#### **Christian Response to Eastern** Europe

As the year draws to a close we want to extend our warmest thanks to everyone who has donated goods to Christian Response to Eastern Europe (cr2ee).

The past year has, at times, seen us almost overwhelmed with humanitarian aid for Moldova whilst over the last few weeks we have been delighted with the response to the Christmas Shoebox Appeal for children and adults.

A number of people have knitted 6" squares, some surprisingly coming from the north of England and Reading area, and have been sewn into blankets of various sizes and some lovely knitted baby clothes were a joy to receive.

Our greatest surprise was to receive knitted items - clothing and toys - from some elderly ladies from the Wellington and Taunton area, who have no connection, and between them produced well over 200 items in wonderful patterns and glorious colours. On our last visit to the Exmouth depot we were welcomed with the comment, "We've been looking out for you as you always bring such a lot of nice things with you". It's not us but YOU the lovely, generous people of our area and further beyond.

#### Fairtrade

*ith all the discussions ay COP26 in the news of recent* weeks you'll be pleased to know that the Hemyock PCC was there (at least in thought) before them.

A lot of parishes across the Diocese are looking at ways they can be more environmentally friendly and more aware of the needs of people in less developed countries. So the Church Council has decided to focus on Fairtrade items in its purchasing as a start.

There is Fairtrade Fortnight to come early next year. Indeed there may be many others in the village looking towards similar aims and if so we'd love to hear from you.

Who knows perhaps we could, over time, become a Fairtrade Village!

#### From the Ringing Room

#### The Tower upgrade.

This has begun quietly over the past few weeks. We have "entertained" representatives from Builders and bellhangers, both local and from further afield. The results of their calculations are now starting to arrive. This will lead us onto our next stage which is to investigate where we might find finance for the project. We are fortunate in this country in that there are literally hundreds of bodies who will make grants to projects such as this one. The problem is finding out which ones. Many will have restrictions such as "only for work within 30 miles of Slough" or "does not cover decorative work", "Maximum 10% of projected costs". There is a book one can scan called the "Directory of Grant Making Trusts", it's about 8 centimetres thick! Not bedtime reading!!

And if you think that approach rules out local fundraising the answer is it does not. Many trusts will only match-fund so our own fundraising will be important. So yes we will be open to sponsorships, donations, ideas etc etc.

#### Bell Three - our enigma bell

Somebody raised a query about our earlier comments regarding this bell and our saying that it will be 400years old in 2024. How did we know that? Quite simply because it is inscribed on the bell, even if the 2 is the wrong way round.

Most bells will have various details cast on their body. The more usual things are makers name, Rector and Churchwardens names and date of casting. There might also be information about donors, (Mrs Smith paid for me) some local news or even boasting (we sound better than the bells in the next village!) There might be a motto or statement, for example our 4th bell has "Draw near unto God" whilst the 5th has "True hearts and sound bottoms!"

The third in Hemyock has none of these except the date. What it does have is a series of initials:

RL CS HG HH IM HH HB WK IK WG AT PM

Whilst documentary evidence was lost in World War 2 it is thought that around 1621 it was decided to recast the 5 bells in the tower at the time, but possibly money was a bit short. One way of saving a few pence would be to forgo casting the normal information onto every bell. Even with limited detail this would save time. Don't forget that the mould would be back to front and spelt backwards when looked at. The suggestion is that these initials were those of people who had made donations towards the cost of the bell. It was put forward that this bell might have been funded by younger members of the population. Certainly names matching the initials and the date have been put forward.

And the bell rings on. There is thought that it was cast in Cullompton or Exeter, but to the best of our knowledge it has not travelled far, just leaving Hemyock once to go to Loughborough in 1982. The rest of its companions all date from the 1800s so quite a wait for the next 400th birthday!

The State Trumpeters of the Household Cavalry and the fanfare team from the Band of the Grenadier Guards along with The Central Band of the RBL and the Abbey organ





# The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

# News from the Blackdown Healthy Living & Activity Centre



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#### **Hemyock History Group**

Te can thank 2 Hemyock residents for giving our members fascinating talks on journeys to far away places. Mark Farrell provided a journal of his and Sue, his wife's, overland journey in a converted Land Rover from Hemyock to Japan with both still and video film of the journey while Piers Langdon gave a moving description of his family's experiences of living and working in Africa from just after the first world war up to the time they had to leave Ethiopia due to the troubles that have beset that Country over many years.

#### Overland Journey from Hemyock to Tokyo in 2019 for the Rugby World Cup

The vehicle that Mark and Sue Farrell travelled in was an ex military ambulance called Amber which safely carried them over the largest landmass in the world with several sea crossings along the way. Once safely across the channel a civilized 3,500km European tour of France, Belgium, Austria, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Turkey, and into Asia through Georgia, Kazakhstan and Azerbaijan where they arrived at Baku, the capital located on the coast of the Caspian Sea and where they caught the ferry to take them over the Caspian Sea to Turkenbashi in Turkmenistan. On the ferry they met several other travellers en route to Tokyo on bicycles. Over the remaining journey they were to metaphorically bump into these cyclists several more times. Mark strongly recommended Georgia and Azerbaijan as of great interest.

As they moved east via the famous Samarkand and into Tajikistan they were close to the Afghan border where the dramatic scenery presented a view of the same crops growing at ever increasing altitudes showing striking colour changes due to the planting of the crop over

a long period of time by the same men manually planting the seedlings. Little evidence of agricultural mechanisation could be discerned by Mark, who is a professional in such matters.

As they progressed through this awe inspiring country they realised that the mountain range became the Hindu Kush Himalaya as the map says. Having never been there myself I cannot comment on where the Hindu Kush starts and where the Himalaya ends. However I understand that one of our members has travelled through the Hindu Kush and may talk about this differentiation at one of our future meetings.

Inside Amber there was a hidden store of bottles of Otter beer intended to be presented to Ben Moon, our Hemyock resident, who was due to be in the England squad for the world cup. As things turned out he did not make it, but the bottles of beer did, and proved useful as celebratory presentations to interesting people they met en route, and to side step the usual drink of fermented mare's milk. One such presentation was to the bride at a traditional Mongolian wedding held in the traditional colourful yurts. Although invited they turned down the opportunity of taking part in another tradition, the men's wrestling tournament where a lot of yak grease is used.

In order to avoid the Chinese border marked by a continuous barbed wire fence, Amber drove north towards Russia spotting the Aral Sea which takes a bit of spotting, since it is virtually dried up due to the cotton plantations sucking up all the water leaving a dried up bed displaying stranded shipping boats dotted about the desert like sandy surface presenting a sort of art installation to the traveller.

A further 6,500kms took Amber through Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia and Russia with a change in the route due to road conditions taking them several extra days backtracking. The temperature as they drove past the Gobi Desert was 39 degrees. One of the main problems that Mark Farrell had to prepare for was the access to diesel fuel throughout their entire journey. Amber was well stocked with metal fuel cans filled with the precious diesel. Of course with the number of vehicles trading across the vast Asian continent there are always sources of fuel, but just look at the recent situation when car drivers locally decided not to start a journey of say 50 miles unless they had checked which garages were open and stocked with fuel. Mark and Sue set off on a 6,200 mile journey to Vladivostok across some of the most inhospitable country in the world not knowing their exact route and trusting that there would be a supply of fuel when required. It is a recommendation to the planning of Mark and the welcoming nature of the peoples of the most remote countries in the world that resulted in their progress over the Asian land mass proving to be such an enjoyable experience. They then took a ferry from Vladivostok, Russia over to South Korea where they were well received, although they did have to take off any reference to Japan before proceeding.

Although Japan is not very popular in S Korea, there is a ferry from S Korea over to Japan taking Amber over to Japan and on to Tokyo where they could enjoy the Rugby World Cup.

#### Surviving life in Africa

Piers' grandfather, Brigadier Daniel Sandford served on the western front in World War one, after which he moved to Ethiopia, a country the size of France and Spain combined. Ethiopia had had a troubled history since 1889 when the Treaty of Wichale, was signed by Italy who had invaded Ethiopia as part of their empire building but were routed by Ethiopian forces supported by the Russians resulting in this peace pact with Emperor Menilek II of Ethiopia, whereby Italy was granted the northern Ethiopian territories of modern Eritrea and northern Tigray. However relationships soon broke down again and Italy acknowledged the absolute independence of Ethiopia in 1896 with the Italians retaining Eritrea. Emperor Menilek I was the legendary son of Solomon and the Queen of Sheba.

After the 1st World War Sandford was stationed in Aden across the Red Sea from Ethiopia but spent much time in Ethiopia and in 1930 when Haile Sellassie became Emperor, he worked with and advised the Emperor. Prior to his coronation, he had been the Regent Plenipotentiary of Ethiopia from 1916. He is a defining figure in modern Ethiopian history, and the key figure of Rastafari, a religious movement in Jamaica which emerged shortly after he became emperor in the 1930. Haile Selassie's internationalist views led to Ethiopia becoming a charter member of the United Nations, however Italy invaded again in 1935 and 1936 by the fascist Mussolini forcing Sandford to flee the country and return to England. Shortly afterwards Haile Sellassie also fled his country and was protected by the British Authorities living in Bath where he was reunited with Sandford The Sandford family had established the Sandford Community

School in Addis Ababa in the 20's which is still operating today. With his knowledge of the Horn of Africa, Sandford was used by General Wavell in Cairo to work with the infamous General Wingate, based in the Sudan organising partisans. The British forces, which consisted primarily of Ethiopian-backed African and South African colonial troops, coordinated the military effort to liberate Ethiopia. The Emperor crossed back into his Country from Sudan in 1941 with the support of Sandford and Wingate and the British forces. The emperor himself issued several imperial proclamations in this period, demonstrating that, while authority was not divided up in any formal way, British military might and the emperor's populist appeal could be joined in the concerted effort to liberate Ethiopia. On 5 May 1941, Haile Selassie entered Addis Ababa and personally addressed the Ethiopian people, exactly five years after the fascist forces entered Addis Ababa. The emperor continued to be a staunch ally of the West, while pursuing a firm policy of decolonization in Africa, which was still largely under European colonial rule. Haile Sellassie ruled his country with the support of the army for many years but due to the famine in the early 1970's and inflation a troubled period resulted in the army taking control with the result that in 1975 many of the ruling elite were executed and in August 1975, Haile Sellassie after 45 years of being Head of State was also killed. Brigadier Sandford had died only 3 years before at the farm he had created just outside Addis Ababa and was aware of the troubles facing his very important friend who attended his funeral. The current situation in Ethiopia with the country entering the second year of a civil war with little prospect of a ceasefire between Tigray and Eritrea and headlines declaring an irreversible state collapse and 300,000 refugees massing on the border, the future looks bleak.


#### Talks over the next 2 months

The following has been received from family who have recently had a loved one pass away and send our love and condolences.

#### **Rev Prebendary Margaret Cameron 1948-2021**

The funeral of Margaret was held at Exmouth and preceded by a Requiem Mass for family and close friends.

Margaret was ordained Deacon in 1990 and in 1994 became one of the first women to be ordained to the priesthood in the Church of England moving to our United Benefice two year later before moving to serve in Plympton St Mary where she remained for the last 10 years of her fulltime ministry which ended in 2013. In 2005 Margaret was appointed a Prebendary at Exeter Cathedral.

Margaret was born in Plymouth attending Stoke Damerell High School for Girls where she excelled at English, Latin and History. She memorably played Bottom in their production of Midsummers Night Dream during her final year when she was Head Girl.

At Queen Mary College in London Margaret read history and following a post graduate diploma in archive administration gained her first job as an Archivist at the Devon record office at Exeter. Whilst there she attended St Leonard's church where she met her future husband Hamilton. They married in 1971 and this December would have been their 50th wedding anniversary.

In 1984 whilst attending a church at Budleigh Salterton the priest, after watching Margaret lead a discussion group, asked her if she had ever thought about ministry in the church. At first the idea was resisted but following a sermon Margaret realised God was calling her and she was accepted for ordination.

Margaret was a wise and insightful priest who also maintained

a deep and abiding interest in many aspects of the world around her - art and literature, garden design, needlecraft, detective fiction, travel and cricket.

Following a visit to Hemyock by a Ugandan priest Margaret and Hamilton were part of a small local group who visited the country enjoying the loving hospitality of those they met.

On Margaret's retirement she continued to serve the church through part time

ministry primarily at Clyst Honiton where she was a much loved inspiration with her kind and gentle ways.

Sadly Margaret was diagnosed with cancer in 2014 but she bore her illness with courage and resilience right to the end never allowing it to interfere with her joy of life, love of family and friends, generosity of heart and great faith.

#### Anthony Francis (Tony) Bennett 15/07/1944 -27/10/2021

On 21st September children, grandchildren, relatives and representatives from the whole of his adult life were present in St. Mary's Church to celebrate the life of a gentle man with a wry sense of humour whom we were all grateful to have known. Tony was born in Hertford and spent his early life living in Essex and Hertfordshire and attending Hertford Grammar School. Studying Law and Politics at Hull University he was also active in the University Social Services Organisation & met with Mike who was later Best Man at his wedding to Sue, also a Law Student. With others they represented their University at Tiddlywinks. Mike was present at Tony's service and Sue spoke about how lucky we were to have been able to know Tony, given that his paternal grandfather had narrowly escaped death as a prisoner of the Germans in Holland during World War I when he had been Skipper of the Harwich/Hook of Holland ferry. He had survived to father Tony's Dad and Aunty Lil.

On graduation Tony became a Solicitor, eventually Partner in a London Firm with whom he stayed for ten years before moving to West Sussex/Hampshire to work for the same firm in Petersfield. While the children were growing Tony became involved with the PTA of their local Primary School in Rogate, indulging his love of music and singing by joining Church Choir as a family, local Choral Societies, musical /drama activities with the school. He was church treasurer for 12 years. He rang church bells and, starting enjoying a 'social life' he decided not to go back to the commute London with the Firm, he joined Warner Goodman, a firm with offices in Southampton, Portsmouth and other towns in South Hants and soon becoming a partner specializing in Domestic and Commercial Conveyancing.

In the absence of Ian Curtis who was self-isolating with covid, John Nash spoke emotionally at the service about Tony's time with Warner Goodman - from being a brilliant lawyer to Tony's willingness to involve himself with various fundraising and social activities with his usual wry sense of humour to the time when he gently and patiently retrained Accountant John himself himself as a Conveyancer.

Without the commute to London, during the later 1980s, Tony fancied learning the 'art' of Morris Dancing in clogs with a highly decorative 'side' called Knockhundred Shuttle, based in Midhurst, West Sussex. With them, the family having helped him learn (in the kitchen) the essential ' tomato soup' clog tap rhythms necessary for most of the dances, he loved going to the various gigs & Festivals countrywide and abroad at weekends and during holidays. Sue would travel too and either drum for the group or play recorder or just support, while the girls played their instruments when they were available. Tony taught himself to play button accordion (melodeon) & alternated the dancing with playing for the dance, continuing having lessons when he and Sue moved to France in 2005.

Keith came to the Service and spoke about sharing 'digs' with him/us on tour, remembering Tony's quiet and unassuming presence -or sometimes sitting watching with shoulders shaking with laughter at the antics of others.

Due to covid restrictions, this was the first opportunity to hold such a service and it was fitting that it should have focused on both John and Edna and their lives and work together, because they were a real team. Family members and folks from their Churches at Ruislip, Kettering, Orpington, Hove and Aldwick gave tributes together with speakers from Sat-7 and Chris Menzfeld from the Slavic Gospel Association, who, with his wife, lives here in Hemyock. Two of their five grandchildren also shared how their grandparents supported them in their young lives, and how visits to Hemyock were always a highlight!

In France Tony loved the social life around learning breton dancing and singing with the local choral societies. Singing friends came to the service from Winchester - folk who have known Sue and Tony since the 70s. They represented the two missing french members of 'Quatuoria' the quartet in which Tony was the tenor for some 6 years in Brittany, singing at fundraising events locally.

And so to Hemyock in 2014. Tony joined the Church choir and Hemyock Singers, Valley Arts, the Walking Group & volunteered with the National Trust at Knightshayes. He loved the continued contact with Dance which he derived from attending 'Zimba' sessions at the Garages, and also our social gatherings with friends in the Catherine Wheel. All of these things he was able to do right up until lockdown/his sad decline into dementia and finally into the pneumonia which caused his death in August.

Before retirement, John and Edna with their daughters Jackie, Viv and Maggie would come each year for their summer holidays and stay with John's father and mother, Alfred and Hilda Doble of Madford and later Eastlands. Jackie, Viv and Maggie now all live in the Wellington/Taunton

May we live in quiet contentment Head held high and conscience clear Filled with strong determination To make a nearly perfect year.



#### **Blackdown Hills Repair Café**

#### **Dear Residents**

 $\mathbf{T}$  t is December already, time flies when you are enjoying yourself Below is my report of some of the activities going L on at County, there is a lot going on and impossible to report everything. This just a flavour, I can always get other information about all sorts of happenings, if you need more information.

County has a turnover of over £1.2billion a year, that is more than £3m everyday of the year.

At month 6 it is estimated that budgets will overspend by just over £7 million, a reduction of £300,000 from month 4. The Dedicated Schools Grant projected deficit, relating to Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), is forecast to be £36 million. In line with Department of Education guidance this deficit will not be dealt with this financial year but carried to future years. Central government has continued to provide a number of grant funding streams this year to help support Local Authorities during the pandemic. The confirmed additional funding Devon County Council is expecting to receive directly this financial year is currently £36.6 million, in addition to the £25.6 million carried forward from 2020/21.

There has been significant change to school provision over the past few years with the Local Authority's role changing but its statutory duty remains to ensure the sufficiency of school places in its area, championing high standards in all schools, supporting the most vulnerable children and acting as champions for all parents and families.

The demand on children's social care services is unsustainable. Councils have increased their budgets for children's services by diverting funds from other areas but due to spiralling demand for support they are still overspending and fear this will continue as pent-up demand due to the pandemic becomes clearer. "Supporting and protecting vulnerable children is one of the most important roles played by councils who want to ensure all children are safe, loved and thrive. Over the past year, Devon County Council has invested nearly £3.5million in providing over 100,000 supermarket vouchers for families who qualify for free school meals so their children don't go hungry over the school holidays. So these vouchers have become a lifeline for many families in Devon, We are seeing applications for free school meals continuing to rise as families struggle with their finances as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

Care providers everywhere are struggling to find enough staff. Many are turning down new requests for help, and juggling rotas and home visits while doing the best they can to care for vulnerable clients. In Devon, around 2,000 additional care workers are needed to fill growing numbers of vacancies, and demand for care is rising. People needing care are finding it very difficult to source; and people already getting help are seeing changes to their visits while their care providers respond to higher demand without having the staff numbers they need. But it's not just social care."There are more people in Devon today who quite simply need help, than there are people to provide it," "I'm talking about help with shopping, picking up prescriptions, preparing a meal, or company because they're lonely."

Devon first achieved a 50% recycling rate (National Indicator NI192) in 2008/09 and by 2010/11 was the highest performing Waste Disposal Authority (WDA) in England at 55%. Since this accolade the authority has remained within the top six highest performing WDAs, and in 2019/20 achieved its highest ever recycling rate at 56.6% placing the authority in second place nationally. In 2020/21, whilst Devon's performance reduced to 55.3% (NI192), provisional national data indicates that the authority remains the second highest performing WDA against a backdrop of reducing performance for other leading authorities Waste Analysis 2022 The Resource and Waste Management Strategy for Devon notes that an audit of dustbin waste was carried out in 2017 and that this should be carried out at 5 yearly intervals. This gives an invaluable insight into the contents of residents' bins and therefore an understanding of which materials are being placed by residents in the wrong bin. The authorities can then measure progress from previous years but most importantly target their communications appropriately.

The 2017 analysis showed that for Devon 40.8% more could be recycled with collection services at the time (51,245 tonnes) and 58.6% more could be recycled with a district wide aligned option (73,600 tonnes). The net costs of this missed recycling are approximately £3 million and £4.4 million respectively, plus the loss of income of  $\pounds 1 - 1.5$  million. If all residents put the right waste in the right bin in the above scenarios, the recycling rates would increase to 70.4% and 76.7% respectively.

The government has announced a £9.3m investment across Devon in innovation and employment projects including training people in retrofit and modern construction skills. We submitted the projects as the lead authority on behalf of the Team Devon partnership, working closely with Devon's District CouncilsThis is very good news for people and businesses in Devon and to some extent offsets the very real disappointment over Devon's Levelling Up bids. Hopefully the Community Renewal Fund announcement is a sign of better things to come in terms of further Government support for Devon's economic recovery through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, County Deals and the next round of Levelling Up funds. This is the largest allocation in England is testimony to the good work of the Team Devon partnership. Lt will provide support for hard hit small businesses and disadvantaged young people and adults, tackle deprivation and disadvantage within Devon's most vulnerable communities, and support the economic growth of rural and coastal communities."Now our collective task must be to crack on and deliver."

village maintenance, toilet cleaning and consumables, electricity, water, professional fees, asset maintenance, and poppy appeal.

The following grants were awarded:-Hemyock Lights Brigade - £1,000.

#### Skatepark at Longmead

Following lengthy discussions and site visits the parish council has agreed on the location of the skatepark (adjacent to the MUGA at Longmead). The skatepark team is now speaking to skatepark designers and is gathering information and advice. The parish council is looking forward to seeing the designs.

#### Community Land

With regard to the 7 acres of land that will be offered to the parish council by Cavanna Homes, a working group has produced the following mission statement which has been endorsed by the parish council:-

- Create and maintain a space that brings families and communities of all ages together
- Develop the space along sustainable and green principles
- Encourage people to spend time in nature through a good design of the space

#### Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges in and around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

#### Tree Work, Healthy Living & Activities Centre

Following a site inspection and advice from tree surgeons it has been recommended that the parish council dismantle two large ash trees and a willow tree which are suffering from disease on the land to the east of the Healthy Living & Activities Centre. The parish council is considering what to plant in their place.



#### **Clayhidon Friends, October Meeting**

ony Cooper, a retired Metropolitan Policeman came to talk to our Group about the famous Brink's Mat robbery on 26th November, 1983. So long ago, but we all still remember the audaciousness of the crime.

Tony was informative and entertaining. His inside knowledge of the robbery made fascinating listening. It astounded us to realise how long the investigation went on and how tenacious the police were in bringing the gang and further criminals involved to justice. Scotland Yard were involved from the start under the leadership of Anthony Brightwell. It was one of the largest crimes of the 20th Century and immediately made front page news. Members of the gang were Mastermind, Brian Robinson, (who died penniless). Mickey McAvoy, John Palmer, Kenneth Noye, Johnson Matthey, Brian Perry and Peter White. It occurred on the Heathrow Trading Estate in London and £26 million worth of gold bullion, (£100 million in today's value) plus diamonds and cash were stolen from a warehouse. Lloyds of London paid out for the losses and several deaths have been linked to it.

Six robbers gained entry to the warehouse. It was later proved that they were let in by one of the Security Guards, Anthony Black, (the ring leader's brother in law). Once inside the robbers smashed Guard, Peter Bentley over the head and poured petrol over all the guard's trousers and threatened to set light to them if they didn't comply! They all did. The frightened guards couldn't remember the recently changed password to the expected £3.2million in cash and the gang had to settle for the gold.

"Merry Christmas!" one of the gang called, as they left. However, during the getaway the van broke down. If only the passing policeman had noticed how low slung the van was.

Little knowing that gold would be hard to dispose of, other than to other criminals, the elite group of six expanded to further members of the criminal society. Of course they all wanted a generous cut. The wicked web expanded and then information started to leak to the police. The security cameras immediately identified Black as the one who let them in. He turned Queens Evidence in return for naming his brother in law, Brian Robinson, as one of original gang.

Silk Painting Demonstration Michael and Karen Watkins introduced themselves and commented what a pretty part of Devon we lived in. They told us that was one of the reasons they enjoyed coming out doing demonstrations, the fact that they got to see parts of the country they wouldn't normally see. They do all the major shows in the West Country too, look out for them! Karen was very proud to announce that Boris Johnson wears one of their ties in a colourful space odyssey design!

The inclusion of other people and the rippling out of the inner circle further than the original six robbers led to quarrelling amongst them, resulting in ten people being killed and 20 people being sent to prison.

The majority of the bullion has never been recovered. I have only told you a smidgeon of the interesting Talk Tony gave to us. I hope I have whetted your appetite to find out more yourselves.

Important to note that Tony Cooper also runs a Club called the 'Dog House'. Members are all very committed retired policemen. He is Top Dog. Then they have Deputy Dog and other comical dog-names. They raise money for the Sunshine House. This, Tony obviously feels passionately for. He enjoys giving these talks to raise money for the disabled and under-privileged children who are under the auspice of the House. Tony has plenty of other talks and if any Group would like to invite him, please contact Anne Lancaster for his details.

Refreshments, which are always welcome were supplied by Sylvi and Lynda. Our Group are very eager to invite other locals to join from Clayhidon and the surrounding villages. We meet now in the afternoons, on the second Thursday in every month in Clayhidon Parish Hall. Alongside people coming to give us Talks, we have summer outings and a Christmas dinner, bringing along our partners. #### November Meeting 2021

The couple, who were a very competent, funny double act gave us a very entertaining and insightful demonstration of how they create some wonderful painted scarves, ties and bow ties. Amongst a lovely display of delicately floating scarves, in all colours, tied to a clothes rail with ties and bow ties enticingly displayed on a side table, we listened with enthusiasm.

Clayhidor

Michael pinned a scarf length of white silk onto a frame. His first task was to create the background design with a special goota latex paint pen. He drew quickly and confidently. This then had to be allowed to dry. A difficult feat in our damp weather. He explained that their work was very weather dominated as in extreme weathers the paints either do not dry, in which case they resort to a hairdryer, or they dry too quickly. They have learned not to continue in hot weather

When the latex pen work had dried sufficiently he quickly added the colours in a design kept in his head but would resemble a long sea-horse. Then Karen asked for two volunteers and they filled in the edges, equally quickly, under Karen's direction. Karen then sprinkled salt onto various parts of the painting, which would dry to a feathered effect.

Usually, at home, Karen would then take over by ironing the whole item to seal the paints, hand wash in a very mild solution of gentle soap and then iron again. A part of the procedure she least likes. Michael said that he would show us some silk worms in a short while.

Whilst we waited for the paint to dry Karen gave us a very clear demonstration of how to drape a scarf in three different ways. She was very patient with us all and was willing to go through the different ways several times.

Then Michael produced a tin that had pictures of the silk worms. Being none too comfortable with the insect world, and in the front row I was feeling nervous. Giving us a brief history of the life of the silk worm he wrestled with the lid of the tin. Suddenly into the air he launched several ten inch plastic silk worms at us. One hit me and notebook and pen was flung up in the air, causing much hilarity.

We were all so impressed with their demonstration, interspersed with humour and knowledge. We would thoroughly recommend any other group to ask them to come and talk to you.

#### The John Griss Charity

The John Griss Charity sent the following report:-

#### **Rose Cottage**

The charity is working with local developer Andy Lehner to submit a planning application to Mid Devon District Council. The plan is to demolish Rose Cottage and build a row of 3 terraced houses. It is hoped that a planning application will be submitted to Mid Devon District Council within the next month. The scheme also includes the redevelopment of the developer's Baptist Chapel, next door to Rose Cottage. The charity hopes to own 2 of the houses which might be rented at affordable rents to local people. If planning permission is granted, the charity will need to seek legal advice on how to structure any such arrangement with the developer.

#### Hartsmoor Lakes

Mike Leigh-Mallory will continue to manage the lakes on behalf of the charity until December 2022. The charity has arranged for an engineer to inspect the site and give advice on how best to repair the temporary fix to the outlet pipe on Greensands Lake. The charity has also met with representatives from the Institute of Fisheries Management (IFM) and the Environment Agency (EA) and looks forward to receiving their recommendations. Later this month the EA will conduct a bathymetric survey of Greensands Lake which will provide vital information regarding depth and confirmation as to whether the lake falls under the Reservoir Act. The charity has received a small grant from the Angling Trust towards installing an otter fence around the syndicate lake.

#### The land

The charity is leasing the land to local young farmer Rob Burridge until December 2022. The charity has applied to the Rural Payments Agency for the land to be included in a Countryside Stewardship Mid-Tier Scheme and hopes to receive a grant towards tree maintenance, hedge-laying and some fencing. A decision on the grant won't be made until later in the year. No decisions have been made on the long-term future of the land and lakes. Work to manage the assets and comply with regulations continues.

#### Parish Lengthsman

The parish has a modest budget to employ a trained lengthsman to maintain those ditches/drains which are no longer maintained by Devon County Council. Please report any problems to the clerk or a councillor so that the lengthsman may be deployed where he is most needed.

#### Hedges

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

#### Local Tradespeople

From time to time the parish council employs people to carry out tasks on its behalf. These tasks range from repairing a wall, improving and repairing footpaths, gates and bridges, clearing ditches, and other general maintenance works. The parish council is keen to use local tradespeople and to that end if you would be interested in quoting for any such works then please contact the clerk giving your contact details and the types of work you are interested in and your details will be held on file.


#### The Universal Light
