



THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation: they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months.

What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation work, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive.

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for.

Easter is Coming - But we have to get past Good Friday

It just so happens that I am writing this whilst I am away on retreat. It is a grey windy afternoon, so instead of a walk I decided that this would be a good time to be sitting indoors with my computer. All is not lost though because from where I am sitting I can see the sea, the hills, the trees, a flock of sheep with this years lambs growing up and clumps of daffodils scattered about. So there is no doubt that it is spring and Easter will soon be here. But it is also Lent, the time when we prepare for Easter by following Jesus as he moves towards the crucifixion

I am on a silent retreat which is being led by Bishop Bob Evens who will be known to many of you because from 2004 to 2012 he was the Bishop of Crediton, our Bishop. The title is 'Learning to be a Disciple with St. John.' Bishop Bob is using various passages from St. John's Gospel to illustrate different aspects of christianity and discipleship. He has a particular gift for using art and music to bring to life some of the things which are there in bible but which we (or at least I!) hadn't thought about before. So it is all very calm and peaceful, quiet and somehow manages to be both affirming and challenging at the same time. But even here, in the silence, away from newspapers, the radio and television broad-casts we cannot escape the horrors of the war in Ukraine.

In one of the sessions Bishop Bob pointed out that there were many, many people praying about it; telling God about all the awful things happening and asking what he is go-ing to do about it. He went on to say that that is not really the way we ought to be praying. He used a quote from St. Paul's letter to the church in Corinth to illustrate what he meant. "Don't you know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit lives in you?" (1Corinthians 3:16) God's Spirit lives in every one of those people who have seen their homes destroyed by missiles and artillery shells; every one of those people who have seen their families split up as men stay to fight whilst

women and children flee to safety in other coun-tries. God is already there, he already knows and Bishop Bob said that what we ought to be doing in prayer is asking God how he feels about it and because we are now his hands and feet on earth, how we can best co-operate with him in doing something about it. That prayer might just be the most valuable prayer we can pray this Lent. Bishop Bob concluded this session with the words, "Vladimir Putin don't you know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit lives in you? You might ignore it. You might try to walk away from it, but it isn't going to go

It is still Lent though, and Lent is a time when we can particularly see God working his purposes out as we move towards the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. In the res-urrection God performed the greatest miracle ever. He brought Jesus back from the dead to live forever in heaven. But God could only do that because Jesus had first to be crucified. At any point in his life Jesus could have walked away from the path that led to the cru-cifixion. But he didn't, he co-operated fully with God and as a result the resurrection was possible.

If we co-operate with God in what, as a result of prayer, we believe he wants of us, then who knows what miracles he might be able to pull off in the 21st century?



Service in Devon to Celebrate Centenary of the Young Farmer's Club and Where it Started

The Bishop of Exeter took part in a special service on Sunday 20 February to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the birth of the Young Farmers' Club movement.

Hemyock Calf Club was founded in Mid Devon in 1921 and evolved into the National Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs, which is now one of the largest rural youth organisations in the UK with 19,000 members aged 10 to 28.

The service, which was postponed from last year due to the pandemic, took place in a packed St Mary's Church, Hemyock and featured members of the local Young Farmers' Club and some live calves.

Chair of the Young Farmers Club in the Culm Valley, Michael Vaysey, said that it meant a lot to the whole club that the church had arranged a celebration service. He said, "The Young Farmers Federation means a lot to me as I have been in the Young Farmers since the age of 14. I have done a lot of competitions now but before Young Farmers I never used to be able to speak to anyone. I was very shy when I was in school. Now I am the Chairman of the Culm Valley Club. I am nearly coming to the end of my time as a Young Farmer so I am trying to get the younger generation to come up and see what I have done so that they can get a better future for themselves."

Members of the village have also made 19 giant calf lanterns, some of which were on display in the church. They were the centrepiece of the village's annual December light parade, which was in honour of the Calf Club and Young Farmers centenary.

The Rector, Rev'd Becky Totterdell, said, "The Calf Club, formed in 1921, was a very creative way to develop the interest and skills of local young people in farming. It was just after the First World War when food was still scarce and the need for new enterprise was great. The Calf Club's focus on the four H's of 'Head, Heart, Hands and Health' was a winner and resulted

in the Young Farmers' Club becoming an international movement. This area of the Blackdown Hills is an immensely creative area generally, and it is great to see music, craft work and film production by members of the village community all playing a part in this celebration."

Georgie Pengelly the Culm Valley Young Farmers press secretary said, "The Culm Valley Young Farmers are very proud of the heritage that sparked what is now an international organisation."

The Bishop of Exeter, the Right Reverend Robert Atwell, is chair of the Church of England's Rural Interest Group and speaks on rural issues in the House of Lords.

He said, "I'm delighted to be at this centenary where we celebrate a new generation of farmers. Devon has some of the best farmland in England and it's great to see the resilience and creativity of the farming community."

"It is extraordinary that out of this Mid Devon village, so much has flowed. What they have been doing here for decades now is encouraging young people to get involved in good animal husbandry, in the care of livestock and to really uphold food production."

Bishop Robert said churches can help support their local community by getting to know the farmers in their area and talking with them to understand the challenges that they are facing including "The challenges that come with leaving the European Union and the challenges in trying to reduce our carbon footprint," he said.

"We are asking our young farmers not simply to be producing food, we are asking them also to be carers of our environment too and these are big asks."

Piers Langdon, from St Mary's, said, "There were around 35 people directly involved in making the service such a memorable event, bringing the community together".

Cr2ee/Ukraine

emyock has once again shown what an amazing parish it is raising just under £3,000 in a fortnight for Christian Response to Eastern Europe (cr2ee) who many will be aware of through their Christmas Shoebox Appeal.

The Devon charity based at Exmouth who help families in Moldova, has been supported for a number of years by David and Janice Bawler, acting as a satellite collecting point, and in turn both by villagers and those further afield.

Janice said "As well as the immediate response to financial aid we have been, and continue to be, inundated with good quality humanitarian aid. Bags and boxes of clothing, footwear, medical items, walking aids, babies goods, sanitary products, toys, non perishable food and other items have filled our dining room, 2 bedrooms, a porch and most of the kitchen. There has been a huge number of sheets, blankets and duvets which are so desperately needed. This is though, the typical response one gets from the village, surrounding area and further afield. People are incredibly supportive. We have also accepted and been extremely grateful to those who have helped transport goods to the charity depot"

To date, 15th March, Cr2ee have sent £25,000 to their colleagues in Moldova. This is to support the refugees and the families who, although having little themselves, are offering accommodation, food and clothing to Ukrainians who have flooded into this small and very poor country many in transit seeking sanctuary in other parts of the EU.

The charity has temporarily closed one of their soup kitchens offering it to 2 Ukrainian mothers with young children and a humanitarian aid truck is due to leave Exmouth in late March for Moldova. Cr2ee, who have been in existence for over 30 years have no paid staff so all donations go on aid. If you would like further details please contact David on 07773579809.







The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. 



Around Hemyock

If you were amongst those who attended the Hemyock Calf Club centenary service (postponed from last year) you will remember what a joyous occasion it was. St Marys was filled with present and past members of Culm Valley Young Farmers Club along with friends, the Lights Brigade cows and 2 very well behaved calves. Following the service YFC members served cream teas and then took part in a question and answer time with the Bishop of Exeter. There is a full report elsewhere in the Pump.

Thanks to the work of many people we now have a village skatepark which is proving to be very popular in particular with younger members of the community. Maybe we will have an Olympic champion in the future.

The Poppy Club which began recently is also proving to be a success. Meeting once a month the aim is to make poppies to be used over the Remembrance Sunday period. Beginners or the more experienced are welcomed to meet at St Marys to knit, crochet, chatter and enjoy cake and coffee.

For generations Hemyock has been known as a very generous and caring parish. Those who have lived here for many years may remember some of the events where helping others has been the priority. Flowers being sent to an area of London for Mothering Sunday, the Egg Service that saw youngsters taking eggs to St Marys which were later sent to local hospitals over the Easter period, toys were collected prior to Christmas and donated to the children's ward at Musgrove Park Hospital, the Christmas Shoebox appeal and in 1967 the then Rector, Rev William Llewellyn-Jones, set up the Culm Valley Feed the Hungry Campaign. This resulted in a 6 month campaign with 540 containers of dried milk weighing nearly 7 tons leaving the village Unigate factory, which stood at Millhayes, for an area of India where people were starving.

This brings us up to recent weeks when the horror of Russia brutally invading Ukraine has shocked the world. The village response and that of our surrounding area has been amazing. Through supporting Christian Response to Eastern Europe(Moldova) (cr2ee) almost £3,000 was donated within 3 weeks, with other people making private donations whilst the amount of humanitarian aid has been overwhelming. Cr2ee will work with their partners in Moldova to offer support to Ukrainian refugees and the Moldovians who are opening up their homes to help them. See report elsewhere in Pump.

There have also been villagers who have driven to Poland with aid from another area and someone who has chosen to go to help in Ukraine. Thanks must go to all those who have helped in any way and we pray for their safety.

Covid continues to rear its head here although most cases appear to be less severe. We remember all those affected by it and those who are unwell or recovering for surgery including **Barbara**, **Ron**, **Alan**, **John**, **Chris and Mary**. Condolences and love are sent to those who have recently had a loved one pass away including **Valerie Goff** and **Joan Adams**.

Here is an excerpt from the address given by Revd Canon Becky Totterdell at Joan's Thanksgiving service:

Les met Joan at a Whist Drive about 22 years ago, and he told me the story. In his words, more or less:

'I asked Joan if she would like a lift home from the Whist Drive.

First, she said "No", then she altered her mind and said "Yes". When she got home she got out of the car and said to me, "I'll see you next week." So I said, "Aren't you going to ask me in for a cup of tea?" And she said "Yes".

Well, the tea must have been all right because Les tells me that, after a month, he moved in.

They carried on going to Whist Drives and Bingo and were very happy together. They also enjoyed going on coach day trips to the seaside, especially Teignmouth and Weymouth. If Les lost Joan at the seafront he'd always know where to find her, because she loved playing on slot machines, and apparently was always winning teddy bears.

Everybody liked Joan; she had a bubbly personality and liked to laugh. She could always see the funny side of things. She was very well-known here in Hemyock where she had grown up and enjoyed community life. She did not have an easy life but was a very strong person and found real happiness once she had met Les. And we thank God for the great happiness she found with Les in the 22 years they enjoyed together.

History Group Report

hris Western, a History Group member, gave a really good talk at our February meeting which was enjoyed by a loyal group of our members. The talk was on the amazing 1893
Polar expedition led by the Norwegian, Fridtjof Nansen with the object of being the first team to reach the North Pole while exploring the Arctic.

He had previously successfully organised a trans Greenland expedition in 1888 with a small team and modest amount of equipment suited to the conditions with the objective of simply crossing Greenland. He led this team of six, coast to coast across 300 miles, becoming the first to explore the interior of Greenland and taking scientific readings on the way, all while enduring temperatures dropping to around minus 40 celcius, and ascending to the interior plateau approaching 9,000ft in height.

Previous well known expeditions by the major powers searching for a sea route through the Arctic, where it was believed there was an open sea between the ice floes, were both abject failures. The American Jeanette expedition of 1879 financed by the NY Herald with 33 men, of whom only 13 returned, was like the HMS Terror and Erebus British expedition of 1845 with 129 men, all of whom were lost. These expeditions planned at a Government level had the grand object of finding a Passage through the ice and into the presumed open Arctic sea. Nansen's plan was for a much smaller team and set about improving their equipment, making sledges lighter, stronger and increasing their capacity. He produced designs for better sleeping bags, skis and stoves, and took advice from the northern 'Sami' people, native of the northern territories in what is now Finland, on travel and survival techniques in the high northern latitudes. He worked with naval architects to create a design which was very different to the American and British ships which were all standard large ship designs for normal ocean going with a length to width ratio of around 5.5. His design was for a squeezed hull with a ratio of 3 to 1, a round hull bobbing on the sea with a double thickness hull of very strong timbers that could withstand the pressure of the thick ice. In the open ocean the rolling of the hull would cause sea sickness but in packed ice would simply slip up above the ice like a slippery eel. The major factor noted by Nansen was that the USS Jeanette crushed by the ice pressure was found 3 years later when some of its ice encased wreckage was discovered on the southern tip of Greenland, some 2,500 miles from where she was lost.

Nansen correctly calculated that there must be a trans polar ocean current moving south west from the area North of Russia and Norway, taking a vessel encased in ice very close to the North Pole. So his wooden ship called the Fram would simply provide good storage and shelter for his crew while they carried out scientific experiments on the ice, while leaving the ship's movement, while encased in ice, towards the North Pole to nature. Due to the success of his first Arctic expedition to Greenland he was able to raise finance, build his special designed ship, the Fram, raise a crew of 13 and generate a large amount of positive support in Norway. His expedition proved there was no land mass in the Arctic north of Greenland since this would have blocked the southerly flow of the ice encased ship. Although they did not reach the North Pole they carried out a great amount of research on the ice proving there was no Arctic land mass or northerly open sea and brought all his team, equipment and ship home safely. This provided a boost to Norway becoming independent of Sweden in 1905.

The March talk was given by Colin Spackman on the history of Wellington. The town of Weolington and Bocland was a saxon town created around 904ad after King Ina had taken control of Taunton Vale around 720ad and Bishop Asser of Sherborne, who wrote the history of King Alfred, is mentioned in the town history. St John's Church was founded in 1250 and although the town was mentioned in the Domesday Book there is no mention of a manor house until Sir John Popham built his home in Wellington between 1600 and 1650, however the main building was damaged in the civil war, but the grounds were donated to the town and became the town park enjoyed by all residents today. The 19th century saw real growth in industry, jobs and population with Thomas Fox and Elworthy building woollen mills in the town, the start of the real prosperity for the 4,000 people in the town. The 1830's saw the building of the Town Hall, Baptist Church and Workhouse, all large impressive buildings plus the extension of the Great Western Canal south of the town towards Exeter, but only reaching Tiverton. The 1840's saw the railway extending south from Taunton to the Beambridge and the creation of companies by Walter Gregory, cosmetics, Walker with his milk factory, the Price bros with their bed factory, now Relyon and in 1867 Egerton Burnett built Jubillee warehouse, which became the main part of Wellington School. Of course, earlier, King George made Wellesley Duke of the town, since he needed a similar name to remember. The end of the century saw the completion of the cottage hospital and the Monument which had taken many years gradually reaching to the sky on the top of the hill. The gradual industrial growth of the town went into reverse from the 1960's, although the population continued to grow. Thus current growth has been in supermarkets and service industries. We now look forward to a unitary authority. What is the future for the History of Wellington?

Our Easter talk on 21st April is a special event with Mrs Patricia Davies talking about her experiences in WW2 which is covered in her and her sister's book, Code Breaking Sisters, a Secret War, which she has previously covered on a BBC interview. The May talk is by John Somers, a retired lecturer from Exeter University on the changes he has seen in his long lifetime. Can we make a plea for anyone with an interest in history to become more involved with the Hemyock History Group, in whatever capacity, to take the group forward. Our web site www.blackdownarchives. org.uk receives regular requests for historic material of the area which we are usually able to provide due to our own archives held on the Groups computers. I understand that Hemyock Castle will be open for visitors on the coming Bank Holiday weekends. We do need to support this historic building at the centre of our community, before it is lost to the developers.

he management committee have always been keen to maintain the hall as an asset and improve facilities where funds allow. Users will notice the new access restriction system. The old 'punchkey' system became a bit clumsy with many codes in existence and therefore to improve security, the system we have chosen to install will regulate hirers to access for the agreed hire period.

The PA system has also been upgraded, with new loudspeakers and a replacement amplifier. Those hard of hearing will appreciate that the hearing loop system is now functioning properly, and there is also a bluetooth connection enabling connection with mobile phone or other compatible device. We have purchased a number of round tables. These are primarily for use at functions such as weddings or other parties to give a more sociable feel than rectangular tables, and some replacement (more comfortable) chairs are also on the way. Issues that the committee are set to discuss include the heating system, replacement of the fence along the Culmbridge Rd perimeter, and progress to the children's playpark.

I noticed recently whilst filing some papers, that in 2006 when Robin's Court was built on the old tennis courts, that there were 21 trustees involved in managing the hall and recreation field, and that this number has dwindled in the present day by just about half. The committee meets every two months and if you feel able to contribute just a few hours to help maintain the parish hall and the field, we'd love to hear from you. It's a wonderful parish asset, and many depend upon it for their social wellbeing, so new faces at our committee meetings would be very welcome.

LEAP NEWS

t has been a busy few weeks at the Longmead environmental project. The Hemyock Community Shedders visited the area armed with a ladder and a host of bird boxes that they had made in the shed. They proceeded to site them on the trees alongside the stream, so hopefully they will become the 'des res' for the tits and small birds this Spring. Many thanks for the bird boxes and a promise of some bug hotels in the future. A great collaboration!

The wildlife hedging saplings arrived from the Woodland Trust and an enthusiastic group of volunteers contacted mostly by the Hemyock Community facebook page, set about preparing the ground to plant the little elder, hawthorn, dog rose, hazel, dogwood and crabapple. It was a jolly crowd ranging in age from teens to very grown ups! There was soon a good routine of making a big enough hole in the clay soil, dipping the sapling roots in mycorrhizal fungi gel, planting it and supporting it with bamboo and a tree guard. There is now a zig zag of a hedge planted at a few sites within the area, mulched with wood chippings kindly donated and delivered by Paul at Ashculme. Fingers crossed that they all thrive over the next few months - we need a nice warm Summer - not too hot and dry please!

We have now purchased three Austrian scythes thanks to the Community Support Award from councillor Ray Radford. This means that we can scythe the grass in different areas as it grows and remove it, thus allowing a greater diversity of habitats in the grassland. The long term aim is to encourage meadow plants, once the fertility of the area has been reduced.

The young rhubarb is ready for pulling if you fancy a crumble, the blackcurrants are shooting and it will soon be time to plant up the beds with herbs and vegetables. There is frog spawn in the pond, the grey wagtails (the ones that look yellow rather than the grey ones which are called pied wagtails) are flitting about the stream and there is a cute little fungus called scarlet elfcup growing on the decaying vegetation near the pond. Why not wander down and have a look?

Dear Residents

e are bringing back into house, the children's services which have been under Babcock. Cabinet, on 1st August 2022, 204 FTE staff currently employed by Babcock LDP to deliver Education services will transfer back into Children's Services in Devon County Council through a TUPE process.

In preparation for this, officers from all departments affected by the move (Children's Services, ICT, Premises, HR, Finance, Communications etc), have been working as part of a project steering group to put in place the necessary arrangements to ensure a smooth transfer of staff and also that the delivery of services to schools and therefore children will not be impacted. Schools' representatives sit as part of the Project Steering Group and all Headteachers have been updated on progress. This report is to provide an update on the progress being made to transition all of the services, and the staff who deliver them. and TUPE for over 250 staff (204 FTE) Over the past 9 months senior staff have also been involved in workshops looking at how all our services currently work together and how this could be improved. There has been excellent engagement across the Council to support the transition of the Babcock LDP teams into DCC and all the workstreams are currently on track to deliver the necessary steps on time. As you will have gather by now, County have put together their 22/23 budget, I have included again the basic figures that make up the budget, it was agreed at our Budget meeting on 17th Feb.

Immediately below are the figures for this current year up to month 10 (End of January)

Adult Care and Health services are forecast to overspend by just over £3.8 million, a reduction of £1.3 million from month 8. The forecast includes budgeted savings of £283,000 still considered deliverable.

Adult Care Operations is forecasting to overspend by just over £4.1 million, this continues to be a mix of price and volume pressures but the improved position is the result of a funding agreement being reached with health around costs associated with the hospital discharge programme. Within Learning Disabilities and Autism higher demand has continued into this year with client numbers in these areas being 164 more than the budgeted level of 3,569.

Older People is also experiencing significant pressures, mainly due to price pressures on residential and increase in the number of nursing placements which are 47 more than the budgeted level of 516. Adult Commissioning and Health and Mental Health is forecast to underspend by £359,000.

Children's services are forecasting an overspend of £8.8 million a reduction of £300,000 from month 8. However, this figure does not include the projected deficit of £39.9 million on Special Education Needs and Disabilities (SEND).

The targets set for each service area have been subject to different pressures and influences.

Totals for this years budget 21/22 was £580.671m with inflation etc. Totals for 22/23 £629.362m increase of £48.691 (8.4%)

There is no getting away from the fact that this budget is one of the most challenging the authority has ever faced. Investment of over £87 million is needed for our services next year and even with the increase in funding from Government that level of investment is not affordable without making significant savings and taking money from our reserves. We put those reserves aside for a rainy day and I think we can all agree it's more like the monsoon season right now. As I have often said these reserves are finite and can only be spent once; however, I am certain that it is the right thing to, using some of that money to support the young, the elderly and the most vulnerable in our communities.

I know that roads and their conditions are of interest to all Parish Councils and the community, so I have included some information regarding this.

Network Condition, Highway Authorities are required to collect and submit data on the condition of their highway network on an annual basis. In Devon, this information is collected via a driven machine survey. The main measure of condition is the Road Condition Indicator (RCI). This is made up of several parameters, such as cracking and rutting, which combine to give an overall measure of the state of the road.

Potholes, Another indicator for the condition of the road network is the number of recorded potholes. In general, the number of potholes recorded each month in 2021 has been below the five year average. In addition to the general improvement in the condition of the network discussed above the relatively benign weather throughout autumn and the start of winter has been a benefit. The above average figures recorded for June and August were due to the wet weather experienced in May and June and the reprogramming of annual inspections to the summer months.

Gully Cleansing

The gully cleaning gangs are slightly behind programme but are confident of addressing this gap by dedicating some 'hand clean' gangs to some problem areas and increasing resources if necessary.

Grips, Easements and Buddleholes.

The cleaning of grips, easements and buddleholes remains slightly ahead of programme.

Management of Drainage Issues.

This financial year has seen in excess of 25,600 referrals made by the gangs. In response to these referrals the gangs have been able to address more than 22,000 of these requests. This is an area of the work that the team would like to continue developing by increasing capacity to meet the demand and reducing response times. However, this is going to be difficult in the next financial year with a proposed reduction in both revenue and capital budgets.

Winter Service

The start to the winter season has been relatively quiet with below average levels of salt spread in both November and December. The forecast for the start of 2022 was indicating milder, damper conditions. The risk of a short, sharp winter event has not been discounted.

A question was asked at the last Full Council meeting (17th Feb) about 20mph limits. What is the timescale for decisions and intended implementation for the 20mph speed limit routes now being invited for proposal?

REPLY BY COUNCILLOR HUGHES said, "we are committed to introducing new 20 mph speed limits in Devon in the coming financial year, as we resolved at our December Cabinet. As you will be aware elected Members and communities have been asked to submit their applications by the end of March. After this, officers will prioritise schemes for delivery. I will ask that an update is provided to Members as the prioritisation work is undertaken and a detailed delivery programme developed".

I just thought you might be interested in this, particularly around Schools.

Devon, along with other councils, continue to raise concerns with the DfE over the rising costs and demand of special educational needs, and although government has responded nationally with £730 million for 2022/23 and a further £325 million in the recent spending review. Devon's share of this funding is £12.5 million which is not sufficient to deal with the demand on the High Needs Block

Local authorities have a statutory requirement to meet the needs of people eligible for care, to support them and their carers, and to fund care for those people with needs who meet financial eligibility criteria. The Adult Commissioning and Health team work with NHS colleagues to assess the strategic health and social care needs of the Devon

population, and ensure there are solutions to meet those needs through integrated commissioning and joined up services. Commissioners work with the independent sector, helping to shape the local market to encourage quality, choice and sufficiency of provision. Local authorities have a responsibility to ensure care is maintained where a provider fails financially and services cease – for everyone, including self-funders, to ensure people's needs can continue to be met

The team are also responsible for commissioning intelligence, statutory returns and surveys, internal performance management, and involvement in sector-led improvement; for commissioning and operational policy development and strategic planning; and engaging the users of our services and their carers.

Longmead

The parish council is looking to improve the overflow car parking areas at Longmead. It has agreed to install CCTV at Longmead in the hope that it will deter anti-social behaviour around the site.

Mid Devon Public Spaces Protection Orders

The pc is supportive of the order for dogs having to be kept on a lead at Longmead. Dogs freely running on football pitches is not acceptable. The pc is supportive of dog owners and to that end it will ensure a dog friendly off lead area will be created as part of the new community land. However, following feedback from many dog walkers, the pc will look at the possibility of creating an area at Longmead that dogs may be off leads but unable to access the football pitches.

ot an easy one to write this month. On the one hand life goes on as normal, ordinary and unchanged from before 24th February; the pigs still need feeding, Widgetthe-puppy is fast becoming Widget-the-dog, old reed comes off the roof and new reed goes on.

On the other hand a war has begun that will affect every one of us, on which all of our histories pivot. I listen to the news and set out to work for fear of getting stuck waiting for some miracle, wading through a clutter of journalists minutes as snaggle-toothed as an old wire fence, catching on our hopes and fears and little good news to ease the passage of the day.

Still the house we are thatching has seen wars come and go and won't stop leaking for this one, so old reed comes off and new reed goes on. She found her just starting to calve and after 4 mixes of concrete I went to find Daisy sitting in the hedge with a huge smile on her face and a brand new calf alive and well and being cleaned from head to toe by it's mother. We left her be and with the excellent help of our friend Stuart finished the concreting. New life on a fine day in the Blackdowns.



Many comments have been made to the council about hedges around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are

some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

Local Tradespeople

From time to time the parish council employs people to carry out tasks on its behalf. These tasks range from repairing a wall, improving and repairing footpaths, gates and bridges, clearing ditches, and other general maintenance works. The parish council is keen to use local tradespeople and to that end if you would be interested in quoting for any such works then please contact the clerk giving your contact details and the types of work you are interested in and your details will be held on file.

Rose Cottage

A planning application to demolish Rose Cottage and build a row of 3 terraced houses has been delayed whilst various wildlife surveys are completed. The scheme includes the redevelopment of the developer's Brethren Chapel, next door to Rose Cottage. If planning permission is granted, the charity would look to own 2 of the terraced houses which might be rented at affordable rents to local people. At this stage no decision has been made with regard to how the charity might proceed with Rose Cottage and it will obtain legal advice to ensure it complies with any Charity Commission regulations/guidance.

Hartsmoor Lakes

Mike Leigh-Mallory is continuing to manage the lakes on behalf of the charity until December 2022. A specialist engineer inspected the fishing lakes and has produced a report giving the charity advice on how best to mend the temporary fix to the outlet pipe on Greensands Lake. The charity intends to follow his advice and recommendations. Firstly, it involves arranging for a specialist company to CCTV the outlet pipe to pinpoint the exact location of the temporary fix. It then hopes to seal off the old outlet pipe and install a new outlet.

The Environment Agency (EA) conducted a bathymetric survey of Greensands Lake which provided much valuable information, including confirmation that the current water volume of 24,186m3 does not fall under the Reservoir Act. This is good news for the charity as it does not have to concern itself with the extra compliance and regulations that would result if the management of the lakes were governed by this act. However, it should be pointed out that if the capacity reduction enacted in Wales in 2016 is implemented within England (which could happen in the next 5 years) then the Greensands Lake would need to be registered under the Reservoirs Act. Later this month, the otter fencing

will be erected around the syndicate lake to protect the fish from predators. A small grant from the Angling Trust helped towards the cost of the fencing.

Mr Leigh-Mallory has been asked to put forward his proposals for the long-term future of the lakes for the charity to consider. At this stage no decision has been made on how the charity might proceed. Options include selling the lakes, keeping the lakes, or leasing the lakes, and it will obtain legal advice to ensure it complies with any Charity Commission regulations/guidance.

The land

The charity is leasing the land to local young farmer Rob Burridge until December 2022. The charity was successful with its application to the Rural Payments Agency for the land to be included in a Countryside Stewardship Mid-Tier Scheme. This means it will be able to receive grant monies towards tree maintenance, hedge laying and some fencing.

The land was damaged when various pieces of heavy agricultural machinery were removed following an auction. The charity is liaising with the purchaser with regard to reinstatement of the land

East Devon Hunt has been told that it does not have permission to use the land. At this stage no decision has been made with regard to how the charity might proceed with selling the land, keeping the land, or leasing the land and it will obtain legal advice to ensure it complies with any Charity Commission regulations/guidance. As above.

General Admin

The estate has now been settled and all monies transferred to the charity. The charity awaits confirmation from the land registry that the assets have been registered. The charity's financial yearend is March 2022 and AC Mole have been appointed to prepare the accounts and tax return.

The charity plans to meet bi-monthly to move things forward.

And Finally

If you would like to get involved or wish to know what is happening around the parish then please come along to one of the council meetings, normally held on the second Monday of every other month in the Parish Hall. The next meeting is the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on Monday 11th April at 7.30pm Parish Hall, with the council meeting following at 7.45pm. 

News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

These recent weeks at Rosemary Lane Chapel we have been in the book of Genesis considering the life of Joseph. Very early on in this story, we come to realise how many difficulties Joseph encountered. He was hated and rejected by his brothers; He was cut off, cast aside, stripped, beaten and sold into slavery. And yet, as we follow the story, though sold into slavery, we realise that Joseph never becomes enslaved by bitterness or hatred or fear. He trusted in God. He trusted that God was at work, even when he couldn't perceive it.

Similarly, William Cowper, the hymn writer, knew a great many difficulties in his lifelong battle with depression. During one season of immense darkness, when he could not see the way through, he penned these words:

God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform. He plants his footsteps in the sea And rides upon the storm.

You fearful saints, fresh courage take; The clouds you so much dread Are big with mercy and shall break In blessings on your head.

Joseph trusted in God because, whilst he didn't always understand the events in his life or the events in the lives of those around him, he understood something of the heart of God for him and for others. He understood something of his love and grace and goodness.

For us, as it was for William Cowper, the heart of God, His love and grace, is manifest in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We have One to whom we can look, a place to which we can come amidst all the events of life and be assured of the constancy of His love and grace and goodness towards us, even in the face of darkness and in the day of difficulty:

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us
1 JOHN 3:16

Why do I share this with you? Recent events in Ukraine create in our hearts a great many questions, most of which may remain unanswered and unresolved. We are left broken-hearted for those whose lives have been devastated by the warfare that has broken out within their borders. We are made aware that millions have been made refugees and millions more left internally displaced by this conflict. Those who hold fast to their faith are not immune to these questions. And whilst I offer no answers regarding the outcome of this war, I am comforted by God's word that reveals his heart for those affected in this war:

The Lord protects the foreigner among us. He cares for the orphans and widows. PSALM 146:9

Time and time again, God's word reaffirms his heart for the broken-hearted, those made refugees and those made orphans and widows of war.

His heart is for their protection.

His heart is for their consolation.

His heart is for their comfort.

Understanding God's heart, the love that is manifest in Jesus who came to bind up the broken-hearted, would, I pray, give rise to compassion. We do not know what the coming days will bring, but I know that these will be days in which we must allow the heart and love of God to lead us into action, both prayerful and practical. For as John continued...

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.

1 JOHN 3:16-18
