





THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation: they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months.











uke of Burgundy and Wood White butterflies, just some of the species your work would help conserve.

What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation work, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive.

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for.







'Constant change is here to stay.' Although 1st September is officially the start of autumn, we are still in the transitional time of the seasons changing as we move into October. Not till we're into November do we generally begin to feel that winter is on its way.

Times of transition are always unsettling because they demand changes of us. We'll need to stop doing some things, and start doing others in order to adapt to our new and changing situation.

The months of October and November bring us face-toface with change and transition on the mega scale at the same time that we move through our own little changes of winter woollies instead of T-shirts and hot soup for lunch instead of salad!

October brings us first of all Harvest festival, a time to look back with thankfulness for all the good we have received, all the good things that sustain and nourish our lives. And the change demanded of us now is our commitment to live our lives and to conduct our agriculture, trade and business in a way enhances the sustainability of our world for the future. Uncomfortable but necessary adaptation to the changing context in which we live.

The turn from October into November brings us All Saints tide. All Saints Day is celebrated on the 1st of November. It is a day when we give thanks for the persistence and courage of those who have left the world a better place as a result of their living. We remember in particular people whose faith in God led them to live out the teachings of Jesus, pursuing all that makes for peace. We remember, too, those whom we have loved and

lost, whose companionship has had a powerful influence on us, and whom we continue to miss dearly. These are significant dates on which to reflect, give thanks, and entrust ourselves and those we love into God's loving care. Each year, this calls for more transition, further adaptation to our changing context.

November brings us the remembrance of massive world conflicts. Thank God we have a tradition which almost forces us to stop and recognise the enormity of what humankind has done to itself - mostly for evil, but also for good. We cannot escape the interconnectedness of the two, the complexity of our motivations, and the lack of easy answers in working out how to live peaceably together on this planet. No wonder we need to turn back to our creator to seek wisdom. The world does not get any simpler because the human heart doesn't change. Our prayers this month are very much for an openness to the Spirit of God, who specialises in bringing order out of chaos, and resolution out of conflict. At the same time we commit ourselves to setting aside our desire to succeed at the expense of others, whether on the personal or international levels, so that true community can flourish.

Significant transition points like these are often best reflected on and managed in company with others. So the church offers spaces to do so. The schedules you find in these pages give you details of the harvest celebrations, the All Souls tide services of quiet reflection, and the November Remembrance services. You are most welcome to drop in and to find sustenance and strength for the transitions.

However there is one piece of work which will get done before most of the other work is even priced. Our trusty weather vane Cockerel is due for his next "wash and brush up", which he gets about every 4 years.

Now you may not have wondered why a lot of churches have a bird as their weather vane body, I must admit I'd never thought about it, it was the norm! But then I read the following. A 9th century Pope decided that every church should display a cockerel on their towers or steeples as a reminder of the denial of the disciple Peter that he knew Jesus. That was OK but when the weather got windy the cocks went tumbling. Someone then had the idea of making them swivel, and then someone added directional arms and, hey presto, we knew where the wind was coming from.

Our cockerel was made in 1751; we know that as the maker scratched the date onto his comb. We discovered many years ago that he had originally been painted black, and a bit of research found that in the C18th there was a common farmyard bird with a tail just like our pride and joy.

So if you look up and see that he is misssing, fret not. He will be back soon!

Hemyock History Group

he History Group have started their live talks in the Church Room this month with an entertaining and informative talk by Mrs Pauline Rossell on the history of the conflict in South Africa which culminated in the 1st and 2nd Boer Wars. The ending of these wars is celebrated in Hemyock by the erection of the Pump at the bottom of the High Street. The reasons why Britain sent an army of 500,000 to South Africa were lost in the practicalities of survival in a foreign land against very different peoples of both white and black skin. As usual the muddles of finding provisions, organising camps, keeping people on one side alive with the costs mounting, while keeping the enemy at bay and once captured, in prison camps soon overtook the initial justification for the whole enterprise.

We have talks arranged for October 21st when local resident Mark Farrell will talk about his family's journey from Hemyock overland to Tokyo, Japan for the 2019 Rugby World Cup. There were two very short trips over sea, the initial channel crossing and the final ferry across to Japan from, was it Russia or China? Come along on the 21st to find out, plus the interesting 7,291 miles overland!

The talk on November 18th will be by new resident Piers Langdon on the country where he grew up, Ethiopia. A fascinating country invaded by Italy in 1935, with a previous incursion in 1895. After so long clinging to our hearths in Hemyock we can now widen our horizons if not in person, by listening to experienced travellers.

We had a very good History Talk over zoom, courtesy of Halberton and Uffculme History Groups on Wednesday 8th September. We were only informed the previous day about the talk by Liz Shakespeare, a published author, about her new book on Edward Capern, the Rural Postman who composed poems on his rounds in North Devon in Bideford and Buckland Brewer. Liz has researched his life, his work as an honoured Royal Postman, his poems and songs and written a wonderful novel based on her research. Edward attended school for only 4 months, but his Mother encouraged him to learn about rural life in the area and to expand his horizons into literature and the arts. However as a poor family in a poor area, the prospects for young men to find paid employment were few and arduous. At the age of 9 he took employment at the Derby Lace Factory which employed over 1,000 people working over 10 hours a day every day. His small fingers could thread bobbins along with all the other bobbin boys. Edward also tried shoemaking and came into contact with a William Rock, whose father was a shoemaker in the High Street and also a freeman of the borough of Barnstable. The local MP noticed William and arranged for him to go to Christ's Hospital School in London and he became a wealthy man and was able to return the good turn to another local lad, Edward, by arranging that he join his literary society in Barnstable. The local MP, John Fortescue also supported this society and arranged for Edward Capern who had become proficient in reading to become a Royal Postman in the local area. Although there were food riots in the area at this time Edward was encouraged not to become involved and concentrate on his royal postal duties at an income that he could support his family together with his wife who worked as a milliner. The round was a 13 mile walk with a 2 hour stop so that people could reply to the letters they received taking in Bideford and Buckland Brewer. He would compose his poems while walking, repeating them so that he could memorise them and write in his notebook at his half way spot and when he arrived home in the evening.

The poems were also suited to become songs and have now been recorded onto CD's by Nick Wyke and Becki Driscoll. Edward became well known for his poems and John Fortescue MP arranged for the poems to be assembled into an anthology which were published due to support from a number of prominent Victorian supporters. The cost of publishing such an anthology was expensive but the 500 subscribers who underwrote the publication included Tennyson, Charles Dickens, the Prime Minister, Lord Palmerston, plus 5 Dukes and as a consequence a printing run of 500 copies was achieved.

The financial rewards of the publication enabled Edward and his wife, Jane, some comforts and security in later life. Many such Victorians had used writing of one sort or another to improve their lives while providing the means for the next generation to learn about life and how to achieve their dreams. In fact our British heritage of prose writing of Walter Scott, Charles Dickens and Trollope with poems from Robbie Burns, Dylan Thomas and W B Yeats among others have led many a youth to chart a successful path to distinction. What a rich heritage we have.

The book written by Liz about Edward and Jane is available from her website for £9.99 or if you would like to borrow it from our library please let me know.

Pauline Rossell started her talk with the early history of South Africa when the Dutch set up a trading base at Cape Town in 1652 for their ships to take on provisions en route to the Dutch Spice Islands. Of course the British needed a similar base for their ships en route to India. The two nations shared the port amicably for many years and in 1688 many French Huguenots, escaping the persecution in France, moved to Holland and then to the Cape Colony. In 1795, France occupied the Seven Provinces of the Dutch Republic, the mother country of the Dutch East India Company. This prompted Great Britain to occupy the Cape Colony in 1795 as a way to better control the seas in order to stop any potential French attempt to reach India. The British started to settle the eastern border of the cape colony, with the arrival in Port Elizabeth of the 1820 Settlers. They also began to introduce the first rudimentary rights for the Cape's Black African population and, in 1834, abolished slavery. The resentment that the Boers felt against this social change, as well as the imposition of English language and culture, caused them to trek inland en masse. This was known as the Great Trek, and the migrating Boers settled inland, eventually forming the Boer Republics. The term Boer was coined from the Dutch word for farmer. However, the discovery of diamonds around Kimberley and gold in the Transvaal led to a return to instability, particularly because they fuelled the rise to power of the ambitious imperialist Cecil Rhodes. On becoming the Cape's Prime Minister in 1890. he instigated a rapid expansion of British influence into the hinterland. In particular, he sought to engineer the conquest of the Transvaal, and although his ill-fated Jameson Raid failed and brought down his government, it led to the Second Boer War and British conquest at the turn of the century. The politics of the colony consequently came to be increasingly dominated by tensions between the British colonists and the Boers. Rhodes also brought in the first formal restrictions on the political rights of the Cape of Good Hope's black African citizens.

I think we are all familiar with the subsequent troubles that the country has suffered, accepting that the Country has a huge rich landmass supporting wildlife and domesticated animals in great numbers. It also has rich mineral reserves a wonderful climate and massive prospects. We thank Pauline and Philip for their hard work in preparing the talk and introducing Hemyock residents to the wonderful geography and history of this very attractive country. We also welcome them to our community as hard working residents who will enrich our knowledge of the world.

We look forward to the upcoming talks from Mark Farrell, Piers Langdon, John Ward and Michael Bowerman. We welcome anyone who is willing to talk to us about interesting historical subjects that would broaden our knowledge of the world and provide some varied backgrounds from our lovely community.

The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial massage.

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. The Trustees are only too happy to consider any applications. Alternatively for more details please contact the secretary, Mrs Judy Barton on 01823 680975 or j.h.barton@hotmail. co.uk.

The Trustees are proud of the speed with which they are able to help patients and in many cases are able to provide financial assistance within two weeks.

The following was received from **David Ball** in early September.

RBL Pedal to Paris

Have reached Beauvais. 60 miles tomorrow and we'll be in Paris at the Arc de Triomphe. Maybe worth noting that the French only close the Arc de Triomphe twice in a year, once for Bastille Day and once for RBL's Pedal to Paris. We have had a superb and genuine welcome from many French citizens. They are very genuinely appreciative of British help in WW1 & WW2 in their hours of need.

We have attended ceremonies at Calais, Abbeville, Auchy la Montagne and today at Beauvais at their war memorials to mark RBL's association with their work for veterans, the 25th anniversary of Pedal to Paris and the historic significance of Allied forces making such a difference to the outcome of the wars. A staggering fact delivered was that 3000 British soldiers defended Calais citadel to occupy the Germans as Dunkirk was being evacuated. I think only 50 returned home, without being killed or captured.

It's been a moving experience as my grandfather fought at Ypres and the Somme in WW1 and my father flew 21 missions across the Channel with Bomber Command on WW2.

All praise to 7 year old **Daniel** who, when out walking with his elderly friend **Martin**, was shocked when Martin fell at the top of the Recreation Field injuring himself and was unable to get up. Daniel ran to our house to get help. David and some men working at the Bowling Green fetched a wheelchair and took Martin to the Surgery who was then taken to hospital to have his cuts and bruises attended to. **Well Done Daniel**!

It is perhaps only in a time of crisis or great sadness that we really appreciate the caring community we live in. Cards, letters, a word of kindness can mean so much. It is though in the following weeks and months, when perhaps one is living alone for the first time for many years, that the unexpected phone call, visit or chat is really appreciated and help in a day of loneliness. Hopefully none of us will be guilty of assuming a mysterious 'someone else' will be the one to reach out. Let us be that person.

The following tributes have been received

Julie Summers.

Those who knew Julie well would associate her with the words courageous, brave, positive, selfless, happy, a wonderful smile and an unconquerable spirit.

Julie was born on 14th June 1960 in Topsham and grew up in the Whipton area of Exeter with her younger sister Diana and attended schools in Pinhoe and Broadclyst. Sadly, when she was 14 her mum died of Breast Cancer aged 35. Some of Julie's later teenage years were spent just outside of Kentisbeare with her Uncle, Aunty and cousins

She'd often recall the time she was staying with her sister in her Gran's pub the Four Horse Shoes, now known as Keepers Cottage, thinking one of the dogs was being naughty when, in fact, it was an armed robbery.... Luckily no one was majorly hurt.

It was on a coach trip to Windsor Castle in 1978 where Julie and Leonard first met and two years later on April 19th there were married at Kentisbeare Church and took their honeymoon in Jersey.

Stuart was born in 1982 and it was less than 12 months later the couple bought a house in Hollingarth Way here in Hemyock. Sarah, came long in 1984. The family continued to grow in 2009 when Sarah had Julie and Len's first Grandchild, Summer, followed by Chloe in 2010 and Henry in 2013. Stuart and Libby had Poppy in 2014 followed by Martha in 2016. All grandchildren have benefited from the unconditional love and devotion Julie brought to family life; so much so that on Superhero Day at school a couple of years ago, Chloe decided to go as "Nanny" and wore some of Julie's old glasses and one of her wigs from when she had chemotherapy.

The last 27 years have been a personal health battle for Julie and a battle she kept mainly private and never let it get in the way of her life. In 1994 she was diagnosed with Breast Cancer for the first time and underwent surgery and intense radiotherapy in Bristol. In 2007 the cancer returned. She underwent more surgery and this time chemotherapy. In 2016 the cancer returned to Mum's back and lungs and from this point on she had to "live" with cancer.

You'd never hear Julie complaining, not once. She always kept a positive frame of mind and it seems many people in the village simply did not realise how much she has been through. This is a credit to her utter determination not to let cancer get the better of her and in the last 15 years she has certainly done the most to live life to the full.

Julie and Len visited multiple countries across the globe and created many memories – one being a holiday in Florida in 1993 they also visited Australia twice and saw England get beaten in the Ashes series. Other trips saw them in New Zealand, Singapore, Canada and multiple European Cruises exploring as many European Cities as they possibly could.

Julie managed to fulfill many dreams and desires throughout her life – she has had her convertible car, followed and enjoyed being part of a racehorse consortium, raised many thousands of pounds for charity, eaten in places such as the Ritz in London and been to see Wimbledon. Many people dream and never do - Julie certainly did what she could.

Living in Hemyock for nearly 39 years Julie embraced village life. She was the local lollipop lady for 15 years, she also worked in both the Spar shop and then the Post Office right up until the start of the pandemic. She was an active playing member of the Bowling Club until 2014 and the couple always attended the regular Friday Night socials at the green.

The family were well aware that Julie played the guitar and saxophone but didn't realise she was in a band that recorded a record in her secondary school years and in lockdown she bought herself a clarinet and started teaching herself – she played happy birthday to Summer on the clarinet in March this year; since 1985 she kept a daily diary; and she always had a chocolate stash hidden away from Leonard.... but what the family didn't know until she passed away was that she not only had one stash – she had multiple piles of chocolate hidden away throughout the house!

Julie never thought she'd reach the age of 40, she reached 61. Julie never thought she'd see any grandchildren, she has 5. In the 2020 pandemic she celebrated her 40th wedding anniversary with Leonard in their garden, and her 60th also in the garden with her immediate family. Just how she would have wanted it.

The family really do hope Julie's spirit lives on in them all and they do her proud. A greatly loved wife, mother and grandmother. Rest in Peace.

Remembering Peter Peter Doble [1947 - 2021]

The eldest of four children born to Stanley and Evelyn of Station Road, Hemyock, Peter went to the primary school and, having passed the eleven-plus went on to Tiverton Grammar School.

He was good at languages and Jenny remembers attending a school play in French, not understanding much of the dialogue but being very impressed by his performance!

Jill remembers us as a family, going to North Wales for a holiday. Peter had his French exchange student Pierre, staying with us, so he must have been about fourteen and she was eight. Peter, being adventurous, decided he was going to do some serious cliff climbing and somehow Jill was daft enough to tag along with him. He had a good telling off on their return, by mum, who had been worried to death. Thankfully they returned unscathed, but a little wiser. She also recollects, "Peter, the school bus is here!" Mum calling, third time. Peter slowly descended the stairs, hunting for school blazer and cap. Having found them, sauntered out through the door towards the Blue Venture, only to be greeted by the "Late again Doble!" greeting of the bus driver. Peter always had a strong sense of justice and reminded her more recently, the reason he didn't hurry was because the bus driver would then drive to his mother's house for breakfast while keeping all his passengers waiting.

A post about Peter's death was placed on the TGS Facebook site and there were a number of comments showing how well liked and remembered he was.

Peter was the most musical of us, taking after our mother, and learnt to play the organ. Stephen remembers going to a small church in Wales where Peter persuaded him to work the bellows while he played. He was interested in so many things – photography, travel, history, politics, steam trains to name a few. The latter was well echoed by the huge model railway that he built up and which he and Stephen spent many happy hours maintaining and developing. And, he loved his cats!

He used to work at Father's Garage on Saturdays but he also delivered the Christmas post – always a nice job for students. From school he went on to Nottingham University to study French and German. Following a sandwich year in France, Peter completed his degree and was able to get a teaching post in Switzerland. He met and fell in love with Marinette and fiftyone years ago they married – a civil ceremony taking place in Switzerland followed by a service of blessing at Hemyock Parish Church. Whether our father ever entertained the hope that Peter would one day enter the business is unlikely. He felt that the garage business was becoming overly regulated and fraught with conditions that made life difficult. For this reason, he never encouraged either Peter or Stephen to take it on.

Sue Bennett, Simon, Emma and Ruth and their families want to say **thank you so much to everyone** who sent flowers, cards and expressions of sympathy following the death of Tony on 27th August. He had spent a week in Musgrove Park suffering from pneumonia & complications of Alzheimers and Vascular dementia but was made comfortable at the end by the loving staff of Camelot Lodge. He died with Sue beside him and with his dignity intact. We will remember his smile.

However, he remained a loyal customer of British cars. The first of these being a loved Austin Cambridge which he drove from about 1970. Both parents were really proud of his achievements in gaining a good degree and then a post teaching English in a Swiss school in Geneva where he lived since 1969.

In 1978/9 he took time out to study English Literature at Keele University and undoubtedly his Swiss students benefited from this on his return. This was a year well remembered by Stephen who was living nearby. They had a shared love of a very old-fashioned cheese shop in Market Drayton. Visits there would often be followed with a cheese fondue that evening. They often lamented the disappearance of such shops. Stephen also recalls a village fete that Peter had volunteered to help with. Particularly memorable as they both ran a stall where a local celebrity would put their head through a hole in a board for locals to throw wet sponges at. The celebrity turned out to be Gordon Banks, the England goalkeeper. It was a thoroughly enjoyable event.

Peter travelled all over the world with Marinette, almost always primarily to see the wildlife. However, he loved Hemyock and came back often, both when our parents were alive and since then catching up with family and friends.

He was a very good teacher and thoroughly enjoyed his work. He organised trips and exchanges to England for groups of students, going out of his way to include those from less advantaged backgrounds. These were always popular and well subscribed taking in such things as The Beatles Tour in Liverpool and engaging the help of a large Chinese restaurant in Manchester where the students were allowed to assist with preparing all sorts of delicacies.

Doubtless for going the extra mile, Peter was very much liked and appreciated by both his colleagues and students. He kept in touch with some of his students (mainly female, by the way!) and had weekly meals with two or three of his younger colleagues. One of them, Pierre-André, made a moving speech at Peter's funeral. Moreover, he went to monthly lunches with what they called "les Anciens", i.e., retired colleagues. He was always ready to help young people with brushing up their English, including Marinette's niece. He had been very active and appreciated in the Church of Scotland for some 30 years until they apparently decided to change their hymn book. This so incensed Peter that he left them for the Church of England where he also made a lot of friends. A Scot who Peter met in the Church of Scotland and happened to be a colleague and good friend of Marinette, wrote a very nice homage in a card she sent. Marinette asked her permission to quote it; "He really was the epitome of an English gentleman: kind, courteous, intelligent, interested in others, open-minded and with a lively sense of humour. Peter was truly "the best of British" (that, coming from a Scottish girl!) "and I feel very lucky to have known him. He was one of a very rare breed these days". Marinette adds "he was a very good husband, patient, calm (most of the time!) and loving, although he did not make a show of it."

Quick-witted and clever, we used to joke that he had some traits in common with Europeans e.g., impatience, especially at the wheel! However, he did mellow (as perhaps we all do) with age and he was a caring, generous brother, quick to help out where there was a need. In more recent years, Peter would frequently telephone his brother whilst taking a bath. Conversations punctuated with splashing noises, much to Stephen's

amusement. Latterly, particularly during the Pandemic, we siblings were in more regular communication. How precious the long phone calls with Peter seem now as well as the briefer, jokey repartees on WhatsApp.

He had a lively mind and was genuinely interested in people, not just the big things but the details of everyday life, as often passing on a practical tip as recommending a film to see, place to visit or, most often, a good restaurant.

In recent years Peter suffered with mobility problems and endured some major surgery. Results were often disappointing but he never let his health problems define him. He adapted with cheerfulness and positivity to a more limited way of life, finding pleasure in watching Countdown and, over the last few months, writing letters to the Sunday Times, frequently taking a provocative position and then relishing the challenge of answering those that disagreed with him. His mobility had actually improved latterly; he was able, with the help and encouragement of a physiotherapist to walk uphill and longer distances. Jenny, Jill and Stephen had great hopes of him resuming his regular visits 'home' but sadly this was not to be.

Thank you to everyone who has expressed their sympathy and memories of Peter. It's great to know he was held in high regard by so many.

To us siblings he was 'Big Brother'; in teenage years quite a tease but in later years a great friend. He was much loved and is missed in equal measure.

Christine Sharp was born in Gosport in 1930 and later trained in London as a florist and then worked in her father's business. On a camping trip she met Gordon Sharp who she married in 1957. Gordon was in the Merchant Navy, and this took them to the Solomon Islands and later the Gilbert and Ellis Islands where he was marine superintendent. She had set up Sunbeams and Guides there. She and Gordon did a lot of sailing. She had an official post in the philatelic bureau which she greatly enjoyed. She would send off first day covers of their beautiful stamps and other interesting artefacts to family and other interested philatelists back home. Nephew Michael remembers the mementoes sent from the South Seas: the coconut, the tobacco jar, and the photos.

The life of these islands was to stay with Christine all her life. She returned several times and on one occasion presented the Gilbert Islands with a bell for their church. Every two years Gordon had leave back home and they would take the opportunity of visiting many places en route. This love of travel stayed with her and after Gordon's death she would travel with friends or on her own. The move back to England was to become permanent in the 1970s when Gordon was taken ill and needed treatment in the Hospital for Tropical Diseases.

The Church had always been a large part of Christine's life. In Holton, after Gordon's death, she was a member of the Mother's Union and set up a small Sunday School for the few young people who lived there. She was totally committed to building up the church and community life in the wider group of churches which is where she met my husband and I in the area around Holton near Wincanton in Somerset. Her Christian faith meant everything to her.

Her cousin and her husband, as well as a few friends in the Holton area helped her with the move back to Gosport and it was after this move that she began staying with us in various rectories in Gloucestershire to look after the animals and also fulfil a secretarial role when she was left in charge of the rectory. Her stays became increasingly extended and in 2004 when Keith suddenly died, she was extremely supportive and helpful with me working full time and requiring a speedy move of house.

From 2006 when Chris and I were married, she often came to stay in our home in Hemyock and Chris at times thought he had acquired "2 for the price of 1". It soon became clear that living on her own was not working well and we suggested creating a granny annexe for her. Once again, Christine got herself fully involved in the life of the church and village and made many friends.

She became very much part of our family especially with Charlie and Jessica and she loved the dogs and cats. She thoroughly enjoyed Chris's cooking and was very grateful for the many trips, both in this country and abroad, with Mary at the wheel. Much fun and laughter could often be heard. She has been greatly missed by us all. Eventually, when it was necessary for Christine to have full-time care, she moved into a Care Home at Willand. These last few years have been very sad as Christine just longed to slip away and be with the Lord. Christine was so very good at keeping in touch with friends at home and abroad, and with many school friends and would send cards and letters even if she was away for only a few days. She enjoyed family gatherings and always remembered important dates or anniversaries. She was good fun, kind and ever faithful.

She would dearly have loved children of her own but still made the most of opportunities life gave her. Christine, we miss you.

Hazel Elizabeth Mary MacLean was born in Exeter on 25th March 1927. Her parents Doris and George Hunt owned a grocery store in the area. Hazel was brought up wanting for little being their only child. Her first passion was horses which took up most of her time until she met Iain who was training in the army in Exeter. It seems they fell in love at first sight and got married in 1950. Hazel was by this time accustomed to the army style of life as Iain was frequently away, during their courtship. In all, she moved house sixteen times in her married life following Iain in his postings.

Hazel was very artistic and became skilled at painting, sculpting and dressmaking. In later life she took up weaving, wool spinning (from her rare breed sheep), silk painting and one of her last accomplishments was falconry which she started at the age of 75.

Her two sons Roderick and Alastair joined them from boarding school at many of the countries they lived in and the family travelled to many more countries during the school holidays.

When they finally settled in the U.K. they got involved in village life. Hazel also returned to teaching mainly disadvantaged children and those from the gypsy community. Their membership of the Hemyock church community and later Culm Davy Chapel benefitted from her artistic work along with her flower arranging skills (and who can forget the nativity ensemble!)

Sadly, in their later years Hazel, like Iain, she succumbed to dementia and they were no longer able to attend the church. Unfortunately, due to covid, their life became very isolated as they were vulnerable health wise and were unable to celebrate their 71st wedding anniversary with either friends or family.

After Iain's funeral Hazel moved to a care home in North Yorkshire to be nearer to her younger son Alastair. Thankfully, travel restrictions were relaxed and Roderick joined his brother in visiting Hazel daily for the last week of her life. Hazel passed away on 17th August 2021 exactly two months to the date of Iain passing.

We hope our young people and staff are settled back at schools, colleges and universities after a very challenging period. Warmest congratulations to **Les Bowden** who has recently enjoyed a significant birthday.

All the kit was supplied for us and we were introduced to the history and anatomy of different types of scythe. We learned some new terms -snath, honing, peening, and each of us was fitted with a scythe suitable for our height.

Luckily the rain stopped and the clouds eventually parted, and by the time we were having a practise scythe at the end of the football pitches, the sun came out.

Having got the basics of the technique, we crossed the stream and got to work in the environmental area. We scythed our way through the thick thatch of grass and made a good start to clearing the area. The rhythmic moving from side to side, was quite hypnotic and being with an enthusiastic group learning a new skill was most satisfying. In fact, the following day, my back felt better than it has done in a long while!

Dear Residents

here will be road disruptions until the end of the year while Gigaclear are laying cables for broadband in the Hemyock area. There must be other issues in and around Hemyock, but I have not been informed of any extreme problems, but please let me or Dan Wood, our new man know if they do arise

Environmental issues are very much in the forefront of County's Climate targets, so I have included some information relating to this. The Environmental Performance Board approved the business case to invest £196k in 131kW of solar panels on the roofs of DCC salt depots. 300kW of solar PV expected from the solar car ports at County Hall and Taw View. Planning application for this was expected to be submitted by now, but still waiting for approval from Digital Transformation and Business Support (DTBS) Management Team. The two phases of the Zero Carbon Buildings projects are expected to install 200kW of renewable energy.

Street Lighting

Green Objective is to retrofit 100% of remaining all and part-night lighting with LED lamps. Work is ongoing across the county to schedule. 45,000 are now using LED technology with 34,000 remaining.

Funding for Special Education Needs and Disability (SEND) through the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) High Needs Block. Scrutiny members will be aware that the funding Devon County Council spends on supporting children with Special Education Needs far exceeds the funding we are allocated from central government. Last financial year we spent nearly £30 million, a third more than we were allocated. This is not a sustainable position and the cumulative impact of the funding gap if no action taken is shown above. We have now been informed by the DfE that for the financial year 2022/23 Devon has provisionally been allocated an additional £9 million. However, this still falls far short of the funding required. At the Master class in July, we shared some of the steps we were taking to try and achieve a more balanced position. The steps in no way reduce our responsibility to ensure children with SEN receive the support they need, as set out in the SEND code of practice, and primarily focus on:

Just About Managing and pay

- Between 2019 and 2020 average pay for the lowest 20% of earners nationally rose slightly. In Devon outside of South Hams and West Devon it fell significantly and was already lower than nationally pre pandemic (in Devon as a whole for this group it fell by 6%). Unsure yet as to whether these impacts are temporary, but even temporary impacts could mean lower income households suffering from more debt issues.
- Average workplace pay rates in Devon were around 82.7% of the UK in 2020, but lower still in some parts of the County (West Devon just 71.9% of UK).
- Data on average pay rates overall in Devon were very volatile in 2020 showing a lot of changes to the labour market, but no significant trend, although greater

levels of working from home. 2021 and 2022 data will be needed to ascertain any longer-term trends.

- On average, pay for freelancers during 2020 took a significant hit
- SW House prices up 17% in a year competition for housing, especially at higher priced end and in rural/
- Staycation boom causing rental property to come off the market and be let by Airbnb - renters who have to move have been hit, especially in traditional holiday areas. Unsure yet as to whether these impacts are temporary.
- Anecdotal evidence (so far) of highly significant increases (doubling in some instances) in Food Bank usage in Devon during the pandemic lockdown periods and more widely worry about food insecurity, especially among those with children

The summer has been a very challenging and intense period for the Health and Care system, and despite the removal of many of the COVID related restrictions, adult social care in Devon is dealing with care home outbreaks approaching levels close to those experienced at the peak of wave 2. With this local situation and the events nationally and globally, everyone's resilience is tested.

Finance

Income - included interest, cemetery, and contributions from Culmstock & Clayhidon Parish council towards the defibrillators. Expenditure - included clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, toilet cleaning and consumables, electricity, water, insurance, asset maintenance.

Longmead

The new bridge should be installed during September/
October. The new concrete trim trail has been laid making
it more easily accessible. The parish council has agreed in
principle to install CCTV at Longmead to combat anti-social
behaviour and dog fouling. During the school summer
holidays the parish council provided free daily access to the
MUGA. It was great to see so many children make use of it.

Skatepark

The parish council has agreed in principle to a skatepark being installed in an area adjacent to the MUGA and pavilion. Following some concerns from the Tennis Club, an alternative site was suggested next to the car park on the junior football field. The council believes this alternative site does not meet the criteria for keeping anti-social behaviour to a minimum by siting the skatepark in a central, well-used location. A visit to Tiverton skatepark has been arranged to gauge the noise level generated by a skatepark.

Community Land

As part of the development adjacent to the cemetery, the parish council will be offered just over 7 acres of community land. The parish council has formed a working group to look at how this land might be used. It will update the parish via the Pump, website and social media. The group met with Cavanna Homes to discuss the removal of topsoil from the fields. Cavanna has assured the council that it will level the land and replace the topsoil and re-seed before handing over the fields to the council.

Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges in and around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

Best in Britain Win for Local Cider

ider made in a Clayhidon farmhouse in the Blackdowns has been judged the best in Britain. Alex Hill has pulled off a stunning double victory in the British Cider Championships. His dry, "deeply traditional" Bollhayes was named Champion British Cider and Champion British Farmhouse cider. It's the second time in 15 years that Bollhayes has won both top honours.



This year, despite the Covid crisis, there were 299 entries, blind-tasted by expert judges. A delighted Alex, pictured here with marketing partner Selena Mitford, from Churchinford, said: "What makes it really special, is that all the apples that went to make the cider are from my own orchard on the farm, which I planted over 30 years ago. It is wonderful to see our hard work come, almost literally, to fruition."The apples were a mixture of Yarlington Mill, some Dabinett, and Chisel Jersey, plus one or two we couldn't really recognise. Even when the cider was only half fermented it tasted delicious, and it is just a lovely, drinkable, traditional West Country cider."

Bollhayes apples are handpicked and the cider is made without adding yeast. Wild yeasts, naturally present in the apple crop, provide the fermentation. The winning cider – well known to audiences at Clayhidon Parish Hall and sold online and at various local markets – was described by the judges' chairman, Nick Bradstock, as "a fine cider, with some austerity, the tannins and acidity excellently balanced and giving a long and full finish". "It is a long time since a farmhouse cider came out on top, but it does go to show how much care and attention goes into even as traditional a product as farmhouse dry," he said.

The championships were staged as part of the Orchards and Cider exposition at the Bath and West Country Festival.Alex, who with his late wife Bee founded Vigo, the Dunkeswell-based fruit press equipment company, was described by the competition organisers as one of the most respected and influential cider-makers in the West of England."I know it's a bit of a cliche, but it is true that the overall standard gets higher with every passing year", said Nick Bradstock. "Even the very few ciders that aren't quite up to standard usually have some quirkiness about them and the vast majority are superb examples of their type."

Alex was presented with the Rupert Best Trophy for the Supreme Champion British Cider by David Simmons, immediate Past Master of the Worshipful Company of Fruiterers. The Pewterers' Trophy for the Champion British Farmhouse Cider was presented by Richard Hills, Upper Warden of the Worshipful Company of Pewterers.

The charity displayed information about the amazing legacy left to Clayhidon Parish by Johnny Griss, who created the lakes and developed them into a successful fishing enterprise.

The charity has agreed in principle to work with a developer to build a row of 3 terraced houses to replace Rose Cottage, subject to complying with any necessary charity commission regulations and obtaining planning permission. It has yet to decide what to do with the land and lakes.

Special events like our Harvest family service led by Jay Lanchbury (19th September), and our combined Big Picnic at Wildside Experience (5th September) proved to be real highlights during the month of September and have served to build a sense of anticipation for events planned during the months of October and November. Visits from the Slavic Gospel Association, London City Mission (LCM) and Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) are all planned. The Luncheon Club, in connection with the Blackdown Support Group, looks set to take place in October after a successful meeting in August. It was great to open the building up once more to this much-loved group and together enjoy the live music performed by the Blackdown Hill Billies. Alongside all these activities are the regular services that take place on a Sunday morning (11am) with both Sunday School and Bible Class taking place alongside our worship service downstairs. A very warm welcome is extended to all.

Like I say, life is getting busy again, and in this we give thanks. But what about when life gets too busy, when busyness causes us to hurry and feel a mounting sense of pressure with all that must be done. For me, the greatest lesson of lockdown was the discovering of a different pace, a stepping back. Life was still busy, but there was less hurry.

Jesus shows us the immense value, indeed the necessity, of cultivating moments of peace and breaking the mounting pressure with a change of pace. Except for the days leading up to Jesus' death, Matthew 14 records perhaps the most intense 24-hour period in Jesus' earthly ministry. Within this short space of time Jesus received news that his dear friend, John the Baptist, had been beheaded, is faced with the demands of feeding over 5000 people, and, a short while later, is confronted

by a fierce storm. Jesus knows the pressure of unexpected news, unexpected demands and unexpected storms. Jesus knew what it was to be under pressure, to be busy. Yet within this same passage, this same 24-hour period, Jesus shows us the pattern of peace, a pattern that would push back on the problem of hurry. After hearing news of John the Baptist's death Jesus seeks a quiet and solitary place (14:13). When the demands of 5000 hungry people are finally met, Jesus withdraws to the mountainside to pray (14:23). After the storm came the Pharisees questions but Jesus once more withdraws (15:21). Jesus was orientating his earthly ministry around his trust in the Father and seeking time with Him. This is the pattern of peace - In quietness and prayer, we'll again hear the voice of God, be assured of His care and control of our lives, and experience His presence.

You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you. ISAIAH 26:3

here is no such thing as a perfect vehicle. I have one for off road and towing the cattle trailer (thirsty but effective), one for day to day (no real complaints), one for old school class (no brakes) and one for glamour (only goes 4 miles before flatly refusing to go any further).

Daisy has either end of the green spectrum; one old electric car, run off her solar panels and Tesco's free charging, and the old VW van, all diesel fume emitting shed on wheels. Turns out he's quite a good shot with many rats dispatched cleanly and a peaceful night's sleep for the home owner resumed.

Another timeless thing returned, for now at least, has been the ability to gather together. I'm so glad for Derek Burrough's family that they were able to have a funeral not limited by covid; to see the church full up and many more outside; to see that a person's passing mattered to the whole community.

Daisy finally had her 50th birthday party (only a year late), a joyful gathering together of life long friends with smiling faces and dancing feet. Neither of us are the most sociable people around, but there are definitely times when it really matters to gather. As we go into Autumn let's hope for a gentler time than last year for all our sakes.

Beach Labyrinth Artist Seeking Seaside Churches In Devon

beach labyrinth artist from Cornwall is looking for seaside churches in Devon to collaborate with. Andrew Nicholson has already created a number of beach labyrinths in Cornwall. For him, creating them is an act of reflection, mission and prayer.

Andrew said, "Much of my labyrinth work on the beach involves an invitation to reflect on each individual's journey and issues they may have been facing. "During this past year I have also broadened this out slightly at different labyrinths to include elements like positive mental health and well-being; environmental concerns, [the significance of] special places and relating Easter to the experiences of lockdown. "There is always an invitation to let go of any burdens, to reflect, pray, pause and to be thankful, move forward, be transformed in some way."

Circular labyrinths have been used by Christians for hundreds of years as a way of praying and reflecting. People are encouraged to walk the circular path from the outside in, as a symbolic physical and spiritual journey to be closer to God. Unlike a maze there are no dead ends. Andrew said that he had created labyrinths during different seasons and for special events – working with charities and arts organisations as well as churches: "Through the pandemic, when the lockdown restrictions have allowed, I have still been able to create a few beach labyrinths, plus a daffodil labyrinth I created in Tresillian Churchyard over the winter which bloomed this spring. "I created one labyrinth last autumn at Porthcurnick as a fundraiser for Mind on World Mental Health Day, while in recent weeks I created one at Par for Kneehigh Theatre's Random Acts
