# THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months

### What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation ork, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for








## **Shifting Sands**

As I write this, I am sitting in a holiday cottage in a wood that grows upon sand dunes at the mouth of the estuary of the river Loughor in South Wales. There is something special about estuaries.

First they offer rich habitats for a wide variety of animal and plant life. Sand dunes and salt marshes provide ideal conditions for birds, reptiles, insects, worms and other invertebrates. Sheep graze the marshes and their food imparts special flavour to their meat. Humans have tried to keep the sea back behind a wall, but it has broken through and, as a result, restored a thriving and diverse ecosystem that would otherwise have been lost.

Secondly, estuaries are continually altering their appearance. The tide sweeps in and out twice each day, exposing and covering mudflats and sandbanks. The light of the sun and the shadows of clouds produce an infinite variety of colours and patterns, while powerful currents and stormy winds can shift the positions of those dunes and sandbanks.

The cottage in which we are staying is built on sand, although I suspect it has some concrete footings. Thankfully, it shows no signs of imminent collapse, although there have been wildfires locally and it must be at some risk from such phenomena.



Jesus told a parable about building a house on sand. When the rain and the winds struck it, the foundations were insufficiently stable to prevent its collapse. A wiser housebuilder in the parable constructed his property on rock and no forces of nature could demolish it.

We live in times of anxiety and insecurity, and it feels as if our hopes for a settled future are threatened by shifting sands of worries and fears. It doesn't take much tidal surge to breach the walls of pride and self-assurance we set up to protect ourselves from the 'slings and arrows of outrageous fortune'.

The rock that Jesus suggested we use as the foundation for the lives we strive to build is none other than the God who created us, the source of love that binds us to one another and strengthens us. May his love give you strength to stand in the face of whatever shocks you encounter on the shifting sands of life.





# Hemyock History Group

fter our talk from Alan Reeve about the Bishops Lydeard Mill, we arranged for a group of our members to go by car to Letthe Mill and have a private showing around this historical building. After billing the visit on our Facebook Group page we filled 5 cars with our members and had a wonderful afternoon in June taking in all the heritage displays that have been protected by the Back family.

Amongst the trades on display are the cooper's and saddler's shops, the blacksmith's shop and the Victorian kitchen, as well as a thatching display. The wheelwright's shop has been transported from Devon and preserved exactly as it was left the day the owner shut up shop for the last time. A transport museum is also on site with carriages giving a realistic view of what life would have been like.

Bishops Lydeard Mill has been painstakingly and precisely restored by the Back Family over many years. The Mill and the attached Mill House have been cited as places of historical interest and given a Grade 2 conservation listing. The aim of the project was to preserve a small piece of history in the picturesque village of Bishops Lydeard whilst also helping to shape the future into a better one for less fortunate people. Five charities receive all the proceeds and donations raised by patrons of the mill.

The Back family are content to live in the small residential part of the Mill House while leaving the majority of the buildings available for visitors to take in all the exhibits of a bygone age requiring many workers for all the trades involved in the milling process. The miller's stream originates in the Brendon Hills and is the same stream that provided the water when the wheel last turned fifty years ago, it is aptly called the Back stream!

The group were supplied with an abundant Devon cream tea in the cafeteria with all proceeds going to several local charities that have benefited greatly from the generosity of the Back family. A fascinating afternoon seeing what life was like in this area all those years ago. Hemyock, with 4 mills on the Culm operating for many years but all now converted to residential occupation.

### **Around Hemyock**

By now almost everyone in the village will have noticed the work of the Poppy Group whose wonderful handicraft has been on display both in and around the parish church. The group took part in the Worldwide Knitting & Crocheting Day in Public on a morning in June where not only could their work be admired ( in particular 'Dolly') but members were willing to teach anyone who wished to take up these hobbies.

The session attracted a large number of people as did the school fete which took place during the afternoon. St Marys church held their fete once again in and around the church which proved to be another well supported afternoon with the display from the young folk from Moira Mansfield Dance Group drawing warm applause. Meanwhile over £5,000 was raised at Pring's Farm Cream Tea afternoon. All these events, and others, depend upon many whether by organising or attending on the day. We are lucky to have such a supportive community.

Another summer event which has taken place here for over 50 years is Holiday Club organised by our local churches and supported by young leaders whose enthusiasm and faith is abundantly clear. Having been involved in past years I know how much work goes into the event and how much fun is had from the youngest to the eldest. This year it runs for 3 days in late August.

Understandably as the village population has grown many different things have started, changed or ended. The Parish Pump is one of these as that which was started by the Rev Tony Grosse, when a group of villagers, including myself, met at The Rectory to put the pages together. It grew into an A5size before the larger size now distributed to every household - thanks to the distributors, - nowadays it is also available online. Another two more recent projects are the Little Community Library and the Community Foodbank with both being popular and well used. Where are they situated people have asked? Facebook and the Pump magazine will normally have the answer.

Did you notice that Football Club have recently been featured in a local paper in their new kit with details of the charities they are supporting? St Margaret's Hospice and the Devon Air Ambulance will be the beneficiaries of fund-raising events.

Get well soon wishes are sent to those who are unwell or recovering from illness and operations. These include **Trace Howe, David Palmer, Mo Anderson, Mavis Clist, Chris Hudson, and Dr Barnes**. We also send good wishes to past residents now living in Care Homes.

Sadly, a number of well-known local people have recently passed away - **Colin Popham, Gordon Sparkes, Chris Edmonds** whilst further afield **Rev Roy Barber and Gordon Hold**. Love and condolences are sent to their loved ones.

### Colin Popham - 10/10/37 to 02/06/2023



Colin was born at Great Torrington on 10th October 1937 and went to school at Great Torrington and then on to secondary school in the same town.

After school Colin worked at Newbolds Photography developing prints then started his working life properly in the laboratory of Torridge Vale Dairy in Torrington

and it was his lifetime ambition to become a Factory Manager within the Dairy Industry.

His National Service with the Fleet Air Arm saw him serving aboard H.M.S Ark Royal visiting many countries. He joined up reluctantly because he was enjoying his new career in the Dairy industry, but he was really very fortunate with his time in the Fleet Air Arm seeing the world and so many interesting places at such a young age.

Colin's ambition to be a Factory Manager was realised after 24 years in the industry ... working his way up from Laboratory Assistant at Torrington to Production Manager at St Ivel Chard then on to St Ivel Hemyock where he started as Production Manager on a brand-new product called St Ivel Gold. The technology for St Ivel Gold was bought from a Swedish Company and starting up a brand-new product line, a technology never previously attempted in the UK involved Colin and his Production Team working closely with the Swedish Company ARLA that developed the product, a very exciting time in his career. Travelling to Sweden became part of Colin's life and he made lifelong friends through his associations with Arla and Sweden.

Colin went on to be promoted to Factory Manager at Hemyock in 1978 and remained in his post until, after receiving his award for 40 Years Loyal Service, he chose early retirement in 1994.

It wasn't long before Colin tired of early retirement, always a very hardworking man, he invested in a free-range egg production line at Shuttleton Farm looking after 4,000 free-range hens producing top quality free-range eggs for supermarkets throughout the country.

The egg market fluctuated wildly and after a few years Colin retired properly this time and enjoyed playing golf at Oak Manor Golf Club as well as joining Hemyock Bowling Club playing in many matches and tournaments.

Art was another hobby and Colin was a talented watercolour artist regularly attending the Hemyock Art Group in the parish hall and during the summer months he hosted his fellow artists at Shuttleton Farm as well as visiting other local venues to sketch and paint.

Colin and his first wife Rita with daughter Amanda lived at Langtree until the family moved to Taddiport near Torrington moving to Yarcombe when Colin was promoted to Production Manager at St Ivel Chard Junction where he remained until offered another promotion to Production Manager at St Ivel Hemyock in 1976. Colin would later take over as Factory Manager of St Ivel Hemyock in 1978.

Colin and Rita went their separate ways in 1981 and Colin married Anne on 21st August 1982. They had 2 children Spencer and Lucinda.

During the 1990's Colin and Anne hosted many European and Overseas Children at the farm, mostly these children came to experience country life and to speak English in a family setting, but many came back year after year becoming part of the family, most notably among them was Beatrix v Wissmann who came as a 14-year-old horse-mad Berliner from a lovely family of her own. Nonetheless Bea adopted the Popham's as her English/Scottish family in the UK and remains extremely close to the family. Now Dr Wissmann, Colin called Bea a 'theoretical boffin' from an early age, a description she remembers with warmth and affection. José Angel from Madrid and Elina from Finland are just two others we keep in regular contact with.

Living in Sampford Peverell, life changed dramatically as the children became interested in horse-riding and both Spencer and Lulu joined the Pony Club. With three ponies the family needed land and moved to Shuttleton Farm, Hemyock in 1992 where they have lived very happily for 31 years.

The whole family spent every weekend away with the ponies competing at Team Showjumping, Dressage and Eventing. Away from horse events, Colin also enjoyed watching Spencer and Lulu play school sports such as Rugby, Cricket and Hockey.

Colin always loved children, he had 7 grandchildren, was always kind and patient taking pleasure in their company and always having time for them.

2013 - Colin was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease in 2013 and fought a brave fight and he didn't let it stop him enjoying his many hobbies until he lost his mobility in 2018. Even after Colin lost his mobility, he was very stoical, always trying to make the best of a difficult situation. Colin was supported in later life by his wife Anne, his family and a team of wonderful carers from Homelife Care who looked after him so carefully and kindly right to the end and to whom the whole family are extremely grateful.

Last Christmas, the BBC film of The Boy, The Mole, the Fox and the Horse was released, and all the children watched it enthusiastically, none more so than Hunter (now 4). All this watching of this wonderful film went on in Colin's room where he sat every day, and he must have known the film word-forword! Hunty liked best the part where the horse grows wings and takes to air with the Boy, The Mole and The Fox on his back and he likened him to 'Pegasus'. When our old grey mare 'Blue' was put to sleep on 1st April 2023 we explained to Hunty that she was now "Flying like Pegasus". Hunter now firmly believes that Granddad is "On Blue, flying like Pegasus". We like to think that he is right!

# Hemyock Parish Council Update

Firstly, there have been a few changes over the last few months to the Council. We were pleased to welcome three new members at the end of last year - Corinne Matthews, Stephen Ward and Kelly Talbot and more recently Kevin Andrews and Stuart Summers have come onboard. We are sure that their various skills will be of great use to both the Council and the local Community. Sadly, Tim Barton decided not to stand for re-election in May and so we would like to take this opportunity to say 'Thank You' to Tim for his hard work and contribution to the Parish Council over the years.

It is with sadness that we must report that our longstanding Clerk, Donna Evans, has had to take sick leave and, our fingers are crossed for her a speedy recovery and we cannot thank her enough for all the work she has done and will do in the future. Whilst Donna is off, we are very lucky to have cover from Sue McGeever, who currently is Clerk for both Halberton and Sampford Peverall PC's. Sue has a great deal of knowledge having run her own business, as well as being secretary of the Exmoor Pony Society for 17 years, so we are in safe hands. Please continue to use our email and phone number if you need to contact us for any reason.

May saw the Coronation of Charles III and Queen Camilla and we were happy to fund the celebrations under the guidance of Sue Scantlebury and her team - what a wonderful weekend it was with something for everyone from the Bring and Share Street tea party, the Open Air Church service and the big clean up with the Scouts. It really brough the village together and everyone commented on how much they enjoyed the various events.

The Parish Council are working with the Dog-Walking Community to find a mutually acceptable solution to the 'Dogs on Leads' issue at Longmead. A working group has been created with members of the public and the Parish Council involved. We hope that by working closely together we can come to an agreement to satisfy everyone.

We are currently in discussion with the Youth Football team and are looking to purchase permanent goal posts for them at Longmead.

The village has been very lucky to have had a Community Larder set up by Sarah Bitmead which has been reliant on donations from the community. We are working together with both Sarah, St Mary's and the charity Foodsave to grow this incentive and move it to a more central place in the village. We are happy to be working with this group to help the wider community and more details will be available shortly.

The PC makes grants to various organisations in Mid Devon which provides services to Hemyock residents. This includes the Citizen's Advice Bureau, which offers confidential, impartial and independent advice on a range of issues including financial. The Tiverton office has a free advice line on 08082 787999 or visit the website at ruraldevoncab.org.uk

There are still issues with potholes around the village- please report these on the Devon County Council website, the more they are reported the more likely they will be repaired. If you see that they have already been reported, please ensure that you add your name to the report.

There have been a growing number of incidences of anti-social behaviour and vandalism in the Public Toilets. It is costing a great deal of money to keep the facility open and in a good state of repair for the benefit of the community. Given that the majority of the damage is carried out in the evenings, the Parish Council is having to consider closing the toilets at night to prevent further damage.

The vegetation has put on a growth spurt in recent weeks, this has become a particular problem where properties are by a road or footpath causing overhanging. Please can residents cut this back, not just the sides but the top as well, as this often hangs down. The safety of both pedestrians and road users is extremely important.

And finally, just a reminder that on Saturday, 16th September there will be defibrillator training at BHLAC - use of a defibrillator could save a life.

### Heritage weekend at Culmstock

### 9th to 10th September 2023

For some years now, the second weekend in September is celebrated in many communities as Heritage weekend, with historic buildings and Churches opening to the public and laying on special events. This year, All Saints' Church in Culmstock will be pleased to welcome visitors to look around the Church building, with an exhibition featuring interesting episodes and people from Culmstock's long history. Parts of the Church building date back to the 13th century, and the yew tree growing from its tower is a unique feature.

### Conveying our past to future generations

Before the Covid pandemic, children from Culmstock Primary School visited the Church to explore local history in the context of its architecture. It is hoped that the experience will be repeated towards the end of the week that follows Heritage weekend.

### See the view from the Church tower

Those with enough stamina to climb the spiral staircase to the roof of the tower will be rewarded with spectacular views across the upper Culm valley, as well as being able to get up close and personal to the Culmstock yew and the Church bells, one of which is over 465 years old. The tower will be open on the morning of Saturday 9th September.

### Hear beautiful music in the English choral tradition

After Charles II was restored to the throne in 1660 the Church of England published a version of the Book of Common Prayer with services and prayers that remained the principal pattern of worship until the second half of the 20th century. The language of the Prayer Book, along with the King James' Bible and, of course, Shakespeare, has had a profound influence on the development of the English tongue.

The Prayer Book, first introduced by Archbishop Cranmer in 1547 during the Protestant reformation, took services that had been recited throughout the day in Churches and Monastic institutions for centuries, and condensed them into just two services - one in the morning (Mattins) and one in the evening (Evensong). Over the centuries that followed, composers have produced musical settings of the two services which have been

sung, particularly in Cathedrals and larger Churches, and which remain among the best loved services of the Anglican Church.

The Taunton-based choir In Ecclesia began life as the Rural Church Singers, with the express intention of bringing Evensong, with its traditional language and poetic cadences embellished by beautiful music, to Churches and communities that could no longer muster their own forces to sing the service. They will be joining us on Sunday 10th September at 6.30 pm to present a service of Choral evensong with words and music that might have been recognisable to the last King Charles 360 years ago.

If you were impressed or moved by the ceremony and music at the Coronation of Charles III three months ago, please come, listen and participate in this special service. You will be most welcome.

### Support your Church building

Our parish church requires a lot of maintenance, which inevitably costs money. We are blessed with a group of Friends of All Saints who contribute time, effort and creativity to keep this vital asset in the heart of our community available for all. There will be no charge for any of the events over the Heritage weekend, but any donations towards maintaining the fabric of this architectural treasure will be gratefully received, particularly if enhanced by Gift Aid.

here is a road closure in Culmstock closing the Village for through traffic from early Sept to October, for house maintenance, this is causing a lot of concern and will affect the Culm Valley area.

This just a bit of update of what is going on regarding DCC's finance.

Members have received regular budget monitoring reports throughout 2022/23 in which budget pressures and risks have been identified. The outturn underspend of £156,000 is achieved after a contribution to the budget management reserve of £1.5 million and a carry forward of £500,000 into 2023/24 for Highways. The final outturn position is an improvement from the £3.6 million overspend forecast outturn which was reported to Cabinet on 8th March and a significant improvement on the £30.5 million forecast overspend at month 2 at which time there was a further £10 million risk identified relating to in year inflationary pressures. The organisational wide response to the financial challenges faced by the authority, resulted in £25.4 million of additional in year savings, income and alternative applications of funding being identified. Delivery of savings and additional income contained within the budget totalled £33.7 million against planned savings of £38.7 million.

Briefing Note / Position Statement from the Director of Children and Young People's Futures recognises the importance of pay awards in helping us to recruit and retain a strong and dedicated workforce, we are concerned that an unfunded pay rise would have significant impact on our maintained schools. The increase of £1,925 for NJC staff along with the proposed 6.5% for teachers represents an additional £13.8 Million in costs to DCC maintained schools in the 2023/24 financial year. This is an average of 7% of total schools funding of £185 Million (calculated as Schools Budget Share plus Mainstream Additional Grant).

Adult Care Operations and Health outturn is £4.8 million overspent, which reflects significant pressure on unit rates and higher residential and nursing placements volumes and complexity present throughout the year. These pressures have been partially offset by one off grant monies and underspends on staffing budgets which reflect the difficulty in recruiting care management staff.


Devon County Cabinet are proposing the decommission the Mobile Library vehicles and provide £25K transition support for vulnerable users to continue to access alternative library provision. The Council would provide funding to help with the transition to other existing and new library services to ensure that the most vulnerable members of the mobile library community continue to access services they value. This has now been called to scrutiny for discussion. Cabinet do not have to accept any suggestions /recommendations. The earliest any closure of the mobile library will not come into force is Sept.

Each of our county councillors has an annual locality budget, to be used as a fund of last resort, of £5,000 that they can use to respond to local needs within any financial year (April to March). Councillors can, if they wish, make grants to support projects or activities that benefit the communities they represent.

# **FiPL funding for the purchase of standard fruit** trees in the the Blackdown Hills AONB



dam's Apples Tree Nursery, based in Dulford on the edge of the Blackdown Hills AONB, have available a quantity of A standard M25 rootstock apple trees which local landowners and farmers within the Blackdown Hills area can order. Grants are available for larger plantings of fruit trees within the Blackdown Hills AONB, via application to the Farming in Protected Landscapes (FiPL) Programme.

The varieties include dessert, cookers, cider and dual purpose apples and all have been selected as being well suited to grow in the Blackdown Hills area. These varieties include Adam's Pearmain, Beauty of Bath, Ben's Red, Browns,

Camelot, Court of Wick, Dabinett, Farmer's Glory, Golden Bittersweet and many more. A full list is available from sales@ adamsappletrees.co.uk.

Adam's Apples also produce and sell other types of fruit tree on very vigorous rootstocks, plum, cherry etc, which would be suitable for growing in the Blackdowns, and many more apple varieties than are on the list - ones listed are just varieties that are considered to be particularly suitable.

### LEAP Summer News

here have been some Summer visitors to the Longmead environmental area. Firstly the human variety. Greendays continue to visit on a monthly basis and it has been great for them to see how the runner beans, leeks and spinach that they have planted have grown over the weeks. It has been a bit of a struggle for the young plants with such a hot and dry June. Greendays last visit was dedicated to pulling up the invasive Himalayan balsam, cutting paths through the long grass and weeding.

We also had a visit from the year twelves of Taunton school who had a week from their usual studies to prepare university applications and to volunteer. They were mostly big lads, many of whom were keen rugby players, and they had brought along a rugby ball for any down time. Not that they really wanted to run around on what was one of the hottest days this year. At first they seemed quite sophisticated and bemused of what is the wild space at Longmead, but this soon changed once they started to channel their inner boy. Soon they were finding froglets, paddling in the river in their trainers, building a weir and looking for invertebrates and fish. Such excitement when a crayfish was found! Unfortunately it was already dead and the invasive signal crayfish variety. It was left on the picnic bench whilst the lads worked in groups to clear back the paths of brambles. By the time we looked at the crayfish again it had been cooked by the sun and was pink in colour. Hopefully this collaboration with Taunton School will continue and we can look forward to more young people volunteering and livening up our green space.

The grass in the area is very long and looks unruly, but this is no bad thing. This grass is a good habitat for slow worms and a variety of insects, moths and butterflies. A large attractive moth visitor is the herald moth, which has brown and white cross lines and orange blobs and scalloped wings. This most attractive moth feeds on willow, so Longmead is a great habitat for it.

Also, overhead, so we cannot claim it for our own, a red kite lazily flew over the area travelling south east. Strange that we don't see more of these impressive birds in this area, when they are so visible even in quite built up areas in the south. At the moment though the sky is full of house martins and swallows. They love hunting for insects over the sewage treatment plant!

There is rhubarb and blackcurrants for picking and plenty of herbs. Also please take a large bunch of marigolds as they certainly need thinning out. The runner beans are looking a bit sparse, but perhaps will make up for lost time now that we have had some decent rain.

As usual, do get in touch if you would like to volunteer.





The chairman thanked everyone for their part in the Coronation event and it was greed to send thankyou letters to the Bendles for the use of their field and to Erica Whitcombe for the cake. The marquee was damaged and Richard Drew said he would report back on a possible repair.

Councillors Bendle, Kidner and Blackmore met with the Devon Highways representative to show him the problem areas in the parish. Discussions included repainting of white lines, getting water off roads, clearing concrete channels and road surfaces on the main road to Hemyock, Wiltown Corner, the road by Heazle, Ridgewood Lane and Bolham. Everyone was reminded to report road issues on the Devon Highways website page.

It was suggested the council should organise a fundraising "pot fest' to raise funds for filling potholes.

The clerk was asked to report to MMDC enforcement a development near Heazle which may not have the necessary planning permission and another development at the top of French Nut Tree.

Meeting held at parish hall on Monday, June 12. The clerk, Mrs Evans was absent. Minutes were taken by Lee Saunders.

### Pothole report from parish lengthsman Chris Houghton.

Mr Houghton said that between December 2 2022 and January 6 2023 he repaired 56 potholes over a wide area of the parish using 52 ultra crete repair tubs supplied by Highways using a tamper plate. He said all sank slightly over a period of time but were still in good order.

As a test he repaired six potholes in April at French Nut Tree, Wiltown, Graddage Farm, near the Ford Street junction and Rosemary Lane using bags of 25kg cold mac @£13 per bag. Five repairs done by hand sank a small amount and the one in Rosemary Lane using a wacker plate had not sunk at all.

Mr Houghton said he felt if the council could get funding direct it should use the cold mac bags as it would be possible to repair more potholes and that also, whenever possible a wacker plate should be used to compact the repairs and using a primer spray costing £18 per can.

Mr Houghton is only permitted to repair smaller potholes. Larger ones have to be left for Devon Highways. The council agreed to ask Mr Houghton to attend the next council meeting to discuss his report.

### **News From Rosemary Lane Chapel**

ne of the great joys of working, serving and living on the Blackdown Hills is the beauty of the landscape. Of course, we can sometimes lose that sense of wonderment and joy in our surroundings when they are our daily backdrop. But, occasionally, we are reminded! And when we are, it can do more for our souls than merely make us marvel.

I was reminded of this when, at the end of June, we were joined by Matt and Becki Dillingham who spoke about their work with Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) in Chad, where they live with their two children. Becki serves as a pilot delivering medical support, resources and the good news of Jesus, to isolated people. As part of their presentation, we saw many images of an often dry, arid and expansive land which has a beauty of its own. In contrast, when Matt and Becki stepped outside after the service and looked out from the car park down the valley towards Hemyock, they stood and marvelled at the green rolling countryside, before exclaiming, as we stood their talking, 'It's wonderful!' Quickly followed by, 'God is good.' For Matt and Becki, and many more besides, the beauty of the landscape, which sometimes passes us by, reveals something of the greater glory of the God who created it. Rosemary Lane

But beholding creation can do more than just make us marvel, it can be a cause of great comfort and encouragement. That same evening, Matt and Becki had shared with us details of a great many challenges they face in Chad and in the work to which they are committed. And yet here, observing creation, with thoughts and hearts stirred toward the Creator, we were comforted, even encouraged.

In difficult days when all feels dark, when life is filled with challenges, God regularly delivers his comfort and encouragement to us through four simple words:

### "I am with you."

Let these words come home to you. These were the words of promise given to Isaac in Beersheba (Genesis 26:24). These same words were given to Moses at the burning bush (Exodus 3:12). And David, in the darkness of the valley, experienced the communicated presence of God (Psalm 23:4). The living God knows what we need most in our deepest distress, when life seems so challenging: Not answers, though that is often what we want, but the promise of his presence.

And yet, as one writer on this theme comments, '*the power of this promise rises only as high as our knowledge of the One who gives it.*' The presence of a vague and unknown benevolence is of little help when we are troubled, or when we are in the valley as David was. And so, God not only promises His people that He is with them; he also longs to remind them of who He is.

When we walk through the valley of deep darkness, He calls himself Shepherd (Psalm 23:4).

When we are lost, overwhelmed, or feeling forgotten, He calls himself Redeemer (Isaiah 43:14).

Creativity from Quaker Faith & Practice 21.38

In a broadcast Good Friday meditation given by an excolleague I was surprised to hear him speaking about the way in which listening to Bach's Brandenburg Concertos had been the crucial factor in his recovery from a near fatal heart attack. He said that whenever he listened to them, on the Sony Walkman his son had given him, at whatever time of day or night, he could feel the atoms in his body rearranging themselves in response to the glorious order and freedom of Bach's music. From the moment he began to listen to them his healing had begun.

For weeks after hearing that meditation I found myself reflecting on the way in which music acts as a restorative for me. I listened to the Brandenburg Concertos again and was aware of the stimulation to my own central nervous system. But then I noted that Frank Sinatra singing 'New York, New York', or Shirley Bassey singing 'Don't cry for me Argentina' could have a similar effect. The raw energy of Tina Turner singing could, if I gave myself up to the rhythm, produce a responding surge of energy in me. I understand that students doing tests after listening to Mozart are reported to have better scores than when they do the tests without the warm-up.

The Holy Spirit can indeed restore us to health (or stimulate us to work well) through the medium of music as well as prayer or antibiotics! And why, indeed, should I be surprised that this is so? Creativity is the gift that we were given on the eighth day of creation. In naming and re-making the world we are co-workers with God, and whether we are making a garden or a meal, a painting or a piece of furniture or a computer program, we are sharing in an ongoing act of creation through which the world is constantly re-made.
