The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months

What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conse ork, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact rmation and information on what to look out fo



A tribute to Reverend Ron White

Dear Friends.

'No man is an island, entire of itself', wrote the great seventeenth century poet John Donne. The reality of this hits home to each of us when we lose someone special to us. Not only have we lost that person, but we ourselves are changed by the loss. The closer the person, the greater the change. As I take funeral services for each unique person from our villages, I am so much aware that not only do we grieve for the person gone from us, but the family and friends gathering together are at the start of a new journey and way of life.

But loss is also a time to look back with thankfulness for all the good of the past and, as local churches, we have been doing that as we also grieve the passing of my clergy colleague, Revd Ron White, at the grand age of 86. Born and brought up in the Bolham Valley of Clayhidon, Ron's ministry and work took him to far-flung Africa, and whether at home or abroad he was considerably pioneering in many different ways. In the Anglican congregations across our four villages, in Rosemary Lane Chapel and in Hemyock Baptist Church, Ron will be remembered for:

His heart for mission

That was seen in his work as a young local preacher, as mission secretary for the Christian Union at Bristol University, running beach missions, starting Devon Assemblies youth camps, his work with Christians Abroad, Scripture Union in Uganda, and supporting Christian unions in schools. His passion for bringing young people to Christ was born from his ministry both as a teacher and a missionary. Ron's heart for mission transformed the lives of many young people for good.

His heart for ministry

Ron's Christian commitment eventually led him to ministry as a priest in the Church of England. As a church family in these parishes we have very much valued Ron's ministry among us, leading services and preaching, and ministering communion to people at home and to community groups. I think he saw it as a gift of God that he could minister in the villages in which he grew up, and which were always so close to his heart. Ron was a part of the Anglican churches' ministry team and his contributions to our planning and discussions were always valuable with the wealth of experience he brought.

We thank God that this is so not just for St Paul, but also for Ron White, and so we entrust him with thanksgiving to the loving care and the joyful welcome of the Lord he loved.

His heart for music

The congregation at St Mary's, Hemyock, have benefitted particularly from this gift of Ron's, through his ministry as choir master and organist over very many years. And the Culm Davy congregation relished his leading morning communion services because he would be both at the front leading and at the back playing the organ! And his accordion enabled joyful worship to take place out in the open air wherever needed, especially at Clayhidon, and lifted everyone's spirits.

The words of the hymns, Bible readings and poems chosen for his funeral service spoke very eloquently of the assurance Ron had that his life was bound up securely in God, and of the confidence we can have in looking forward to the resurrection and the life to come. This is an assurance that is offered to all of us, through the loving gift of Jesus, and Ron would want us to know it!

A fitting summary of Ron's life is one which St Paul writes about himself to his colleage, Timothy, as he neared the end of his life:

'I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race. I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day - and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.'

APCM

New Year means it is time to look back on the last one. Well it is in certain quarters including the Diocese of Exeter who want various bits on information on what we, and other churches, have been doing. In the past few years we at St Mary's have pulled some of this information together to produce a report looking at what the various groups have been doing. This gets looked at in what is in effect the Church's A.G.M. - the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

This is done in conjunction with another ancient meeting the Annual Vestry Meeting. This has one job to do - to elect the Churchwardens for the next 12 months. HEMYOCK SINGERS – An end of an era

emyock Singers have provided the village with concerts and stage shows for almost 50 years but sadly the L membership had become low, being especially affected by Covid, and their last concert took place on December 12th 2022.

Janice Bawler an original member who sang with the group for over 40 years write -The group grew out of a music appreciation group within Hemyock Leisure Centre giving their first public performance in 1973 - a concert version of Iolanthe. Such was the success the following year saw them singing The Gondoliers. A change of genre then saw the group present at Hemyock Parish church The Crucifixion by Stainer and by 1975 their first full stage production HMS Pinafore was followed the next year by Merrie England with a cast of over 50 for each production.

Original performances had been for one night but later years saw 5 nights when the Parish Hall was filled to capacity with a waiting list. The group performed a huge variety of musical stage shows including My Fair Lady, The Wind in the Willows, Annie get your Gun, The Wizard of Oz, Fiddler on the Roof, Calamity Jane and Oliver. This went on to win the National Operatic and Dramatic Association's (NODA) Regional Award for Excellence. Programmes produced by members also won regional NODA awards.

A long standing annual tradition saw the group singing choral works including Handel's Messiah, Vivaldi's Gloria and Faure's Requium both here and in other venues as well as entertaining at village events, care homes and Christmas celebrations throughout Mid Devon, Wellington and Taunton. The Singers were also amongst those who took part in the BBC Songs of Praise when filmed at Taunton in October 2021.



To celebrate their 21st year a hugely successful dinner was held at the Parish Hall when other invited guests joined past Producers and Musical Directors and presentations made.

Hemyock History Group

Rev John de Burgh Forbes

Our Rector from 1896 until 1927 was born in 1857 in Whitchurch on Thames and when baptised, Queen Victoria signed as a witness. The connection with the Royal family was due to the fact that his grandfather was Sir John Forbes who became a surgeon Commander in the Royal Navy from training in Edinburgh in 1806 until he was discharged in 1816 to become a well respected physician in Penzance and Chichester before being appointed Physician to the Queen in 1841 and knighted in 1853. Rev John went to Clifton College, Bristol, ordained at Kings College and served as Chaplain to the Royal Court in St Petersburg prior to arriving in Hemyock in 1896. He lived at the Rectory, which is now Regency House, with his sister Eliza to help with the catering and admin. His first action was to build the church rooms after purchasing the land from two local families after their cottages were burnt down. Traction engines with coal fires travelling the lanes did not go too well with the thatched roofs of the cottages as sparks were blown out the engine funnels. Local councils had also just been formed to undertake some of the functions that the Church had previously been responsible for such as the Collector of taxes for the poor. The church graveyard had also become crowded and the Government instructed the new councils to find new land on which to create a cemetery, helped by the Rector. The Hemyock benefice was attractive to the rector due to the fact that he could walk to the station, hop on a train and travel in style to Plymouth, from where he could take a passenger ship down to the Mediterranean during the cold winter months. John Forbes eventually established a C of E parish in Palermo, Sicily to which he retired in 1927 for 6 years before returning to England and joining his brothers and sisters at Swanston House in Chudleigh to which his Mother had retired in 1901 when his father died at Whitchurch on Thames. Obviously a number of his 12 brothers and sisters had married and moved away from the family including his eldest brother, Alexander, who moved to Melbourne, Australia and whose latest descendant became a prominent diplomat. A number of brothers and brothers in law became merchants trading around the world with James, emigrating to Canada, Eustace, an engineer with the British South African company in Rhodesia and became involved with the Matabele wars in Rhodesia. One of his brothers in law, married to Charlotte, based themselves in Liverpool running an import and export business. They all grew up with Sir John and his brother Alexander, who retired to live in the family house in Whitchurch, for their last few years.

Alexander had been a merchant in Mexico, when the Mexican empire included Texas and the SW America States, Costa Rica, Honduras, Guatamala, Nicaragua and California where he owned silver mines.

In 1835 Alexander, who was also the British vice consul in Mexico, wrote the first book in English about California and was involved in persuading the British Government to exchange the considerable debt owed to Britain by Mexico, for the state of California. However the break away states of America were advancing west gradually taking control of all the land north of the Rio Grande and in 1846 this included California.

Rev John de Burgh Forbes chaired a parish meeting of residents who raised the funds for the memorial Pump erected in 1902 which has recently been completely renovated by the Parish Council.

Rev John de Burgh Forbes became the first President of the Bowling Club in 1905 and was able to hand over the ownership of the land, on which the Green had been established to Trustees of the club at a meeting on 1st July 1921. Rev John was also the official who opened the new Parish Hall in 1927.

SW Archaeology

Dr Bryn Morris, who manages South West Archaeology (Swarch), gave a talk at our January meeting about his work on investigating various sites using a variety of techniques. A number of slides displayed the result of Lidar surveys at Killerton Estate completed by Swarch. Drone LiDAR surveys are a rapid and accurate way of capturing large areas at a high level of detail. With the added benefit of being able to penetrate vegetation, a LiDAR survey is a cost effective and reliable way to get topographic survey data of a site. The Dyke Aclands owned several estates in the West Country including Columbjohn Manor, Broadclyst Manor, Pixton Park, Tetton Park and Trerice Manor originally owned by the Arundell family but when Margaret Acland married 2nd Baron Arundell brought this estate into the Acland family. Swarch were involved in designating the two deer park pales and watering pond, at Killerton, probably post-medieval in origin, but dating principally from the C18 onwards. The sections of park pale survive well and will allow a valuable and very complete insight into the domestic economy and pursuits of the occupants of this private estate. The earthworks will retain archaeological material relating to their construction and more generally on the use of later post-medieval deer parks at a period when they were becoming less fashionable across the country as a whole. The history and evolution of the deer park is well documented both historically and archaeologically which enhance our understanding and significance of Killerton's deer park. With the scheduled monument Dolbury Hillfort, the Grade II listed Killerton House and the Grade II registered park and garden, as well as a number of other listed buildings which together illustrate well the historical development of Killerton. Of course several of the estates with land and buildings have been given to the National Trust to manage. Most of the estates had deer parks since when they were established the land represented the largest Royal Hunting Park in the Country. Dr Bryn also indicated which roads had been part of the original country layout with field patterns spreading from the roads rather than newer roads simply breaking up the field patterns. This was a fascinating talk from someone who has spent his life protecting historic treasures in our landscape.

The next two talks will be given by Colin Spackman on the Duke of Wellington and his connections to the area on Thursday 9th February and Alan Reeve on Bishop Lydiard Mill on Thursday 9th March.



Around Hemyock

t seems like only yesterday we were enjoying the festive season. In a short few weeks we celebrated seeing the village adorned with colourful lights and a wonderful parade with lanterns depicting the weather, trips around the estates by Father Christmas and his band of merry helpers, St Mary's Christmas Fair, church services including the joyful Christingle afternoon and carols in the churchyard whilst a Songs of Praise welcomed in the New Year.

For some of our families it has also been a time of great sadness with a member of their family passing away. We remember **David Berkley, Robert Pike, Rev Ron White, Perce Moon and Ron Cassell** who from 1980-1992 was the Pastor of our Baptist Chapel. The following has been received.

Robert Pike formally of Oakleigh and later of Prowses, Hemyock passed away peacefully in the presence of his two daughters, Karen and Kate on Christmas Eve 2022 on Clyst Ward at the RD&E Hospital, Exeter. He was much loved and will be greatly missed by all his family and friends.

Robert was born on the 17th of Dec 1944 in the Llanfrechfa Grange Hospital, Cwmbran Wales. He spent the majority of his adult life living in Clayhidon and in more recent years, Hemyock. Robert was an active member of the local community. He worked for the local council authority as a lorry driver until he had a stroke in 1998. In his spare time, he was a Parish Councillor for many years and Bar man at the Half Moon Inn, Clayhidon during the 1980&90's. Robert also collected parish donations for the Poppy Appeal.

He played darts, skittles and enjoyed volunteering his time as a driver and general helper for the Healthy Living Centre and other local charities. He would often help out at the Garages Youth Club in Hemyock. He was a founding member of the Blackdown Sea Angling Club and enjoyed both fresh and sea water fishing. Prior to his heath failing, Robert enjoyed spending time over at "Johnnys "ponds. As a keen amateur CB Radio operator, he would whistle out the call signs "M3YNI" and "Rod Rest". You would often see the oversized ariel on his car above the hedge line, before seeing the car! Roberts Funeral took place on Friday 27th January 2023 at Taunton Crematorium. Those who attended were asked to wear funky ties, waists coats and trouser braces in memory of Robert's quirky dress sense.

David Berkley

David Berkley was born and brought up in the Home Counties and studied Agriculture at Reading University, where he met his wife Vivien. In 1958 they moved to Somerset to manage a YMCA hostel at North Cadbury that was being used for the British Boys for British Farms scheme to train a new generation of young people to work in farming. This led to a job as lecturer in Agriculture with Somerset Farm Institute, first day release around the county, then based in Cannington. In the mideighties he resigned to start his own business in the then-new field of livestock pregnancy scanning, covering the whole of the South West. That venture only ended when his equipment finally became beyond repair. With their six children grown up and with their own families, in 2003 David and Vivien sold their home in Somerset and moved to Tedburrow, next door to son Chris and his family. Later they downsized to a cottage in Hemyock High Street. In Devon, they characteristically got involved in many village activities, including the Baptist Church and The Repair Cafe. These activities all supported David's lifetime principles of "Make and mend", to think of others before himself and to live life in Jesus' name.

Rev Ron White

St Marys needed extra seating to be brought in for the service of Rev Ron White attended by 200 people. A man of considerable talent he was held in great esteem and affection by all who knew him.

Ron died on 16th December 2022. His funeral service took place on 6th January 2023, and he is buried in Hemyock Cemetery with many family and friends.

He was born in 1936 at Troakes Farm, Clayhidon, went to the village school, was awarded a full boarding scholarship at Exeter School, followed by a degree course at Bristol University gaining a 2:1 in Biology with Chemistry. He then did a PGCE at Oxford. His subsequent career involved teaching in different types of school: Abbotsholme, a progressive boarding school; Birch Freeman High School, a boys' secondary school in Lagos, Nigeria; 2 years at Honiton when it was a secondary modern, and 12 settled years at Uffculme (1974 – 1985).

In parallel there has always been a strong Christian faith and commitment which led him to taking up a position of leadership in a Christian organisation (Scripture Union) in Uganda. We were deported by Idi Amin's henchmen in 1973.

43 years of Ron's life were lived in fellowship at Rosemary Lane Chapel and 43 years in the Church of England. He was ordained priest in 1986, served his curacy in Ivybridge and was appointed vicar of Stoke Fleming, Blackawton and Strete (South Hams) in 1988.

In retirement since 2000 he has lived out his priestly ministry in our local parishes as well as taking on the position of organist and choirmaster at Hemyock. He was also a pianist, accordion player, musical director (Hemyock Singers), actor (VAS), author, entertainer at harvest suppers, secretary or administrator of several village groups, coffee shop server, gardener, artist, litter picker, putter outer of bins etc etc...

Perhaps he really was the character he once played in The Mikado: Pooh Bah – the Lord High Everything Else.

We send condolences and love to the family and friends of those mentioned and to others known to us.

To all who are unwell or recovering from surgery or illness we send all good wishes remembering by name **Kay Lane, John Andrew, Chris Hudson, Joan Cooper, Alan Craig, Mary and Chris.**

The AONB had commented that they were keen to limit the introduction of development in isolated locations. The application lacked clarity for use and need.

Finance

Income - included overage payment, donations, interest, and cemetery. Expenditure - included clerk's pay and expenses, grass cutting, village maintenance, insurance, toilet cleaning and consumables, electricity, water, asset maintenance, legal fees, room hire, bank charges and Christmas competition.

The following grants were awarded:-

- + £1000 Blackdown Support Group
- + £1500 Repair Café, Jim's Shed

The pc has agreed to keep the Band D annual rate at £97.31, reducing the overall precept it receives to £84,890.

Longmead

The pc continues to liaise with the company which Maverick (skatepark designer) has appointed to complete a flood risk assessment, and Devon County Council. Once the pc understands and is content with the flood compensation areas, the planning application will be submitted to MDDC.

Work to fix and improve drainage on the road to the containers has been completed. The pc intends to install some sleepers to protect the grass areas and then, later in the year, consider a larger project to look at the best surface for these areas.

Community Speed Watch - More Volunteers Are Needed! Have you seen or heard vehicles speeding on Station Road? Are you concerned? Could you spare an hour to monitor the traffic? The village has its own speed watch team and it is looking for new members. Community Land

As part of a 106 legal agreement, 7 acres of land will be offered to the parish council. The pc has created a new Community Land Committee to drive this project forward.

The parish council hopes the land will:-

- Be a space that brings families and communities of all ages together
- Be developed along sustainable and green principles
- Encourage people to spend time in nature through a good design of the space

The pc intends to create a path from Longmead through the two fields of green open space to link up with the new development, Oak Mount.

With regard to the 7 acres, the parish council invites interested groups/individuals who wish to create a community area within the open space to contact the council. The council is hoping that groups of like-minded individuals will get together and drive their project forward. The pc will facilitate and support each group.

If you've always wanted an allotment, or wish to create a community orchard, or wildflower meadow, talk to the council about your idea and together we can create a great space for everyone to enjoy.

The judge this year said' Hemyock's Christmas lights are truly impressive and even more so when you go round and look at all of them. The whole display is anchored by the wonderful pink light displays on the trees and the pink clouds, especially at St Mary's and with the large star on top of the tower. There is a lot of work involved in doing that many trees and the Lights Brigade team who do it should be thoroughly congratulated. I particularly liked the tree baubles at Higher Millhayes, and the effective weather theme in Castle Park of a polar bear on an iceberg in a blue sea. The bungalow in the centre of the village caught my eye because the use of a single soft white colour throughout the house and garden was so effective, and in Eastlands I liked the way lines of lights were trailed over a garden even if it didn't have any convenient trees. Of course, it was hard to choose winners. Impossible really, because the overall effect is that the community cares and we all enjoy the Christmas feelings the lights create.'

T t was summer when I last wrote one of these. Sometimes just normal, everyday life eats away at your time like the tide at L Sidmouth cliffs. I remember we arrived there once one summer's evening for a cheeky fish and chips after work, to find a cloud of red dust hanging over the shore, another huge chunk of land having fallen into the sea. Sometimes no matter how hard you try and defend your time, with early starts, late finishes, time just goes.

Up until the New Year at least the weather has been good, especially as we have been on the largest roof we have ever done. It's not the biggest house really, but one of those with an extension every 100 years for the last 400, so there are valleys and hips all over the place. The customers have been wonderful, really patient and kind, and just glad to be warmer and drier under each new bit of roof. 

The Village Hall Management Committee are progressing plans for the hall improvements. The next stage is to submit a full planning application and obtain Building Regulation approvals This will allow us to approach building contractors and seek quotations.

The expected costs are around £150000 and hall reserves will allow about £40000 to support this. The balance will be funded by grant aid. Once we have detailed costings the Committee will approach grant and funding sources locally and nationally.

Fund raising is ongoing and we continue to promote hall use with hires and live events which will boost our reserves. The annual Parish Council grant of $\pounds 2000$ delivered to support our running costs is appreciated.

Our lengthsman has filled in 55 potholes in the parish using 52 tubs of material provided by Devon Highways. We will monitor how effective these repairs are.

Many comments have been made to the council about hedges around the parish encroaching on to roads. Residents are politely asked to ensure their hedges are kept trimmed. Whilst there are some restrictions on when hedges may be cut, if there are road safety concerns then under these circumstances those restrictions do not apply.

From time to time the parish council employs people to carry out tasks on its behalf. These tasks range from repairing a wall, improving and repairing footpaths, gates and bridges, clearing ditches, and other general maintenance works. News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

his morning, in the Hillman household, we are dealing with disappointment. Not for the first Saturday in recent months, football has been cancelled. The pitches are waterlogged and unplayable. My wife contains her understandable glee, she has been saved from a rather wet morning. The boys stand in stark contrast: they are a picture of disappointment and frustration. It's difficult to watch, but disappointment can be a common feature in life.

Recent months at Rosemary Lane Chapel have been full and busy, particularly over Christmas. It was a time of rejoicing as we shared in the celebrations of Christmas with members of our community: The BSG Christmas Lunch, Toddlers and Venturers Christmas Parties, and Open the Book Assemblies at Hemyock Primary School. Sunday services were shaped by our advent series entitled 'Christmas According to Matthew' giving us cause to focus on the events surrounding the birth of Jesus, the arrival of Immanuel. The season was made complete by the inclusion of our Christmas all-age service, Carols By Candlelight and our Christmas morning worship service. And yet, this well-planned season, rich in anticipation, excitement and hope, was not free from disappointment (and I'm not talking about England's exit from the world cup).

At a time when we make so many plans, when anticipation and excitement build, if things don't go as hoped for, we can face disappointment. Ill-health hampered many from attending the aforementioned events or even disrupted family plans for a Christmas long hoped for in the aftermath of Covid. For many whose experience was loss, disappointment doesn't even come close to describing the sadness and grief encountered during the Christmas season.

We are faced with a question – when hope flourishes, how do we handle disappointment? When we spend so much time anticipating the events of a season like Christmas, how do we deal with derailed plans?

When we come to the accounts recorded in the Bible of the birth of Jesus, we find a familiar scene. We picture the infant Jesus surrounded by Mary, Joseph, Shepherds, Wise Men, donkeys, sheep and maybe a camel. The scene is framed by a stable and a star that shines brightly above. The scene is quiet, peaceful, and seemingly perfect. However, even if the scene ever looked like this, it didn't stay this way. The resentment and jealousy of a bitter king forced Joseph, Mary and Jesus to flee to Egypt. The arrival of Jesus, the very first Christmas, doesn't end as we would expect or hope. Jesus becomes a refugee. No doubt Mary and Joseph battled with disappointment. But as we read these events in Matthew's gospel, we are reminded of two things that I believe help us in our disappointment. First, God the Father remains present in his watchful care and protection of his Son (Matthew 2:13):

¹³ When they had gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up," he said, "take the child and his mother and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for the child to kill him."

It is God's word that sends Jesus to safety, it is God who remains present. This is true for all God's children: He is present, He is purposeful, even in disappointment. Second, Jesus didn't come to live a life removed from fear, disappointment and pain. Jesus, even as a child, experienced life's difficulties. Why is this important for us? Well, the One who died for us, who rose again, now lives to intercede for us before God the Father. He intercedes as One familiar with pain and suffering and disappointment.

Therefore, Christ, who is fully God, became fully man and sympathizes with our weaknesses and cares for us in them. I wonder what impact it would have upon us if this year ahead we longed for, not for what the world reveres as perfect, but for the promises and presence of God. These concluding events of the birth of Jesus as recorded in Matthew remind us, through the experience of the incarnate Son of God, that He is with us, more than this, He is for us, even, especially, in our disappointments.

> I will sing the wondrous story of the Christ who died for mehow he left the realms of glory for the cross of Calvary. Yes I will sing the wondrous story of Christ who died for mesing it with His saints in glory, gathered by the crystal sea.

I was lost: but Jesus found me, found the sheep that went astray, raised me up and gently led me back into the narrow way. Days of darkness still may meet me, sorrows path I oft may tread; but His presence still is with me, by his guiding hand I'm led.*
