone, particularly on days you are feeling low or lonely - they may be feeling the same way. Often just talking to someone can be an enormous help.

Find sources of comfort

Finding ways to give yourself comfort even when you are feeling lonely can help to improve your mental health. Below are some ideas of "comfort measures" that you can take even if you are alone.

- Give yourself a foot massage or soak
- Have a bath or shower
- Focus on your pet
- Prepare and enjoy healthy comfort food
- Watch favourite TV programmes or read favourite books
- Spend time in nature
- Have a cup of relaxing herbal tea
- Maintain a regular sleep routine

Distract yourself

Another way to boost your mental health is to find healthy distractions. This might come in the form of reading, watching television programmes about topics you like, listening to music, or finding other activities that interest you.

- Go back and re-read some of your favourite childhood books or choose a list of books you've always wanted to read
- \bullet Listen to audiobooks if you struggle to read
- Watch documentaries or films on topics of interest to you
- Listen to your favourite songs or play an instrument
- Play games that engage your mind such as Sudoku, puzzles, crosswords, solitaire or online chess.
- Make a virtual tour of an art gallery/museum or watch an online theatre production

Plan for the future

Feeling like life is on hold? While it might feel like this will last forever, there will come a time that you'll be back to your usual routines and spending time with others again. One way to feel less alone now is to make plans for when things have improved – what hobbies or activities might you be able to re-start, who will you arrange to see, is there a favourite place you could visit?

Be kind to yourself

Most importantly, be kind to yourself during this difficult time. If you find yourself saying things like "I shouldn't be feeling this way" or pushing away difficult emotions, this will only make loneliness or anxiety persist. Many people experience these feelings but find it difficult to acknowledge them. Instead of resisting your feelings, instead, try to accept them and understand that they will come and go. This helps to take away their power.

Finally - don't be scared to ask for help

If you find yourself with poor mental health and you aren't able to pull yourself out of feelings of anxiety, depression or fear, it is important to reach out for help. While it's normal to feel afraid and lonely at a time like this, worsening or ongoing feelings could indicate the need for outside help. There are many sources of support available, you can speak to your GP or Blackdown Support Group about the most relevant options for you.

She described playing in fields that are now housing estates and witnessed many changes during her life, as many of you here have.

At school she was sporty, something that stayed with her throughout her life. Whether playing tennis very well, or in later years home-made golf, she always did her best and usually won.

Before getting married she worked as a secretary for the Suez Canal Company, a position that made full use of the language skills she had acquired. These skills were useful throughout her life as we will see. A mother of four herself, once her children were old enough Mum trained to be a teacher. Trips to teacher training college with her friend Carol in Carol's old mini seemed to frequently involve breakdowns and always in the rain. Undeterred, Mum graduated and became a very popular teacher of infants, although apparently the quiet Mrs Dalton could really raise her voice when necessary. She and her remaining teacher friends were still in touch until very recently, such were the friendships she developed and maintained.

Retiring from teaching and with the children doing their own thing, she and husband Peter moved to Culmstock from Bedfordshire. This took everyone by surprise as they had

planned to retire to Norfolk where their respective families hailed from!

As a treat to themselves it was decided to holiday in Greece. Mum, calling on her language skills, learned Greek. Dad did not. Now in Greece, Mum would visit the local shop and converse with

the owner in Greek. To everyone's amusement Dad, believed to be one of a Greek speaking couple, would be talked to by the local men, much to his bafflement and their amusement.

Mum and Dad moved to Hemyock in 2000 and for the next 20 years Mum, a talented artist, enjoyed the painting group, travelling for painting holidays to Brittany as a guest of Roger and to Italy, having learned Italian. She helped the Friends of St Mary's with their activities and work, supported numerous fetes and events and attended Church where she also helped with the flower arranging.

She made many friends and it is good to see some of you here today as COVID-19 rules allow. She valued all of her friendships very much, was always pleased to share her painting tips, her garden and her time, and enjoyed just being a part of it all.

Mum has received a large number of cards which all describe a quiet, thoughtful, caring and talented woman who will be missed very much.

Thank you all for your friendship and for coming today.

After their marriage they moved to Castle Hill Farm and eventually moved from their house to a bungalow they had built naming it Rodleigh, farming the same land for nearly 50 years. 

The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial massage.

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. The Trustees are only too happy to consider any applications. Alternatively for more details please contact the secretary, Mrs Judy Barton on 01823 680975 or j.h.barton@hotmail. co.uk.

The Trustees are proud of the speed with which they are able to help patients and in many cases are able to provide financial assistance within two weeks.

Dear Residents

ever thought COVID would be as serious as it is looking, we need to be really careful, with vaccines now available, we will get over it. Devon County Council launch COVID-19 Fund to help communities.

Devon County Council has launched its third round of COVID-19 Funding to help provide valuable funding to organisations working in communities that have been affected by the coronavirus outbreak. The scheme launches this Monday (January 11, 2021) and grants of up to £700 are available. The funding aims to help voluntary and community groups to tackle the social and economic impacts of the virus outbreak and help those who are most vulnerable in their communities.

The new Oxford AstraZeneca vaccine is being given to the first people in Devon, with thousands more doses expected to be administered in coming days and weeks. Unlike the Pfizer vaccine, the first to be approved, the Oxford vaccine does not need to be stored at ultra-low temperatures and is much less complicated to move, making it easier for the NHS in Devon to vaccinate people in care homes and those who are housebound. The vaccine has been trialled at selected hospitals nationwide for surveillance purposes before being sent out to hundreds of community-based local vaccination services across the country. Devon County Council has a statutory responsibility each year to set a balanced budget. Financial targets are set for all the areas of activity that are undertaken by the County Council. Elected Members approve all budgets of the authority and, throughout the year, monitoring of expenditure and income is undertaken to ensure that spending remains under control.

The funding for the Council's budget currently comes from a number of sources including council tax, business rates, government grants, fees and charges.

I am sorry this is a bit heavy reading, but County is a big organisation and manages millions of pounds of our money, I thought you might like to know how we spend the money and where it comes from.

If there are any issues that you are concerned with, please let me know and I will do what I can to get them resolved. We know about the roads, it has been a difficult time, but I can assure you that our Highway Officer is on to it and getting it

- 1.1. This report outlines the financial position and forecast for the Authority at month 8 (to the end of November) of the financial year.
- 1.2. At month 8 it is estimated that budgets will overspend by £1.9millions, a reduction of £823,000 from month 6 forecast of £2.7 millions. If this overspending materialises then it can be accommodated by not making the full 2020/21 planned contribution to reserves which would leave the Council in a break-even position.
- 1.3. The Dedicated Schools Grant projected deficit, relating to Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), is forecast to be £30.4 millions, this is an increase of £2.6 millions since month 6. In line with Department of Education guidance this deficit will not be dealt with this financial year but carried to future years.
- 1.4. Central government has put in place a number of grant funding streams to help support Local Authorities during the pandemic. The confirmed additional funding Devon County Council is expecting to receive directly is £80.5 millions, these grants are detailed further within section 8.

On 17th December 2020 the Government published the Provisional Local Government Finance Settlement 2021/22 Excluding Government assumptions about council tax nationally, the increase in Government funding for the Council is £3.7 million or 2.2%. This includes:

- An additional £3.1 million from a new Social Care grant of £300 million nationally. This is to support both Children's and Adults Social Care;
- An increase in Devon's allocation of Rural Services Delivery Grant of £368,000;
- A reduction in New Home Bonus Grant of £957,000;
- Government compensation for no inflationary increase in the business rates multiplier of £1.2 million.
- Other social care grants continue with no inflationary increase.

For Council Tax, the Government has announced that: The Council Tax increase that will trigger the need for a referendum is 2%;

Local authorities can set an Adult Social Care Precept of up to 3%. If the full percentage is not used in 2021/22 there is an option to carry forward the unused amount to 2022/23;

A grant of £670 million nationally has been announced to offset some of the impact the Pandemic is having on the Council Tax Base for next year. Devon's share is £6.358 million;

A Council Tax Income Guarantee Scheme has been announced that will compensate authorities for 75% of irrecoverable losses in the current year.

The Government has also announced:

- Devon's share of national COVID funding for 2021/22 is £14.823 million.
- The continuation of the 75% Covid Sales Fees and Charges compensation scheme into the first quarter of 2021/22
- The Fairer Funding Review, 75% Business Rate Retention and the Business Rates Reset have been delayed.
- A public sector pay freeze has been announced, except for those earning less than £24,000 per annum who will receive an increase of at least £250. The pay freeze does not apply to front-line NHS staff; and
- The National Living Wage will increase by 2.2% next year to £8.91 per hour.

2021/22 Targets

- 3.1. Cabinet in December approved Revenue Spending Targets that totalled just over £571 million which represented an increase of £28.4 million or 5.2% and included savings of £15.3 million. Although that was only a few weeks ago much has happened. A new variant of the Coronavirus has been identified and the Country has entered another national lockdown. It is hard to imagine that a return to normal will happen quickly.
- 3.2. The changing circumstances has led to a review of the Targets. Some savings previously identified do not now seem feasible. Other areas need bolstering to increase the resilience of the Council. In summary the proposed changes are:
- Reduce planned savings by £3.7 million across Adult Care & Health, Children's Services and Highways, Infrastructure and Waste;
- Additional Investment of £302,000 in Legal Services to support Children's Services and Risk Management to support the whole organisation; and
- Additional £3.3 million to fund the cost of the 2.2% increase in the National Living Wage.
- 3.3. The proposed Budget Targets have increased by just under £7.3 million to nearly £578.5 million, an increase of 6.6% on the 2020/21 Budget.

Our Thatching Life featuring Ferrari the Thatcher and Daisy his apprentice...

ell in common with many, we have crept quietly out of last year into this. We are thankful to have work we can carry on with, and besides that, every year we both try and build on the last: The yard has young Peter Meyrick's fine gates in place and I've almost finished the stone wall next to it. I trialled what can only be described as an agricultural net curtain across one of the bays which lets light in but keeps rain out; much better for the reed and for us working under cover on rainy days.

The bats seem to like it too, as moths land on it providing an all-you-can-eat buffet for them, as evidenced by a pile of moth wings in the end of the barn. My tractor has recently been covered by Tawny owl droppings and pellets, although Daisy was none too pleased when she found me dissecting a pellet in her kitchen. The little black rescue kitten is on its way to being a good mouser and fine company, following me about the yard and trying to steal into my van anytime I open the door.

We've got our own pork and now our own beef to eat, which is just as well as since before Christmas, shopping trips have either been done early, late or on the off-chance when we spot an empty carpark next to the shop. We've a carpet of squashes in my cellar at home thanks to my Dad's loan of half his veg patch this year. It'll keep us in soups and risottos for weeks to come, which we might need if it comes in cold again.

The biggest challenges to us at the moment are supply chains and demand. Our suppliers have warned of higher costs of imported water reed due to the ports getting used to the new routines, and on top of that last year's wheat reed harvest in the uk was much reduced, with all stocks spoken for already and prices having shot up by 13%. Once again we are in the position of hoping for a 'normal' year for the new wheat reed harvest

We've been lucky to be re-thatching a roof close to home this winter, but it's a big one and I expect our customers feel like we've been there for a decade already, with the next customers in line feeling like they've been abandoned in the last decade. People often ask if we work in the winter, and the answer is always 'Yes!', but lack of daylight, poor weather and Christmas all conspire to make it feel like we've been there forever. We are on the home run now tho' with one wrap left to go before ridging, cutting out the eaves all nice and tidy, and an almighty great tidy up.

There's no doubt these times are harder on our children with their lives on pause, and hardest on our elders while they wait for their vaccinations and for some semblance of normal family life to return. And so we wait; for vaccines, hugs, harvests. And hope. Daisy is better at hoping than me as a rule; she carries it with her, an air of 'everything will be alright in the end'. I can feel it coming up the ladder before she does, and so our day begins.

Clayhidon Parish Hall

layhidon Parish Hall has been closed for most of 2020, but thanks to Zoom the committee has continued to hold online meetings and lay plans for the time when the COVID-19 pandemic is over.

Members decided at their December meeting to press ahead with finishing the hall extension project while adding major improvements to the original building, namely new insulation and a kitchen refit.

This follows a survey of local opinion, in which 60 per cent of respondents expressed the wish to continue the project rather than try to build a completely new hall if funds became available.

Planning permission for the extension has expired and so the plans – for new toilets, an artists dressing room/small meeting room and parish archive – will have to be resubmitted to Mid Devon Council

An essential modern requirement for attracting funding is that the hall is run by a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). The committee has agreed its new constitution and this will be submitted to the Charity Commission and once approved it will hand over ownership and responsibility for the hall to the new body.

News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

I'm sure I wasn't alone in feeling a deep sense of sadness and frustration when a 3rd national lockdown was announced at the beginning of this year. Of course, we fully support the measures necessary for protecting the NHS and saving lives. As such, although places of worship were allowed to remain open, we decided to close the chapel building and stand alongside our community as we seek to curtail the spread of Covid-19.

Nevertheless, I felt a now familiar feeling of disappointment as I arrived at chapel to record the first online service of a new lockdown. And yet, alongside the familiar feeling of frustration, I encountered something else that had become a familiar experience in the year past – encouragement. As I walked into the cold chapel building, I found that a member of our fellowship had, in the days previous, installed an electric heater so that I could feel warm whilst recording. It may sound like a small thing but aren't these often the most profound.

With the news of another lockdown came the stark warnings that the worst was yet to come. According to one article I read, 'a storm was coming.' A headline such as this could cause further despondency and fear, but this last year has taught me that sometimes it takes a storm to help us discover and treasure love and mercy: A neighbour checking in to see if we are ok; a local volunteer delivering groceries with the warmth of human contact we so desperately need; and the kind experienced when a tired pastor receives a photo of a smiling family ready for the next online service. This is true of our relationship with God... sometimes it takes a storm to discover how wide his love and mercy is for us!

The other day, I was reading about 'Jesus calming the storm' in Mark's gospel (Mark 4:35-41). It is an incredible account that reveals Jesus to be the God of all creation as he holds command over the waves of the sea and saves his disciples. It's an account that demonstrates the power of the Lord to speak peace into

and over our lives. It's an account that is also included in the gospels of Matthew (8:23-27) and Luke (8:22-25). And yet, it is only in Mark's gospel that we read that the disciple's boat was not alone on the water that day. Other boats were with them (35-36):

"...but this last year has taught me that sometimes it takes a storm to help us discover and treasure love and mercy"

That day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. **There were also other boats with him**.

It is an incredible act of mercy as Jesus saves his disciples from that which fears them, the storm which arose whilst they were on Lake Gennesaret. But, as I read from Mark's gospel, and as this minor detail jumped out at me, I realised I had missed how wide this act of mercy was. It was not the disciples alone who were saved, but those also in the other boats. How often is this the case in our lives? We miss the fullness of what God is doing and, as such, miss just how wide his mercy and love really is.

Our vision is limited, we cannot perceive the full extent of what

God, in his mercy, is doing among us, even in the storm. We are challenged to open our eyes to the reality of a God whose mercy and love is wider than we can comprehend. As Frederick William Faber penned:

There's a wideness in God's mercy, like the wideness of the sea; there's a kindness in his justice which is more than liberty.

For the love of God is broader than the measure of our mind; and the heart of the eternal is most wonderfully kind.

In the year ahead, our hope as a fellowship, is that we may continue to trust in the God who speaks peace into and over the storm. The God who brings peace into our lives. The God whose love and mercy, revealed in Jesus Christ, is far wider than we can comprehend. And, as we look to Christ in the storm, we may continue to love, comfort and strengthen one another.

Could your local churchyard be the best in Devon this year?

uring the pandemic, Devon's residents have appreciated the green spaces around their churches like never before and now Devon CPRE is inviting churches of all denominations to enter this year's competition to find the 'Best Churchyard' in the whole of the county.

Following a year with little to celebrate, Devon CPRE applauds the volunteers helping to maintain and 'green up' Devon's churchyards. During the challenging months of lockdown, many churchyards have become real sanctuaries for the local community - not just for churchgoers. In some places, they are the only public space people can walk to for exercise and to observe nature.

This is the fourth year the Devon countryside charity has held its churchyard awards and it's hoping to receive more entries than ever by the end of March. The judges are not seeking the most pristine or manicured churchyards. They are looking for those which are well-managed to provide a peaceful haven for people and wildlife. Each entry is visited by the judges and assessed on a range of criteria, including the measures put in place to increase biodiversity.

Penny Mills, Director of Devon CPRE, says, "Devon has hundreds of beautiful churchyards and they've really come into their own during the challenging circumstances of 2020. Residents the length and breadth of Devon have appreciated their local churchyard like never before, so we want to really celebrate these special places in 2021 and celebrate the people who look after them - because they are all volunteers and they do a fantastic job."

CPRE Devon trustee and fellow churchyard judge Ivan Buxton has been impressed by the standard of entries year on year: "We were particularly impressed by the careful management of these ancient burial grounds to create sanctuaries for the living. Measures to encourage wildlife and biodiversity have included bug hotels, mini-beast trails, ponds, bird boxes, composting areas, wildflower meadows and even gardens producing fruit, vegetables and herbs for parishioners to enjoy."

Because of Covid-19 restrictions, last year's competition had to be run differently to previous years. The judges waited until after Lockdown travel restrictions were lifted in the summer to begin their on-site inspections. There was no official prize-giving ceremony in 2020 but the Winner and Runner-up were presented with their trophies in person, in informal visits observing strict social distancing. This year's competition will be conducted along similar lines.

Which Devon churchyards will make the shortlist in 2021? As well as the kudos of winning, there's a top prize of £200 and a beautiful oak plaque, made in Devon from sustainable wood, to display to locals and visitors.

NEWS FROM COLDHARBOUR MILL

In the 2021 New Year Honours list, John Jasper, volunteer at Coldharbour Mill Working Wool Museum and Wellington Arts Association received the British Empire Medal for services to Cultural Heritage in Devon and Somerset.



John has been a volunteer at Coldharbour Mill for 30 years. Without him it is doubtful that anyone would have had the knowledge or commitment to successfully lead the volunteer 'Steam Team' to return the dilapidated steam plant to operation. John has been the driving force to return the Mill's rare and original steam plant and associated engines to full working order, to lead a team of dedicated volunteers to operate the historic Steam Complex for the public at regular Steam Up! events throughout the year, manage the labour-intensive annual insurance inspection process, and continue improvements to the Museum's many machines by managing regular work days of volunteers.

Undoubtedly, his greatest achievement was to oversee the rescue, restoration and installation by the steam volunteers of the 1867 Kittoe and Brotherhood Beam Engine in the Beam Engine House, replacing the original 1865 model that had sadly been scrapped in an earlier era. To not only re-assemble it from scratch but then to successfully steam it for the public to enjoy is an amazing achievement and a terrific legacy. John has recounted the full five-year story in 'The Beam Engine Story' on the Mill website: https://www.coldharbourmill.org. uk/the-beam-engine-story/

Unfortunately, owing to the current situation we will not be able to hold our Steam Days for a while, but John and his team will continue to keep the machinery in working order until things return to normal.

Although the Mill is closed to the public at present, we are all working hard on many ongoing projects and preparing for reopening when it is allowed.

A huge thank you to all the volunteers who have been helping to get the Mill back in order, as well as those who have been supporting us from a distance.

Blackdown Hills Repair Café

Blackdown Hills Repair Café will continue to offer a repair service from home, when the lockdown is once again lifted. Throughout the last period when the Repair Cafe was not able to run from its normal premises at the Hemyock Parish Hall, Stephan Lehner and the Blackdown Hills Repair Café repairers have been hard at work repairing a wide variety of items from televisions to toasters, shears to spades and radios to wristwatches.

Stephan has been travelling the Blackdown Hills picking up items for repair and dropping them off to repairers in the area to save as many items from landfill as possible.

The total repairs carried out is 184 items, with over 85% of these successfully repaired and saved from Landfill. Working on approximate weights of items, this means the repair café have saved between 230 and 240 kilograms of items from going to landfill

The results speak for themselves and demonstrate how the repair café can help the local community and also prevent further contamination of the environment.

A New Vision for Fox's Field, Wellington

Tellington Mills CIC and Transition Town Wellington are delighted to be working with Somerset West and Taunton council on plans to protect, regenerate and restore Fox's Field as an open, green space for the whole community. The field, a popular walking spot beside the old mill buildings at Tonedale, has been brought into public ownership for the first time.

The first community consultation event about the project will be held on Saturday 6th March 2021 at 11am. All are warmly welcomed. This will be held online (details on the groups' respective websites and FB pages), and will be the first of a series of public events in a wide variety of formats over the coming months.

Cllr Mark Lithgow, representing Wellington North on Somerset West and Taunton council, said: "I am very pleased to support the TTW and CIC collaboration, working together to become the guardians of the recently purchased Fox's Field. Both groups are run by dedicated volunteers who have cared for our environment for many years. I am looking forward to seeing and enjoying the results of this collaboration," said Cllr Mark Lithgow, representing Wellington North on Somerset West and Taunton council.

Helen Gillingham and the TTW community gardening team have been looking into the idea of creating a forest garden on part of the site. A forest garden emulates a woodland edge with a mix of perennial plants that can feed either humans, wildlife or each other. It is a patchwork of open spaces, canopy trees, understorey shrubs, ground-cover and climbing plants. "It's not only beautiful but also provides a useful harvest and makes an ideal habitat for pollinators, birds and other wildlife," explained Helen. "It's a fantastic way to grow food, locally, in a way that doesn't harm the environment and is great for people and wildlife."





Local resident Gina Deacon, who launched the initial campaign to save the field from being sold for development, is delighted with the news: "Fox's Field is a very important environmental resource in our community... especially for those like me, who need to mobilise for health reasons, with their dogs, or just to enjoy walking. Not forgetting the wildlife too, who need the green belt to survive."

"We're keen to hear any ideas that would attract wildlife and allow everyone in the community to enjoy this beautiful space," said Anita Roy, who works with both the CIC and TTW. "We've seen from lockdown that green spaces like this are absolutely vital for our physical and mental health. And with the changing weather patterns, increased flooding and the loss of wildlife, we need to find ways to work with nature to restore ecosystems."

The community groups are looking forward to coming up with plans that aim to enhance biodiversity, increase the soil health, and allow people to continue to enjoy and have access to this vital open space for years to come.




