



THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservati ork, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact nformation and information on what to look out for

Parish Pump | No. 299 October – November 2023



We are just coming to the end of the Creation Season in the Church calendar. It is the season of the year which runs from 1 September, which is the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation to 4 October, which is the feast of Saint Francis of Assisi. It is the time of year when we particularly pray about and give thanks for the beauty and productivity of God's creation. That is something which is particularly easy in the

midst of the beautiful scenery of these valleys which we are so privileged to be able to live in. It is also the time of year when we renew our commitment to caring for the planet and thinking about what action we can take so that we can hand it on in good order to the generations yet to come. So it is entirely appropriate that our Harvest services

fall either within or just after the Creation Season. What is also highly appropriate, at least to my mind, is that the theme chosen for the Creation Season this year was 'Let Justice and Peace Flow.' The thinking behind this was apparently based on a quotation from the prophet Isaiah, "Listen carefully, I am about to do a new thing, now it will spring forth; will you not be aware of it? I will even put a road in the wilderness, rivers in the desert." (Isaiah 43: 19). As the climate continues to change, the urgency grows for everyone from governments to individuals to make changes in order to live more sustainable lifestyles. All we hear on the news is how bad it is and what we ought to be worrying about and how much worse it might get. But if we join together with others to form a river of Justice

gave their lives in attempting to overcome injustice and the subjugation of peoples and nations by the use of violence. But the main thrust of our observance must surely be to commit ourselves to do what we can to ensure that God's peace and God's justice will ultimately prevail throughout the world.

Faced with something as catastrophic as the war in Ukraine that might seem like a Herculean task, but we are already playing our small part by supporting cr2ee and our government is helping with probably more in the way of military aid than we know about. And wherever people come together in prayer God is there. It is God's creation and wherever he is at work there is always hope.

That might sound like little more than an interesting theory, but actually it is good practical theology. One of the things which is causing most disruption to the sharing of God's bounty, which we pray and sing about at Harvest time, is the war in Ukraine. Because of the blockade of Ukraine's sea ports and the intentional destruction of grain storage depots, supplies of grain to the rest of the world have fallen dramatically. That is something which is being felt disproportionately by the poorest people and the poorest countries in the world. What we need is for that war to be brought to an end. I don't believe that it is just coincidence, that five weeks after the end of the Creation Season, we shall find ourselves celebrating Remembrance Sunday.

and Peace in the desert of doom and gloom, then hope is

created instead of despair.

I hope that this year, as well as remembering all those from this country who have given their lives, not just in two World Wars, but in all the armed conflicts since, we shall be able to remember all the thousands of Ukrainians and Russians who have been killed in an invasion which can ultimately never succeed. When we come together to worship on Remembrance Sunday one of the first things the presiding minister says

is, "We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation may, together, live in freedom, justice and peace." More than ever this year that must be what we are praying for as we join that river of Justice and Peace. Of course we shall continue to remember the members of our armed forces who





David and I were on holiday in Cornwall directly above Fistral Beach and we slept with windows open and fan running throughout the night and like many were still hot despite a sea breeze.

By the time this issue of the Parish. Pump is delivered our younger students will have started/returned to school or moved to higher education with young adults starting life at university or joining the work force. We wish them all well.

Congratulations to the **Blackdown Practice** who have been ranked as 6th best in Devon gaining 97% in a patient's survey. We are all aware of how lucky we are in this area to have such wonderful, dedicated staff.

I hear that Holiday Club has again welcomed many children and a wonderful time was enjoyed by all. Thanks to all the helpers who put so much time into preparing and running the event.

St Marys was delighted to welcome George and Heather Kittow (nee Salter) to a service as they celebrated their 65th anniversary. Heather reminded yours truly that I had been one of the young choristers at their wedding.

The Countdown to Christmas quiz will have been held before the Pump is delivered with donations going to our Air Ambulance and Bristol Childrens Hospital who both do amazing work. We have recently had a friend's 2-year-old treated at the hospital after being transferred from the RD&E and are most grateful for the treatment she received.

We are all aware of family and friends who are poorly at present or recovering from illness or an operation. Through the Pump we send them all good wishes for a return to good health remembering by name Chris Hudson, Alan Craig, David Palmer and Sarah Jackson.

Joan Cooper was a well-known villager admired and held in deep affection by many. Her family have sent the following

Joan was born in October 1927 in the attic room of Wyndham, the house next door to the one she has lived in for the last 36 years. She was one of the Wides, a prominent Hemyock family who ran an egg and poultry business in the village as well as a garage, a building company and various other enterprises. Her father, Howard, was one of six siblings and none of these aunts and uncles ever moved away from the village., although Mike was a doctor and spent most of his working life as a missionary in the Congo. Her Grandfather lived at Orpington, just opposite the church, and when he built Downmead, out on the Culmstock road, Joan's father then took over the business and moved into Orpington, where Joan lived until she moved away to college.

Growing up, Joan and her sister Pat were surrounded by members of the Wide dynasty. From the age of 5, Joan spent 3 years at the small private school run by her Auntie Muriel but at the age of 8 went to boarding school in Yeovil, She always maintained that her three years at this school were

the unhappiest years of her life and described it as being like something out of a Dickens novel. Thankfully she was rescued from these horrors by the onset of World War II. It was felt that Hemyock was likely to be a much safer place than Yeovil so she was moved to Bishop Fox's school in Taunton where she stayed with a local family during the week and came home every weekend to roam the countryside and play with her friends. At school she played hockey for the first XI and swam every day after school in the local baths. Her mother had insisted she learn to swim after she nearly drowned at an Open air pool in Westward Ho! when she was 5 and a fully clothed stranger had to jump in and rescue her when her rubber ring got caught around her legs and she was pulled underwater. Thus started her love of swimming, a lifelong pleasure which she would pursue at every available opportunity.

During her time at school Joan was sent to private elocution lessons, which required her to do solo dramatic performances in front of the whole group. At about the age of 17, she went to stay the night with her elocution teacher in Bristol who was taking her to see a George Bernard Shaw play at the Old Vic. She realised that acting was something that she loved doing and when she started work she joined an Amateur Dramatic group. Her most memorable experience was playing Miss Prism in Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of being Earnest". Many years later Joan's Mother told her that during her last year at school her elocution teacher had written to her parents saying that she would like to put her forward to train with the Old Vic youth group with a view to her becoming an actress. Her parents refused to entertain the idea

From Hemyock Joan moved to London where she studied Domestic Science at college, a combination of cookery and needlework, with a view to becoming a teacher. Although she loved the cooking side of things, she loathed the needlework and this did not change in later life. When it came to the night before the deadline for handing in one of her pieces of sewing which was to be exhibited publicly with all the work from the other final year students, procrastination meant that Joan hadn't finished her dress. In order to get out of completing the project, she sabotaged it, claiming to her tutor the next day that it was a terrible accident. She told me this story at the age of 85 and claimed it was the first time that she had ever admitted it to anyone. Sorry Mum, but your secret is now out.

While she was at college in London, Joan met Gordon. Gordon's father had taken the pastorate in Bishopswood and Gordon was visiting him. Joan was doing her six weeks teaching practice in Hemyock because so many of the London schools were still closed after the war. Gordon's stepmother was due to speak at a young people's squash in Hemyock but was feeling unwell so Gordon stepped into the breach. Joan was at the squash and the rest is history.

In 1949 Gordon moved to the Bristol Aeroplane Company. He and Joan married in May 1950 and bought a house in Clifton. Unable to have children themselves, they adopted Jenny and Martin and Joan resumed her teaching career, working parttime at Clifton High School. She was a very popular teacher and took a great interest in her pupils, many of whom she remained in touch with for the rest of her life. The Cooper family moved to Westbury-on-Trym in 1963. During their time in Bristol they attended a Brethren church where they remained for the next

38 years, until they both retired from their jobs and moved back to Hemyock in 1986 to care for Joan's ageing relatives. Here the couple became dedicated members of Hemyock Baptist Chapel and one of Joans greatest delights was to become a leading light in the village Holiday Camp. Despite the age difference Joan had an affinity with young people and became very involved with youth work always having an open house to them.

More than anything else, Joan loved being surrounded by people. She both sent and received approximately 350 Christmas cards every year! Once she retired to Hemyock she had more time on her hands and unlimited opportunities to pursue both her love of people and her love of food. Joan and Gordon opened their home to all and in particular to young people - Joan planned with Gordon preferring his paper!

Joans life after retirement was not confined to entertaining. She started organising holidays in which the couple travelled the world, visiting interesting places and meeting newly discovered relatives. She was a very intrepid, adventurous individual and tried all sorts of things which nobody in their right minds would ever have considered taking up at her age, including zip wires, parasailing and water skiing. In the late 1990s Joan and Gordon were visiting some of Gordon's family in Canada, a very large family who congregated every summer at a lake for a long holiday filled with socialising, BBQs and watersport activities. Joan wanted to try water skiing but despite her best efforts she just couldn't get herself to a standing position and eventually decided she would just give it one last go. Never one to give up easily she hung on as though her life depended on it, which it nearly did. She ended up in hospital and spent the rest of the holiday in a wheelchair. The Parasailing went without a hitch and there are photos of her suspended above the ocean underneath a very large parachute. Which just leaves the zipwire, sometimes known as a flying fox. In 2010 the couple went on a Christian retreat to Lee Abbey where there is an activity centre on-site which includes a 130 metre zipwire above a wooded valley. Joan signed up for it and was told by the organisers that, at the age of 83 she would be the oldest person ever to have attempted it. Joan was up for the challenge but Gordon thought it was ridiculous and was looking forward to an afternoon's snooze behind his newspaper. However he couldn't settle and ended up convincing himself that the zipwire was one step too far and that he was never going to see Joan again. He became so agitated he made his way to the start of the zipwire, only to find Joan ascending the ladder to get to the Eagle's Nest at the top. She completed the zipwire descent, absolutely loved it and was the proud holder of the on-site record for the oldest participant. But not for long. When she reappeared back at the start point she found, to her astonishment that Gordon was harnessed up and was halfway up the ladder to the Eagle's Nest. To his dying day he had no clear recollection of how he got there. He remembers turning up to say his final farewells to Joan and the next thing he knew he was at the top of a very tall tree and about to jump out of it. Anyway, they both lived to tell the tale and I suspect that Gordon, at the age of 88 may still be the record holder!

Once Gordon died, Joan lived at home on her own until the age of 95 and was determined not to go into residential care. This was all very well but as her health declined she depended more and more on friends. There had been various attempts to increase the amount of help from external agencies but Joan foiled these attempts by locking the door! However, she did eventually, and

very reluctantly, agree to go into Hummingbird Care Home after Christmas. As it transpired she caught an infection a few days before Christmas and the doctor said that she needed to be in hospital. She refused to go. When he resorted to telling her that there was a strong possibility that she would die if she wasn't admitted to hospital she said that was fine.

Hummingbird Care Home welcomed Joan on Christmas Eve. She was given one hour's notice of her impending departure from Newland and was then moved into her new home with remarkably little fuss. Heartfelt thanks go to Esther Needle to whom the main burden of Joan's care fell. Apart from the day-today care that she provided, Joan had Esther's number on speeddial and as Joan became more frail and more demanding, Esther was called on with increasing frequency. Sincere thanks also go to Alison Whiteside, Maureen Aylwin and Margaret Ackland who all provided care in Joan's latter days at home.

Although unsettled at first, Joan soon immersed herself in her new life at Hummingbird and took part in many of the activities which were laid on for the residents. At the tender age of 95 she learnt to knit. She loved the weekly guiz and also joined in with flower arranging, cup-cake making and was even a "midwife" when a brood of baby ducklings hatched in an incubator in the living room.

Although her time at Hummingbird was relatively short - she thought the staff were wonderful, the food was fantastic and she particularly liked the constant company of other people. In fact she thrived on the care she received. However the time came when her body gave up and her health declined very quickly. . On her daughters final visit, one of the last things Joan said to her was "Life seems to be all about tea, cake and coughing" which probably just about summed it up!

Shortly after uttering those words of wisdom about the meaning of life, Joan drifted off into her own private place and Jenny decided to leave her in peace. She had her eyes closed but suddenly started smiling and laughing. She shouted out "Joan, how lovely to see you" and woke up. I asked her where she was and she pointed to the other side of the room and said that she was in heaven and that Gordon was over there waiting for her.

Joan, a dedicated member of the local Baptist Chapel, passed away with a Christian faith which had never left her.

Joyce Parson like Joan was a lady with a strong Christian faith. She grew up in Kent where she gained her great love of animals. Following her father's early death, the family moved to Harrogate and at Liverpool she qualified as a Pharmacist. For many years Joyce ran the pharmacy at the Royal Hospital for Neuro-disability in Putney where there were a number of WW2 veterans. Moving to Hertfordshire she managed a local chemist and in later life worked at the Hampshire clinic during which time she gained a Master's Degree in fine art from Southampton university which nurtured her interests in antiques and art. Her knowledge of the history of art and antiques was impressive as was that of geography thanks to the extensive travelling she and her late husband greatly enjoyed in later life.

Joyce was a private person who was never happier than being in a supportive role. Her family remembers how she would make a Christmas cake for the 48 boys at her sons Prep school and when older their friends were always welcomed at home when

Hemyock History Group

Peter Fisher gave a very interesting talk on the Battle of Rorke's Drift, which was a battle in the Anglo-Zulu War and represented the successful British defence of the mission station of Rorke's Drift, under Lieutenant John Chard of the Royal Engineers, a local man, when a large contingent of Zulu warriors broke off from the main force during the final hour of the British defeat at the day-long Battle of Isandlwana on 22 January 1879, diverting 9.7 km to attack Rorke's Drift later that day and continuing into the following day.

Just over 150 British and colonial troops defended the station against attacks by 3,000 to 4,000 Zulu warriors. The massive but piecemeal attacks by the Zulu on Rorke's Drift came very close to overwhelming the much smaller garrison, but were consistently repelled. Eleven Victoria Crosses were awarded to individual defenders, along with a number of other decorations and honours. Lt John Chard is buried locally.

On 9 January 1879, the British under Lord Chelmsford, arrived and encamped at the drift. On 11 January, the day after the British ultimatum to the Zulus expired, the column crossed the river and encamped on the Zulu bank. A small force was detailed to garrison the post, which had been turned into a supply depot and hospital. On 20 January, after reconnaissance patrolling and building of a track for its wagons, Chelmsford's column marched to Isandlwana, approximately 10 km to the east, leaving behind the small garrison. A large company of the Natal Native Contingent (NNC) under Captain William Stevenson was ordered to remain at the post to strengthen the garrison. This company numbered between 100 and 350 men including civilians and wounded. The Royal Engineers, commanded by Lieutenant John Chard, had arrived on the 19th to repair the pontoons that bridged the Buffalo. Chard rode ahead of his detachment to Isandlwana on the morning of 22 January to clarify his orders, but was sent back to Rorke's Drift with only his wagon and its driver to construct defensive positions for the expected reinforcement company. Chard was left in temporary command and he rode down to the drift itself where the engineers' camp was located. Soon thereafter, he heard the news of the complete defeat of Chelmsford's main force at Isandlwana and that a part of the Zulu impi was approaching the station.

Upon hearing this news, the force at the drift decided the best course of action was to remain and fight, since a small column, travelling in open country and burdened with carts full of hospital patients, would be easily overtaken and defeated by a numerically superior Zulu force. Chard and Bromhead directed their men to make preparations to defend the station. With the garrison's men working diligently, a defensive perimeter was quickly constructed out of mealie bags, biscuit boxes and crates of tinned meat. This perimeter incorporated the storehouse, the hospital, and a stout stone kraal. The buildings were fortified, with loopholes (firing holes) knocked through the external walls and the external doors barricaded with furniture. With the defences nearing completion and battle approaching, Chard prepared the men available to him. Chard posted the British soldiers around the perimeter, adding some of the more able patients, the 'casuals' and civilians, and those of the NNC who possessed firearms along the barricade. The rest of the NNC, armed only with spears, were posted outside the mealie bag and biscuit box barricade within the stone-walled cattle kraal. The approaching Zulu force was vastly larger. Most Zulu warriors were armed with an assegai (short spear) and a nguni shield made

of cowhide. Some Zulus also had old muskets, antiquated rifles, and some captured Martini-Henrys as used by the defenders, though their marksmanship training was poor, and the supply of powder and shot was low, and of poor quality. Even though their fire was not accurate, it was responsible for five of the 17 British deaths at Rorke's Drift.

At about 4:00 p.m., Surgeon James Reynolds, came down from the Oscarberg hillside with the news that a body of Zulus was fording the river to the southeast and was "no more than five minutes away". At 4:30 p.m., the Zulus approached the south wall and the Zulu vanguard of 600 men attacked. The British opened fire when the Zulus were 460 metres away. The majority of the attacking Zulu force moved around to attack the north wall, while a few took cover and were either pinned down by continuing British fire or retreated to the terraces of Oscarberg. There they began a harassing fire of their own. As this occurred, another Zulu force continued to the hospital and northwestern wall.

Those British on the barricades were soon engaged in fierce hand-to-hand fighting. The British wall was too high for the Zulus to scale, so they resorted to crouching under the wall, trying to get hold of the defenders' Martini–Henry rifles, slashing at British soldiers with assegais or firing their weapons through the wall. At places, they clambered over each other's bodies to drive the British off the walls but were driven back.

Chard realised that the north wall, under near constant attack from the Zulus, could not be held. At 6:00 p.m., he pulled his men back into the yard and decided to switch to revolvers. One of his men made a hole big enough to get into the next room, occupied only by a patient who he dragged through. The last man out was Hook, who killed some Zulus who had knocked down the door before he dived through the hole. After 50 minutes, the hole was large enough to drag the patients through, and most of the men were now in the last room, defended by Privates Robert Jones and William Jones. From here, the patients clambered out through a window and then made their way across the yard to the barricade. Of the 11 patients, nine survived the trip to the barricade, as did all the able-bodied men. The evacuation of the burning hospital completed the shortening of the perimeter. As night fell, the Zulu attacks grew stronger. The cattle kraal came under renewed assault and was evacuated by 10:00 p.m., leaving the remaining men in a small bastion around the storehouse: Zulu attacks began to slacken only after midnight, ending by 2:00 a.m., and replaced by harassing fire from Zulu firearms until 4:00a.m By that time, the garrison had sustained 14 dead. Two more were mortally wounded and eight more – including Dalton – were seriously wounded. Almost every man had some kind of wound. They were all exhausted, having fought for the better part of 10 hours and were running low on ammunition. Of 20,000 rounds in reserve at the mission, only 900 remained.

As dawn broke, the British could see that the Zulus were gone. Patrols were dispatched to scout the battlefield, recover rifles, and look for survivors, many of whom were killed when found. At roughly 7:00 a.m., an impi of Zulus suddenly appeared, and the British manned their positions again. No attack materialised, however, as the Zulus had been on the move for six days prior to the battle and had not eaten properly for two. In their ranks were hundreds of wounded, and they were several days' march from any supplies. Soon after their appearance, the Zulus left the way they had come. However, the force turned out to be the vanguard of Lord Chelmsford's relief column.

At the end of the fighting, 400 Zulus lay dead on the battlefield. Only 17 British were killed, but almost every man in the garrison had sustained some kind of wound. After the battle, 351 Zulu bodies were counted, but it has been estimated that at least 500 wounded and captured Zulus might have been massacred as well. A total of 11 Victoria Crosses were awarded to the defenders.

The October meeting will mainly be a discussion of forthcoming events, a report on past events and a statement of our financial position. Ie our AGM. Members will be able to discuss our forthcoming talks and suggest interesting topics. The November meeting will be a talk by David Pugsley on the death of the famous Dr Peter Hennis, the hero of the Exeter cholera outbreak, during a duel.

Dear Residents

he month of August is always very quiet, not much happening at all, The next few months we will be working on next year's budgets, will be a challenging time. Neither have I got anything to report for our areas particularly, although there must be, if you have anything, please let me know.

This is a time of significant change and opportunity for English local government as a whole. Despite the government increasing funding for councils over recent years, a combination of high inflation and rising demand has left local authorities facing some of their toughest budgetary decisions to date. Our Director of Finance Angie Sinclair revealed that the authority finished the 2022/23 financial year £156,000 in the black on a revenue budget of almost £630 million. But she warned that – in common with councils across the country – Devon continued to face tough financial challenges The year since last June has seen all of us gain a better understanding our financial position, stabilising some area of the business which frankly were out of control, when they could/should have been in our control. Surges in service demand, not least in Adult and Children's services make the task more difficult to predict and model financially, but the 'new' corporate Leadership team are clearly all 'rowing' in the same direction, despite events like the cost of living and Ukraine war impacting us, but with no influence over those events.

Last summer Angie Sinclair, Financial Director, warned councillors that Devon faced a £30.5 million overspend with a potential further £10 million on top because of soaring inflation. She called for urgent action to be taken across the authority to curb costs. Council leaders set up a group of senior officers from every department to go through the budget line by line and identify savings.

An overspend in 2022/23 has been avoided through an organisational-wide response that resulted in a rigorous in-year savings programme. We currently provide financial support to organisations helping people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless even though we do not have a statutory responsibility to do so. The proposal to cut the discretionary spending was originally made to help us balance our books in response to soaring demand for our statutory services. Our contracts with providers will now be extended until the end of March 2024. In the meantime we will continue to talk to Devon's eight District and City Councils, working together to agree a way forward that ensures ongoing homelessness support across the county.

Councillor Hart made the announcement having listened to members of the public speak passionately of the impact that the proposed cuts could have on them and others at a special scrutiny committee meeting. Donna Manson, who is meeting regularly with District Councils' housing services to discuss a way forward.

Our Trading Standards service is reminding businesses, such as takeaways, sandwich bars, care homes and retailers who supply certain single-use plastic items, that a ban comes into force this October, and that they should start thinking now about alternatives and where to source them from. The ban includes all single-use plastic cutlery, trays, plates, bowls, and balloon sticks, as well as banning the use of certain types of polystyrene cups and food containers used to supply food that is ready to consume.

Devon, Plymouth and Torbay Devolution Deal

The Government has agreed to conclude a devolution deal covering Devon, Plymouth and Torbay this year. The deal will, subject to consultation, see the establishment of a Devon, Plymouth and Torbay Combined County Authority. It will not require a directly-elected Mayor nor costly reorganisation of existing councils. Devon's District Councils will have representation on the CCA as will representatives from the business and education sectors. The CCA will have new powers and additional funding from Government to tackle priorities such housing, public transport, jobs, training and skills. Functions and resources of the Heart of the South West Local Enterprise Partnership will be folded into the CCA



Commitment and long-term faithfulness in each season brings forth a fruit of joy for the farmer. In these few years on the hills I have witnessed a contentment in the farmers work and a thankfulness in seeing what is produced over the years. The farmer is a picture to us of the secret joy of trusting in God's providence and experiencing his goodness. The farmer cannot afford to focus on the fruitfulness of tomorrow, only the faithfulness in today. To work in faith is all we are asked to do. And it's really all we can do. Our lives, like the farmer's, are ongoing and various exercises in learning to trust God despite what we can see today. Perhaps the greatest joy for those trusting in God, is the realisation that He who is the Lord of the harvest is indeed faithful. And so, I close with the words of the Psalmist:

Your love, Lord, reaches to the heavens, your faithfulness to the skies.

Your righteousness is like the highest mountains, your justice like the great deep. You, Lord, preserve both people and animals. How priceless is your unfailing love, O God! People take refuge in the shadow of your wings. They feast on the abundance of your house; you give them drink from your river of delights. *For with you is the fountain of life;* in your light we see light.






