THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months

What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation ork, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for

A Time to Celebrate

I find it very depressing and disappointing that the newspapers and news broadcasts concentrate so much on bad news. I know that there are all kinds of terrible things happening in the world, from the war in Ukraine, the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, how much worse everything might get right across the world due to climate change, right down to travel disruption caused by snow in this country. But it would be much more uplifting, if just occasionally, the headlines were to focus on a good news story.

Even in the midst of all the bad things that are happening in the world, there are still plenty of things for us to celebrate. Just look around at this beautiful area of countryside we are fortunate enough to be able to live in. The spring flowers are in bloom, the clocks have gone forward so the evenings are getting lighter. There is a sense that Summer is just around the corner.

On Sunday 9th April we celebrate Easter, arguably the greatest celebration of the Church year. Easter Day is when we celebrate the fact that God raised Jesus from death to prove that our life here on earth is only the prelude to eternal life in heaven in the closer presence of God. What better news could there possibly be than that?

Then on Saturday 6th May we shall be celebrating the Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. In fact there will be a whole weekend of celebrations including an open air Church Service at Longmead followed by the Big Coronation Lunch in Hemyock. It is, of course, the first time we have had a Coronation in this country for 70 years. I can remember seeing the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II on television, the first time a Coronation had ever been televised. We all went round to my cousin's house, because they were the only ones with a television set. It had a 9 inch black and white screen and to see the picture properly the curtains had to be closed! Maybe that first weekend in May will also be a time for us oldies to reminisce about how much has changed since the last Coronation and to be thankful for some of the ways in which life is easier now than it was then. How, I wonder, did we ever manage without our mobile phones, without emails, without being able to look up everything you could possibly want to know (and even things you really don't want to know!) on Google?

And the celebrations continue, on Sunday 28th May is the Feast of Pentecost, or Whit Sunday. That is when the Church celebrates the sending of the Holy Spirit to Jesus' first disciples with what sounded like a rushing wind and what looked like tongues of flame. It is a festival which seems to have been forgotten about except in church circles, partly I suspect because it used to have a Bank Holiday associated with it, but no longer does. Except this year, thanks to Easter falling when it does, Pentecost is the day before the Spring Bank Holiday, so for this year at least Whit Sunday has got its Bank Holiday back. Yet another reason to celebrate.

I know that I am a 'glass half full', rather than a 'glass half empty' person, but I cannot help thinking that if we all put more emphasis on the good things in life and didn't allow ourselves to get bogged down in the doom, gloom and despondency we are bombarded with by the media, then the world would be a much better place. Yes, there are terrible things which happen and there will continue to be terrible things which happen, but there are lots of good things as well. So why not try looking for all the good things which happen around us? God makes sure that Springtime and Harvest come around each year. If we trust in him and make the most of our opportunities I am sure we will find lots more things we can celebrate about.

Ring for the King

7 ou may have heard or seen of a campaign run by the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers to trt and get all ringable *bells sounding out at the time of the upcoming Coronation.* "Ring for the King" has been the cry. The last time we had something similar was just before the new Millennium in 1999.

Hemyock is like many towers - looking for more ringers. But the Coronation is only 4 weeks away I hear you cry (if you are one of those who grab for the "Pump" the moment it is published), how long does it take to learn? How long is a piece of string? I reply.

That is an interesting question. The answer from my experience is anywhere between 11 months and One and a half hours. (No that is not a typing error). Some people have a natural ability for ringing, others have to concentrate more.

We can say that:-

- You do not have to be Superman or Superwoman.
- The ability to count (to 6 in Hemyock or 16 in Birmingham) helps.
- So is being over 1.5 m in height.
- You do not have to read music.

We are always happy to talk about ringing so if you are interested contact Tower Captain Lin Holway on 681522. What do you get from learning? You get a skill which stretches back to the 1500s. You join about 40000 ringers in England, and more overseas, you getting involved in lots of locall history, open the doors to nearly 6000 places in the world where bells are rung "full circle", have gentle beneficial exercise, and become a messenger as the bells pass on messages from "A service starting soon", "there's a wedding" or "someone has died", or as in this case "There's a new King".

Ring for the King anyone?

A very big thank you!

For the last 20+ years, John Northam ('Old Rikki') has been examining the annual Church Accounts for St Mary's Hemyock and Culm Davy Chapel and is now to retire and file away his calculator. John has worked with several different Treasurers and seen 5 changes in Rectors. During this time accounting



processes, rules and regulations have become more stringent - financia reporting to the Exeter Diocese and onward to national auditors is certainly more complicated than it was, so John's advice and affirmation has been gratefully received!

Hemyock History Group

he talk on 16th February was given by Colin Spackman from Wellington Museum on the visits to Wellington by the Dukes of Wellington.

Colin has produced the most definitive record of the connection between the town of Wellington and the Dukes of Wellington whose principal residence is at Stratfield Saye, Berkshire.

The very informative booklet written by Colin is available from the Wellington Museum at a cost of £3.50. The History group does own a copy which is available should you wish to borrow it. Arthur Wesley was born in 1769 in Dublin and had an elder brother, called William, who decided to change their name to Wellesley, which does seem to be a higher ranking name with more letters in it. Their father was already an Earl, of Mornington, which does help in the scheme of things. So as Arthur Wellesley, he progressed through the ranks of the army to reach the hierarchy as Lieutenant General Sir Arthur Wellesley leading an army against Napolean who had invaded Portugal on his latest adventure into the Iberian Peninsula in 1809, to be stopped in his tracks by Arthur Wellesley. King George III and the Prime Minister, the Duke of Portland, decided to reward Arthur with a Peerage, and both were eager to learn what new title he would choose. Now, we know Wellington as a town is not far from Wellesley, in spelling not geographically. Arthur notified the authorities and he was on the road to becoming first Viscount Wellington, then Earl of Wellington, then Marquess of Wellington and in 1814, became the first Duke of Wellington even before his great success at the Battle of Waterloo. By a simple vote in parliament the Duke was awarded £400,000 which was used to acquire the estate at Stratfield Saye. In addition to his success on the battlefield Arthur progressed to Downing St as Prime Minister for a total of 3 years, before retiring to his London house at 1 London. After his death in 1852 at the age of 83 he was interred in a magnificent tomb in St Pauls. Subsequent Dukes continued to visit Wellington and its schools and other civic buildings. The booklet produced by Colin Spackman contains a wealth of material from his research that has never been assembled in one place before.

The March talk was given by Alan Reeve about working water mills still operational in the area. Alan works as a volunteer guide, showing visitors at Bishop Lydiard Mill how the working mill grinds flour using the machinery in use for hundreds of years. Water wheels are very well known as the means to turn the heavy grinding stones. However several mills in the area used turbines which rotate horizontally as the water flows through them, rotating the flutes around the drive shaft which will transfer the energy through a gear wheel to the grinding stone for the fine flour to be produced. Hemyock had several mills in addition to the mills at Clayhidon and Culmstock at Culmbridge, Millhayes, Whitehall and Westown. A visit will be arranged to the Bishop Lydiard Mill in June for our members to have the opportunity of seeing the mill in full operation. Please let us know whether you would like to join this visit to the historic working mill.

The April meeting will be on Thursday 13th April by Chris Coopey of Uffculme History Group on the first TV programs broadcast to the Culm Valley. The talk in May will be given by Pauline Rook with her library of local images of the Blackdown Hills over the years on 11th May.

Around Hemyock

s the Pump lands on our doorstep, we will be just a few weeks away from the Coronation of HM King Charles III. A Thime of great celebration for our country as well as here in the village. The Book of Hemyock shows folk dancing through the street in 1953 followed by the majority of villagers and those who lived here at the time may also remember the **Girl Guides** planting the cherry tree in the lower corner of the Recreation Field whist the Coronation committee of 1902 were mainly responsible for the village Pump being erected to commemorate, in part, the Coronation of Edward VII. There are probably also several families who still own Coronation mugs etc from past years.

It is interesting to see photos of the committees from that year and 1911 - all men - and then in 1937 when a committee of over 40 men and women organised village celebration. As a community I'm sure we will all look forward to a weekend of activities in May and thanks go to all involved. Perhaps there will be another permanent memorial in the village as a reminder of the day?

The Parish Hall was alive with fun and laughter for Valley Arts production of Robin Hood - our son travelled from Pembroke to watch his friend in the lead role - and moving the annual show to February appears to have been a great success. Well done everyone!

The horror felt by many on seeing the devastation caused by the earthquake in **Turkey and Syria** has seen parishioners responding as usually happens here with a large variety of items being donated plus nearly £1,000 from a coffee morning and Benefice church donations going to **Shelterbox**.

Donations to war torn Ukraine through cr2ee have continued including several new Ghillie kettles, donated by a villager, enabling water to be boiled and food warmed using small twigs in the base.

Love and condolences go to those who have recently had a loved one die remembering, in particular, the families and friends of Shirley Robinson, Fred Perrott and Thomas Morgan. Some of our older long term parishioners may remember Beryl (nee Saunders) a daughter of Percy and Hilda who passed away recently in New Zealand.

Shirley Robinson

Shirley was born October 4th, 1925. She was the only daughter of Doris and Cecil Robinson but had 2 brothers. Her father, Cecil was running the family newspaper business The Yorkshire Weekly Newspaper Group, set up by Shirley's great grandfather John Robinson in 1852 and based in Wakefield.

By all accounts Shirley hero worshipped her brothers and playing with them was the start of her love of sport. Like the boys, Shirley went to boarding school from the age of 8 when she started at Godstowe in Buckinghamshire and although she loved all sports, it was Lacrosse where she particularly excelled, eventually representing England. Shirley went on from school to Bedford college to train as a PE teacher. Whilst at Bedford College, she discovered the spirituality which had been nurtured as a child in the local church with her parents but became the driving force in her life. After a stint teaching at Wadhurst College, Shirley took a huge leap into the unknown. In 1951 aged 25 Shirley was one of a group of women who caught

a boat which took 3 weeks to sail to India with the Bible and Medical Missionary Fellowship. Shirley spent the first couple of years training in the north of India where she learnt Hindi at a language school and worked with various women's groups. After that she moved south to Kimmins Girls boarding school SE of Bombay as it was. Set in the hills with wonderful clean air, children escaped from the cities and generally thrived in this community. Shirley stayed 14 years, first as PE teacher but developed her career until she was vice principal. Shirley loved school life in India and found it very rewarding.

Rita, a friend of Shirley. kindly lent me The Kimmins High School centenary book produced in 1998 which paints a picture of this amazing girl's school and its struggles through a century of dynamic change in India. In this book it says "from 1953 until the end of 1967 Miss Robinson made an invaluable contribution to the school sharing with the students her own enthusiasm for all forms of physical education and her high standards." Kimmins really was the pinnacle of her life.

Sadly, soon after this Shirley returned to Blighty in 1967 to care for her aging mother. Shirley spent the next 5 or 6 years in Wakefield and after her mother died, Shirley decided to move to Birmingham where she spent the rest of the 1970s. The early 1980s saw Shirley move to the Devon area- firstly in and around Ottery St Mary where she and her friend Ann Blair often opened the house to those who needed hospitality in difficult times or when re-settling. As the 20th century closed she moved to Hemyock with another stint to Birmingham in between moves. Shirley always kept her connections to India - she continued with support work for India providing sermon notes, food parcels and song tapes.

It is clear Shirley had many cherished friends in this area - many through the church. Mary Hudson who started dog walking with Shirley in Hemyock, Stephen Reed a previous pastor at Hemyock Baptist church who kindly often took her out for birthday lunches whilst Friends from India reappeared - Rita in Honiton and Joan another great friend from India.

In 2013 she moved into Hummingbird Care home as its first resident where she received fantastic care. Sport was still important even as Shirley reached her nineties- she had now become an avid played of Boccia- (Botcha) a form of bowls for those with mobilty impairment. Now a paralympic sport.

Shirley was someone who loved sport, teaching was her forte-was a hugely generous benefactor to causes she supported. It began in India but Shirley continued throughout her life to donate all she could to those less fortunate than herself. She loved animals especially horses. Shirley's faith in God was reflected in her work, her friends and her generosity.it was her life.

Fred Perrott

Fred was born at Prings Farm, Hemyock in 1930 the youngest of 6 children and attended Hemyock school. He left aged 14 and worked as a farm labourer and a local contractor later moving to the local milk factory. When this closed, he worked at Relyon at Wellington returning to the Hemyock factory when it reopened as St Ivel. In 1980 he married Eileen who he had known since schooldays and they had 41 extremely happy years together before she passed away after a long illness. Fred had devotedly cared for her and was left bereft but his large number of family

and friends proved to be a tremendous support for him. He discovered new cooking skills being well known for his beef stews and introducing garlic to his ingredients! Fred loved using his camera and camcorder, learnt about more modern technology enabling him to WhatsApp his family in New Zealand, record films from his phone replaying them on his TV and he really enjoyed using the laptop and tablet given to him by his grandson.

Fred had a number of other interests and hobbies including motorbikes, gardening (specialising in runner beans, potatoes and onions,) ploughing matches, hunting and steam trains. He loved being outdoors whatever the weather enjoying nature but he also had '2 second homes' - his shed and greenhouse. Following a heart operation Fred retired but continued fishing and meeting 2 special friends Charlie and Sinclair. They talked about and tinkered with bike, car and rotavator engines becoming known as Foggie, Compo and Clegg - Hemyock's answer to the characters in Last of the Summer Wine!

His mobility scooter gave Fred a new sense of freedom and he would travel to surrounding villages to visit friends and often travelled to Dunkeswell where as a child he met, during WW2, American aircrew who gave him sweets and let him get close to their planes - he had a wonderful memory throughout his life.

Fred had a great love of family with his children Steve and Debbie and his many relatives bringing him great happiness. Last year he was thrilled to meet his great granddaughter from New Zealand and to hear earlier this year that a second great grandchild is due this summer.

Anyone who called on Fred, who passed away aged 93 yrs, was always welcomed with tea, cake and biscuits and his family feel sure that his late brother Jack will, as promised, have met him in the next world ready to enjoy some refreshments together.

Thomas Richard Morgan was born in Poplar in 1935, now famous for the "Call the Midwife" series. He was speedily relocated to Wiveliscombe during the war and finally to Hemyock with his wife Amanda and four month old Sharon, later Cindy would join them, neighbours to Ruth and Ted Tartaglia who became long term friends. He lived in the same house for 53yrs. He was a champion Pigeon Racer in his day, and you could spot where he lived by the flight of pigeons in daily exercise, circling around the loft. Tommy had great knowledge on all birds and villagers would bring all kinds of injured birds for "Dr Dolittle" to mend, including a Barn Owl.

Tommy was a Master Builder and worked a large area around Hemyock. He was a friendly, cheeky character that people were drawn to. It was surprising he managed to finish painting the Parish Pump, as so many stopped and wanted to have a chat when they saw him in the centre of the village.

One of the highlights of the year for him was Hemyock Scout Jumble Sale, he loved looking for 'treasures' and eagerly filled the 50p bag at the end, taking it home to show what he'd got. (To date, I think he has 6 shoe stretchers)

May the joys of Spring bring you happiness.

Thomas was also a keen Rugby player and watched avidly the highs and lows of England, this included the ladies 'very skillfull' team. He and his friends could be spotted rabbiting around

On entering The Manse, we a found a well stocked larder thanks to the kindness of local church members and this kindness continued throughout our time in the village.

Ron loved to meet people, and they him and he was welcomed to all the homes he visited. He especially loved young people who gave him great joy. He would frequently go and play with them at the school during lunch breaks until the Headmaster asked him to stop as the children were so excited afterwards during the afternoon lessons!

Ron's greatest joy was to tell them about the Lord Jesus and what he meant to both of us. Another great joy for Ron and I was being part of the village Holiday Club when often 100+ children would meet for fun and friendship. (Planning meetings at their home was always a fun time).

Ron and I retired 30 years ago but remained in touch with many local friends and thanks go to all those in Hemyock and the surrounding area for giving us so many happy memories.

Dear Residents

T t is all about budget this time of year and we are all affected by the increases. We are restricted to increase our council tax by 4.99%, L including an extra 2% for Adult Services, to avoid going for a referendum.

Our Cabinet has proposed a 10.5 per cent increase in our budget to fund vital services for the most vulnerable children and adults, as well as more cash to tackle potholes. There will be increases of 18.4 per cent in spending on children's services and 8.8 per cent on adult services to keep up with a rocketing rise in demand. And since the target budget was set last month, we have allocated an extra £2 million to tackle the increase in potholes caused by this winter's icy spells and torrential rainfall.

"We fully recognise the strain that household budgets are under with soaring inflation and big rises in the cost of living," said Councillor Hart. "But we must look after the young, the old and the vulnerable and they account for some 79 per cent of this budget."

"It has been a very difficult budget to deliver but we've asked how can we make council taxpayers' money work better for them and cut wastage in the system, and the savings strategies are tough but realistic."

The budget has been finalised by the full council on 16th Feb, we will all be getting our Council Tax bills in the next couple of weeks from MDDC.. Read for the full story on our website. Sorry I have given you a lot of figures, but County do deal with large amounts of money, and needs to be taken in context.

The Adult Social Services Budget is £336m per year and the Children and Young People Budget is £233m per year, these are all mandatory, we have to supply the service. County's revenue budget is £719m.

The underlying forecast position for Integrated Adult Social Care services at month 10 is an overspend of £7.8 million, a deterioration of £765,000 from the month 8 position. The forecast overspend continues to be driven by risk around delivery of planned savings which form part of this year's budget and a worsening position in Older People service budgets,

particularly within residential and nursing care and personal care. The reported position assumes that of the £18.2 million budgeted savings and additional income, £12.3 million will be achieved by year end, including £8 million one off additional income agreed with health partners. Additional in year savings of £4.3 million have been identified as part of the FSP.

Children and Young People's Futures is forecasting an overspend of £19.5 million and an overspend of £41.1 million on Special Education Needs and Disabilities (SEND). The underlying forecast position for Children and Young People's Futures services at month 10 is an overspend of £23 million. The month 10 position assumes that of the £11.7 million of planned budget savings £3.8 million is deliverable (the £7.9 million of savings considered undeliverable contributes to the forecast overspend).

The rest of the overspend forecast continues to be driven by volume and cost pressures relating to placements for children in care and cost pressures within School Transport. Children's Social Care is now forecasting to overspend by £12.3 million by year end, an increase of £805,000 versus month 8.

Latest figures show that the recycling rate for the district has risen to 56.56%, compared to 52.02% during the same period in 2021/22.

The major contributor to the change has been food waste. More food waste has been stored correctly in food caddies instead of with non-recyclable waste meaning the amount of food waste collected has increased by 6.81%. On top of this, the amount of household non-recyclable waste has decreased by 14.46% meaning the total waste the Council collects has decreased.

Highways for maintenance of Devon roads had gradually fallen from around £35 million in 2012/13 to approximately £25 million in 2022/23. Coupled with inflationary change, in particular the rapid increase in inflation seen in 2022/23, this meant that the maintenance budget had halved in real terms compared to a decade ago. This also has the knock-on impact of forcing change in priorities with safety taking higher consideration and proactive works being stopped, leading to rapid deterioration of roads.

The Government has introduced new rules meaning you need to show photographic identification (photo ID) when voting in person at a polling station. This is a national change implemented as part of the Elections Act 2022. Voters will need an accepted form of photo ID for the local district and city council elections taking place on Thursday 4 May. The deadline for people to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate is Tuesday 25 April 2023.

If I can be of any help please let me know, I do get a lot of concern/questions about road conditions, but I am continually told that it will be done when funding is available, nevertheless, keep reporting issues on the County Web Site

Charity Update February 2023

Rose Cottage

Following consultation with Mid Devon Planning Department, the original planning application has been revised to include demolishing Rose Cottage and building a row of three terraced houses. No planning decision has been made on this application.

If and when planning consent is granted, the charity will then decide what it wishes to do with regard to Rose Cottage. The charity is keen for there to be smaller, more affordable homes in the parish, rather than Rose Cottage being redeveloped to create another large house.

At this stage no decision has been made on how the charity might proceed with Rose Cottage and it will obtain legal advice to ensure it complies with any Charity Commission regulations/guidance.

The land

The charity has agreed a new 5-year lease with Rob Burridge to graze the land. The land has been entered into a countryside stewardship Mid-Tier scheme with the Rural Payments Agency. This scheme provides a range of options and capital items that together help to deliver a broad range of environmental benefits. The main priorities are to protect and enhance the natural environment, in particular the diversity of wildlife and water quality. There is wood available to parishioners, following some hedge laying works. Please contact Jamie Blackmore (07966 023903) or Richard Drew (07786 016833) for more information.

Hartsmoor Lakes

The charity has chosen a new team (Rory McMakin and Paul Webber) to manage the lakes on behalf of the charity. The finer details of the lease agreement are being agreed. In the short term, a lot of investment is necessary to bring the lakes into good order but, over time, the lakes will provide an income for the charity to use for the benefit of the parish.

News From Rosemary Lane Chapel

Several days ago, I was due to be meeting with members of the 'Open The Book' team to rehearse our next assembly for Hemyock School. We pulled into the chapel car park and, to our surprise, found it to be full up. It was a Friday morning... Toddlers!

It was a delightful problem to be confronted with. The group has, like many of the activities at Rosemary Lane Chapel, continued to grow in recent months. The chapel volunteers, alongside This supportive and welcoming community of families that meet regularly in the chapel, have continued to remain invitational; seeking to provide a safe, fun, encouraging and nurturing space for families to gather. This to me is a picture of the church... a community of people doing life together and inviting others in, specifically that they too might come to know and grow in the love of God as we follow Jesus. In March, we were greatly blessed by a visit from Stefan and Mira Zarevi (SGA - Bulgaria) who summarised their work, and ours, like this, 'It's all about relationship.'

The beating heart of church life is a relationship with God, a relationship He makes possible and invites us into through His Son, Jesus. And, through Jesus and the Holy Spirit, a relationship with one another. This unity, this community is forged at the cross where Christ died. Is it any wonder that Easter is such an important time for the church? Hearts and minds set upon Jesus, His life, His death and, crucially, His resurrection. The same is true this year as we look forward to our annual Easter services to which we would extend a warm invitation to all (details attached). But, for now, let us return to the resurrection. Last year a good friend of mine and member of the leadership team at Rosemary Lane Chapel, Pete Aird, wrote an article that I found most helpful: The Resurrection – Is it just Rhubarb?

Christians believe that Jesus died on Good Friday, paying the penalty for all they have ever done. They also believe he rose again on Easter Sunday. Of course, many people consider it foolish to believe that anyone could come back from the dead – but is the idea really so ridiculous?

One night, unable to sleep, I came across this verse:

'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.' – John 12:24

It strikes me how our everyday experience reflects the truth that death is not the end – so much so that the miracle of the resurrection need not be quite so difficult to believe, even for supposedly enlightened 21st century minds, who seem so certain that such things as people rising from the dead just can not happen. If they would just open their eyes they would see such impossible things happening all around them.

In my garden I have a rhubarb plant which never fails to amaze me. Towards the end of the year it disappears and, as it withdraws into the ground leaving absolutely nothing of itself to see above the surface, it looks as though it is as dead as the proverbial door nail. And yet, come the spring, new life emerges, as if from





the grave. Huge leaves rapidly grow on the end of the chunky rhubarb stalks that, in time, will go on to delight me by becoming the principle ingredient of delicious crumbles and flavoursome fruit fools.

As Jesus was saying in the verse that I read earlier, my rhubarb plant is a picture that hints at the resurrection.

Likewise, as I write this, it is still dark outside. Yesterday evening the sun went down, but, in an hour or two, it will come up once more. This is another echo of the truth that death is not the end.

God in his wisdom has kindly placed in creation pictures of the deep truths of the gospel to help us see and understand.

The truth of the resurrection, in one sense therefore, is not something unfathomable, something that rational minds must struggle to believe. We see echoes of the resurrection all around us. It is as certain as day follows night.

And just as day follows night so does joy follow sadness. 'Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes with the morning.' [Psalm 30:5b] For some the night is already long and the day still seems far off but, when the last trumpet sounds, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. [1 Corinthians 15:52]

And our joy in Christ will be complete.

In his book **'A Light that is Shining – An introduction** to the Quakers' Harvey Gillman writes about the foundation of the Religious Society of Friends:

It is not in the institution of the church, nor in the hallowed pages of a book, that God is most keenly to be found, but in the human heart.

Devon CPRE releases new map showing

alarming solar farm spread

s applications for massive new solar farms on prime agricultural land continue to come thick and fast, the Devon branch of the countryside charity CPRE has released a map showing the alarming spread of industrial-sized solar developments across the county.

The map shows the number, scale and spread of 65 permitted and pending solar farms of 20+ acres in Devon, and the only major application to be refused last December at Marsh Green in East Devon. The nine largest solar farms covering 100+ acres are all within the local authority areas of Torridge, North Devon, Mid Devon and East Devon.

Barely a week goes by without one local authority or another in the county considering a solar farm proposal. Next week (Tuesday 28 March) plans for one covering 145 acres of farmland at Whimple in East Devon are being recommended for approval, despite many concerns from the local community. Devon CPRE's objections are among the dozens so far received against Aura Power's proposals for land east of Rutton Farm, Rull Land. Among numerous objections submitted to East Devon District Council, Devon CPRE states that 94.6% of the proposed site is graded 3a or 3b land, thereby including Best and Most Versatile (BMV) land, which should be protected for food production.

Meanwhile, construction of the massive Litchardon Cross solar farm is underway in North Devon, and Torridge has recently received an application for a solar farm and related battery storage on fields at Brandis Corner, near Holsworthy. The developer wants to install 11,600 solar panels, eleven industrial containers with batteries, three sub-stations









and other infrastructure. Devon CPRE has objected to the Torridge proposal because of its size and location in the open countryside. The charity believes this would adversely impact the environment for the proposed 40-year lifetime of the solar farm and unjustifiably industrialise a greenfield site when there's a growing need for our agricultural land to be put to better use producing food.

Devon CPRE Director Penny Mills says, "Solar power has a part to play in providing so-called renewable energy but, in a wet climate like Devon's, covering thousands of acres of productive pasture with glass is not the 'green' solution it's claimed to be - especially when there are plenty of redundant brownfield sites and rooftops where the panels could be put."

Devon CPRE trustee and energy spokesperson Dr Phillip Bratby adds, "At a time of rapidly rising food prices, we believe that Devon's farmland should not be covered in solar panels to produce small quantities of expensive electricity at times of the day when it is least needed, but should instead be used to produce high-quality food for local consumers."

The publication of Devon CPRE's solar farm map comes as the national charity CPRE launches its own campaign for solar to be located on rooftops, something the Devon branch has long campaigned for. Regrettably, these arguments often fall on deaf ears because solar farm developers have deeper pockets than our charity to promote their agenda and interests and claim that covering our fields in glass panels and batteries will solve the energy crisis. It won't.
