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
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
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
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
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### THE BLACKDOWN H LLS TRUST

The Blackdown Hills Trust is looking for local volunteers to help check stock fencing around the grazing units in the Neroche Forest area. These sites are managed by the Blackdown Hills Trust in the Blackdown Forest for grazing conservation : they are a magnet for rare butterflies such as Wood White and Duke of Burgundy and an array of plants, insects, birds and mammals. The areas are part of a Higher Level Stewardship and are grazed by English Longhorn cattle in the summer months

#### What will the volunteer role involve?

The role will involve walking the stock fence twice a year during the spring and autumn in the grazing compartments to check for any rotten posts or damage to the wire, and reporting back to the Trust. There may also be opportunities to get involved in practical conservation work, for example clearing conifer re-growth to allow native flora to thrive

Full training will be provided for the role, including maps of the sites, appropriate contact information and information on what to look out for

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
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




#### Water flows uphill in Hemyock!?

There is a secret place in the lanes around Hemyock where water appears to flow uphill. That can't be true I can hear you say but take a look at the picture. The water is flowing from right to left, through a gap in a hedge and into that bramble patch. Okay, so you won't believe it until you have seen it with your eyes. I keep going back just to check and I will tell you where it is as a special Easter gift from me to you.

I was asked by the Church Ministry team to write something for the church spot in The Parish Pump, so here it is. I am writing this before Easter, and you will be reading it after, the most important day of the Christian year. So, what could I write about I thought to myself as I passed this gap in the hedge where you must see it to believe it.

The first Easter day started early for two men who were told by some of their women that the massive stone rolled across the entrance to the tomb where Jesus' body had been put had been rolled sideways and Jesus body was gone, despite being guarded by Roman soldiers armed to the

teeth to prevent anyone trying to take the body. Impossible, the stone was too heavy and the guards too fierce. Two disciples Peter and John did not believe the women, perhaps the intensity of the grief they all felt and the brutality of the death of their friend were playing tricks on the women's thinking. The two men ran as fast as they could to see for themselves. John, who was the younger man, arrived at the tomb first, it was a shocking sight, the stone had moved and the guards were gone, he froze in fear. Peter came up behind him and ran straight into the rock cave that had been created as a burial chamber. There on the plinth where Jesus body had been laid were the white linen grave clothes that were commonly used. The headpiece was neatly folded but the continuous bandage-like shroud was intact, like a butterfly chrysalis, it looked like the body had passed through the cloth, it still had the shape of Jesus. The men were stunned, can you imagine what they were thinking? As they left John turned to look at the sight once more and in a moment of revelation, believed.





Outside, deep in the Olive grove and shrubs was a woman called Mary Magdalene.

She had been with the group of women who had gone early as the sun rose to dress the body of Jesus as was the custom, they had been prevented from doing so on the Friday before. Tears streamed down her face and sobbing uncontrollably, she stumbled back to the tomb and looked in again just to check

> reality. Through the blur of her stinging eyes, she saw two figures one at the head of the plinth where the folded head cloth was and one at the base. Such was the state of her mind she never wondered what they were doing there, but she was jerked back to reality when they asked, "Why are you crying". She answered, her tears running again, "They have taken my Lord and I don't know where they have put him".

She turned, steadying herself and there was a man, just outside the entrance, she presumed the gardener, who asked her the same question. "Why are you crying"? She said "If you've taken my Lord tell me where you have put him."

Jesus answered by saying her name "Mary".

She knew that voice! she returned his gaze and as her legs gave way she grabbed Jesus for support. "Rabboni (Teacher)" she cried looking into his face. "You had better not hold me" he said smiling, "but go and tell the others."

So, here is the Easter present I promised you, actually two. One is a fact, the other an illusion, go and see for yourself. In the Bible look at John 20: 1-18. For the other, use What3words - https://w3w. co/plod.costs.pounce.



A training seminar was organised for a government department and the theme of the day was about resolving conflict between management and staff. Contributions from attendees were recorded on a flipchart. Someone suggested that a weakness in the department was the management's tendency to interfere on trivial issues. So the word 'nitpicking' was duly written on the flip chart. Suddenly one of the managers leapt to his feet. "Shouldn't there be a hyphen between 'nit' and 'picking'?", he asked.

Elsewhere, some twenty years ago now, the US military announced an astonishing discovery. They had created an 'indestructible sandwich' that stays fresh for up to three years and can withstand extreme heat, rough handling and air-drops. Available in pepperoni and barbecue chicken flavours, this breakthrough was achieved following months of research by food scientists in Massachusetts. According to press reports at the time, the discovery would enable greater efficiency within the military, as service personnel would no longer have to worry about stale or soggy sandwiches as they risked life and limb on the battlefield. The feedback from soldiers who piloted the product was that the sandwiches were "acceptable". ### The Violet Chapman Trust

The Violet Chapman Charity (Charity registration number 299996) was established in 1986 after Mrs Violet Chapman, who was a patient of the Blackdown Practice, gave a substantial gift to the doctors, which was intended to provide patients with services and help that were not available under the NHS.

The original Trustees were Dr Jonathan Meads, Mrs Chapman and Sir Christopher who, at that time, was senior partner with Ashfords Solicitors and one time president of the Law Society. The Trustees were, at this time, all volunteers not drawing any salary or expenses, and this remains the case to date.

The Trust has discretion to give grants for medical equipment and treatments as well as giving financial assistance to patients of the Blackdown Practice for numerous purposes.

All grants are given for the physical and mental wellbeing of the patients, and many will gain support by the help the Trust gives in supplying counselling where the NHS is unable to supply.

There are many examples that we could give of the patients we have helped recently and would cite one that required

their bathroom to be modernised to enable them to continue to live at home; another patient who needed a chair that would help them in getting in and out without assistance. Another example is a patient who had severe back pain and a grant was given for them to have remedial massage.

If you feel the Trust can help you we would suggest you talk to your GP or any person who gives you support and submit an Application form which can be found online or pick one up from any of the Blackdown Practice surgeries. The Trustees are only too happy to consider any applications. Alternatively for more details please contact the secretary, Mrs Judy Barton on 01823 680975 or j.h.barton@hotmail.

The Trustees are proud of the speed with which they are able to help patients and in many cases are able to provide financial assistance within two weeks.



This leads us to conclude that there is widespread support for these matters to be explored further. Our next steps are to gather quotes for improving the MUGA surface and improving the drainage on the grass pitch. We will also conduct an audit of available all-weather pitches and their capacity in Mid Devon and look for active grants and loans which may be available to the club or the Parish Council to support improvements at Longmead.

#### Hemyock Youth Football Club Survey

Many thanks to everyone who responded to Hemyock Youth Football Club's survey about the facilities in Longmead in the autumn. There were 104 responses to the online survey which was open from 20 October – 10 November. In addition to this, pupils conducted a separate survey at Hemyock Primary School collecting 50 responses. The Parish Council offered 3 prizes of Exe Valley Pizza vouchers, for which many thanks from the HYFC committee, and the lucky winners were Liam, Jane Adair and Bryony Redwood.

The key findings were that:

- 80 respondents (77%) were in favour of upgrading the surface of the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) at Longmead
- 85 respondents (82%) were in favour of the grass pitches being improved with better drainage and floodlighting.
- 89 respondents (86%) would support a community café at Longmead.

L is with considerable sadness that we record the passing of Mrs Donna Evans, Hemyock's Parish Clerk for the past 11 years. With her previous experience as a trouble-shooter for a large insurance company providing advice on difficult and contentious insurance claims, she was very well suited to the many tasks involved. Donna took on the role in 2012, together with the parallel responsibilities of being the 'Proper Officer and Responsible Finance Officer' of the Parish Council, advising on protocol and the correct courses of action to run the council. She quickly established an excellent network of people within Hemyock, with other parish clerks in the area and with Mid Devon Council staff. She threw herself into the work, dealing with some very difficult and sensitive issues and also ensured that all the Parish Council's official documents

were up to date. All this work was a hugely valuable foundation for her to undertake a 12-month course to achieve a Certificate in Local Council Administration. True to form, Donna passed with flying colours.



Donna dealt with all aspects of Parish Council work; a huge range of tasks and projects. These included, parish finances, Public Open Space land, Longmead sports area, maintenance of parish assets, footpaths and pavements, management of Hemyock's five commons, cemetery, garages youth centre, emergency planning, Hemyock local plan, legal aspects and liaison with solicitors, Healthy Living Centre improvements, proposed skateboard park, Police liaison, reports to the Parish Pump, council communications and web site, planning applications, Jubilee celebrations, Air Ambulance night landing site, defibrillator contracts and support, and much more. Her work behind the scenes negotiating with officialdom and obtaining grants was hugely beneficial to the parish



Donna willingly embraced all aspects of Council work, including testing the skatepark in Tiverton, as pictured. She also took part in many other activities, such as tree planting, clearing vegetation from St Margaret's Brook, balsam pulling, organising parties and events, speedwatch, litter picking and commons management.

News from the Blackdown Healthy Living & Activity Centre

Hemyock's Community Fridge has had an AMAZING first 2 months. We now have 20 volunteers who help every week and lots of 'back-up' volunteers who can step in when needed. These volunteers collect surplus food from the supermarkets, weigh and unpack the food, keep the fridge/freezer clean, hoover the room, recycle boxes and much more. We couldn't run the Community Fridge without them.

In January we gave away 1025kg of food, an equivalent carbon saving of driving 748 miles. In February we gave away 1223.7kg of food, an equivalent carbon saving of driving 893 miles. Over 2 tonnes of surplus food saved from landfill and given to our community. Wow! Thank you to everyone involved.

We welcomed Helen Morris to our Therapy Team in February. Helen is a hypnotherapist who can help with issues such as anxiety, depression, stress, weight management, phobias and much more. Helen is offering a 50% discount on any initial appointments booked in April and May. You can find out more at www.innerfreedomhypnotherapy.co.uk

We have a new weekly class starting on Thursdays 7-8pm. Emma Dee is bringing Sound Baths to Hemyock. A group sound bath is a session led by a trained sound therapist who plays specialist instruments in particular ways and in a specific sequence to help induce a feeling of relaxation and sometimes a meditative state. The benefits of a sound bath can be numerous and profound. There is research on the benefits to those with tiredness, sleep deprivation, anxiety, depression as well as physical ailments such as soreness in the body and headaches. 

• I began compiling this column when the Rev Tony Grosse retired in 1996. Throughout that time I cannot recall a period when it L recorded so many folk seeing a loved one pass away within a short period.

We send love and prayers to the families of Bernard Haine, Pamela Gubb, Geraldine Marke, Christine Brown, Ann Smith, Maud Johnson, Donna Evans and Paul Mathews. The following have been received from their family and friends

#### **Christine Brown**

Depending on your age and how long you have lived here you may think of Christine as Sister Brown from the surgery, Churchwarden at St Mary's, keep fit leader, travelling companion, WI member or simply a trusted and faithful friend.

Christine grew up at the Galyons pub on London docks but was evacuated to Scotland to stay with her cousins. She trained to be a nursery nurse at 15, She then spent a year or so working on a farm at Burrowbridge. From there her love of nursing saw her working at a children's hospital in Birmingham later moving to Viney Green Childrens Home in Bristol where she took on the role of a housemother.

At 32 years her career took another change and she trained to be a nurse at Musgrove Park Hospital eventually becaming Sister of ward 8. From there she met Dr Franklin, and he offered her a job as Practice Nurse at Churchinford surgery. She moved to Churchinford and lived in a flat, with her mother, in Dr. Franklins house which was also the surgery. in 1975 she, moved to Hemyock where she became involved in many local events, keep fit, carnival and the church to name a few. She retired in 1994 and enjoyed many a coach holiday with Redwoods and started her own exercise classes. She loved cats, knitting, crotchet, walking, W.I and was Churchwarden for a number of years.

#### Happy in Hemyock

#### Ann Smith 1936-2024

Mum was the daughter of a GWR signalman and shopkeeper in a mining valley in South Wales. She met Dad (Alec) at Reading University (to be her husband for 64 years) as she studied for a degree in Geography and was a fierce lacrosse player! Mum went onto be a teacher and we moved around the country with Dads work living mainly in Manchester. In the early 80s Mum got the post as Head of Geography at Wellington School and was excited about this and an opportunity to return to a village life which was Hemyock .Friendships in Wellington and Hemyock started . The most welcome change was becoming part of a community in Hemvock. Mum had a strong belief and enjoyed going to church regularly again, she volunteered in the Hemyock summer schools, and did litter picking and walking local routes to check paths and styles were clear and she was committed to the Blackdown Support group. She liked being outdoors, walks up to Wellington Monument or along the lanes especially when spring flowers were there. She enjoyed tennis when the new recreational ground included the courts. There was lots of fun and laughter.

Mum was happy in Hemyock, her happiest place to live. In mum's dementia years the community helped to support her in lots of ways. If she wandered off Dad would get a phone call and he could go and fetch her .The shops helped mum by picking out the right coins from her purse when she had lost recognition of them herself and so she could achieve her task of getting the milk and

paper. Neighbours would welcome mum as she randomly popped in. Dementia care was the reason to leave but THANK YOU HEMYOCK for the happy days Alison Adams (daughter)

#### Remembering Maud and Ken Johnson

On retirement in 1985 Maud and Ken moved from Kent to Hemyock, to St Margaret's Close. Ken was an only child from Walthamstow in N. London and Maud, an identical twin, from nearby Edmonton but with Welsh and Swedish parents. She went to the Marist Convent School, opposite Spurs ground, and he went to George Monoux Grammar School. Both were excellent students judging by their school reports and held posts of responsibility.

Maud spent much of the early 1940's fire watching at night in London including during the Blitz. After returning from evacuation and working for a short while Ken was called up into the RAF where he worked on Lancasters and on early radar. They met when they were both working for the local council, Ken as a scientific assistant and Maud as an accounting machine operator. If the war had not got in the way she would probably have trained as a cookery teacher.

They were married in June 1949 and honeymooned in Combe Martin. Their first home was in Bush Hill Park and before their two children, Janet and Karin, were born they enjoyed doing amateur dramatics together. Before moving to near Orpington they lived near Burgess Hill in Sussex for several years. Ken worked in Martins Bank, during the take over by Barclays, and later for the Civil Service. He had been a keen cyclist since a boy and thought nothing of cycling daily to work in South Norwood - 24 miles from home.

Maud was a 'stay at home mum' until the children were older when she worked as a ward clerk in the children's ward of their local hospital where she spent a lot of time listening to the children. She also spent a while as a Tupperware demonstrator - does anyone remember these 'parties'? Later she was a room steward at the National Trust's Quebec House in Westerham after learning to drive in her late 40's. She also learnt to text in her 80's!

They enjoyed living in the village very much, making lots of friends and joining in with St Mary's Church and other village activities including holidays around Europe with Redwoods. They also found the local Anglo Scan group and often went to their get-togethers especially at Christmas and Midsummer. In addition to this Maud helped with cookery sessions in the village Primary School which she and the children enjoyed.

They were both keen gardeners with Maud drying flowers for pot pourri and for sale at the fetes with Ken's plants. She was often baking and her biscuits and cakes were much appreciated. Ken was also a skilled carpenter, making furniture, toys, trugs and even a 'catherine wheel' for a flower display at the 1988 village Flower Festival. He also audited local accounts several times - his earlier 'chief cashier' banking experience coming in useful.

The Scandinavian influence was always evident in Maud's baking, decorating, cross stitch pieces and other artistic work. She had been to pottery classes in Kent and in Hemyock she took up weaving on a small floor loom in the spare bedroom. They enjoyed many country walks together locally and exploring other parts of the UK on holiday. They both bought new walking boots in their early 80's. As a child Maud had had regular trips to Sweden to visit family with her sister and their mother.

Many of their early family holidays were spent in a friend's caravan near Studland, Swanage when all the necessary paraphernalia was squashed into a mini around the two children – no seatbelts then.

They would regularly drive to Hastings to visit Janet and often enjoyed the company of Karin and her family nearby – helping with babysitting in the early days and later providing a quiet study space for their three grandchildren when exams loomed. They had four greatgrandchildren, now ranging in age from 3-10 years, who were a great source of delight to them.

In 2014 they took the difficult decision to leave Hemyock and move into Dunkirk House where they were well cared for.

Ken died in March 2018 at the age of 93 and Maud in January 2024 aged 101.

All the family were able to say goodbye to them at their funerals and were glad to be joined by some from the Anglo Scan Society and from Hemyock at Maud's service.

As they were at their happiest living in Hemyock it seems only fitting that their memorial should be in St Mary's churchyard.

#### Geraldine Marke

Geraldine was, especially in later life, a very private person. She had married Leslie and they had a daughter Sheila. Geraldine had lived in the parish all her life and her mother was a member of the Clist family. For many years she worked at the now demolished Milk Factory and later as the popular village Post lady. She took great delight in chatting to all those on her round and keeping up to date with all the local news as she cycled to the different areas.

Geraldine was a gifted knitter and greatly enjoyed crafting garments for her grandchildren and great grandchildren throughout her 93Years. She was very fond of cats and greatly enjoyed watching the birds feed in her garden.

#### Bernard Haine

The sudden death of Bernard was a shock to all who knew him. Bernard was born at Windovers, Madford Cross where he grew up with his older sister Meg and late brother Edward. They all attended Dunkeswell Abbey Chapel Sunday School because that was within walking distance. When he was about 8 he joined the Church Choir which may have only been for a short while because he had to cycle to and fro . He was in the Cubs for some years as well. All three children attended Hemyock Primary School in the old school. Bernard continued his education at Uffculme until leaving school and becoming apprenticed to Gerald Redwood to learn his trade as a carpenter. He remained working for 'Redwoods 'until his retirement.

He moved with his parents to Eastlands about 1975 where he remained until his death. He cared for his parents wonderfully as they got frailer. He was a gentle, caring and loving son, brother and uncle with a ready chuckle and grin. Bernie will be sadly missed by friends and family alike especially as his death was so unexpected. On a personal note, Bernard was a good neighbour of my late parents for many years. He and dad could often be found chatting together as they gardened. He was also kind to my cousin Geraldine, another neighbour, frequently checking her garden bird feeders were filled and staying for a chat.

#### LEAP news

ate January saw a tidy up at Longmead with some local volunteers including pupils from Hemyock Primary School, who were super helpful. An owl box was positioned on one of the large oaks, and new and reconditioned bird boxes were put up along St Margaret's Brook. Weeds were cleared from around the fruiting hedge and the old tree guards removed. An intrepid soul even waded into the now full pond, to remove the chair, bicycle wheel and other debris that had been thrown onto its surface whilst it was frozen.

We were fortunate once again to be selected by the Devon Wildlife Trust to hold a tree hub at Longmead as part of their scheme 'Saving Devon's Treescapes' an ongoing campaign to help mitigate against ash dieback and to promote the wonder of trees in our landscape. The tree hub was a success once again - around 55 people took away some native saplings (downy birch, blackthorn, cherry, crab apple, hazel etc) to plant in their garden. A number of people with a larger area to plant up, took the DWT details to obtain tree whips in bulk. Hopefully the little whips will thrive despite the wet conditions that we have endured this Spring, and the prospect of a long hot and dry Summer ahead. The conservation group from Green Days Day Care - check out their website on www.greendayscare.co.uk -returned to Longmead after a Winter break , and had a super session in the wildlife area. They harvested the leeks that they had planted in the late Summer, and thanks to our wonderful volunteers we all enjoyed delicious leek soup. The remaining few whips left over from the tree hub were infill planted in the fruiting hedge, brambles by the seat next to the pond were cut back and a small tree by the pond was coppiced and the wood used to start a woven dry hedge between the BMX track and the fruiting hedge. A letter pick was undertaken (not much litter fabulous) and peas were planted in one of the raised beds.

We look forward to welcoming Green Days on the last Thursday of the month throughout the Spring and Summer and we are also excited to be hosting Hemyock Beavers to make small bug houses in early May.

Thanks as always to all who help out and volunteer in the area.

When you walk through the area do look out for evidence of birds using the bird boxes and the first wildflowers of the Spring.

#### Hemyock History Group

he February meeting was a talk from Peter Walters on the subject of Vestry Meetings at St Mary's Church in the 18th and 19th Centuries. During this time, prior to the introduction of local authorities, communities were managed by significant landowners in the area looking after the interests of the community at various minuted meetings. The Vestry meetings handled all the financial matters related to the operation of Church life including the maintenance of Church buildings, costs of providing normal operations such as lighting, heating, musical activity, and Church activities.

The landowners were also churchwardens and had ultimate authority in distributing the Church income. The Patron, the largest landowner, owned the advowson and had the right of presenting the Vicar or Rector to the benefice who in turn claimed the tithes paid to the church. The Churchwardens would be responsible for allocating responsibilities such that weekly services went smoothly and maintenance of the infrastructure were planned. Separate meetings were held for the Overseer of the Poor Tax to ensure destitute residents were suitably provided for. A register of families who were considered to be supported by the Hemyock community would be maintained, based on the time the head of the household was working in this area. Should the family hit troubled times the Overseer could check whether another community somewhere in this County or adjoining counties would have a closer call on resources. Families could not simply up and move to another area, unless the head was being offered a job in that area. There was, of course a Workhouse in Wellington to provide basic essentials while the family sorted themselves out. In the 18th and 19th centuries the Vicar or Rector, coming from Oxford or Cambridge would receive a stipend agreed with the Patron of the Benefice.

The tithe apportionment Act in 1842 listed all land within a community with acres, owners and location all delineated within a map. This converted the commodity based tithes into a direct monetary basis per farm. This monetary amount was paid to the Benefice each year for another 100 years until the Tithe Act of 1936 ended the practice. Of course wherever financial matters are managed by men conflicts occur. In 1891 the Rector raised a Court Order against the churchwardens to enforce the payment of the stipulated monetary amounts. The Churchwardens as landowners in the area came up with a plan to auction enough farm assets to raise the agreed tithe amounts. So an auctioneer was employed to go to the 3 main farms in the valley followed by all the locals ending with a good display of food and drink to be consumed at the end of the day. One of the farmers bid for the other farmer's hayrick and vice versa, the money was raised, the auctioneer was paid his fee, the Rector got his tithe amount and the community had a good party. All sorted out locally. All was done above board, minuted, and available today.

Between 1890 and 1900 an agent of the Canadian Government enticed many hundreds of farm labourers from the valley to take the free train ticket from Hemyock to Liverpool, a liner from Liverpool to Quebec and onto Winnipeg plus a free plot of 60 acres to call their own.

The March meeting was a talk by John Young, a Methodist Minister, on Rev Augustus Montague Toplady who was born in 1740 in Farnham while his father was involved as a Royal Marine in battles in the Caribbean, where as a result of the RN skirmishes around Cartegena of the Indies between Spanish and British fleets Major Richard Toplady was killed. The young Toplady then went on to Westminster School where many English Poets attended and where he became involved in the Calvinism which would be the basis of his religion. Due to his Father's roots in Ireland, A M went up to Trinity College Dublin where he earned his BA in 1760. His first position as a curate was in the diocese of Bath and Wells at Blagdon, N Somerset. Toplady wrote his famous hymn Rock of Ages in 1763. A local tradition is that he wrote the hymn after seeking shelter under a large rock at Burrington Combe, a magnificent ravine close to Blagdon, during a thunderstorm. He became the incumbent of Harpford and Venn Ottery, two villages in Devon. In 1768, however, he learned that he had been named to this incumbency because it had been purchased for him; seeing this as simony, he chose to exchange the incumbency for the post of vicar of Broadhembury, another Devon village. He would serve as vicar of Broadhembury until his death in 1778 at the young age of 38 of TB.

The April meeting will be a talk from Des Atkinson on John Norden's survey of Devon Manors and the May meeting will allow us to welcome David Pugsley back for his latest talk. We continue to scan and catalogue all the local historical documents donated to the History Group by a long term family resident in Hemyock.

#### Dear Residents

t Month 10 (Jan) it is estimated that budgets will effectively break-even by year end, with a small overspend by £291,000 A currently forecast. This is an improvement of £4.3 million compared to the Month 8 (Nov) forecast.

It is worth noting that Devon County has managed its finances very well, and taken necessary action when needed to, while other County Councils around us have run into serious financial problems.

On Wednesday 14 February, councillors agreed a 4.99 per cent increase for our part of the council tax for this coming financial year. It comprises 2.99 per cent for general services with an extra two per cent specifically for adult care.

It means an extra £1.56 a week on their bill for the average Band D householder.

It allows an increase of 10.4 per cent in spending on children's services, six per cent on adult services and 4.7 per cent on climate change, environment and transport.

Councillors also agreed an extra £1.5 million to boost regular road drainage since the target budget was set last month to tackle the increase in potholes caused by this winter's heavy rainfall.

Agreement was also given to bring the homelessness budget back up to £1.45 million to support the work of district councils and homeless organisations for another year.

This is a well-constructed budget increasing expenditure for adults and children and looking after the old, the young and the vulnerable who account for almost four fifths of the budget.

We have a finite amount of money to spend and we have to allocate it to protect those most in need. But we will ensure that we get the best possible value from every pound we spend on behalf of our residents.

A six-week public consultation was launched on Monday 12 February, on the draft proposal to create a Combined County Authority (CCA) for Devon and Torbay to oversee new powers and funding transferred from Government.

The ground-breaking devolution deal announced by Levelling Up Minister Jacob Young last month, proposes to create the CCA, which would be a formal partnership of elected members drawn from the councils of Devon and Torbay, including district councils, together with representatives from business and education.

People are being invited to have their say on how the CCA would work, the powers that it would have and the functions it would be responsible for. These include investment in local economic growth, delivering affordable housing, improving public transport, and meeting net zero ambitions.

By far the biggest issues raised at Parish Council meetings are roads and their maintenance, very rarely anything about Adults and children's services, with a combined budget of £588.7k out of County's overall revenue budget of £743.3k. That only leaves £155k to run all other services, including Roads/Highways.

Devon has the largest road network in England with 8,953 miles of roads, whilst Cornwall has over 4,500 miles of roads (Department for Transport (DfT), 2022).

In 2023, we assessed 57,000 public reports of potholes of which 12,000 were ultimately assessed as duplicates. We repaired over 53,000 potholes.

Each report we receive is assessed onsite by a trained highway safety inspector. We do not ignore any reports that we receive, however, we do have to prioritise our funding as we cannot afford to fix all of the problems that are reported to us.

We prioritise repairing potholes, on roads, that have a 40 mm (4 cm) vertical edge and are 300 mm (30 cm) wide as these are the biggest risk to highway users.

All reports should be assessed onsite within seven calendar days. Following the assessment, repairs will be carried out by the end of the next working day, seven or 28 calendar days (depending on the outcome of the assessment) if confirmed as a priority pothole. We will repair smaller potholes, and other road surface issues, as and when resources are available and as part of our planned works programmes.

We have employed extra repair gangs, to increase repairs, hopefully with better weather we will catch up.

We have had our Locality Budget restored for small donations to local organisations/clubs etc. they would needs apply to Locality Budgets at County.





#### John Griss Legacy

layhidon Parish Council is planning to hold a public meeting to discuss the John Griss legacy to the community. It will explain what has happened since this wonderful bequest was made and what may take place now.

But most of all councillors want to give everyone in the parish their chance to make sensible suggestions, thoughtful comments and serious contributions to decisions that have to be made.

This meeting will be held at the parish hall on Wednesday, April 17th at 7.30 pm.It will be chaired by Alison Weekes, chairman of the parish council, Richard Drew, vice chairman, and Nicholas King, chairman of the John Griss Charity.

Alison said:" We understand that several factors have made the situation around this wonderful and generous bequest less clear than I would have liked. These include the pandemic and the lockdowns which prevented the council holding a public meeting before. It has also been complicated by many other factors including the emotional attachment so many people had for John Griss, and a division between some councillors who wanted to sell both the land and lakes and his near derelict cottage and those who were determined to keep these assets.

The situation has also been complicated by the divided response to a village hall poll about prospects for the village hall, and by the tragic illness and early death of Donna Evans, Clayhidon's parish clerk. It was Donna who kept the community up to date with reports in the Pump and the parish website run by Gareth Weekes who died last year but had found no one willing to take to take it over.

Because of these factors and the necessity to keep financial negotiations secret, the council understands some people have felt they were not kept up to date with what has been going on with the legacy.

The Hartsmoor Lakes are now the subject of a five year lease and have been transformed by two enthusiastic and determined lessees. They will be present to explain their hard work at the site at the meeting. Supervision by the John Griss charity is enhanced by a co-opted member, Andy Don, who lives in Ashculme and is a fisheries expert for the Environment Agency. The charity is very appreciative of his help and guidance. The plan is for the fisheries to be developed and eventually bring in a substantial annual income. The land there is subject to a separate five year lease renewed annually.

After much deliberation and prolonged planning negotiations, the charity has now been paid £285,000 for Rose Cottage which will now be developed into three new homes, two of which will be low cost units to be administered by a housing association.

Separately the council has just cashed £42,000 from the sale of a small field it shared with a Churchinford charity begun in 1675 to give money to the poor of both parishes. We are awaiting advice from the Charity Commission as to the future of this money.

The parish also now has this new website which the council wants the community to use. So we hope this will improve all aspects of communication.

I would also like to point out that whatever problems we have faced with communication, we had an election for the parish council last

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Before committing to the improvements of our current hall, we thoroughly explored the possibility of constructing a new facility for our parish. Unfortunately, this option faced several challenges, including the unavailability of funding that was once accessible in previous years, the absence of suitable land owned by Clayhidon Village Hall charity, minimal community interest based on a survey, the historical significance of our existing hall, and the practical constraint of the current hall needing to remain in use until completion of a new build. These considerations underscore our dedication to making informed decisions and reinforce the importance of focusing on enhancing our existing space.

Your understanding and support are crucial as we embark on this project to ensure a thriving and meaningful community hub for years to come.

We're calling on local charities, businesses and individuals to support and volunteer during this exciting expansion.

The proposed extension of Clayhidon Village Hall is not just a physical expansion but a commitment to the well-being and prosperity of our parishioners and beyond. We eagerly anticipate your involvement, support, and enthusiasm as we embark on this exciting journey together.

#### Wellington Film Festival 2024

his year's three-day Wellington Film Festival has announced its programme, bringing a huge variety of films and supporting events to venues across the town. The programme ranges from a late-night showing of disco classic Saturday Night Fever to a movie pub quiz hosted by local TV celebrity Clinton Rogers.

Opening the festival with a multi-media spectacular the ground breaking German silent film Metropolis (Fritz Lang, 1927) will screen behind a live soundtrack from sci-fi/surf band Palooka 5 and a DJ. Its themes of an unbelievably wealthy super-class living next to the dirt-poor workers who support their spoiled lives guarantees that Metropolis stays relevant to the present day.

On a calmer note the weekend will see one of the first UK showings of Six Inches of Soil, a West Country documentary telling the story of how a group of remarkable farmers, small businesses, chefs and entrepreneurs are transforming how food is produced and consumed. Its focus on local food systems and shorter supply chains mirrors the work of Wellington's new Community Farm, illustrated in a short film of its own.

The overwhelming success of last year's combination of ET with a costumed Star Wars picnic in the town park led the festival organisers to repeat the exercise with a showing of Jurassic Park at the Wellesley followed by full-on dinosaur session around the bandstand where Wellington Silver Band will be playing movie themes.

Locally-produced heritage films to be shown in St John's church include a retrospective look at the life and work of the late Brian Hulls, an award-winning BBC cameraman who covered wars in Iraq, Bosnia and Africa but came home safe to his home in Blackdowns. In a second nod to the silent-film era the festival will show clips from Stan Laurel films featuring one of his favourite supporting actors Jack Ackroyd – who retired to Wellington when the talkies arrived.

Anticipating the arrival of the town's new station the same session will screen Railway Approaches, a nostalgic Great Western Railway publicity film shot in 1936 to celebrate the seaside towns of the South West – and the joy of travelling by train.

Contemporary film-making features in the festival's 48-Hour Film Challenge for young people. Make a movie in a weekend (that's right, only 48 hours!) – register yourself and/or your team and at the launch event you will be assigned a line of dialogue and a prop that must be included. You will then have 48 hours to write, shoot or animate and edit up to a three minute film in a genre of your choice. Tell your story with a phone, tablet or a DSLR if you have one. All eligible films made and submitted by the end of the 48 hours will be screened at Wellington Film Festival and be entered for an Award.

Steam trains always stir an audience's heart strings and so will Untouchable, the festival's sole foreign film. Filmed on location in Paris and on a true story of friendship between a quadraplegic millionaire confined to a wheelchair and his street smart ex-con caretaker Untouchable depicts an unlikely relationship rooted in honesty, kindness and humour.



"And once again we thank Wellington Town Council and Somerset Council for the generous financial support that makes the festival possible."

Also outdoors, the Sunday afternoon picnic musical on the Wellington School playing field is The Greatest Showman, starring Hugh Jackman and telling the story of P T Barnum who created and ran the world's most famous circus.
